

real name) is sitting in a chair calmly while having a conversation with a complete stranger about her history, her fidgeting indicates she is uncomfortable. Last year at this time, she would not have been conversing with anyone much less a stranger. In fact, she would have been at home afraid to venture out in the world or have contact with anyone.

Patsy is on probation after serving some time in jail. She was placed in the Texas Correctional Office on Offenders with Medical and Mental Impairments (TCOOMMI) program. TCOOMMI offers appropriate and cost effective alternatives to incarceration for offenders with special needs. The support TCOOMMI helps her of maintain the provisions of her probation. Before she entered the program, she had trouble complying completely with the terms of her probation. The diagnosis of major depression makes her eligible for the TCOOMMI program. Patsy has suffered from major depression since childhood.

Patsy's parents divorced when she was about two years old, but she alleges

Although Patsy (not her that her father began sexu-eal name) is sitting in a ally, physically, and emotionally abusing her and her sisters in their early years, and the abuse continued until she was 12.

Patsy did not have a happy childhood, so she began cutting and developed an eating disorder to ease the pain. At age 13, she was admitted into a state mental facility after committing a crime. She spent her teen years in this facility. At age 18, she was a single mother and began co-habituating with a man who was not the father of her child. She saw him as a family man who was stable, hard-working, and could take care of her and her child. She thought she had achieved the perfect picture of what a family should look like. But she soon discovered the marriage was not picture perfect.

Patsy appeared to function well in the outside world. She taught pre-kindergarten classes and held the director's position in a daycare and was a church youth director. Her family seemed to be a normal family to everyone who knew them. Not many people knew about her abuse of prescription drugs, binge drinking, cutting, or eating disorder. She could control all of it for long periods of time, and then there would be an episode that sent her crashing to the bottom.

She stated that she was 'pretty sick" when they married. During the marriage, she was hospitalized a dozen or more times for binge drinking and suicide attempts. Then one day she discovered her husband was having an affair. She attacked his girlfriend and was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. She was convicted of the crime and put on probation.

Although she had been treated for mental illness for years, she had never stayed with a treatment program for long. The probation forced her to get treatment for her mental illness. The probation department and Texoma Community Center (formerly Mental Health Mental Retardation Services of Texoma) work together to provide services for Patsy.

"For the first time in my life, I feel like I have hope for the future. Depression is not totally controlling my life. I don't think that I am a bad person, but I have made some bad choices. Now I see that I can have a better life if I use the resources available to me and get the help

I need. When I first came to Texoma Community Center, I saw the psychiatrist who realized that I had been abusing prescription drugs. She would not allow me to do that any longer," states Patsv.

"Leanne Thompson, Adult Probation, and the two Texoma Community Center employees, Kristi Gourd and Whitney Redden, have helped me change my life. This last year, I have been in therapy and have gone to group meetings. In the past, depression kept me in bed and my anxiety prevented me from being around other people. Therapy has made me deal with my issues. I believe that my life has been saved through these three women's work. I would not have found all this help if I had not been in trouble with the law. I know it sounds strange, but I know it is true. I would have continued to crash. I am now functioning in daily life and that is a huge thing for me," ends Patsy.

Help is available in Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties through Texoma Community Center. Services include: 24 hour emergency services, assertive community treatment (ACT) team, case management, cognitive behavioral therapy, community-based assessments, crisis intervention, Medicaid eligibility, medicationrelated services, respite services, skills training, small groups, supported employment, supported housing, and transportation. Mental health centers are located in each county including Cooke Mental Health Center, 319 West Dixon, Gainesville, 940-665-3962.

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

County Agent's Report

Many native trees dying as a result of last year's drought

We are experiencing a very significant decline in the native tree population in Cooke County. Especially noticeable is the loss of Blackjack and Post Oak trees. Often the first sign of problems that landowners notice is the loss of bark. This is generally caused by a fungus, known as hypoxylon canker. Hypoxylon causes cankers and death of oak and other hardwood trees. The disease is com-

the southern United States. Relatively healthy trees are not invaded by the fungus, but the hypoxylon fungus will readily infect the sapwood of a tree that has been damaged, stressed, or weakened.

The drought of last summer is certainly a stress that may have promoted this disease. According to the Texas Forest Service, hypoxylon canker activity usually increases when prolonged drought occurs. It is difficult for hypoxylon canker to develop in wood that has normal moisture content. When stress occurs, the fungus can become active in the tree and invade and decay the sapwood causing the tree to die. Once hypoxylon actively infects a tree, the tree will likely die.

Noticeable thinning of the crown or branch dieback, may be some of the first signs of the disease. As the fungus develops, small sections of bark will slough from the trunk and branches and collect at the base of the tree. Where the bark has sloughed off, tan, olive green, or reddishbrown, powdery spores can be seen. By the time the spores become visible, the tree is dead. In four to eight weeks, these tan areas will turn dark brown to black and become hard. They have the appearance of solidified tar. After several months, the areas will become a silvergrav color.

Once the fungus invades the tree, the sapwood begins to rapidly decay. Dark decay lines can be seen running through the wood. Removing

mon in Texas and all across on structures, roads, fences, powerlines, etc., should be removed as soon as possible.

All oak trees are susceptible to hypoxylon canker, as are elm, pecan, hickory, sycamore, maple, beech, and more. The fungus spreads by airborne spores that apparently infect trees of any age by colonizing the inner bark. The fungus is known to be present in many healthy trees and can survive for long periods of time in the inner bark without invading the sapwood. As mentioned earlier, when a tree is weakened or stressed, the fungus may then invade the sapwood and become one of several factors that ultimately cause the tree to die.

According to Joe Pase III, of the Texas Forest Service, there is no known control for hypoxylon canker other than maintaining tree vigor. Apparently the spores of this fungus are so common in most areas that removing trees infected with hypoxylon canker is of little value in controlling the spread of the disease. Also, infected firewood is not considered to be a source of innoculation. The fungus does not kill groups of trees by spreading from tree to tree. There is usually little that can be done to avoid naturally occurring stress factors, but many mancaused stress factors can be avoided. During drought periods, supplemental watering is recommended, if the tree is near a water source. Also, avoid compacting root systems during construction. Damage to tree roots predisposes a tree to infection by
