



But when the Government borrows money from the banking system, it is an entirely different story. The treasury signs promissory notes or bonds for the desired amount. Our commercial banks accept a Government bond or note as if it were a cash deposit. The Government then writes checks on such deposits, to pay, for example, a military plane manufacturer. The manufacturer deposits the Government checks in his company's bank account. In turn, he writes checks to pay his workers, and his bills for aluminum, electronic plane equipment, etc.

Unlike money collected in taxes, the borrowing process has created a billion dollars that did not exist before, and put it into circulation. This flow of new checkbook money inflates our total money supply just as surely as if the Government had printed a billion in paper "greenbacks" and spent that instead.
