### MANY DIE FROM GAS BETTER BE CAREFUL

AUSTIN .- With the advent of cold weather each year in this State, several deaths are usually reported, resulting from asphyxiation by gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes or sleeping quarters.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning in theme will be featured. this respect, emphasizing that it is never safe to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no gas leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated and unfit to breathe.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have at least one windown on the 9 just as the half ther is too cold to permit an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room where a window can be opened.'

Dr. Cox said he was prompted to issue this warning early in the season because of the fact that thousands of new residents in the State have come from districts where they have been used to burning coal, wood or oil, and they do not know the dangers of gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes.

"Occupying a room heated by an open gas flame and at the same time keeping the room tightly closed, may prove disastrous the very first time it is tried," Dr. Cox said. "It is better not to risk it even one time. Always be sure that your room has plenty of fresh air, but make doubly sure when you have a gas fire burning."

AUSTIN .- In a statement on controlling communicable diseases issued by the Texas State Department of Health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer sta tes that if every case of suspected communicable disease were seen promptly by the family physician and definitely diagnosed, thousands of susceptible persons would be protected from these

disabling diseases. "The theory that it is a good thing for children to have these catching childhood diseases and get them over with, has long since been proven an error which may actually endanger a child's

State Health Depart-"The ment," Dr. Cox said, "does everything within its power to protect the health of the people of Texas, but the cooperation of every individual in protecting his own health and that of his community will do more than anything else to successfully check the spread of communisuccessfully cable diseases among our peo-

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

THE EGG AND YOU

Something's got to be done about it, and right quick. Just imagine, I went to my pet grocery store today and bought a pound of butter for the paltry sum of 71c, just 28c less than I paid a few weeks ago. What's the matter with the Administration and its economic planners? With the price of butter already down to 71c a pound, and threatening to go even lower, things have come to a pretty pass, in-

The first thing you know, most of us will be able to buy butter without first having to cash in a government bond. And that would be just too bad; that's something the Administration planners must not allow to happen, and you can depend upon it, they won't. As for us, we will accept no alibis, no excuses

— they can get the price of
butter up again — look what they've been able to do with

with eggs and other foodstuffs. Let's pause for a moment to see what they've done with eggs. They worked miracles with them. All through the midwest states a spell ago the hens really began to go to work -they stepped up their production. Now, don't blame the poor hens. You see, no one has ever told them about the Government-price-sup- \$1000. creating surpluses. So, the first with Mass vestments. when the Government egg-buy-ers went to town. They worked so well that they soon got the situation well in hand are now back up to 95c a doz-

Of course, it took a lot of our tax money to accomplish this worthy (?) objective. But what does that matter? Aren't eggs once again priced so high that we cannot afford to buy them? What do we care about the measly \$28,000,000 the Government paid out so far this year up to the middle of October to purchase 2,866,834 cases (with 30 dozen eggs to the case)?

And don't let it disturb you in the slightest that most of these Government-purchased eggs will be allowed to decompose. The Government boys got 'em away from us didn't they? That's what really counts. The Secretary of Agriculture says, "So far we have gotten rid of 3,175,000 pounds of these dried eggs. We have donated them to school lunch programs and the like. It's possible that we may sell some of these dried eggs later."

Don't let that statement alarm ou too much. If they them, the dried eggs will be sold at a big loss, and in markets that can not affect the price you pay for eggs at the corner grocery store.

But, to be serious, isn't it ridiculous? That is too mild a word. It's crazy. Here we are paying more tax money to make certain that we will have to pay more money for our food. Why do we, a supposedly intelligent people, put up with such arrogant nonsense?

Well, we have just elected a new Congress which will go into action next January. The first piece of business of the 81st Congress should be to unscramble this Government omelet; put a stop to this squandering of tax funds in order to keep food pri-

ces beyond our ability to pay.






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
