LYLOYD POOL IS ACTIVE AREA OF THE COUNTY

The Lloyd Oil Corporation expanded in its No. 1. Bailey offshoots on its Collier lease in the Lloyd pool near Brooksmith, last Thursday, after having brought in the best well in that pool and also another good producer during the previous two weeks.

The No. 10 Collier was completed a little over two weeks ago and proved to be the biggest producer that has been brought in in that area, coming in with a production of around 50 barrels a day. This was followed, as learned from the statements of Ray Hoff, superintendent of the Lloyd Oil Corporation by Collier No. 11 with a production of about 15 barrels a day. Both are from the pay found in that pool at around 425 feet.

These leases are near the railroad and a switch and loading equipment are being put in for shipping the oil which has been contracted to the T. & P. refinery at Port Worth.

Power for pumping the eleven producers now on the leases is being put in, and foundation for engine was run last Friday. A 25 horse power Diesel oil engine will be installed.

There is now about 1,000 barrels of storage on these leases, all full, and 500 barrels more storage is being added by the putting in of this other 250 barrel tank.

The Lloyd Oil Corporation in addition to its operation in this field is getting ready to drill a deep test on an 80,000 acre block between Del Rio and El Paso. Mr. Hoff states.

LAST CHARGE TO GRAND JURY BY WOODWARD

"Very seldom is a man convicted on a charge of assault with intent to commit murder," said District Judge J. O. Woodward, when he scanned the criminal docket while making his charge to the grand jury Monday afternoon. "Many times the assault is merely aggravated assault with no intent to kill," he said. "But, gentlemen, I expect you to act on each such case on the testimony given."

In making his charge Judge Woodward said that this would be the last time he would ever have this duty to perform, and that he had done it in Brown county forty-six times herebefore. "In Brown county," he said, "the law is as well enforced as in any in Texas, and it is always a pleasure to me to come here. There is no better citizenship, no better law enforcement, or no better grand jury in the state than in this county."

He mentioned District Attorney Walter U. Early with whom he had worked for twelve years and told the jury that he has never known Mr. Early to do anything in office that was not worthy of high high position, that he has been an honest man in his duties and that he could be trusted by the jury.

Liquor Violations In referring to the liquor cases the judge said that every man in Brown county who makes whiskey or home brew in his home, even for his own use only, should be indicted. "Driving while drunk" cases called from him the words that these men are the most dangerous ones in any community and that the law should give them the limit.

In glancing over several cases where men were charged with stealing automobiles, a thing he said that is growing less, he wished someone would steal his car and he would be better off. admonished the jury to do its full duty and "let the chip fall where they may."

RECOVERY OF LEPER IS HAILED AS A TRIUMPH OF MODERN MEDICINE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—John Early, the leper, whose love for his native mountains of North Carolina gave health authorities much trouble and newspapers much copy, is going home again.

But this time he goes, not as a fugitive from a leper's asylum, but with the benediction of the authorities. The United States Public Health Service has announced that Early has "recovered" and will be released some time in November from the national leper home in Carville, La.

And remembering the time when the burial service was real in English churches over a leper after the dread mephitic was discovered, those at the leper home still suffering from the disease, will send Early out with ceremonies symbolic of the joy of men once doomed who have in prospect a reprieve.

Still Bears Scars

The Public Health Service terms Early's case "another triumph in modern medicine." Although he bears on his face and body scars of the disease, he is believed to be well. Periodic tests will be made but there seems scant danger of a relapse. The health service reports that since 1921 only one leper discharged from the Carville institution as cured has suffered a recurrence of the disease. During the last 16 months, 24 patients have been discharged from the leper home.

Although Early's frequent escapes from institution, where he was confined caused vexation at the time,

health authorities seem inclined to think that his absence without leave were for the best. They credit him with creating sentiment that aided in passing the law placing leper under the care of the Public Health Service.

Caused Big Stir

He made an unauthorized appearance in Washington in 1923 and registered at a hotel but he caused his greatest stir in 1927 when he fled back to his old home near Tyrone, North Carolina, and procured a rifle as insurance against more confinement. Residents of the section petitioned the surgeon general to suspend the federal law governing the segregation of lepers and to let the man spend his days in self-imposed isolation in a section of the North Carolina hills. The petition, habes corpus proceedings and Early's rifle did not keep him from going back to Carville.

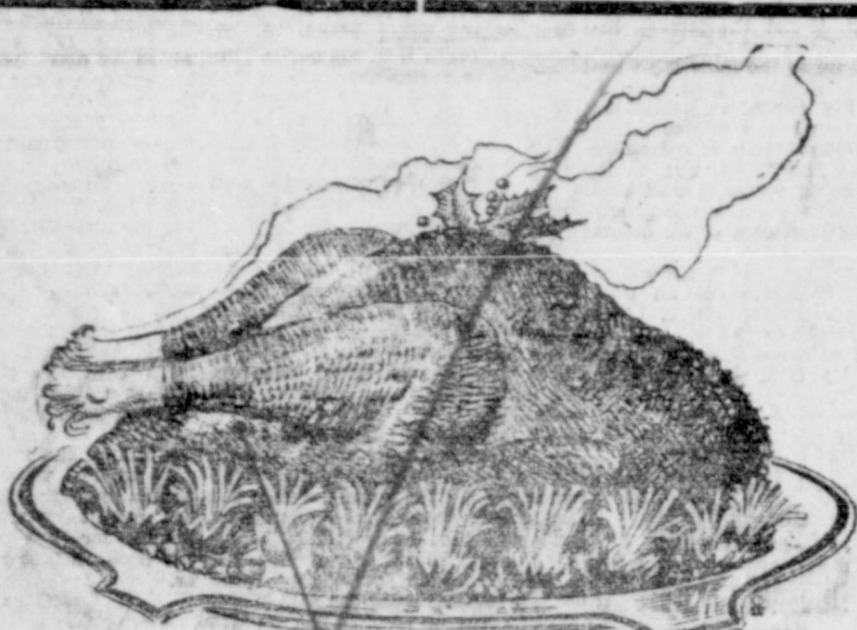

BUTTER-NUT ENLARGES PLANT TO TAKE CARE OF WHOLESALE TRADE

Butter Nut Bread Company, at 203 East Lee Street, has recently deserted the retail field and in the future will operate in the wholesale field, and in preparation for this move, the company has added approximately \$5,000 worth of new equipment. The Butter Nut Bread Company is owned by the Southwest Baking Company of Dallas, and has been operating in Brownwood since January 1, 1928. Earl Hancock is manager of the Brownwood plant.

The new equipment added has made of the local plant one of the most up-to-date and one of the most sanitary in the city. Bread and other bakery products can now be made entirely by machinery, and without human hands touching it, either in preparing the dough or in handling the finished product.

The new equipment added, includes two new ovens, with a total capacity of about 750 loaves of Butter Nut Bread per hour, a new Thompson moulding machine that has an output of one loaf per second, a new wrapping machine that handles about 350 loaves per hour, a new dough brake that makes for better quality and a high speed mixer. In addition to this, a new electric sign has been erected in front of the building occupied by the company.

**Christmas Plum
Pudding Recipe**

Miss Maymie Malone, home demonstration agent, thinks that not only should we do our Christmas shopping early, but that we should do our Christmas cooking early, and herewith gives a recipe for a Christmas plum pudding. She claims that plum puddings and fruit cakes cooked in the pressure cooker save much time and fuel.

The plum pudding recipe is as follows:

Mix in a bowl the following dry ingredients:

One cup seeded raisins, 1 cup clean currants, 1-2 lb. shredded citron, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. nutmeg, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 2 cups nut meats, any sprinkle over this mixture 1 cup flour, 1 pt. stale bread crumbs (rolled or ground fine). Mix well with other things.

Beat 3 eggs dissolve 1-2 tsp soda in 2 tablespoons of hot water, add this to 1-2 cup molasses, the grated rind and juice of 1 lemon and 1-2 cup grape juice, mix all liquids together and all other mixture, pack in molds which have been lined with paper and well greased, to 3-4 full place tops slightly on cans (baking powder cans are good or 1 lb. coffee cans) place in cooker with enough water to last for 1 hour's cooking with pet cock open then close pet cock and run pressure up to 15 or 20 lbs. for about 10 min. Let steam off and dry puddings in oven.

These may be canned and kept for years.

These puddings are best served hot so place them in a colander which is over boiling water and steam until it is heated thoroughly. Serve at once with hot sauce.

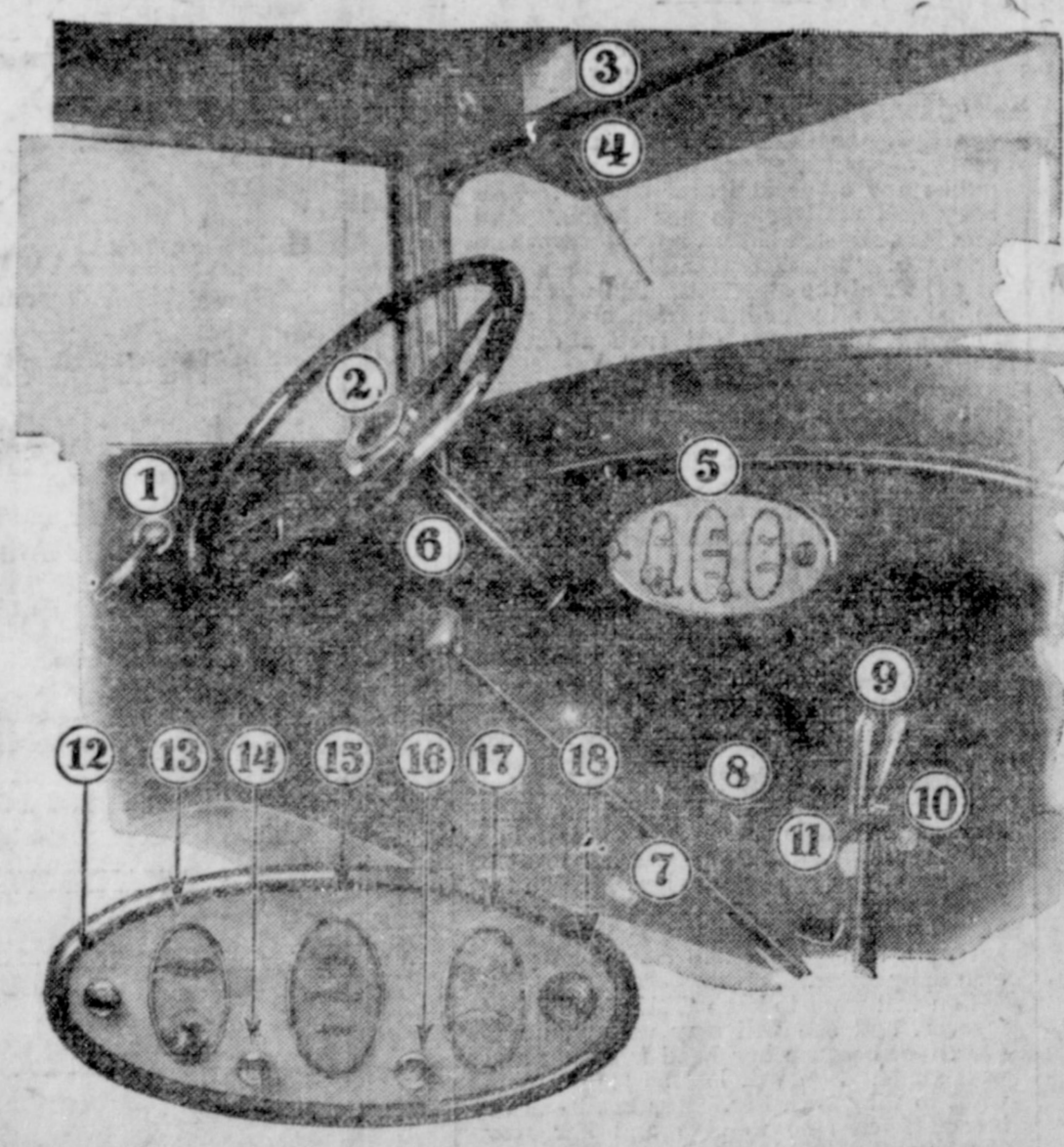

MEANING OF CURTILAGE NOT TO BE RESTRICTED IS OPINION OF COURT

AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The meaning of "curtilage" should not be so restricted as to cause failure to protect the home against "officious disturbers of its peace and quietude" nor so expanded as to make a refuge for criminals, the Court of Criminal Appeals observed today in affirming the one year sentence of Richard Worth, Franklin county, for possession of liquor equipment.

Worth contended that officers in entering his orchard without a search warrant, about 100 yards from his dwelling, violated the constitutional protection against "unreasonable search within the curtilage" which refers broadly to premises about a home.

The officers found a still in the orchard and another one some 300 or 400 yards from the dwelling.

er, wife of the man who was shot, who told her version of the affair and events of the day leading up to it.

Wanted to Search Place

Mr. Wood's testimony was to the effect that the mayor had come to him at the city hall about 5 p. m. Sunday and wanted him to go with him to search a place, and Mr. Wood said he could not go as they had not the required search warrant for it.

Mrs. Maner's story was to the effect that Mr. McInnis had stopped her husband, herself and two friends on the road south of Blanket, had called Mr. Maner from the car, had a few words with him, struck him three times and then shot him.

Mrs. Maner was cross-examined by Will J. Scott, attorney for Mr. McInnis.

"Where did you and Mr. Maner go Sunday morning?" Mr. Scott asked her.

"To our uncle's home in the country," she answered.

"Did you get a gallon jug of liquor at Jess Stewart's?" was the next question.

Mrs. Maner refused to answer until Judge Parkinsin told her to answer "yes" or "no", whereupon she said they got there a gallon jug of grape juice.

"Was that the same jar of grape juice which was thrown from the car after the shooting?" Mr. Scott asked her.

She said it was.

Denies Under Influence of Liquor

The final question he put to her was, "Where not all four of you in the car under the influence of liquor," to which she replied, "No."

The examining trial was first scheduled for Tuesday, then was postponed until Thursday, and finally postponed to Friday. At ten o'clock there were so many present in Judge Parkinsin's office, that the place of holding it was changed to the county court room, and that room was kept packed by those who wanted to see and hear the testimony.

The trial had one odd angle, in that T. C. Wilkinson, Sr., appeared as an attorney for Mr. McInnis while his son, T. C. Wilkinson, Jr., on the other side, is county attorney, who took down the evidence. On Mr. McInnis' side were Mr. Wilkinson, Mr. Scott and A. L. Kirkpatrick, Mr. Scott doing all the cross examining. The defendant appeared with his right arm in a sling, his wrist having been broken. It was said, during the time of the shooting.

Prosecuting Attorney Walter J. Early led for the state, and was assisted by Gih Calloway, attorney for the Maners.

Mr. Early began the trial by explaining to the mayor that he could make a statement or not at that time, as he desired. On advice of his attorney Mr. McInnis refused to say anything.

Mr. Wood said in his testimony that Mr. McInnis came to the city hall about 5 p. m. Sunday where Wood was on duty. In the car with him was a son and woman, whom he did not know. The mayor told Mr. Wood, he said, that he and the girl in the car would make a complaint and asked Mr. Wood to go with them to search a place. Mr. Wood said he told him that he could not do it without a search warrant, whereupon the mayor tried to get in touch

with the city attorney and the city judge by telephone, but failed.

The mayor then asked if there was a blank warrant he could get. Mr. Wood said. The policeman told him that there was none there he could lay his hands on, as they were locked up.

"If I can't get any help from the law, I'll get my gun and kill the mayor," Mr. Wood said the mayor said at this point.

Mr. Wood then tried to get the mayor to wait until they could get in touch with the attorney or judge and get the proper papers, but he said that once more the mayor tried to get him to go with him, and not succeeding drove off down Anderson Street and turned left on Hawkins.

He further said in his testimony that he heard of the shooting about an hour and a half after seeing and talking to the mayor, and that in the mayor's conversation with him he did not mention whose house he wanted searched nor where it was.

Mr. Scott then asked Mr. Wood in what state the mayor seemed to be when he was talking to him, and Mr. Wood replied that Mr. McInnis seemed to be mad and excited.

Wife's Testimony

Mrs. Maner said she and Mr. Maner have been married for nineteen months and that Sunday they spent most of the day at the home of their parents, 811 Melwood Avenue, and that they were there until about 3 p. m. On cross examination she said that she and her husband had gone to the home of an uncle, Jess Stewart, Sunday morning, and there had gotten a gallon jar of grape juice, and that about noon at their home, Palmer C. McInnis, Jr. had come, stayed a while and had had some of the grape juice to drink.

At about 3 p. m. she said that she and Mr. Maner drove in their car to Comanche to bring back friends. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hammond of Brownwood, who had gone there to visit. On returning to this city, Mr.

and Mrs. Maner being in the front seat, with Mr. Maner driving, they had passed Blanket and met a car with Mr. McInnis and his son, James riding in it. She said that Mr. McInnis asked them to stop, which they did. Turning his car about, she said the mayor drove by them and parked in front of them. Getting out of his car the mayor walked back toward theirs, and Mr. Maner got out to see what he wanted, she said.

Near the rear of the Maner car, Mrs. Maner said, the mayor said to Mr. Maner, "You gave my boy whisky", and before Maner could reply he struck him in the temple, throwing Maner against the rear fender. Twice more Mr. McInnis struck Mr. Maner, before Mrs. Maner said she could get between them.

When she arrived on the scene, Mrs. Maner said she saw a pistol in the hands of the mayor and that he was pulling back the trigger with his thumb. She said she then pleaded with the mayor to stop and said to him that Clyde did not give his son whisky.

Mr. McInnis then said, according to Mrs. Maner's testimony, that Maner was responsible for having a wrecked car, and Clyde answered that if his car was wrecked it was not his fault.

Mrs. Maner said that the mayor threatened to shoot her if she did not keep away as he pushed her away once. She said that several cars passed long the road as they talked and that at each car passing the mayor hid his gun under his coat.

"Clyde saw Mr. McInnis was about to shoot," said Mrs. Maner, and he placed both his hands on

my shoulders to try to push me away, and while in that position the mayor shot him."

She then described how the mayor's little son grabbed his father's arm and begged him not to shoot again and the two struggled for a time in the road, until the mayor finally went to his car. Mrs. Maner called to Mr. Hammond directly after the shooting to help her get Clyde in the car, which he did. Mr. Hammond had once before just stepped from the car, Mrs. Maner said, but on the mayor pointing his gun at him, he had gotten back in.

Mrs. Maner then told of getting the injured man in the car and driving to the hospital. Mr. Scott asked Mrs. Maner if she heard the mayor say to her, they "had better get Clyde to a hospital or a doctor or he would bleed to death," and Mrs. Maner answered that she did not.

The following witnesses were called and sworn, but only two were used: Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hammond, Mrs. Maner, Ellis Daughtry, George Knutson and Mr. Wood.

Signing the bond for Mr. McInnis were the following men: Frank Grantham, Arch V. King, R. G. Hallum, R. M. Lew, J. F. Renfro, Thos. H. Taylor, J. J. Timmins, Ed B. Gilliam, John T. Yantis and Fred S. Abney.
