Blood Bank Rates As Big Asset to Patients, Hospital

Muenster Knights of Columbus this week remind the community that Wednesday, June 24, is Blood Bank Day . . . and please mark the calendar.

As a member of the Red Cross blood bank system this community's hospital and its patients, along with other residents of the hospital district, have an efficient and economical arrangement for blood transfusions. Volunteers donate blood twice a year and persons who need blood can get it free any time. A charge is made to cover collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, infusing and other services but none for the blood. It means that the average cost per unit of blood in the Muenster hospital has been reduced from \$46 to \$26. It also means that the hospital saves about \$150 per month on stocking fees.

Muenster made its first deposit in the blood bank on December 17, and started drawing on the account, on credit, 19 days before. The deposit amounted to 59 units and withdrawals amount to 48 units. Eleven units remain in the account. It's time for another deposit. So, the next visit of the Bloodmobile at Muenster is scheduled for Wednesday, June 24.

The shortness of the ticket accounts for the election's exceptionally small turnout. Total votes cast were slightly over 2,000 out of the county's voting strength of about 10,000. Muenster voted slightly over 10 per cent, a total of 99 in both precincts. North Muenster favored Scoggin 63-16. South Muenster favored him 18-2.

Father Bede Mitchell officiated at the final rites and George J. Carroll & Son Funeral Home was in charge of burial in Lindsay Cemetery.

Rosary was recited at 8 p.m. Wednesday in the Carroll Chapel. Ben Streng had lived in California the past 30 years. He was in the construction business. His wife was the former Katie Block of Lindsay. She died while the couple lived there.

Surviving are two sons, Lawrence of Lindsay and Walter of Houston; two daughters Mrs. Margaret Knight and Mrs. Pauline Stone of Fort Worth; two brothers, John Streng of Muenster and Sylvester Streng of Temple; three sisters, Mrs. Theresa Moster and Miss Lena Streng of Muenster and Mrs. Joe Prescher of Lindsay; 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

It appears to be a system that works if school authorities have the gumption to use it.

Unfortunately, however, we can't depend on the right attitude at all of the universities. A recent news report tells that one school permitted one of the Chicago Seven to speak at an assembly but declined to allow an assembly for a Freedom Foundation program.

The principle of academic freedom has been misused for many years to cover a multitude of sins. Wild ideas are tolerated on the theory that every idea deserves a hearing and that open minded students are free to accept or reject. But the sad fact is that the radicalism is favored. The same degree of "academic freedom" is not allowed, and certainly not encouraged, for presenting the traditional American way. Many students nowadays are subjected to a barrage of propaganda telling what's wrong with their country but hear very little of what's right with it.

Despite all that, the nation can still be proud and pleased that only a comparative few students are taken in by the false prophets. The records show that the vast majority is loyal and sensible and dedicated to its job of getting an education. They refuse to get involved in radicalism.

Conservation Men From India Spend Two Weeks Here

Personnel of Muenster soil conservation work unit are hosts for two weeks to two conservation officials of India. The men are spending 29 weeks in the United States and are assigned to the Gainesville SCS office from June 1 to July 10.

The men are Nityananda Pattanayak, 31, of the Korapat District, Orissa, India. He has a BS degree in agronomy from the Agricultural Institute of Allahabad, is a soil conservation officer at Orissa. The other is Ranjit K. Mukherjee, 39, of Hazaribogh, Bihar, India. He has a B Tech degree in agricultural engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology, is a district director of soil conservation. They are Pat and Mike to the local SCS men.

Their purpose here is to study techniques and procedures of planning, designing and installing erosion and flood control structures and special land treatment and management in high sediment output areas in order to stop erosion. They are spending much of their time working with the Muenster personnel on the special erosion control program recently approved in the northwest part of the county.

The remaining 23 weeks of the visitors' time in this country is being spent mostly in southern and north central states.

Bank Starts Work On Addition and Drive-In Window

Floor space in the Muenster State Bank will be almost doubled by an addition which got under way last week.

Andy Schoech is in charge of construction on the 25 x 36 2-floor annex at the back of the present building. Its walls will be structural tile and brick with outside matching the present walls and inside brick of another color.

The lower floor of the addition will have a conference room, a lounge, a snack bar, a rest room and storage area. All of the upper floor will be used for storage.

The project includes major changes for the front part of the building. A drive-in window will be installed at the south side and the tellers' department will be moved to that area so that the tellers will be near the drive in window. The inside service windows will face north, whereas they now face east.

The lobby floor, which will be part terrazo and part asphalt tile after re-arrangements, will be covered with carpet. Desks of bank officers will be located in the lobby.

The lobby and teller department will occupy all of the front room of the bank. The bookkeeping machines, now in the teller area, will be moved to the room which is used as a conference room.

If more bookkeeping space is needed a present storage room beyond the conference room will be converted to that purpose.

Community Is Busy With Grain Harvest

Harvest at Muenster is off to a good start but as of Wednesday afternoon farmers are sweating out the "like-ly showers" predicted in the weather report.

Grain dealers estimate that the wheat crop is about one fourth harvested after starting during the past weekend and going strong through several days of favorable weather. Meanwhile some of the wheat is waiting for the harvesting of oats that had been windrowed before the rain or for barley.

Progress has advanced far enough to indicate that average wheat yields in the community are 30 to 35 bushels per acre and average oats

yields are 60 to 65 bushels per acre. In cash value the crops are about equal. Wheat prices are \$1.15 to \$1.20 per bushel and oats prices average 60 cents a bushel.

Quality of the grain has been good, with high test and low moisture content. However dampness increased slightly Tuesday and Wednesday because of increased humidity.

Ray Hess was reported as resting uneasily Thursday morning in Muenster Hospital as a result of injuries sustained Wednesday morning when a tractor turned over on him. He sustained a broken pelvis and possible other internal injuries.

The accident occurred about 9:30 while he operating a tractor and mower on his farm about two miles south of Muenster. The tractor toppled into a ditch with him, and the rear wheel fell over on him pinning him down. He lay there for about two hours before he was discovered by Jimmy Hendricks, a Bohner Oil Co. pumper who saw the overturned tractor from the road.

Hess remained conscious all the time, giving credit to the water he frequently splashed into his face from a pool beside him.

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
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Parish Societies Name Delegates To CSL Meeting

Some Students Do Not Have to Pay Withholding Tax

The Tax Reform of 1969 is helping thousands of Texas students save time and trouble on filing an income tax return this year. This summer students who will not owe any income tax for the year can fill out the new Withholding Exemption Certificate, Form W-4E. This authorizes their employer to stop withholding tax and they won't have to file an income tax return next January 1 to get their money back. The same rule applies to some retired persons and part-time workers. For 1970, a single person who makes less than \$1,725 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,100 low income allowance and a personal exemption of \$625. A taxpayer over 65 can earn wages up to \$2,350 without incurring a tax liability. If you qualify, talk to your payroll office, but you will not ordinarily qualify if you are married, due to the community property law in Texas.



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
