The column this week presents another Tale with a Twist, clipped from Update, monthly publication of the National Association of Manufacturers. Entitled "Passing of Big Brother" and written by Joseph C. Keeley, it presents a view of official snooperism and welfare waste.

There was once a small boy who lived in a house near a country lane. One day some surveyors showed up, then a lot of workmen came with machines, and they turned the country lane into a highway.

The boy was delighted. "Now," he said, "when I grow up I will be living in a house by the side of the road and I'll be a friend to man. Better yet, I will be a brother to everyone." And from that time forth he tried his best to be just that.

He became the most helpful fellow you ever saw. Whenever anyone passed by, he smiled and waved at them; and if they stopped, he would talk to them and try to assist them. He would give them directions, offer them a drink of water from the well, even clean their dirty windshields. **Fame Spreads**

Throughout that area he became famous for his helpfulness and generosity. Whenever there was anything to be done, he could be counted on to help; and when people showed up at his door collecting for charity, he never told them he had given at the office.

He became such a friend to man that he was known far and wide as Big Brother.

But as time went on, Big Brother slowly changed. Where he used to help out only when people asked for his help, he now insisted on helping them. Where he used to give advice only when he was asked for it, he started telling people what he thought was best for them. Further, he insisted that they do as he told them. Where he used to show a friendly interest in what his neighbors were doing, he turned into a nosy busybody, prying into all their going and comings, and spreading all kinds of malicious gossip about them. To make matters worse, in his anxiety to help people by making them do what he thought was right, he began reporting them to the constable.

As for giving to worthy causes, even this changed. He made up his own list of things that he felt should be done to help his fellow man, and it was a long and strange list indeed. With this, he was constantly badgering others for contributions; and if they were reluctant to give, he became downright threatening.

## C of C Endorses Amendment on Jobs thru Bonds

Interest at Tuesday's Chamber of Commerce meeting was centered principally on the proposed constitutional amendment on the November 7 ballot allowing the state to set up a program entitled "Jobs for Texas through Revenue Bonds."

Leo M. Kuehn of Gainesville explained the proposition, pointing out that it permits a political subdivision like a county or city to raise funds by a bond issue to help finance a new business in the area, thereby creating job opportunities.

Kuehn said that the program was developed by the Texas Industrial Commission and Gene Davenport is serving as district coordinator. He also said that the idea is far from new. Forty six states have it now. Also, 51 known corporations with job potentials of 21,000 those other states last year because Texas could not offer the financing provision.

The proposition is recommended especially to the smaller communities which do not have the help of big banks. Its method is to issue revenue bonds to raise the money and to retire bonds only by revenue, not by tax. Also mentioned were special precautions plus observance of present laws to help avoid bad investments.

Chamber members adopted a resolution endorsing the amendment and urged all to recommend a favorable vote for it at the election.

From there SH gained 13 before the teams exchanged kicks again. Then Bednorz passed to Mel Walterscheid for 12 and Kenny Hartman picked up 13, and the drive fizzled. Following a short kick by the Tigers, Anna then moved 28 to the Tiger 30 and attempted a field goal, which fell short.

## Sixth St. Traffic Change Is Official

Now it's official. Sixth street is a one way street on the single block from Main to Oak, and a two way street east of Oak.

City Superintendent Steve Mosler announced Wednesday that the proper signs are erected and drivers are expected to observe them even though the parking stripes on the north side of the street remain slanted for east bound traffic. Regardless of direction of the stripes people are reminded to park properly for a two way street. The correct parking slants will be painted soon.

The change to two way was made in response to a request from Sacred Heart School, to allow bus loading and unloading at the curb rather than in the street. Objections were raised because other traffic problems were expected to result.

## Tough Job Awaits Tigers at Nolan Saturday Night

Sacred Heart Tigers will take on a big job Saturday night at Fort Worth when they meet Nolan High, which is rated considerably higher and also claims a more impressive record. According to UIL classification the teams would be AAA and B, and according to experience to date the Vikings have been doing well in competition with AA teams.

Though stuck with the unimpressive 0-5 standing, Nolan has close losses that still signify power. It lost 7-6 to Northwest-Justin, 10-6 to Decatur and 17-6 to St. Marks, which is rated No. 1 among the state's private schools.

Coach Eddie Stock said he's not posted on Viking particulars but very much impressed by close losses to strong teams. He's expecting a tough game, but he's also confident that his boys will measure up to their potential and break out of the loss column.

## Blood Collection Dated October 25

The semi-annual collection for Muenster's blood bank will be held on Wednesday, October 25, according to an announcement this week by the Red Cross blood center of Wichita Falls.

Personnel of the center will have their facilities set up in the K of C hall from 2 to 7 p.m. and will be assisted by local hospital and hospital auxiliary personnel.

The quota again is set at 100 pints, the quantity normally used in a half by the hospital district receiving transfusions in other hospitals.

People are urged to mark the date on their calendars and make special efforts to provide for the community's needs.

## Wet-Dry Election Ordered for City's Annexed Areas

In an election to be held on Saturday, November 4, people of Muenster will decide whether to extend the wet status to all of the city. At this time the only wet area is that which was in the city limits at the time of the original election.

To change the situation a petition for election was submitted to the commissioners court at its regular meeting Monday. Finding it in order, the court ordered a special wet-dry election applying to all of the area which has been annexed to the city since the previous election. If it passes the city council will decide what parts of the annexed area will be permitted to sell alcoholic drinks.

Funeral service for Mildred Swan, 54, was held Monday at 9 a.m. in the St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church in Chula Vista, Calif., and burial was in Glen Abbey Memorial Park of San Diego. She died at 5 a.m. Friday, the 6th, after an illness of about a year.

Mrs. Swan was the former Mildred Becker, born in St. Joseph, Iowa, on March 28, 1924. She spent her childhood and youth in Lindsay and was married on November 27, 1943, to Richard Fette who was killed in a plane crash on January 20, 1944, near San Diego.

Her second marriage was to Frank Swan Jr. on March 6, 1945, in El Cerrito, Calif. He died Sept. 25, 1977.

Last week's renewal of the old Muenster-Celina football relationship was a repeat of previous performances. The Hornets came out a poor second as they had twice in bi-district games and once in regular season. This time the score was 32-8.

A part of the problem was simply that they could not peak their enthusiasm two weeks in a row. They lacked the fire that was very apparent in the one point loss to Pilot Point. Another factor is that Celina, the perennial power house, had its customary good team, plus apparently its readiness for the Hornets.

MHS started the game with a nice drive that became a disappointment when the Bobcat defense decided to call a halt about the time that Muenster threatened.

Promptly after that Celina punted and the Hornets made more midfield gains that could not be sustained.

As if adding insult to injury, the Bobcats then demonstrated how easy it was to score. From midfield quarterback Bart Miller connected with glue fingered Chemmie Terry, who sailed all the way to the goal. A try for extra point failed as the quarter ended.

The second period was a standoff until near the end when a second big pass play went to the MHS 2 yard line. With time left for only one more play Dwight Cherry plowed into the middle for the second Celina TD. Again the try for extra point failed. The Bobcats led 12-0 at the half.

Early in the second half Celina put on its drive for the third touchdown, the scoring play being a pitchout to Rhodes followed by a 14 yard dash to the goal. For the third time the extra point conversion

## United Way Drive Has \$90,000 Goal

The Cooke County United Fund campaign for 1978 got under way last week Thursday with a record goal of \$90,000, an increase of \$10,000 over last year's goal.

The drive is headed by Wilburn O. Echols, president and Bob Welch, campaign chairman. Community chairmen have not been named.

Funds collected in the drive will be given to twelve agencies of the county, and the total amount budgeted to all determines the campaign goal.

Funding for the separate organizations is planned as follows: Red Cross, \$13,500; Boy Scouts, \$8,500; Camp Fire Girls, \$12,000; FFA and 4-H, \$3,000; Council on Alcoholism, \$300; Gainesville Boys Club, \$29,000; Muenster Youth Council, \$1,400; Salvation Army, \$8,500; SW Dabetic Foundation, \$7,000; Texas Rehabilitation Hospital, \$600; Texas United Community Services, \$250; United Service Organization, \$600.

Endres told the court that a contract is needed if Muenster firemen continue answering rural fire calls. The reason is that the fire department's insurance does not apply on unauthorized runs. In case of a casualty the city would become liable.

## Larry Wimmer Buys Kerr-McGee Service Station

Larry Wimmer is the new owner and manager of Muenster's Kerr-McGee Service Station and Store, which until lately carried the Mobil name. He bought the business from Kenny Cain, effective last Saturday when he received the necessary state licenses, and changed its name to Larry's Kerr-McGee.

Wimmer will continue the usual service station sales and services while selling groceries, beer and convenience store items.

He is a native of Muenster and has been living in Plano since graduating from Muenster High School in 1961. His wife, the former Patricia Fette, is also a native and graduate of MHS.

Associated with Cain's former business but not included in the deal with Wimmer is the C&G Muffler Shop next door, which is jointly owned by Cain and Larry Gobble. Cain now is making it a full time business.

## City and County Continue Fuss on Rural Fire Calls

The matter of payments by the county for rural fire runs made by the Muenster Fire Department remains unsettled.

At its Monday meeting the commissioners court proposed a contract retroactive to Aug. 1, 1977, providing no compensation for fire runs from then until Aug. 1, 1979. Mayor Leonard Endres said he would submit the contract to the city council for its consideration but would not recommend approval.

The problem originated on Aug. 1, last year, when the City of Gainesville agreed not to charge for rural fire service in return for the county's taking over full cost of the ambulance service.

Muenster declined the arrangement on grounds that it owes no service in exchange for the ambulance because Muenster taxpayers are paying their share of ambulance cost. Mayor Endres also pointed out that the ambulance averages only about two runs per month to Muenster.

Muenster has billed the county at the previous rate of \$75 for fire runs made since August, and has suggested that it might accept a water tank truck in payment. Commissioner Robert Bayer said that if the contract is accepted he will permit Muenster firemen to use the Precinct 4 water truck.

Three big plays early in the 4th quarter produced TD No. 3 for the Cubs. Hennigan's pass to Gene Haverkamp gained 25, Hennigan ran for 22, and Hennigan's pass to Jim Bartush went 40 yards to the TD.

The Tiger Bs spent the first quarter yielding yardage by penalties and losing possession on a fumble and a penalty; however Kent Fuhrman also recovered a fumble for SH.

Second quarter started as more of the same, including one loss of possession by interception and three major penalties. The rash of losses finally ended with Ted Walterscheid's fumble recovery on the Tiger 13.

That was the point of origin for the Tigers 87 yard drive to the first score. The big play was Craig Walterscheid's pass to Monte Endres for 41 yards. Also Mike Hesse gained 31 in 5 runs, including the 4 yard plunge to the end zone.

Next score needed only 88

seconds, starting with Kirk Mollenkopf's fumble recovery on Chico's 33. A penalty set SH back to the 48 where Brian Herr passed to Monte Endres for a gain to the 21. Next three tries were a no gain and two incomplete passes, then a fourth down pass, Walterscheid to Endres, for the TD. Chico started the second half with a fine kickoff return finally salted by Mike Hesse on the Tiger 41. From there five tries plus 15 free on a penalty reached pay dirt.

## Drought Relief Emergency Loans Available at FmHA

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Stan Reed, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Mr. Reed asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the drought make their needs known at the FmHA office at the Federal Building, Gainesville, on Thursdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted until June 25, 1979 for physical losses and September 28, 1979 for production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs", Mr. Reed said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of three and five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purchase of the loan.

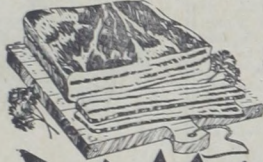

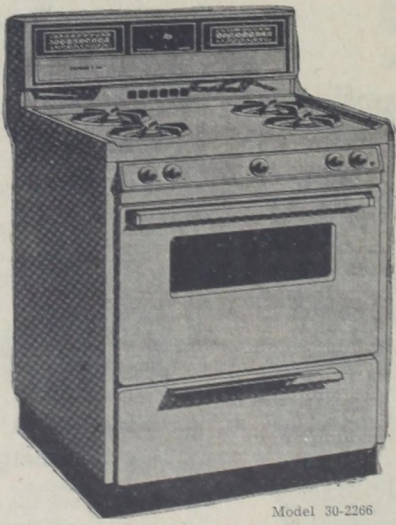
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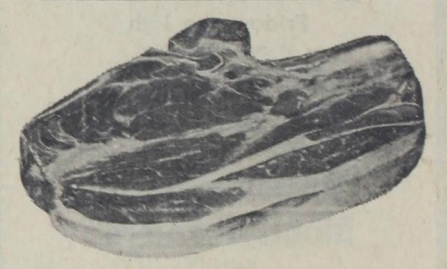
