#### Tests Show Girls At SHH Are Better Drivers Than Boys

The test shows the value of Driver Education as it was the junior girls - many having just completed the course who scored highest. The senior boys and junior boys were next, all having plenty of driving experience and/or Driver Education behind them.

In awaken Driver Education students to awareness of how important safety is in driving. several means are being used at SHH. Films are being shown on vehicle safety and phamphlets are given out to inform students of recent facts on vehicle safety.

Statistics show that 80 per cent of all cars now have seat belts, and about one-third of the drivers use them. Twentyfive per cent of all cars now have shoulder belts, but only four per cent of the available belts are used. Seat belts now save about 3800 lives per year.

There are so many things that drivers of today need to know if they are to operate their automobiles safely that most schools, as SHH, have a driver education course. Among the topics with which all drivers should be familiar are: traffic laws, proper attitudes, how to drive under all types of conditions, and a knowledge of what pedestrians and other drivers are likely to do.

To acquire this information and to master the necessary skills, a student must spend 30 hours of study, 6 hours of driving, and 6 hours of observation. The hazards on streets and highways are so, great that society has the right to expect all drivers to undergo this training.




So MHS B team girls took on next year's Lindsay A team, and lost by a count 36-32. Following that the Muenster boys won their tussle 61-32.
