The hours of tension last week, as the country was sweating out a possibility of having its election referred to the House of Representatives, have at last jarred politicians into a realization that a change is needed in our system of electing the president.

In fact, several changes are in order. The first one concerns the custom of beginning reports from the East three hours before polls close in the West. News of voting trends is known to have an effect, and this time there was the added effect of interviewing party big shots who confidently predicted victory. That to our way of thinking, is unfair. It would be much better if all reports were withheld until the country's last vote is cast.

Suggestions along that line were made in Congress a few months ago. The idea was to open polls all over at the same time, keep them open for 18 hours and close at the same time. That means, for instance, going from 6 a.m. to midnight in the EST zone, from 3 a.m. to 9 p.m. in the PST zone and midnight to 6 p.m. in Alaska. Then let the reports begin.

Obviously this would spoil the big election night show for most people, but it has the very definite merit of eliminating influence on late voters, which certainly is worth consideration.

An alternative which seems reasonable is to continue closing polls on the present schedule and allow returns to go in as usual but withhold reports to the news media until all polls are closed. The count then would be well advanced perhaps even decided when the first report is made.

Regardless of what method is used, the important point is to avoid influencing late voters by early reports.

Even more urgently needed is a constitutional amendment adopting another way of counting votes. We have seen again that a president can be elected without receiving a majority of the popular vote. This time, because of the third candidate, it was only 43 per cent. Of course, Republicans say in this case that most Wallace votes were protest votes against the administration and actually favor Nixon over Humphrey. However, Democrats also claim that their man would have won if Wallace had kept out. Well, who's right? Obviously that issue can't be settled convincingly for all of the nation.

Nowadays more people favor the popular count as the fairest way of electing — or at least an electoral vote count based on the popular vote. This latter method has merit because it compensates for possible difference in state voting laws. For instance, a lower minimum voting age would give one state a higher percentage of eligible voters. More lenient regulations for registration would have a similar effect. Even a simple factor like the weather could deprive a state of its fair representation in the popular count. For instance, if California is balmy while New York is a blizzard, resulting in 90 per cent turnout in one and 80 per cent in the other.

Such considerations make it seem that the better way is a combination of electoral and popular vote systems — dividing each state's electoral votes in the ratio of its popular votes. That method respects the principle of state's rights, permitting each state to determine its own voting regulations instead of requiring uniform regulations all over the nation. It is more in harmony with current demands of taking powers out of Washington and returning them to the states — besides possibly compensating for effects of difference in weather.

Assuming this method had been followed last week, none of the three candidates would have a majority. We'd have failed to elect a president. And here we come to another very proper recommendation.

Instead of sending the election to the House of Representatives where the choice is made by politicians, let it be decided like a party primary, by a run-off of the two leading candidates.

We know, from the outcome of other elections that the run-off will be seldom needed to elect a president. However, this one has shown so convincingly that provision should be made for future races with

## Hornets Continue Perfect Record, Rip Saint Jo 34-0

History repeated itself, at least for the first half, when Muenster and Saint Jo met last week in their annual football tussle. Despite an underdog rating, the Panthers were high for their old favorite rivals and gave the Hornets a scare through the first two periods. However, things changed after that and Muenster went on to a hefty 34-0 win.

The opening moments seemed to indicate an easy conquest for the Hornets. After kickoff the Panthers had to start from their 1. Three plays gained 5 and a fourth down kick was short. The Hornets were in business with 32 to go and Clifford Sicking made that on his first try. A left end sweep by Sicking added 2 points.

But the game took on a different look after that. Panthers gained 45 yards to the Hornet 20 before two penalties moved them back to the 40, then fumbled the ball away. Alcuin Schilling recovered it. Penalties also spoiled Hornet efforts to move the ball.

Beginning the second quarter Muenster made consistent gains but could not finish the job. Starting on their 18 they went to the Panther 4 when three penalties for 35 yards spoiled the series. They lost possession on the 23.

Four plays later Saint Jo kicked and Muenster started again from its 22. Don Hartman, Mark Hellman and Clifford Sicking stepped off nice gains before a 12 yard pass from John Monday to Bob Bruns put Muenster on the 19. Then it happened again. A penalty cost them 15 and the drive fizzled four plays later on the 21.

The second half opened with two big plays which seemed to break down Panther resistance. First play after kickoff Hellman made 15. Next play Sicking got around right end and went 55 to pay dirt.

## Tigers Will Play Greenhill Hornets In Season Finale

The last game of a tough season is coming up for the Sacred Heart Tigers when they meet the Greenhill Hornets of Dallas on the Tiger field Saturday night. The game begins at 8.

Though information here about the visitors is limited, Coach Joe Felderhoff has a few bits of data which seem to indicate that the Tigers are underdogs again. The first bad sign is the length of Greenhill's roster. With more than forty boys in uniform it is expected to have a husky and well balanced first string, plus good reserve strength. The Tiger roster of less than 20 offers much less possibility in strater or reserve strength.

Another sign is scanty but meaningful data on the current record. The standing of 6-3 is lots more impressive than Sacred Heart's standing of 3-6. Also, they had a better score against a common foe, Pleasant Grove Christian. Greenhill lost 20-0, Sacred Heart lost 46-12.

Felderhoff has one consolation, however. His injury problems are minor this week. Billy Bayer probably will remain out with burns on his hands, but all others are in fine condition. With a few breaks and lots of hustle they could possibly spring an upset in closing out their season.

## News of the Men in Service



Earns Bronze Star Medal  
Specialist Four Donald Hess has received the Bronze Star Medal with V Device for Heroism in Vietnam, and the Purple Heart for wounds received in connection with valor. He is the son of Mrs. Arnold Hess.

The citation reads in part: For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. Spec. 4 Hess distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on July 7, 1968, while serving as a forward observer with the second platoon of Company A, 5th Battalion, 46th Infantry.

On that date he was participating in a combat sweep near the village of My Lai when the platoon came under heavy automatic, semi-automatic, and M-79 grenade fire from an enemy force of undetermined size while crossing a small footbridge, a command-detonated mine was exploded wounding several men including Specialist Hess.

Disregarding his own wounds he rushed to the front of the action, picked up one of the wounded and despite enemy fire carried the injured soldier about 50 meters to where he could be treated. Then, still refusing treatment for himself he returned to the site of the mine and assisted in the treatment and evacuation of another seriously wounded comrade. He continued to render medical attention and give encouragement to the injured until he was evacuated.

His bravery, courage and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the Americal Division and the United States Army.

It was for these wounds that Spec. Hess received the Purple Heart.

A real tussle is indicated in that

area. And both teams have very capable backs. Sicking, Hartman, Sparkman, Hellman and Monday have all been going strong for the Hornets, running up the long string of high scores. Standouts for the Trojans are Donnie Osterman, Clifford Pennartz, Danny Joe Schroeder and Danny B. Schroeder. They, too, have been piling up the points.

While admitting that the game has kept him nervous all week, Coach Glenn Richardson is confident, but far from cocky. He says his Hornets are ready in attitude and in near peak physical condition. They have the usual seasonal sore spots plus a few more painful injuries. Worst problem is Sammy Sparkman's injured ankle ligament, which will at least handicap him and possibly bench him.

## Buffalo Stampede From Haltom City Hits Tigers 46-0

The long dry spell for Sacred Heart Tigers was extended through another game Saturday night as they went down in a 46-0 defeat before the B team of Haltom City High. It was another case of adequate weight and speed and reserve strength matched against a Tiger shortage in all of those categories.

But the game was not as bad as the score. The Tigers trailed 11 to 13 in first downs and 219 to 295 in total yardage. They made gains throughout the game but just were not able to put them together for a touchdown.

The visiting Buffaloes got off to an early start when, on the third play, Eddie Parr got around left end for a 57 yard sprint to the goal.

Their next one came only a short time later after a Tiger punt was blocked on the 13. Two tries reached the 4 and Stakely went in from there on a quarterback keeper play. Putnam followed over for boums points.

The kick ending Sacred Heart's next series of downs was the sensation of the game. From the 10 Lee Roy Hess got off a beautiful high spiral that got a good boost from the brisk breeze. It carried more than 70 yards in the air and tumbled into the end zone.

Shortly after that Hess was on the receiving end of two passes which gave a big lift to Tiger hopes. First one was from Don Schneider intended for Tim Endres. A Buffalo intercepted but lost possession as he whirled and the ball sailed over to Hess. Next play was a 19 yard gain as Hess, in the company of 3 defenders, came down with Schneider's pass. Two plays later, however, the Tiger effort ended in a fumble on the 20, about 2 minutes into the second quarter.

Fumbling was the feature of that period. The visitors made three first downs before losing it to Kevin Swirczynski on a fumble. And the Tigers fumbled the next two times they got hold of the ball. ## NIXON'S HARDEST DECISION

We will leave it to the pundits to pontificate on why the election went as it did. But President-elect Nixon did make one basic decision in the final days of the campaign which deserves comment, and applause.

President Johnson's last minute bombing-pause announcement in the final week of the campaign created a crisis-decision for the Republican nominee. It was the kind of masterful political play which John F. Kennedy found it possible to employ in 1960. Candidate Kennedy had been briefed on the already initiated plans for invasion of Cuba, to which undertaking President Eisenhower had assigned the incomparable Whiting Willauer, the man who had master-minded the overthrow of the Communist regime in Guatemala. Candidate Kennedy proceeded to embarrass Nixon, repeatedly, with charges of inaction against Castro — all the time knowing full well that the most careful invasion plans were in the making. Candidate Nixon felt constrained to remain silent in the face of the criticism, for security reasons. Kennedy won the "debates" while Nixon maintained a discreet silence. Upon achieving the White

House, Kennedy promptly dismissed Whiting Willauer, and permitted the invasion to become a military and diplomatic fiasco.

President Johnson's bombing pause announcement was interpreted by many of Nixon's aides and advisors as a cut of the same cloth. They were irate, pointing out that Johnson had no commitment from Hanoi and, indeed, none from Saigon. There was no reason why it could not have been delayed until election day, or the day after, except that the dramatic announcement would help the candidacy of Humphrey, and bring Kennedy and McCarthy followers back into the party ranks just in time to vote.

Whereupon, Nixon gambled. He had gambled in 1960 by refusing to reveal that Eisenhower had ordered the overthrow of Castro. This time, he gambled that he could win without condemning what his aids believed to be a cheap political trick. Mr. Nixon was not willing to have the enemy, or the Government of South Vietnam, or our SEATO allies believe that a President of the United States would play politics with war and peace. He realized that, as the new President, he would have to deal with that enemy, the Government of South Vietnam, and those SEATO allies, Mr. Nixon gambled, and won — but barely.

We reserve the right to become his severest critic. But he has earned the plaudits of the nation for his wise gamble. It should make peace possible sooner than would have been the case if he had followed his aids' demands.

## Democrats Retain Control of Texas Political Offices

AUSTIN, Tex. — General election day was a rosy one for statewide Democratic contenders.

Not only did Texas endorse liberal presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey, but also all statewide Democratic standard bearers. No incumbent congressmen lost their jobs and the partisan lineup in the state legislature remained just the way it is.

Preston Smith of Lubbock won the gubernatorial race with about 57 per cent of the votes over his opponent and first-time candidate GOPER Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Ben Barnes, 30, of DeLeon will become the youngest lieutenant governor in history by virtue of his overwhelming triumph over Republican Doug DeCluitt of Waco. Barnes was the top statewide vote-getter on the ballot.

All incumbent statewide officials seeking re-election won handily.

In congressional races, three Republicans seeking new terms had no great trouble, but none of their colleagues seeking to unseat incumbent Democrats was successful. Congressional lineup remains 20 Democrats to three Republicans.

Eight Republican state House members were elected — four incumbents, four newcomers. Three incumbent GOPers were defeated. Two GOP state senators were re-elected. Lineup remains 142 Democrats to eight Republicans in the House, 29 Democrats to two GOPs in the Senate.

Boasting that no other state can compare with Texas" regarding its support of, loyalty to or victory for the Democratic party," former State Democratic Committee Chairman Will D. Davis observed: "Texas is the most populous state to have a Democratic governor and only one of 10 largest to have solid statewide Democratic administration."

Texas was the only one in the southern and southwestern regions to give Humphrey plurality; and only Texas, Washington and Hawaii west of the Mississippi voted for the Democratic presidential nominee.

## Election Rejects Most Amendments

MOST AMENDMENTS DEFEATED — Voters showed they are in an economy frame of mind in their decisions on 14 proposed state constitutional amendments.

They voted November 5 to cut out the state property tax, but they refused to go along with raising the state's public welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million a year or to increase legislators salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 annually.

Approved were changes in state employees' pension system, university fund investment liberalization, removal of the \$504 a year ceiling on contributions to teacher pensions, wiping out the property tax and clarification of a legislator's eligibility to run for office by virtue of the termination date of his elective term.

Texans turned thumbs down on tax exemptions for warehouse-stored property, El Paso local governmental consolidations, Dallas road bonds, tax aid for Texarkana tobacco merchants, state contract changes, tax benefits for anti-pollution equipment purchasers and industrial bond issues.

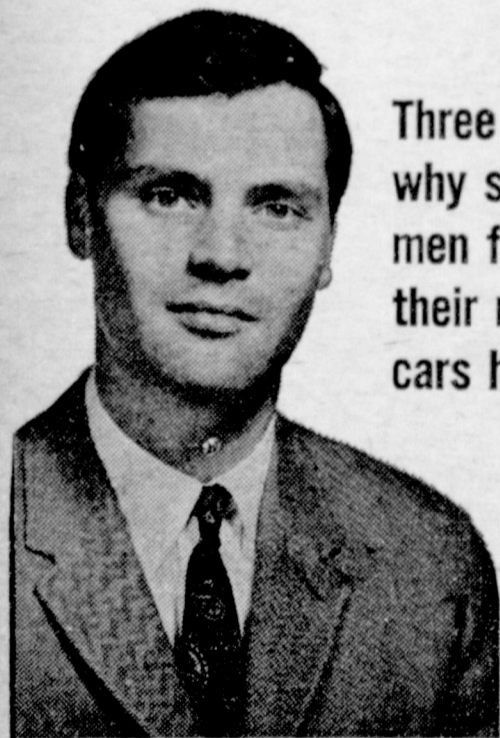

### Electric Car Is on Display at TP&L



Texas Power & Light Company's modern-day version of the "horseless carriage" is in Gainesville for a visit and will remain through next Monday. It is on display at the TP&L office, 109 S. Rusk St.

The Company's electric car is a sophisticated contemporary of its turn-of-the-century ancestors and is currently

touring many of the cities and towns in TP&L's 52-county service area.

Called Mars II, the automobile was purchased from Electric Fuel Propulsion, Inc., of Ferndale, Mich. It was bought primarily to acquaint individuals with the numerous advantages of the modern electric car, a vehicle which many persons consider as the transportation of the future.

Mars II is built on a compact car body and is powered by 20 six-volt lead-cobalt batteries and a 15-horsepower direct current motor.

It can accelerate from 0 to 40 mph in 10 seconds, can attain a top speed of 60 mph, and will run from 70 to 120 miles before the batteries must be recharged.

The car's batteries can be recharged overnight by a built-in charger which operates on 208-240 volt household current.

Also, the car's manufacturer has an optional 100 amp quick charger which can be installed in service stations, parking lots or garages. The quick charger can fully recharge the Mars II in 90 minutes or can recharge the car to 80 per cent of full capacity in 45 minutes.

Presently, the Mars II is not being sold to the general public; however, some 25 electric utility companies in the United States have purchased the automobiles for promotional and research purposes.

The car will seat four adults. Its accessories are powered by a separate battery, and the heater is an aircraft-type liquid-fuel unit. Compared to the conventional, gasoline powered automobiles, the electric cars would eliminate the air pollution problem currently associated with today's traffic-congested cities.

Additionally, the electric car will require fewer repairs since it has very few moving parts. In fact, while an ordinary piston driven vehicle has about 15,000 moving parts, the electric car has only three, the wheels, the rotor, and the gears. In an electric car there is no need to change oil, add anti-freeze, have tune-ups or warm up the car on cold mornings.

Also eliminated would be the harsh sounds of gasoline-powered motors. Electric motors make very little noise, so the car operates almost silently.

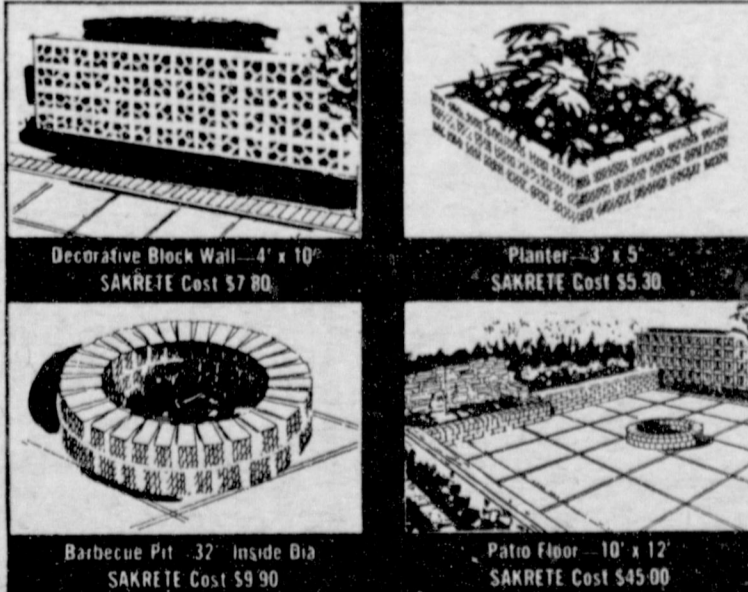
