These instruments have been recently purchased by the D.P.S. and will be used by the Driver License Service. These screening devises will be used to re-examine problem drivers primarily but will also be used in some of the Driver License Offices throughout the Region.

Instruments of this type, or similar, will eventually be used in the screening of all persons applying for a Texas Drivers License or applying for renewal. With the present eye charts, many of the applicants memorize the chart before their eyes are checked. With the new instruments a much more accurate check of

the vision can be made. "Initially the vision will be screened for acuity and color perception which are the only items currently screened on an ordinary Driver License examination", Major Smith said. "This is another step forward in the supervision of traffic on our Texas Highways. It is no secret that there are many licensed drivers in this state and nation who have vision problems. This new vision checking instrument will be far better than the old eye chart screening the driver who should drive and ones who should not."
