### Farmcast, the weekly agribusiness report released by the Texas Department of Agriculture, is lavish in its use of superlatives in this week's issue — excellent, best ever, prospects couldn't be better.

The wheat crop, over 95 million bushels, is more than twice the size of last year's. Grain sorghum, now about half harvested is said to be fine and also getting a good price.

Peanuts and cotton are both reported to be going great. Soybeans, getting more important as a Texas Crop and having about twice last year's acreage, are making excellent progress. And hay is reported as the best in Texas history in spite of the problems in getting baling wire.

The Ag Department's good report is especially welcome in relation to the shortages and run-away prices following last year's gigantic grain sales. This ought to wipe out the shortages and re-establish more realistic price levels. Not that anyone favors getting back to \$1 wheat, but everyone has to admit that the present price of \$5 is even more out of line on the other side.

The ideal situation all around is when prices are moderate and crop production is good. Besides giving the farmer a good income, it provides a bountiful supply assuring reasonable prices to processors of flour, cereals and livestock feed, and possibly even having some left for export.

Equally good news comes from the cattle industry. The number of stocker cattle on Texas farms is up a half million head since January 1. Beef as well as grain appears to be plentiful, hopefully assuring that meat prices will settle down after controls are lifted in September.

And after that, let's hope that officials will have learned what has been obvious to other people all along. If the economy must have controls, why not bear down on the factors that cause the trouble? Such as wild government spending, exorbitant wage demands along with labor racketeering, official graft, welfare rackets, etc.

How about current attempts of senators and representatives to vote themselves a pay increase? — when they already get fabulous pay plus transportation, mailing privilege, hospitalization and medical care, huge allowance for office help and various other benefits. How about many workers in manufacture and the building trades who get \$10 or more per hour? And even then some of those guys loaf on the job.

How about the labor racketeers, described in recent issues of Readers Digest, who destroy millions of dollars worth of property to enforce their demands on the building industry? How about the deficit spending which keeps inflation on the move, and pork barrel projects, which are little more than diverting government funds to political favorites?

The American public can get along very well with cost of living fluctuations that reflect normal ups and downs in the weather and economy, but it is getting mighty tired of paying those added costs which represent corruption, thievery and exorbitant wages and salaries.

Those are the things that put the blemish on life in these United States. Our nation would be next to a Utopia if we could apply the principles of personal freedom and free enterprise along with technological advancements in an atmosphere of fair pay and conscientious work. Human cussedness is our problem. Too many people are disregarding the golden rule.

## Elm Red District Sets Grass Judging Contest October 2

The annual grass judging contest sponsored by the Upper Elm Red Soil and Water Conservation District will be held on Tuesday, October 2, on the campus of Cooke County Junior College.

The date was set in the August meeting of district directors with vocational agriculture teachers of the three county district in attendance. Detailed plans for the contest will be announced at a later date.

Also considered and approved were ten new soil and conservation plans prepared during July.

## Council Approves Early Project of Pavement Repair

A quickie paving project was discussed and approved by the Muenster City Council in regular session Monday night. To assure getting the job done while warm weather assures a better quality of work, the council asked Street Commissioner Herbert Miller and City Superintendent Steve Mosler to negotiate a contract as soon as possible. It was agreed that the work will probably be done early in October.

No new pavement is planned. All of the work is to be re-surfacing and patch up presently damaged pavement. Jobs on the priority list are six blocks on Pecan from the highway to Sixth, one block on Sixth in front of the cemetery, the first and second blocks east of Main on Fourth, the first block west of Main on Seventh, Maple Street from Third to Sixth, and a number of repair spots on Oak, Hickory and Cedar. Other pavement in need of repair is to be included in the project as far as the budget allows.

## Tigers, Bulldogs Tangle Friday in Test Scrimmage

Looking for both the strong points and the weak points in his SH Tigers, Coach Bob Steele has them matched for a practice scrimmage with the Alvord Bulldogs on the Tiger field Friday night.

Though the signs indicate that Sacred Heart should emerge with the better score Steele expects a closer match than last year when his boys came away leading 3 TDs to 0. The Bulldogs are heavier, they have two talented boys who were not eligible last year, and a sprinter who looked good in track. They are expected to have the advantage in weight and Sacred Heart to be better in speed.

However, one of the Tiger regulars cannot be there. Kevin Pels is sitting it out with a pulled tendon, hopefully to be ready for action next week.

The Sacred Heart first string, 22 strong, continues with its high spirited and optimistic nightly workouts. The name of the game is winning, and the objective adopted at the first practice was to improve on last year's very fine 9-1 record.

Supporting that ambition they have some very encouraging signs. The team is made up almost entirely of lettermen with a year of growth and experience. There's more weight over all plus break away speed that should produce a number of long yardage scores through the season.

## Entries Asked for PP&K Competition

Local youngsters, will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1973 Punt, Pass & Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be co-sponsored by the Muenster Jaycees in conjunction with participating Ford Dealers in the area.

Nationally PP&K, now in its 13th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted more than 9-350,000 youngsters — and participation this year is expected to top the 1,200,000 mark.

Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against others their own age. Any youngster eight through 13 years of age, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register to compete in PP&K at any participating Ford Dealer. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing.

Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing and kicking distance, and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

Twelve national finalists will compete for the National championships in their age group during the halftime of the Super Bowl Game in Houston, Texas, January 13, 1974. Winners will have their names permanently enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Their trophies will be presented by Football Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

In Panama City, Florida, they looked up old friends from Camp Howze days, Mr. and Mrs. Jay Ellenburger, located her in a hospital there and visited by phone, later saw him at the couple's new home at Fort St. Jo Beach.

The Sarasota Gardens and Parrot Jungle were next and they crossed the Skyline Causeway Bridge at St. Petersburg, took a boat excursion and because it was a clear day saw Cuba at a distance.

**Warning Issued on Grain Swindling**

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White warns Blacklands farmers to beware of unscrupulous buyers of grain sorghum this harvest season. Make sure you know your buyer," he cautioned. "Unfortunately, every year we get reports of a few buyers making shady deals with farmers that can lead to a complete loss of profit for the farmer," Commissioner White said. "Farmers who are going to sell their crop at the turn-row from unknown buyers should demand cash, or should make careful inquiry to see that the buyer's check will be honored," Commissioner White said.

With prices at good levels, it is imperative that farmers this year more than ever before, make certain they know the buyer of their grain sorghum, or take the time to make sure that what seems to be a legitimate deal is just that, White urges. "It won't take but a few minutes to investigate the buyer, and that time can mean the difference between a good profit or no money at all from your grain sorghum crop this year," White said. "These men move with the harvest and reports are that they are moving throughout the state now."

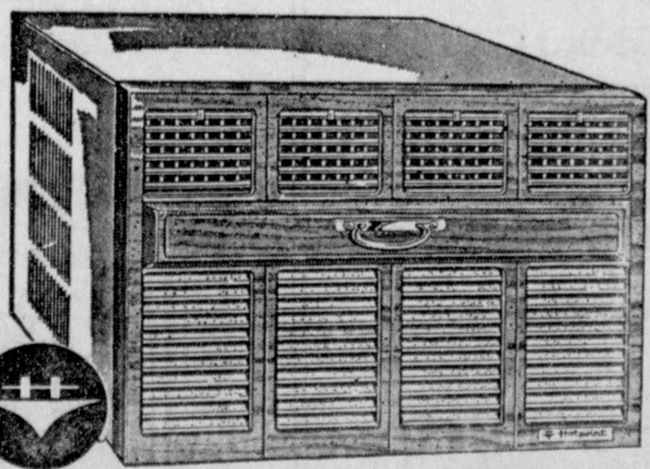

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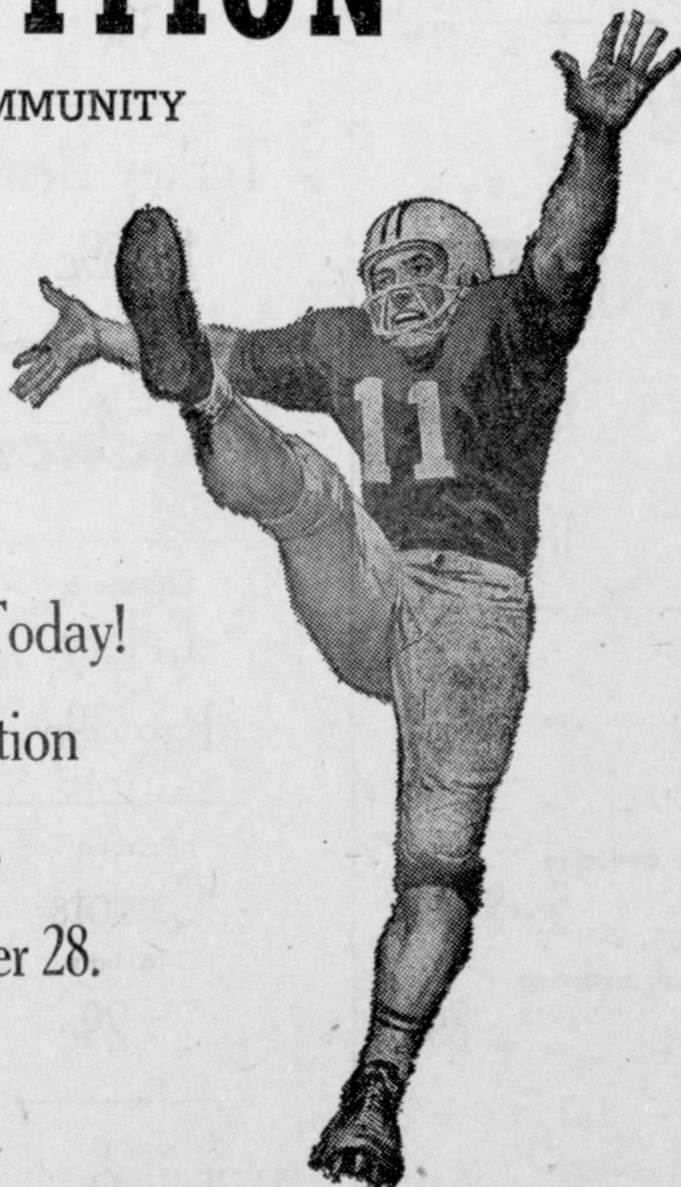
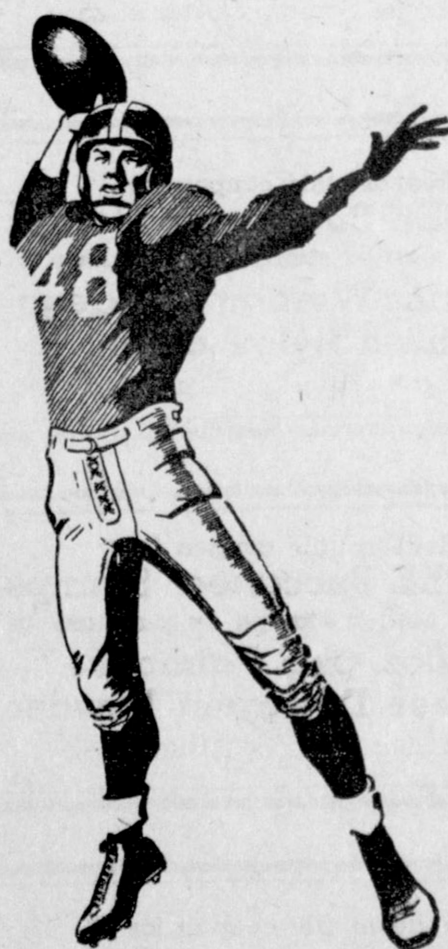
