**Margaret Medders Regrets Waste of Time and Fortune**

Margaret Medders, Muenster's former Cinderella resident, is in the news again, but not as the result of another brush with the law. This time she only expresses her regrets for wasting eighteen years of her life along with the fortune that was not hers to spend.

She told her sad story in an interview with William Thomas of the Memphis Commercial Appeal while an inmate in a Memphis, Tenn., jail on a conviction of fraud. She has a word of advice for the young girls who try to follow her way, that "There is not one thing in the world that's worth a day in this jail." Mrs. Medders spent two years in a Dallas jail on a charge of fraud before being sent to Memphis on a similar charge.

Much of what she told in the Memphis interview is well known to former friends and acquaintances... that she and her husband, Ernest, came to believe that they were heirs to a share in the fabulous Spindletop oil fortune, and established a fabulous credit on the basis of that rumor. That they built a fine home here, entertained lavishly and spent wildly until jealous relations sued for a part of their fortune.

That is when they as well as many others discovered that the assumed fortune was only a hoax and they had been living it up on borrowed money. Bankruptcy law allowed them to keep their home which they later sold and bought smaller places in Gainesville and Brownsville. In those times Mrs. Medders was writing a book on their experience, with a hope of making a fortune on the publication and movie rights and paying off their debts. Ernest died in Brownsville and was

brought to Muenster for burial.

Still with dreams of big money, Margaret continued to live high. She got into trouble in California for straining her credit while promoting her book and proposed movie. She ran up a \$14,000 bill at the fashionable Fairmont Hotel in Dallas. She was charged with fraudulent money raising deals in Tennessee.

Eventually, in the Dallas jail, she became aware of a mental illness explaining the former belief that money is just around the corner. "I realized that there wasn't ever going to be any money", she said.

Nevertheless she still has hopes that some day she will legitimately have money... from the book she is writing. In the Dallas jail she wrote 30 pages of it a day, but progress has slowed down considerably at Memphis. She also has visions of a useful life when she gets out of jail, helping girls who have been in jail or mental hospitals to stay out of trouble.

Her present life in Memphis contrasts sharply with the good old days. She misses such things as a tub bath, king size bed, down pillows and the beauty shop, Dallas was somewhat better. Having a blood clot, she was in a hospital ward, and had a more pleasant routine, including nursing.

**Recycle Organic Matter, Not Burn**

 Rather than burning leaves or hauling them to the dump this fall, why not use them for a compost pile? The resulting compost will provide a good source of organic matter for potted plants, for top-dressing the lawn, and for building up the soil in flower beds, shrub borders and vegetable gardens.

A simple method of composting leaves and other vegetable matter is to alternate 4-6 inch layers of vegetable matter such as leaves or grass with 2-4 inches of garden soil. If available, add manure to the soil layer. Make the compost pile 4-6 feet wide and any desired length, depending on material and space available.

Sprinkle a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter to hasten decomposition. Use about 1/2 pound, or 1 cupful, of any good commercial fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface of the pile should be dish-shaped, forming a

basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter thoroughly before adding the soil layer. This is especially true when composting leaves as they can be extremely slow to decompose if too dry. Water the pile thoroughly when completed and add additional water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy.

Turn or mix the compost with a garden fork or shovel every 3-4 months. This aerates the material and speeds up the composting process. Most compost should be ready to use in 6 months to a year. The use of commercially available compost activators will reduce the time required for decomposition only if used according to directions.

Well prepared compost can be used anywhere peat moss is used and is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and other organic material.
