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From Austin comes a report that State Representative Green of Houston has introduced legislation to eliminate age, sex and marital status as factors in setting the rates for private passenger car insurance in Texas. The proposed bill bases rates on driving experience, vehicle use and vehicle characteristics.

Green says that the public wants a pricing system which charges the driver according to demonstrated driving habits regardless of age or sex. He believes the proposed system would be more acceptable to the public because it incorporates factors which are casually related to accidents. It also provides the State Board of Insurance enough flexibility to develop a new rating system which is satisfactory to insurers as well as insureds.

The man definitely has a good idea there. It is not fair to charge higher rates year after year just because the insured happens to be in a higher risk classification. If his performance record is good he most certainly deserves to be rewarded by a better rate.

This is not intended to imply that the present principle is all wrong. Studies by the insurance companies doubtless are correct in their classifications, which can be accepted as a guide in writing up an initial policy. If he's a young male, the insurer really has no choice other than charge a higher rate as a starter. But suppose his record after that is flawless. The company does not have to pay a penny for injury or damage caused by him. There seems to be no reason then why he should not be rewarded with the rate of the very best driver.

The same applies to all the other classifications. No matter how well they are rated, the policy assumes that some payment will become necessary because of them. But suppose they have a perfect record. Would it not be proper to give a proportional credit on the renewal?

The annual responsibility to assume certain obligations and protection against liability have a definite value, but it seems that the company ought to make allowance when it does not have to pay any bills for the insured.

As insurance is being administered, it appears as a rip-off of the deserving. The more risky classification is charged a higher rate initially and is charged a penalty on renewal if his performance turns out to be as bad as his classification. On the other hand, the only satisfaction for the person with a perfect record is not being charged the penalty. He is not rewarded with a reduced rate.

Obviously, the only fair insurance is that which offers a financial reward for a good record. And that should include a rock bottom low rate to anyone with a perfect record regardless of age, sex, etc.

Another highly desirable change in the car insurance laws is a provision requiring all drivers to prove that they have liability insurance in effect before being able to register a vehicle. All of us have heard of cases in which a person with adequate insurance to protect the other fellow was left holding the bag by someone else who did not have insurance. This should not be allowed.

As if you do not have enough to worry about, The National Tax Limitation Committee reminds us that the average worker last year worked 153 days just to pay his taxes. If you are average this means you, and it's just another way of saying that 42 cents out of every dollar goes to the government for tax. It seems unbelievable until one realizes that lots of hidden taxes are included. For instance, a total of 52 different taxes are levied on a single egg, and 108 taxes on a loaf of bread.

It goes on and on and keeps getting worse. In 1948 shortly after World War II, taxes took 24.2 per cent of every dollar, and the ratio has been going up ever since. Tax took 35.5 cents of the dollar in 1957, 39.2 cents in 1968, and now 42 cents.

Needless to say, the big reason behind this fiscal fiasco is inflation, which is brought on mostly by wild government spending. . . . now budgeted at \$500 billion for 1979, including a deficit of more than \$50 billion. Anyone would think that reasonably smart and

## Committee Holds Initial Meeting For Germanfest

Initial planning for the 1979 Germanfest got under way Monday night in an organizational meeting at which a roster of assignments and a schedule of meetings were adopted.

Alvin Fuhrman heads the festival organization as president, Johnny Fisher is vice president and Jane Monday is secretary. Additionally twenty directors were named for the various duties associated with Germanfest. The proposed festival plan is very similar to last year's. It will be held in the city park, the large tent, with most of the concessions, being located on the tennis courts, and the Jaycee pavilion to be used principally for entertainment. The German Fun Run is advanced from Sunday to Saturday.

New proposals include two dances instead of one on Saturday, more entertainment at the park, traffic control, more off-street parking, shuttle bus service from up-town Muenster to the park, and better emergency health care.

The next Germanfest meeting is scheduled on February 19 to start planning the concessions. Persons and organizations who wish to have booths are encouraged to start their planning before then.

A month later, on March 19, the second and final meeting with concessions chairmen is scheduled. At that time a \$35 deposit will be expected for every space reserved, whether in the tent or elsewhere in the park.

Organizations which had space last year will have priority over new applicants in the allocation of booths. The fee for use of space will be 10 per cent of a concession's gross revenue less the \$35 deposit.

Other meetings scheduled by the Germanfest board are on February 12, March 26 and April 20.

Muenster High basketball teams started the second half of their basketball season at Callisburg with a 60-52 win by the Hornets and a 47-43 loss by the Hornets. Preceding the main events the junior varsity girls lost 31-17.

The boys' game was hotly contested for three periods with Muenster barely leading by scores of 17-15, 30-29 and 46-45. In the fourth the Wildcats turned cold while the Hornets kept going for a gain of 7 and the final count of 60-52.

David Felderhoff led the scoring with 26 big points and Don Grewing hit 10 along with a fine job of rebounding. Todd Richey and Ricky Winn each added 8.

## Woodlock Quits 235th DA Office

Jerry Woodlock, 235th District Attorney for the past four years, has resigned from the office effective February 1 to accept a position in the law firm of Sullivant, Meurer and Harris.

Woodlock said he decided to accept the opportunity for private practice rather than finish his remaining two years in office. He sent his letter of resignation Monday to Governor Bill Clements who will appoint a successor. He said he waited until Clements took office because there has been criticism of "midnight appointments" by outgoing Governor Briscoe.

Most likely candidate for the job is Woodlock's assistant, Brock Smith of Bridgeport, who says he has the backing of the three bar associations of the district.

Although the office is elective, the vacancy is to be filled until the next general election by the Governor's appointment. Smith's intention is to remain in Wise County and to employ an assistant who will be located in Cooke County.

Woodlock graduated from law school in 1970 and became assistant county attorney the same year. In 1971 he succeeded Bill Sullivant as county attorney and in August 1974 he succeeded Jim Hatcher as district attorney.

## County Viewpoint Presented in Rural Fire Fighting Issue

In behalf of the Commissioners' Court, County Judge Greg Underwood has responded to the letter written by Mayor Endres stating the city council's intention to discontinue fire fighting service in the rural area unless a contract by the city and county is negotiated by January 27, 1979.

Judge Underwood presents the county's side in the confrontation and suggests a meeting of the two bodies or their representatives to discuss the problem.

The following is the judge's letter.

Dear Mr. Endres:  
I am in receipt of your letter of January 10, 1979. Concerning the date of January 27, 1979, and the requirement that the City of Muenster and Cooke County negotiate and agree upon some covenant concerning fighting fires outside its incorporated area, all I can say is that the City Council of Muenster, who, I assume knows best about the responsibilities in that regard, I cannot give you any assurance that there will be any agreement entered into by that date.

However, to set the record straight, I would point out that I have prepared a contract, had it signed and mailed it to you, the effective date of which was August, 1977, to expire August, 1979. The contract was signed by yourselves and mailed back to me with the change in the date and made effective January, 1979. This was done without "negotiation" between yourselves and the Commissioners' Court. Since that time, we have discussed other means of settling the problem including involvement of Cooke County Firefighters' Association, of which Muenster is a part.

In late summer of 1978, Cooke County purchased a water tank truck to be used for the purpose of fighting rural fires, inasmuch as the City of Muenster did not own one. You have been told that this truck is available for your use, also, in fighting fires within the City of Muenster, as well as rural fires.

It is and has been since September, 1978, at the fire department of the City of Muenster. We have not made

## City Gets \$1,673 Sales Tax Check

The City of Muenster this week received its first rebate check of the new year for the 1 per cent city sales tax collected by the state comptroller's office. It was in the amount of \$1,673.74, a gain of 20% over last year's payment of \$1,388.78 for the corresponding date.

Pay was for the period ending December 29, 1978. Muenster's check was one of some 900 paid to Texas cities for a total of slightly more than 18.1 million. The amount is about \$300,000 less than last year's first payment, but in this area most of the checks are larger.

Other payments of the area were reported as follows: Gainesville, \$1,974.93, up 27%; Lindsay, \$1,433.57, down 50%; Nocona, \$3,589.64, up 45%; Pilot Point \$656.42, up 7%; Saint Jo \$616.26 no comparison because first payment was omitted last year; Sanger, no payment and also no basis for comparison; Whitesboro \$1,113.02 up 59%.

Comptroller Bullock reports that total rebates to all cities last year were \$424.8 million, a 17 per cent increase over 1977. The total for Muenster was \$88,370.94, a gain of 66 per cent over the 1977 total of \$52,997.15.

## Sacred Heart and Notre Dame Split Pair of Contests

Sacred Heart teams broke even Tuesday night in their double header basketball program with Notre Dame of Wichita Falls. Tigerettes were losers by a count of 55-35 and the Tigers were winners by 52-44.

## Employers Told Of New W-2 Forms To Report Wages

Employers should remember that there's a new way to report employee's wages for social security purposes, Gus Jones, Social Security District Manager in Sherman, said today.

There's also something new to read those reports — a machine called an optical scanner that translates the reports to the magnetic tape language that a computer can understand.

Jones said the Social Security Administration is concerned because some early reports are being received in a format the optical scanner can't read — and that means more expensive manual processing.

Beginning with 1978 wages, employers are to use Form W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) to report their workers' earnings, Jones said. Form W-2 has been revised for 1978 so it can be read by the scanner.

The Form W-2's are printed three to a page, and Copy A of the form is to be submitted to social security in just that way — three to a page.

Some employers are going to the trouble of cutting the

## Firemen Answer 49 Calls in 1978

The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department had a busy year in 1978, averaging almost one call a week and including five major blazes.

According to a summary by Secretary Tom Swirczynski, the firemen made 49 fire runs during the year, 15 in the city and 34 in the rural area. In Muenster there were 5 building fires, 5 grass fires, 5 vehicle fires and one other. Outside the city were 5 building fires, 25 grass fires, 3 vehicle fires and one other.

The major fires were at the Dick Evans home in Myra on Feb. 11, at the Community Lumber Co. on March 28, at St. Richard's Villa on May 28, a Tee Jay Oil Company's tank battery on June 5, and at the Campbell Ranch Hay Barn on July 3. Fires at St. Richard's and the oil tanks were caused by lightning.

## Cooke County Is State Leader in Oats Production

Cooke County climbed to the top-ranking position among oat producing areas in the state, harvesting 1,070,000 bushels of the 13.7 million bushels grown in the state, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service showed a 42.6 per cent decrease from the 24 million-bushel 1977 harvest, with prolonged drought a major problem through most of the growing areas.

"Most of the 1,800,000 acres planted in oats this year were utilized for feeding livestock," commented Agriculture Commissioner, "so the crop year was not a total loss for most producers.

"Grain yields were cut sharply," Brown said, "with average production dropping from 40 bushel per acre to only 32 bushels per acre."

The top ten oat producing counties included: Cooke, first; McLennan, second; Denton, third; Collin, fourth; Kaufman, fifth; Coryell, sixth; Grayson, seventh; Hamilton, eighth; Bosque, ninth; and Fannin, tenth.

He was on the job there as usual the day before his death.

Trachta was a former member of the Muenster City Council, also a charter member of the Muenster K of C council and a charter member of the KC Fourth Degree Assembly.

He was married twice, the first time on November 15, 1921, to Bertha Hoenic who was killed in an automobile accident on July 18, 1935. Next he was married on November 25, 1946 to Isabell Walterscheid who died on October 15, 1966.

A final tribute to Joe was a streamer with two floral arrangements across the front of his drug store. The message was "So Long, Joe. We'll Miss You."

Survivors are a stepson, Larry Walterscheid, of Oklahoma City and a number of nieces and nephews. Among friends and relatives at the services were Mr. and Mrs. Larry Walterscheid and three children, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Graff of Plano, Wayne Trachta of Norman, Okla., Glenn Trachta of Stamford, Hank Trachta of Denton, Kathy Anderson of Marshall, and Bonnie Levine of Dallas.

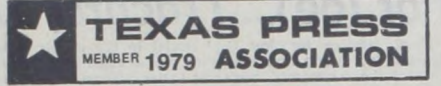

## CCC Board Okays Finance Program For New Building

Trustees of Cooke County College have agreed on a combination plan including both tax and revenue bonds as a way to finance a \$2.7 million expansion program. Projects planned are a student center and fine arts building costing \$2,385,760 and an administration building costing \$359,500.

The original proposal was to combine the two projects in a single bond issue to be paid out in 30 years on a 17 cent tax rate. The proposal tentatively adopted is to finance the administration building out of surplus funds already on hand at the college and to pay for the larger building out of two other sources. One of those is a revenue bond which is expected to raise \$900,000 over a 30-year period through a building use fee of 0.15 per student per semester. The other is a tax bond raising \$1,485,760 in 30 years on a 10 cent tax.

Actually the 10 cent tax would hardly be noticed. It would seem more like a continuation of the assessment which had been in effect until last year when another bond was paid off.

Though the program was adopted, the board has not ordered the 10 cent bond election. The consensus was to plan the election along with school and municipal elections on April 7.

**Tax Credit Allowed**  
**On Energy Saving**  
**Home Improvement**  
Homeowners who have made energy-saving improvements may claim a tax credit when filing their 1978 income tax returns.  
The Energy Tax Act of 1978 provides for such a tax credit on energy-saving home improvements installed since Apr. 19, 1977, points out Ashley Lovell, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.  
An individual may claim a credit of 15 percent of energy-saving expenditures made between Apr. 20, 1977 and Dec. 31, 1978. The maximum credit allowed is \$300 and can be claimed on IRS Form 5695.  
What type of energy-saving property is eligible for tax credit?  
Lovell lists the following:  
—Insulation for ceilings, walls, floors, roofs, water heaters and related areas.  
—Exterior storm (or thermal) windows or doors.  
—Caulking or weather stripping for exterior windows or doors.  
—A furnace replacement burner to reduce fuel usage.  
—A device to make flue openings (for a heating system) more efficient.  
—An electrical or mechanical furnace ignition system to replace a gas pilot light.  
—An automatic energy-saving setback thermostat.  
—A meter displaying the cost of energy usage.  
To be eligible these improvements must be installed in or on an individual's principal residence, either owned or rented, noted Lovell. The individual must be the first person using the item, and it must have an expected use period of at least three years.  
Additional information on tax credits for energy-conscious homeowners is available in IRS publication 903, "Energy Credits for Individuals."

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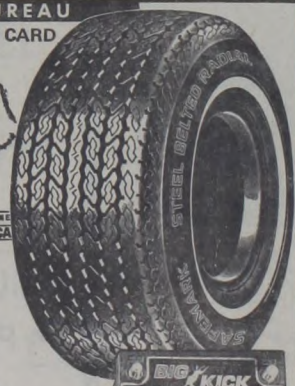
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**MHS Splits with Sanger and Loses Three to Lindsay**

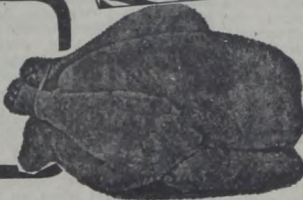

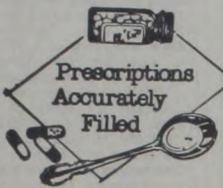

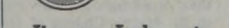

any request of you for any payment or quid pro quo of any nature whatsoever concerning this item.

In regard to the City of Gainesville contract, we had been paying the City of Gainesville \$75.00 per run. We were fixing to be faced by the request by them to raise our payment to \$125.00 per run, even though their actual costs were over \$200.00 per run, based on their figures.

The sum of \$15,000 was simply a negotiated figure which represented considerably less than their cost, but it also represented a savings to Gainesville inasmuch as they did not have to undertake a heavy initial investment in buying ambulances. In the event Gainesville had gone into the ambulance business, and in the event that the citizens of Muenster desired ambulance service, I strongly suspect that Gainesville would have requested Muenster to contribute toward that expense.

Further, we have checked the records concerning the number of runs made by the City of Gainesville and averaged them out for a number of years and that the number of runs they have made contrasted to the \$15,000 consideration, the average cost to the county will be \$48.00 per run, if paid for on a per-run basis.

I have, also, checked concerning ambulance runs and there have been a total of 90 runs during calendar year 1978 in Muenster as contrasted with the statement of two (2) per month which was given to us in September, 1978.

I believe that all citizens in Cooke County are desirous of some kind of ambulance service, including the citizens of Muenster, Texas. If at this time, we stationed a unit in Muenster with additional housing, etc., the cost would increase significantly. I do not think it would be possible or feasible to station a unit in Muenster at this time.

The Muenster Hospital District has informed our body that it, the Muenster Hospital District, has no need for an ambulance or an ambulance service, but that service should be provided by the county.

I do not recall the City of Muenster volunteering or being involved in the discussions when the ambulance question was raised two years ago. If perhaps, the City of Muenster would now be interested in taking over part of the ambulance service, we would be most happy to discuss it with you.

I feel that the Commissioners' Court of Cooke County, Texas, is still interested and desires to negotiate an amicable solution to this matter with the City of Muenster. If you will give me time and place when a committee of the City of Muenster could meet with selected members from our Court, I will be happy to see that they are there to discuss other alternatives that, perhaps, have not been explored concerning this problem without taking such drastic action as terminating rural fire service on a specific date.

**New W-2 Forms**

forms apart, which means they cannot be processed by the optical scanner, Jones said. Other employers are sending in the Form 941's that were used previously for earnings reports. And some are using older Form W-2's. Those forms cannot be processed by the machine either. Employers should use only the 1978 Form W-2, Jones emphasized. And the entire page must be sent in even if one or two of the forms are blank. The changeover is part of the switch to annual reporting of employees' earnings, Jones explained. Reports were submitted quarterly in previous years. All Forms W-2 should be submitted with Form W-3 (Transmittal of Income and Tax Statements). The forms are available from local Internal Revenue Service Offices. The deadline for submitting the forms is February 28, 1979. Detailed instructions for completing the forms are given in the December 1977 Circular E (Supplement), Employer's Tax Guide. Employers who don't have a copy of Circular E can get one from the nearest Internal Revenue Service office, Jones said.
