A recent issue of the Farm Bureau weekly bulletin, "Facts For You," refers to an article by Dr. Cleon Skousen in a publication entitled, "Freeman Report, July 1977," reminding us that the founding fathers of the U.S. government were deeply committed to the proposition that without God there really could be no government of a free people. The thought is especially appropriate in relation to the anniversary of Abraham Lincoln, a very religious man.

Skousen outlines basic principles upon which our society was founded and which were accepted without question by our thriving nation, but which are being abandoned by increasing numbers as the country drifts away from God.

Those basics are 1, that God exists as the Creator of all things; 2, that men are responsible to God for their conduct toward one another; 3, that the life of man continues after this life; 4, that men will be judged by God for their conduct in this life.

Just a little thought on the subject is enough to show that our country is far out of tune with these ideas. Though not bluntly denying the existence of God it goes along with that idea in some of its official policies. It permitted atheists to ban the Almighty from the UN and from classrooms. And it certainly ignores responsibility to God in the conduct of people to one another.

This attitude is understandable in people who deny the existence of God or a life after death. Why not get what they can here if there is no hereafter. The great problem with those people, however, is that they can't feel really certain, and the odds against them are so enormous if they are wrong. The satisfaction of a few years of self gratification is so very insignificant by comparison with eternity.

This leads up to the really important thought, that men will be judged by God for their conduct in this life. It provides the answer concerning Divine Justice, a final assessment of reward or punishment.

Rusty Serna Is Regional Champ In Golden Gloves

Rusty Serna made another big step forward in his boxing career during the weekend by winning the championship in his division at the regional Golden Gloves Tournament in Fort Worth. But, unfortunately, his progress is temporarily halted there because of age.

Coached by his father, Alfred Serna, who moved his family last year from South Texas to Muenster and is now employed by the Valente Corporation, Rusty won all four of his fights in the light middleweight class (150 to 155 lb.) of the high school division. He is eagerly looking forward to next year when he will be eligible to go all the way.

City Gets \$2,695 Sales Tax Check

The City of Muenster has just received a check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock in amount of \$2,695.15 as its rebate for city sales tax collected by the state during the period ending February 1, 1979.

It is the second payment this year and slightly less than last year's \$2,852.01 for the corresponding period. However, combined with the first payment the total rebate to now is \$4,368.89, a gain of 3 per cent over the first two periods of 78.

On a statewide basis, payments of this period are a hopping 36 per cent higher than the same period last year. Total collected to now is \$43.7 million compared with \$32.2 million last year. Some of those sharp increases apply to cities of the North Texas area.

For instance, Gainesville received \$26,619 and its total to date is \$44,593, a gain of 51 per cent. Nocona, with a total of \$9,994 to date is 69 per cent ahead, Pilot Point, with \$2,924 to date is 76 per cent ahead; Sanger, with \$1,592 until now is 128 per cent ahead; and Whitesboro, with \$3,857 until now, is 23 per cent ahead.

Nearer even is Lindsay with a total of \$4,279 for a gain of 1 per cent. And Saint Jo now has received \$1,668 but was blank a year ago, so it has no basis for computing the percentage of change.

4 SH Players on TCIL All District

He explained that very often dogs get into the bags that are easy to open and spill the contents on the ground, after which the trash is either scattered by the wind or carried away by dogs.

With about 30 persons attending, a meeting to shape up plans for the 1979 Germanfest was held Monday night in the Muenster Telephone Corporation. The group represented 22 organizations centering attention on foods, drinks, entertainment, parking and souvenirs.

Hopefully another attraction this year will be a multitude of handsome beards. The committee is encouraging it by booking a related contest, the basis of judging to be determined later.

Chairman Alvin Fuhrman said that a well rounded schedule of entertainment for the pavilion is about complete and a brochure to publicize the festival will soon be ready for printing.

A disappointment, however, is that there was no applicant for sponsorship of the shuttle bus service, a proposed new feature that will be particularly helpful if nearby parking is hampered by bad weather or highway construction.

The committee's next planning session is dated for March 19, which is slightly more than a month before the Germanfest date.

Proposal on Dairy Trade Concession Opposed by AMPI

Congressional approval of the Carter Administration's proposed multilateral trade package will surely put thousands of U. S. dairy farmers out of business, the head of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., warned today.

Irvin J. Elkin, an Amery, Wis. dairy farmer and president of the regional dairy cooperative said the dairy portion of the package "is bad news for consumers too."

This package results in doubling the quota for imported cheese and crippling present safeguards against subsidized dumping. "It is just the tip of the iceberg," he said.

"If this agreement is approved by Congress, the door is open for a complete reversal of a U.S. dairy policy that has served the country well."

Now the dairy farmers are being asked to be the sacrificial lambs in the name of expanded trade, he said.

Under the dairy portion of the package, cheese quotas would be increased by 128 million pounds, Elkin said. The administration is claiming only 67 million pounds would be brought in on an annual basis, he charged. But another concession would contribute to disproportionate damage to U.S. farmers and consumers. More imports would be an extra cost to the taxpayers and the long term result will be higher prices to consumers, Elkin said.

"There is no justifiable basis for granting the unfair concessions," Elkin said, "and therefore we will wage a vigorous fight to preserve our present marketing system."

Contract Awarded For Football Lights

Flusche Enterprises has been awarded the contract of erecting the lights at Muenster High School's new football field. The decision was made by school board members at their meeting last Thursday night.

The system to be used is the newest development in both brightness and efficiency which is available at this time, according to David Flusche of the contracting firm. It will consist of four clusters of eight each mounted on 70 foot high steel tapered poles, a total of 32 lamps, each rated at 1500 watts. The 48,000 watt system will produce an estimated 25 candlepower of light on the field, which is said to be a brightness adequate for comfortable reading.

The lights are identified as metal halide, the brightest

and most efficient available at this time. As pointed out by Flusche, it yields 95 per cent of illumination and only 5 per cent of heat from the electricity used. By comparison, vapor lights, the next best, are 85 per cent efficient and the common incandescent light loses half of its electricity in heat.

Poles will be located at the 25 yard lines between the grandstand and the track, which surrounds the football field, and wiring to the poles will be underground.

Work schedule on the entire project has already been delayed by severe winter weather, to the extent that the track will not be available for use this season. However the plan still calls for finishing all of the football related facilities in time for the coming season. People who contracted for the grandstand are reported to be waiting for the weather, and the same is true of the track contractor, who has been kept off the job about two months.

The football project, with only six months remaining before the season opener, is about to become a hurry up job. Work involved, along with establishing sod on the field, includes construction of a new grandstand on the west side, moving the two old grandstands to their new location on the east side, surrounding football field and track with a fence, moving the present concession stand to the area, building restrooms, and finally building a fence around the complete area and surfacing the parking lot with gravel.

Muenster Council Will Host District K of C Initiation

More than 30 candidates of the Knights of Columbus 47th District are expected Sunday for the second and third degree initiation hosted by the Muenster Council. The program will begin at 1 o'clock.

Grand Knight Wayne Klement said Wednesday that the group of initiates is expected to include 28 from the admissions degree here in January along with several to be admitted this week in a ceremony at Denton. About 24 are expected to join the Muenster council.

A letter received by the grand knight from State Deputy Don J. Sauerman, conveyed his congratulations to the council for its increase of membership and stated that he will probably be here to participate in the ceremony. A group from Dallas is also expected to participate.

Officers of the Muenster council urge a big attendance at the initiation to give the new members the most impressive reception possible.

Rosary will be recited at the Jerry Crane Funeral Home, 6534 E. Northwest Highway, Dallas, at 7 p.m. tonight, Thursday, February 22 and the funeral Mass will be offered at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church, Abrams Road at Kenwood on Friday at 9:30 a.m.

In addition to his mother, John Turner is survived by his wife, Mary, and three children Cathy, John and Sara; also a brother, Jim Turner of Boston, Massachusetts, the sister-in-law and two nephews.

It's Colder than Last Year

There's a reason for the sharp increase of recent fuel bills of the community. It's been 16 per cent colder than a year ago, according to a research of local records by Steve Moser.

In fact, this may be the coldest ever at Muenster, but Moser can't say because his temperature records do not go back far enough.

His study on temperature determines averages for 45 days. Dec 1 to Jan. 15, for the three past winters. For the period ending Jan. 15, 1977 the average high was 50.5 and the average low 27.2. Ending Jan. 15, '78 the averages were 52.9 and 30.5, and for the period ending Jan. 15 this year the averages were 45 and 25.6 degrees.

From first period to the second the high and low increased 2.4 and 3.3 degrees. However from the second to the third period temperatures dropped 7.9 and 5.1 degrees.

While searching through the official weather records Moser found a number of other interesting statistics. The year of heaviest snowfall was 1978 with a total of 26.80 inches, and the next heaviest was 19.50 inches in 1966. Heaviest snowfall for 24

hours was 7 inches on January 30, 1977.

Earliest snowfall was 2 inches on November 13, 1976 and next earliest was the next day, 2 inches on the 14th. Latest snowfall was 4 inch on May 8, 1948. And the only White Christmas on the local record was in 1975, a total of 4 inches.

The moisture record shows that the driest year was 1956 with only 19.06 inches, and it was followed by the wettest, 51.80 in 1957. Next wettest were 1968 with 43.54 inches and 1950 with 43.53 inches. Rated second and third in dryness were 21.32 inches in 1963 and 23.01 in 1952.

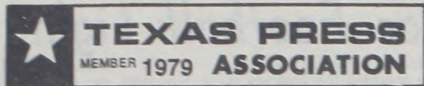
The wettest month on record was April 1957 with 12.43 inches and next wettest was August, 1970, 11.61 inches, then August, 1971, 11.57 inches, September, 1964, 11.12 inches, and September 1962, 11.11 inches. Over the years there have been several completely dry months.

Heaviest 24 hour rainfall was 6.65 inches on August 13, 1971, and next heaviest was 6.15 inches on October 31, 1974. Most intensive rainfall was 2.5 inches in one hour on August 13, 1971.

STATE OF TEXAS LOUIS EDWARD RUSSELL IN THE MUNICIPAL COURT OF MUESTER, COOKE COUNTY TEXAS OPINION and ORDER

MARSHALL, J.
On the 3rd day of February, 1979, came on to be heard the above cause wherein the Defendant was charged by count one with a violation of Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. art. 761d, Section 166, speeding, more specifically operating a motor vehicle on December 5, 1978, at a speed of 72 miles per hour in an area of the public highway within the corporate limits zones for a maximum speed of 55 miles per hour, and the cause having been reset at the request of defendant from its original setting of January 6, 1979 and having been regularly reached on the docket, came the Defendant by and through his attorney. The Defendant was not present in the courtroom. Counsel for the Defendant moved the Court dismiss the instant action on the sole grounds that the first setting of the case was 31 days after the commencement of the action, as defined in Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 32A.02 Sec. 2(a), and was therefore, beyond the bounds permitted by the Texas Speedy Trial Act. The Court informed counsel of its opinion in State v. King, Cause No. 78-1082, October 1978, in which Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 32A.02 Sec. 1(4) was held unconstitutional as being in conflict with Barker v. Wingo, 407 U.S. 514 (1972). On the basis of the holding in King, and the principle of de minimis non curat lex, the motion to dismiss was thereupon advised.
Counsel for the Defendant proceeded next to offer a plea of nolo contendere to the count of complaint. The Court inquired of counsel as to whether there were any motions that counsel desired to make as to the complaint itself. After examination of the complaint, counsel responded in the negative. The Court thereupon informed counsel that the plea of nolo contendere would be taken under advisement.
Following a recess, the Court returned to the courtroom and called the case to proceed with the entry of the plea and disposition of the case, only to discover that counsel for the Defendant inexplicably had left the courtroom during the recess and, despite being summoned, did not respond.
The Court is thus confronted with the question of whether it can properly enter a plea on behalf of defendant who never appeared, offered by a counsel who disappeared, and then proceeded to judgment. The Court is of the opinion that it cannot and must stay its hand.
Had counsel for the Defendant not departed prior to the entry of the plea by the Court, the Court probably could have proceeded to judgment under Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 33.04. The failure of the Defendant to comply with the terms of Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 27.14(b) or (c) is not an issue due to the attempt of Defendant to comply through counsel with Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 27.14(a). See Texas Attorney General's Opinion H-1203 (1978).
Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 27.14(a) states in material part: "a plea of nolo contendere in a misdemeanor case may be made either by the defendant or his counsel in open court and the punishment may be assessed by the court either upon or without evidence, AT THE DISCRETION OF THE COURT." Emphasis added.
It is that plea of nolo contendere was proffered by counsel for the Defendant in open court. Equally certain it is that the absence of both counsel and defendant at any time before the entry of a plea, much less a final judgment, deprives the Court of the ability to exercise any of the discretion conferred upon it by the statute.
Further, were this Court to deem the plea as having been entered at the time it was offered and then, in the absence of both counsel and Defendant, proceed to judgment, such an action would rightly be viewed as an abuse of discretion, not an outright denial of the rights of the Defendant guaranteed to him by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. This Court will not so penalize the citizen for the action of his counsel.
IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Clerk of the Court reset the instant cause for trial on the 3rd day of March, 1979, such setting to be at the top of the docket for that day; and
IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that counsel for Defendant and Defendant himself be notified of the new setting by certified mailing of a copy of this Order and that Defendant shall not be required to post an appearance bond or other security for his or counsel's appearance at trial on the date specified; and
IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that all proceedings in this matter are stayed until March 3, 1979.
Order accordingly.
Opinion delivered and order entered February 4, 1979.

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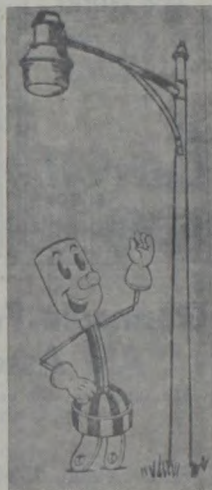

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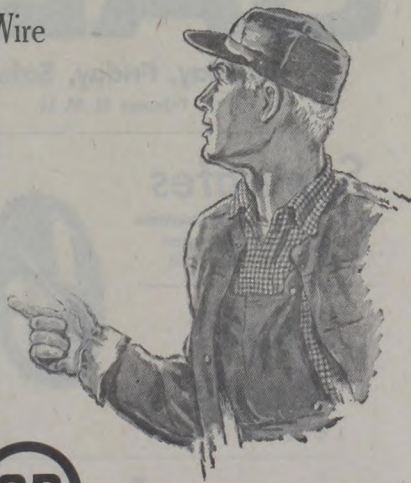
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St. Richard's Villa Rocks and Rolls For Heart Drive

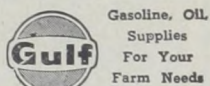

the most important that our country now faces. The administration is worried about inflation, crime, foreign relations and what not, apparently unaware that any of those problems would be much easier if they were approached with an awareness of God and eternity.

What this country needs is not more strikes or contracts but a revival of conscience, public and private. It needs the cooperation of government, religion, education and business to awaken the public to the most important fact of life . . . and really the only hope of overcoming our troubles.
