President Nixon's nationwide talk on the energy crisis was disappointing in that it failed to ask for two measures that would get rid of unwanted regulations besides saving lots of energy. One of those is to discontinue the forced busing of school children, the other is to discontinue use of anti-pollution gadgets on automobiles.

As regards the latter, engineers estimate that the clean air devices required on late model cars are using an additional 300,000 barrels of gasoline daily to attain an acceptable quality of exhaust. The quantity of fuel used for unwanted hauling of school children has not been specified but anyone knows it has to be enormous when many thousands of the buses are operating daily across hundreds of big cities.

What strikes us is that the administration fumbled both the opportunity to help the energy cause and to make very desirable changes. Busing has been most unpopular to the vast majority of people who are affected. Both blacks and whites, by the millions, have objected to it as an imposition on the children and an aggravation of racial tensions as well as a burden on taxpayers. Likewise, lots of new car owners are unhappy with the gadget which increases the vehicle's purchase price as well as its operating cost.

To this column's way of thinking, the country has already endured more than enough of the burdens caused by integration and ecology cranks. Common sense tells us that these regulations are brainstorms which should have been stopped long ago — in fact should never have been started. And now, it's baffling as well as disappointing to realize that we're still stuck with the burdens even when the national welfare so badly needs to be rid of them.

So, when you are pinched by the shortage of gasoline just remember that our government chose to waste it by the millions of barrels in order to satisfy those official busy bodies who have gone over board on integration and ecology.

As regards the ecologists, one would think the government long ago should have had a fill of their meddling. Those are the guys who caused a four year delay in congressional approval of the Alaska pipeline. They are the guys who have delayed progress toward construction of nuclear power plants. They have delayed refinery construction and they have stopped urgently needed offshore oil development. Besides all that they put a ban on the use of low grade coal which, in the opinion of the energy experts, is the most abundant of all of the nation's fuel resources.

The way this country has been kicked around by the ecology fanatics is little less than ridiculous. This isn't claiming that they have done no good whatever. Rather, they deserve lots of credit for improvement in the quality of air and water. But they deserve no credit for their fanatical extremism in demanding degrees of improvement that the nation or industry can't afford. Nor do they deserve credit for delaying urgently needed projects just to exercise their bureaucratic authority.

Other people of government as well as the integration and ecology cranks have to share the blame for the energy crisis. By setting low prices on crude oil and natural gas they discouraged exploration for more oil and gas, and in many cases caused abandonment of low production oil wells. Domestic producers were paid less than half as much as the foreign importers were paid. Another deterrent was the drop of depletion allowance from 27.5 per cent to 22.5. Officials considered it as a tax loophole for oil men whereas in many cases it was less than adequate compensation for exploration losses.

Of course, it was pleasing to hear that several measures are being taken to meet the emergency. We like the idea of sacrifices now to prevent a crisis later. Still we're concerned about the president's estimate that the recommended measures will reduce our need by 10 per cent whereas the Arab ban of oil shipment to

Christmas Lights In City Awaiting OK from Congress

The city's Yule lighting program for this Christmas season is doubtful since President Nixon's TV address Sunday night on the energy crisis.

Mayor David Bright said Tuesday that installation of lights, scheduled for that day, was postponed at least for a while until Congress decides on the recommended ban of outdoor lighting. And even if the lights are allowed they will be curtailed on a voluntary basis.

In last week's meeting the city council decided to burn its display street lights about 60 per cent of the time formerly used. Likely the time will be further reduced if lighting is allowed. But it will be shut down completely if the ban is imposed. In that case the lights will not be installed.

The mayor pointed out, however, that the town's principal display is the Noel arrangement on the water tower, and the installation there is permanent. Only a fuse and a few bulb replacements are needed to get it ready. It has been suggested that this display be used at least for a short time if the yule lights are allowed. The city council will decide after Congress responds to the president's recommendation.

Availability of current is no problem now, according to TP&L. It has the power if the city has the OK.

Saint Jo Loses Frisco Wins in Bi-District Games

District 14-A was well represented last Friday as unbeaten Frisco rolled to a 31-18 bi-district victory over Aledo in a game that was determined mostly by passes. First downs were 12 for each and the Coons led only 193-173 in rushing yardage. But they were ahead 193-38 in the aerial game.

Next action for Frisco is with Allen, which survived 13-12 in the bi-district elimination with Van Alstyne.

It was different in 7-B as the Saint Jo Panthers were turned back 35-18 by Prosper's Eagles. Constant blitzing by Prosper was a big factor in that game. The Panthers lost the ball seven times on fumbles, and Quarterback Goff was smeared for total losses of 45 yards.

Cause, Consequence of Energy Crisis Outlined by A&M Petroleum Prof.

The why and wherefore of the energy crisis along with the consequence now and through the next several years were explained to members of the Muenster JETS club and some forty visitors Tuesday night in the MHS auditorium.

Speaker for the regular JETS meeting was W. D. Von Gonten, Ph.D., associate professor of petroleum engineering at Texas A&M University. He pointed out that the crisis which is causing so much concern in the nation resulted from a number of circumstances, all of which could have been avoided. So, now the country has less fuel than it needs. Adjustments can be made and resources developed to restore normal conditions in several years, but until then there will be discomforts and inconveniences.

One cause of the trouble was the low price of gas and oil. Because of the bargain, demand for them grew, but domestic production did not increase. Producers were not able to make ends meet on the prices they received. So the country had to export gas and oil, chiefly from Venezuela and the Arab countries.

Then suddenly, for political reasons, the Arabs shut us off. Our supply is 17 per cent less than our need, and the nation cannot, on short notice, switch to other available fuels. Coal, for instance is plentiful but plants that used to burn it have been converted to the more desirable gas and oil. Changing back the plant equipment as well as mining the coal will take time.

The speaker also pointed a finger at environmentalists, saying it is a pity that environmental crisis and energy crisis did not happen at the same time. If so the environmentalists could not have gone

Mail Earlier for Christmas Because Of Energy Crisis

Postmaster Arthur Endres announced today that December 3-8 will be "Christmas Mail Early Week" in Muenster. The fuel energy crisis is a cause of great concern to the Postal Service as it affects the timely movement of Christmas mail.

The curtailment in number of air flights as well as the 50 mile-an-hour speed limit for vehicles makes the Mail Early Week more important this year than ever before. Consequently packages are needed in the post office by December 3 instead of December 10, and Christmas cards are needed by December 8 instead of December 15.

In order to get all of the Christmas mail to its destination by December 25, the post office needs your cooperation in mailing early. It will help greatly if mailers will band their mail into local and Out-Of-Town bundles when there are 10 pieces or more for each bundle. As in the past labels will again be furnished.

Two park projects got the okay at a meeting of Muenster Jaycees last Thursday night. Beginning early in December they will start on converting about an acre of wilderness area across the creek into usable park space.

The second project is the pavilion for which the Jaycees have been building a fund for several years. Members have agreed that it's time to do something and are working out details now on the design with intention to start the work as soon as possible.

Jaycees presently are having a membership drive, inviting youngsters to join and share in the good work.

City Policeman Sworn In Monday

As of 11 o'clock Monday morning the city of Muenster has two police officers. That is when Mark Blankenship was sworn in as patrolman assisting Police Chief James McDonald.

Blankenship was employed under provisions of a grant which is available through the Texhoma Regional Planning Commission, which operates in Cooke, Grayson and Fannin Counties. The greater part of his salary will be paid by the commission and a requirement is that he spend a specified number of hours attending special courses in law enforcement.

He is a native of Saint Jo and has been living in Muenster the past two weeks to qualify as a resident of Cooke County. He plans to move a mobile home here soon.

His assignment is to divide patrol time with Chief McDonald during normal conditions and to work with him at crowded occasions.

Meanwhile the city is taking steps to qualify five volunteers as auxiliary police to help when additional officers are needed. An ordinance to that effect is being prepared for adoption at an early meeting of the city council. The men are Mike Stoffels, Henry Knabe, Herbert Knabe, Willie Fisher and Gilbert Boydston.

MHS Teams Divide Pair of Contests With Whitesboro

Muenster High's basketball teams broke even with Whitesboro Monday night in a pair of games in the MHS gym. Girls played the curtain raiser going down 62-41 before the visitors, and the boys came through with a strong final quarter for a 51-43 win.

It was the second loss of the season for Bill Moore's girls. As in the week before at Whitesboro, they played on fairly even terms with the Whitesboro second string but were no match for the regulars who are made up mostly of last year's district champ team.

The visitors led all the way ending the periods with scores of 10-7, 26-19, 52-27 and 62-41. Muenster scorers were Becky Fields 19, Tracy Klement 11, Debbie Schneider 8, Sandy Dittfurth 3.

Next game started like an easy one for the Hornets. They went to an 8-2 count before their visitors got organized, and that was the biggest spread in the score until late in the final period. MHS ended the first period with a 10-8 lead.

During the next period Whitesboro tied the score three times and ended the half with a 20-20 score. Then during the third quarter it was close behind all the way and got ahead by a 31-30 count as the period ended.

However the Hornets regained their lead early in the fourth and kept ahead the rest of the way. During the latter part of the period Whitesboro got into foul trouble as it got too eager to get the ball. The result was that Muenster got lots of foul shots and made a good percentage of them. Finally Muenster played keep away in the last two minutes.

MHS scorers were Robert Johnson 21, Ronnie Felderhoff 13, Lyle Klement 8, Randy Wolf 6, Curtis Klement 3. Total foul shots for the Hornets were 15 out of 25 tries.

Cubs Drop 20-17 Game at Nocona

Sacred Heart's junior boys had a hot contest but the girls were swamped in a pair of games at Nocona Monday night. The score was 28-2 in the opener as Brenda Voth was the girl who kept Sacred Heart from being completely blanked.

However, it was different in the next game. The lead changed several times with scores being tied 6-6 and 8-8 in the first two periods, then 13-11 and 20-17 favoring Nocona in the third and last periods. The Tiger Cubs led in field goals but made only one free throw whereas Nocona made 6. Glen Walterscheid hit 7 for Sacred Heart, Bobby Hartman and Fred Koesler scored 4 each and Danny Walterscheid 2.

AMPI Head Notes Sharp Decline in Milk Production

Officials of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., today expressed concern over the continuing decline in U.S. milk production.

"October was the 12th consecutive month in which milk production was below the same month of the preceding year," observed John Butterbrodt, AMPI's dairy farmer president. "And instead of slacking off, the rate of decline appears to be accelerating."

U.S. milk production in October was 4.7 percent below October, 1972. The most recent monthly drop was the largest since the production downturn began last November.

September milk production was 4.2 percent below a year ago while August and July were down 3.8 and 3.3 percent, respectively.

Citing a number of factors in the milk production decline, Butterbrodt noted many dairy-men have left farming entirely while others have turned to more profitable farming enterprises.

In an effort to lower costs and generate income, dairy-men have sold some of their milk cows for beef, he added. Many others have reduced the amount of high-protein feed in their herd rations — feed that is needed for optimum milk production but which still is high in price due to heavy demand for available supplies.

"In general, the milk production decline all boils down to the fact that dairy farmers still are finding it difficult to stretch their milk sales income far enough to meet production costs and make a living, even with the recent advances in milk prices," Butterbrodt said.

Unless there is a leveling off or decline in production costs, dairy farmers again may have to seek higher prices in an effort to stay in business producing milk to meet consumer needs, the AMPI president said.
