Friends of State Representative Bill Sullivant are pleased to learn that he has been rated by Texas Monthly as one of the ten best members of this year's legislature.

The article describes him as "an honest, thorough, legislative craftsman who has made a place for himself more by dint of hard work than by any excess of natural talent. Low-key, passive personality, alert but cool, an unusual combination for a successful state representative."

Bill is known among his colleagues as a hard worker representing this county with conscience and judgment. He is appreciated especially by rural people for sponsorship of the tax bill requiring farm and ranch land to be assessed according to its productive capacity rather than its market value.

Skyrocketing land prices of recent years, the result mostly of speculative buying, would have been the basis for much higher valuation. We shudder to think what a farmer's tax predicament might be if his income from the land had to pay for the inflated assessments based on land prices of recent years. The idea is about as unrealistic as expecting to make payments on the high priced land out of its earnings from production.

We've been aware lately of efforts in Washington to get this country back on friendly terms with Cuba, both economically and politically. In keeping with its close affiliation with the Soviet Union, the Castro regime favors a spirit of detente, in which the two countries establish a friendly atmosphere for trade, tourism, social relations and what not.

The Castro outfit has its henchmen spreading this line. At the same time we have our own liberals who seem always eager to be chummy with the people who stated long ago that they intend to take us over.

Of course these people don't bother to look at the record. They are unimpressed by the fact that relations with red countries have been very unsatisfactory in the past. We have been mooched and cheated. We have had agreements violated. And we have seen the reds accepting assistance from us at the very time they were hauling shiploads of supplies to our enemies. We have seen them expanding their military while depending on us to grow their grain and build their truck factory.

Well, the Russians and Cubans are too much in cahoots to justify any confidence from us. The proposal reminds one of the bad guy edging up close to the good guy. While he claims his motives are completely friendly, we still wonder whether he's getting set to pick a pocket or stab the person. This is an instance of that old time problem involving the white hats and black hats. The white hats are at a disadvantage. They have to be constantly on guard against trickery and treachery, whereas the black hats can carry on in comfort knowing that they will receive a fair deal while awaiting their opportunity for a rip-off. As it looks from here, US has little to gain in getting chummy with Cuba.

Actually, just one Cuban program is more than sufficient reason for US to reject any proposal to improve relations with the Castro cutthroats. It is the espionage program that has been under way for more than five years under cover of sugar harvesting. The scheme was hatched in 1969 as a way whereby Cuba could compensate to some extent for a subsidy of a million dollars a day from Moscow.

In this operation Castro & Co. invites US leftists, especially the revolutionaries, to show their good neighborliness by helping Cuba with its sugar harvest. As told by a Congressional Internal Security Subcommittee, this program is "one of the most extensive and dangerous infiltration operations ever undertaken by a foreign power against the U.S."

While in Cuba these young leftists are quizzed on every aspect of life in this country. And when they return home they have assignments to gather information on nuclear research and weapons, missiles, submarines, planes, etc. — in fact a wide range of information.

Community Starts Annual Swim Class Next Monday

This community's annual free Red Cross swimming classes will be held during the coming two weeks in the Muenster municipal pool.

Mrs. Harold Flusche, director, announced the program this week, stating that registration will be held next Monday from 9 to 11 a.m., and enrollees will be divided into two groups, one to receive instructions Tuesday through Saturday of next week and the other Monday through Friday of the following week.

Each of those groups will be divided into classes for four levels of instruction: the beginners, advanced beginners, intermediates and swimmers and each of those levels will be further divided into three 45-minute classes a day beginning at 9, 10 and 11 o'clock. As a result of the dividing and re-dividing each instructor will have only a few persons to teach at any time, an arrangement which assures more personal attention. The class time received by each student will be five 45 minute sessions.

Anyone who has completed kindergarten will be admitted. This includes adults, who are invited and encouraged to enroll.

Rain Measure Is Slightly Ahead Of Local Average

With arrival of the middle of the year, Muenster has slightly more than half of a normal year's moisture measure. Steve Mosler's official record on July 1 shows that the total to date is 21.51 inches whereas the average for a year is about 35 inches.

Rain has been not only ample but probably also the most timely that the area has experienced in many years. Net result was a better than average grain yield and good harvesting weather, with only one interruption in combining, which did little if any harm to the grain but gave a big assist to pastures and forage crops.

Again, a rain last Saturday gave another welcome boost to ranges and feed crops. Good hay cuttings are in sight now. Saturday's rain measured .38 on Mosler's gauge, and was reported up to 2 inches in some areas of the community. Total for June was 3.18 inches.

The first tennis tournament sponsored by Muenster Jaycees was a real dandy — so much so that players and spectators were trying to promote another while it was still under way.

Expansion of Hospital District Described as Two Way Bargain

A good deal to people on both sides of the proposition is the appraisal given by Muenster Hospital Board members to the July 19 election on expansion of the district.

To residents within present bounds of the district it is an opportunity to expand in progress and stability as well as size. Or, to put it another way, the addition enables the district to continue improving instead of slipping backward.

As pointed out by Al Trubebach, board chairman, people of the area — permitted to be annexed have identified themselves as supporters of the town and district, but if rejected in their request to join, some would be inclined to take their patronage elsewhere. Their absence would hurt financially, perhaps even to the extent of causing a cut back or shut down in the operation.

On the other hand a favorable vote can stimulate patronage and hasten progress

and growth. And if the project is sufficient to justify additions and improvements the district will have more resources to finance the program.

On the other side, residents of the area permitted to annex have the satisfaction of joining a district that is established and successful and almost clear of debt. They are becoming part of a going concern, not haunted by the problems and costs of starting from scratch. Along with all that they have the factors of nearness and convenience. Almost everyone of the people concerned is closer to Muenster Hospital than to any other, a consideration which gets bigger as the energy crisis gets worse.

Donors Asked for Next Deposit in Local Blood Bank

Sponsoring organizations of the Muenster Blood Bank program have started recruiting for their semi-annual collection on Wednesday, July 16. The operation will be conducted by the Bloodmobile personnel of the regional Red Cross blood center of Wichita Falls, who will have their facilities set up in the KC Hall from 2 to 7 p.m.

Quota for collection again is set at 100 pints. This goal is based on six months requirement by the local hospital along with the amount used by hospital district residents receiving transfusions in other hospitals. The program provides that all of these people are entitled to free blood — but are to pay for costs of collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, etc. — from the supply contributed to the local blood bank. By this arrangement the cost of a transfusion is about half as much as when commercial blood is used.

The hospital as well as the patient reaps a benefit from the program. The hospital does not have to pay storage fees for blood.

Some 26 communities of North Texas and South Oklahoma are affiliated with the Wichita Falls regional bank in this program. Each community in its turn supplies the others through the Bloodmobile collection. Also each has a collection quota based on the quantity of blood used.

In a special effort to reach their quota the local sponsors are reminding donors who give regularly and also contacting other prospects. In addition they are sending out a community-wide request to everyone who is willing and able.

One group they remember especially is the high school students who responded very well in the last two collections. All of them are urged to come again and help reach the goal. Anyone over 17 can be admitted without parental permission. Persons between 16 and 17 can be admitted with parental permission.

As a convenience, the donors again are invited to make appointments for donations. They can call 759-2271. The appointments are also favored by Bloodmobile personnel because of the tendency to level off slack and rush periods.

CCC Library Gets \$3918 US Grant

Congressman Omar Burlison announces Office of Education approval of a \$3,918 Library Resources grant to Cooke County College for fiscal year 1975.

Grantees are accredited institutions of higher education, eligible branches of such institutions, and other public and private nonprofit library agencies whose primary function is to provide library and information services to institutions of higher education on a formal cooperative basis. Grant funds must be used to acquire academic library materials such as books, periodicals, magnetic tapes, phonograph records, audiovisual materials, and other related library materials.

Though enlarging the district by about 50 per cent, from 22 to 33 percent of the entire county area, the expansion will add comparatively little in tax valuation and population. At the present time the district's valuation is about \$8.3 million, which figures to about 11 per cent of the county's total of \$76.5 million. The proposed expansion would add about \$3 million, increasing its portion of the county total to about 15 per cent.

The population ratio would increase from 16 to 19 per cent of the county's total of 24,000. Present count of the hospital district is about 3,850 and the count of the proposed addition is about 720, increasing district population to 4570.

The area proposed for annexation to the hospital district includes the southwest portion of the county, about a ninth of its area, and consists principally of the communities of Myra, Hood, Rosston and Leo.

Its eastern boundary is irregular to exclude Gwyn property near Myra and Fischer property near Era and to include Feldehoff and Zimmerer property between Myra and Lindsay.

Joining the present district line between Myra and Lindsay, the boundary is determined principally by three roads. At the north end of the addition is the J. T. Biffle Road; then the Arthur Reese Road, generally parallel to and about two miles east of the Myra-Era FM Road. At intersection of the Reese Road with FM 922 the boundary follows 922 west to the intersection with Myra-Era pavement, from which point the Sam Seagraves road leads south to the county line. The boundary follows this road south to the county line, except the zig zag to exclude Fischer property, thence west to the Montague county line then north to the present district boundary.

Sr. Genevieve Transferred
After twenty three years in Muenster as a primary teacher of Sacred Heart School, Sr. Genevieve will be transferred to Stuttgart, Arkansas, where she will teach 1st and 2nd grades. She will remain here through July and will then be replaced by Sr. Lillian Marie Reiter, who will have her first teaching assignment in her home town.

3 Finish Revised Training in WSI
A refresher and retraining course for water safety instructors was completed last week at Waterloo Park, Denison, by three of this community's currently authorized WSI personnel. They are Mrs. Harold Flusche, Mrs. Ted Henschel and Miss Kathy Luke.

Purpose of the program is to retrain WSIs in the revised Red Cross safety program which stresses more thorough indoctrination in safety rather than rescue procedure for those who are deficient in safety habits and knowledge. The class was conducted by Bud Bradley of Dallas, a national safety services director of Red Cross. It included 48 re-trainees from four counties.

Five SH Students Attend Workshop
Five students of Sacred Heart High, John Henschel, student council president, and Mary Grewing, Laurie Walterscheid, Mark Hess and Chris Schilling, sponsored by Mrs. Bob Steele, attended a student council workshop at NTSU, June 22-26.

The five day program was based on leadership training and was designed to teach many activities the students could present to their fellow students at home. Wednesday was spent at Six Flags, and a banquet honored unusual achievements.
