The damaged flood gate has never been entirely closed. Water is flowing under the gate at a comparatively rapid rate. More than 50,000 acre feet of water has been lost to date.



A list of blank spaces will be 1e7t at the bottom of each ballot, for the voter to write in his selection of precinct delegates to the Brown County Democratic convention, which in turn will select and instruct delegates to the state Democratic convention, to be held later in the year in Galveston. It is important that you select good men and women for these positions, people who will represent the precinct intelligently and fairly. Do not leave the spaces blank..

For district and state offices the voter likewise will find many candidates. There are five candidates for the legislature, three for district attorney, two for state senator and four for congress.

In the race for state senator, Judge E. M. Davis of Brownwood is pitted against Penrose Metcalf of San Angelo. Judge Davis is well known to the readers of The Banner, having served as city attorney of Brownwood, county judge of Brown county and as a member of the legislature. Mr. Metcalf is at present, and has been for a number of years, a member of the legislature from Tom Green county. This race will be decided Saturday, as there are two candidates only.

Interest in this district for the past several weeks has centered on the race for Congress from the new 21st Consional District. Brown County occupies an extremely favorable position with regard to this race, as it is the larges county in the district without a resident candidate. There are four candidates, all most excellent gentlemen, and any one of whom would serve the district acceptably in Congress. They are Culberson Deal and E. E. (Pat) Murphy of San Angelo, Judge Carl Runge of Mason and Judge Charles L. South of Coleman. Judge South is the better known of the four to voters of this county, as he is serving now as district attorney. Judge Runge is a former district judge: Mr. Murphy a prominent San Angelo attorney and Mr. Deal former secretary of the San Angelo-Board of City Development. All have been conducting spirited campaigns, and have strong followings in the various counties of the district.

The interest in the state races lies largely around personalities, as few issues are involved, at least in the first primary. There are three candidates for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court: James W. McClendon of Travis County; H. S. Lattimore of Tarrant and John H. Sharp of Ellis. The first two are widely known in Texas and are eminent attorneys. So possibly is the other, but we have heard little of him during the campaign.

Lon A. Smith is a candidate for re-election as railroad commissioner, with four opponents, leading of which at the present time seem to be John Pundt of Dallas or W. Gregory Hatcher, also of Dallas.

J. H. Walker, commissioner of the General Land Office, and J. E. McDonald, Commissioner of Agriculture, both have opposition, there being four candidates for the latter office, which probably will result in a run-off between McDonald and Fred W. Davis.

State Comptroller George H. Sheppard has several opponents and probably will be forced to a run-off. Walter Woodward of Coleman is a candidate for Attorney General, as are William McCraw of Dallas and Clyde E. Smith of Woodville. Woodward is the present state senator from this district; McCraw is a popular former district attorney of Dallas, and Smith has considerable strength in East Texas. The man elected will represent the state in legal matters. Our advice is to select from the three the attorney you would choose in event your personal.

In our opinion the race is between Walter Woodul of Houston and Joe Moore of Greenville, both present members of the state senate, although Ben F. Berkeley of Alpine may be a contender and John Hornsby of Austin has many friends. All are capable, all deserve your consideration.

Of the six candidates for governor remaining after the withdrawal of Edward K. Russell, Jimmie Allred and C. C. McDonald seem to be the strongest contenders, with Tom Hunter and Clint Small possibilities to crowd one of these gentlemen out of the run-off. Most readers are familiar with the qualifications of the leading candidates. Maury Hughes and Edgar Witt, fine gentlemen, are hopelessly behind. Clint Small is a favorite son of West Texas, who ran four years ago; Hunter ran two years ago, has strong support throughout the state, and may be in the run-off. C. C. McDonald has the support of the Ferguson administration, a considerable factor, coupled with a personal popularity to be considered. Allred is attorney-general, a red-headed, firey, likeable young man with plenty of ability. He's not as strong as he was two or four years ago, but plenty strong to be leading man Saturday.

United States Senator Tom Connally has his two opponents, Joe Bailey, Jr., and Guy B. Fisher, outclassed, and will win in the first primary, according to all indications. He has made a splendid record, and there is no need for changing senators, so far as we can see.

There are the high-lights of the Saturday primary. Get all the information you can regarding the candidates, make your decisions, and go to the polls early.



The Five Fighting Zanes. WHEN it came time for old William Zane to die, he could take pride in the fact that he had given to frontier history five stalwart sons who would make the name of Zane forever famous there. They

Col. Ebernezer Zane, founder in 1770 of the settlement which was to become the present Wheeling, W. Va.; a soldier in Lord Dunmore's war of 1774; builder and commander of Fort Henry, the scene of two famous Indian sieges in 1777 and 1782; an early settler in Ohio on the present site of Zanesville; blazer in 1796 of "Zane's Trace," which followed the route of an old Indian trail from Wheeling to Limestone (opposite Maysville, Ky.) and over which poured a flood of settlers into Ohio and Kentucky: a colonel of tia and a leader of men down to the day of his death in 1811.

Izaac Zane, captured by the Wyandots at the age of nine; a "white Indian" for ten years as the adopted son of Chief Tarhe; then, returning to his own people, a mem ber of the Virginia House of Burgesses; back again to the Wyandots to become the husband of Myeerah, the "White Crane," daughter of Chief Tarhe, and to take her with him into the Ohio country to establish the settlement which now is Zanesfield and there to live with her until his death in

Silas Zane, one of the first settlers near Wheeling; a captain of Virginia troops in the Continental army while the Indians were besieging his brother's fort in 1777 but present there during the siege of 1782; a trader in the Indian country after the Revolution and, about 1785, a victim to Indian treachery on the Scioto river.

Jonathan Zane, captured at the age of two by the same Indians who carried off his brother, Isaac, he lived with them only a short time before being returned to his own people; a stalwart fighter during the stirring events around Fort Henry; a pioneer into Ohio and the partner of his brother in marking "Zane's Trace."

Andrew Zane, an early settler at Wheeling; hero of a famous exploit during the siege of 1777 when when he escaped from the Indians by jumping over a 70-foot cliff, only to be killed by them a short time later.

"The Fighting Zanes"! Only five of them? No! For there was another-a sister worthy of her brothers-Betty Zane, the girl whose swift feet brought the much-needed powder from Ebernezer Zane's cabin to the hardpressed defenders of Fort Henry during the siege of 1782 and whose brave defiance of death that day did much to make the name of Zane forever famous.

Mrs. Abbie Hounshell mentioned in this letter is the injured party and mother of Fayette Hounshell. This letter reads as follows:

TO THE PUBLIC

Mrs. Sarah DeBusk, Mrs. Abbie Hounshell, Sam DeBusk, Fayette Hounshell and the other children and relatives of Mrs. DeBusk and Mrs. Hounshell, take this method of expressing to he peace officers of Brown and adjoining counties, and to the district attorney and district judge, our appreciation for the way in which the prosecution of Lester Sterne, who attacked and robbed us on the night of June 19, 1934, was conducted.

We especially desire to commend the work of our good sheriff, Jack Hallmark and his Deputies, who so ably conducted the investigation, and through whose untiring efforts the perpetrator of this crime was discovered and captured. We also wish to thank the District Court and the Grand Jury for their prompt work in immediately returning a bill of indictment, and bringing the case to a speedy trial, since in our feeble condition it is probable that we might not have been able to testify, if the case had not been tried until the fall term.

We also desire to express our gratitude to the twelve jurors who so patiently and ably tried the case, and desire to say that we consider their verdict a very just and righteous one. We are handing a copy to the Brownwood Banner and Brownwood Bulletin and hope that you will give this space in your valuable

I appreciate the untiring work done by the officers of adjoinng counties in helping to ferret out this serious crime. office was notified of this violation by my deputy Jim Campbell of Cross Cut immediately after it occurred. I at once, in company with my only available deputy, went to the DeBusk home arriving shortly after one o'clock on the night of the tragedy. My entire force assisted in working on this case for three successive days and nights, dropping all other work of the office and continued to work until the guilty parties were apprehended. I could not make the arrest of the defendants in this case as they were located in another county, but was present when each of them were arrested and did all in my power to bring the guilty

July 24th, 1934.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

On June the 23, 1934, W. E. Hallmark came to the Police Station inquiring the whereabouts of L. E. Sterne. We located him at 1133 South Fifth St. After searching his place and talking to him he told us that he spent the night of the 19th of June at the Carter Home in Jones Co. and that he had used a borrowed car. We located the car in Abilene and after looking the car over and comparing the ires with the tread, or track that was made at the scene of the crime, I, in company of W. E. Hallmark returned to the Sterne Home and arrested L. E. Sterne. We worked the balance of the night gathering evidence in Taylor and Jones Counties, taking the witnesses before the District Attorney who took the statements; later that night we returned to the Sterne Home and arrested Mrs. L. E. Sterne.


