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As voters of the Muenster School District approach Saturday's election on a \$490,000 school bond issue few will question the need of providing the requested funds.

Present space is inadequate for the school's expanding program of what has already been added and what will be added. The remedy to this situation, as proposed by the Texas Education Agency and planned by the Muenster school board, is to construct one building with two kindergarten rooms and other classrooms, and to remodel the present elementary building to enlarge some classrooms. Another expansion is to close in a patio adjoining the home-making department.

Also planned is a re-roofing and general fix-up job for the original school building, now in its 27th year. It's sufficient to say that wise maintenance policy requires this attention.

Likewise on the program is addition of slightly more than two blocks of space, removal of the football field to a better location, and including an all weather track in the job. Grandstands, restrooms and parking space are also figured in.

Admittedly the athletic features are less urgent than the other needs, but early action on them are equally desirable and advisable. The question is "if eventually, why not now?" The increasing popularity of track in recent years would make the track a community attraction available to both schools and individuals interested in physical conditioning. Besides it would be desirable to host local meets and allow area schools to have their meets here. The track is a good bet to become a community asset.

Since the program is attractive it's natural for the community to want it as soon as possible. And inflation convinces us that the sooner it's done, the better. Looking back we regret that it was not done five or ten years ago. Looking forward we are haunted by the thought that it will be higher every year we wait.

This brings us to the issue of this week's election. By approving the bond issue the district instructs the trustees to lose no more time, thereby taking advantage of a double saving. The first saving is the lower interest rate of a bond issue as compared with short loans. The second saving is in allowing inflation less time to run up the costs.

One point that should be understood is that it's going to cost regardless of what the vote decides. Because of inflationary pressure the tax will have to increase 15% to meet operation needs. Besides the board has an alternate course for the improvement program if the bond fails. It is allowed to finance a part of the program on a short term, higher interest loan to be retired in five years. Meeting that obligation would likely require more than the 15% set to liquidate the bond issue.

Then, with the one obligation out of way, the board could enter its second phase of short term financing for the second portion of the overall program. By that time inflation would have increased the price and a second round of higher tax would be needed to pay the higher costs of retiring the debt.

So it would go with one stage after another as the children prolong their wait and inflation keeps increasing the cost. Those are the factors involved as voters consider whether they prefer the 25 year bond with the lower rate of interest or the series of 5 year loans with their higher rates and progressively higher inflated costs. There can hardly be a doubt that the people will get more for their money through the bond issue.

A fringe benefit is also in sight if Muenster State Bank succeeds in buying the bonds. In that case local money would be welcome as it was in the sale of hospital bonds. Earnings on the bonds are tax free.

The one sour feature about all this is the need to increase taxes. Raises have been coming too frequently in the past few decades. We wonder if it will ever stop. Nevertheless the outlook isn't quite as gloomy when we remember that first of all these are local

Gainesville Will Host Conservation Awards Banquet

The 28th annual awards banquet honoring champion farmers and ranchers of the Upper Elm Red Soil and Water Conservation District will be held in the Activities Center of Cooke County College on Friday, May 6, 7:30 p.m.

Plans for the event were made last week Thursday in a meeting of the sponsors in Gainesville's First State Bank. The sponsors are banks, newspapers, radio stations and TV station of Cooke, Montague and Grayson counties, in which the conservation district is located.

William A. Claunch of First State Bank was chosen to serve chairman, a position he has held for several years. Headliners selected for the program are Gene Foster of Grayson County College and Pat Bolin of Radio Station KGAF. Foster will be master of ceremonies and Bolin will be narrator telling the conservation stories of the champs while colored scenes of their operations are flashed on a screen.

Awards to the champions will be made by sponsors of their respective areas. Other awards will be presented by District Chairman John H. Bayer.

Naegeli Assigned To Farmersville SCS Work Unit

Arlin Naegeli, member of the local Soil Conservation Service work unit since July 1968, will become District Conservationist in charge of the Farmersville SCS office on April 25. Confirmation of his transfer and promotion was received during the week-end.

In his new job he will supervise the SCS program in some 136,000 acres of crop and pasture land, approximately the same area as assigned to the Muenster work unit.

Naegeli has been in the SCS since his graduation at Sam Houston State University eleven years ago. He worked in Bellvue, Jacksboro and Bowie before coming to Muenster. After the transfer of Jack Davis to Tahoka in 1973 he was appointed acting head of the Muenster work unit and on March 4, 1974, when the Muenster work unit was designated as a sub unit under the Gainesville SCS office, Naegeli was appointed conservationist in charge.

His successor here has not been announced.

Sales Tax Rebate Of \$11,287 Is City's Biggest To Date

The biggest city sales tax rebate ever received by Muenster was a part of the largest quarterly payment ever made by the state comptroller's office. The remittance received here was \$11,287.11.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said that city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1977 totaled a record \$89.5 million, up 18.5 per cent from the same three months period of 1976. The period, closing on February 25, includes December and reflects a big increase over the former Christmas period. It also reflects remittances by many retailers who have to pay only on a quarterly basis.

Bullock's report also announces that, effective immediately, the small retailers collecting \$300 or less of state sales tax will be allowed to file returns and remit only once a year instead of every three months.

The statement accompanying Muenster's check explained that the gross collected was \$11,225.80, and the 2 per cent collection fee was \$224.52. Adding \$849.95 of prior balance and retaining \$564.12 accounts for the check's total of \$11,287.11.

Checks sent to some other cities of the area were as follows: Gainesville \$78,479.64; Lindsay \$3,961.38; Nocola \$15,945.67; Pilot Point \$5,655.75; Saint Jo \$2,962.04; Sanger \$4,416.49; Whitesboro \$12,951.04.

Big Turnout Expected Saturday For 4 Elections in 1 Location

A special election along with three routine elections is expected to bring community voters to the polls in droves Saturday. All will be under one roof at the Muenster Public School. Also all voters will have the opportunity to mark three ballots and some will get to mark four.

The big issue, which is expected to be the election's principal attraction, concerns a proposed \$490,000 bond issue to finance expansion, remodeling and repairs at Muenster Public School. The program as presented by the school trustees includes one new building with two kindergarten rooms and several other rooms, remodeling one building to enlarge some classrooms, enclosing a patio to enlarge the home-making department, giving the original building a rebuilt roof and general fix-up & paint up, acquiring additional campus space, providing a new football field with surrounding track along with parking space, grandstands, rest rooms and concession stand. An administration building is in the plans if finances hold out. The entire proposal complies with Texas Education Agency recommendation for upgrading the entire school program.

The school board urges approval of the bond issue because it is more economical than piecemeal projects on short term loans, because it avoids inflated costs due to delay and because it permits the school to use the facilities earlier.

Tax increase needed to retire the bond issue is set at 15 per cent. Along with this raise the board anticipates another 15 per cent boost to meet bigger operational expense. Total proposed tax raise is 30 per cent of which half is intended to pay off the bond.

Other elections Saturday are those for the city council, the school board and the hospital board. All are non-contest elections with one candidate for each open position.

On the city ballot are Mayor David Bright for re-election, Ted Henschel for re-election as position 5 alderman, and Ray Walterscheid for position 3 alderman who declined to run again.

On the school district ballot are Adam Wolf and Eddie Fleitman, both unopposed for re-election. Also on the school ballots are Doyle Selby and Al Felderhoff, both unopposed for re-election to the county school board. Shelby is on the ballot for Precinct 3 voters, Felderhoff on the Precinct 4 ballot.

The hospital district ballot has four unopposed candidates, all seeking re-election. They are Jimmy Jack Biffle, Paul Fetsch, Al Felderhoff, and Al Trubenbach.

The elections will be held in the public school, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Lee Toothaker and Joe Horn will conduct the city election, Charles Cash will supervise the other three.

MHS Band Gets Best Ratings Ever In UIL Regional

The MHS Band received the highest ratings of its career in Class A competition in the Region V University Interscholastic League Concert and Sight-Reading contest held at Bowie High School in Arlington on March 23. Ratings were Division II (Excellent) in Concert and Division I (Superior) in Sight-Reading.

Judges for the concert event were: Buddy Richardson of Wichita Falls, Eldon Janzen of Fayetteville, Arkansas and Pete Kunkel of Longview. Sight-Reading judges were Paul Stroud of Longview; G. T. Gilligan of Kermit and Jim Harwell of Stephenville.

For concert competition the band played "Loyalty March" by Skornicka, "Hymn of Praise" by Bruckner (arranged by Phillip Gordon) and "Cherubim Song" by Bortniansky (arranged by David Warren).

Some of the judges' written comments were: from Buddy Richardson "... very nice. Excellent style and control ... This is an excellent band ..."; from Jim Harwell "Very attentive group ... your behavior in this room was a plus in your favor. Congratulations"; from Paul Stroud "... Nice job. You seem to have learned the basic fundamentals well. All in all, you did well. Best wishes."

The Muenster High Band is under the direction of Bob Hayes. It will present a concert on April 30 for Germanfest. The annual Spring Concert will be on May 9 at 8 p.m.

County Team Is First in District 4-H Rifle Contest

Cooke County 4-Hers made an excellent showing in the District IV 4-H rifle contest held Saturday, March 26, at the University of Texas at Arlington. Competition included teams representing the 14 county district surrounding the Metroplex.

The senior team from Cooke County took first place honors with a team score of 772 out of a possible 900. Team members included Billy Felderhoff, George Luke, Dick Dangelmayr, all from Sacred Heart 4-H Club, and Steve Dutton from the Callisburg 4-H Club. High point individual score for the contest was fired by Billy Felderhoff. His score of 274 was followed by George Luke's 251. A score of 248 placed Dick Dangelmayr as the third highest point individual for the contest.

Winning first place qualifies the senior team to represent Cooke County at the State Contest to be held in conjunction with the State 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University on June 7 and 8.

Cooke County junior team placed second behind Tarrant County Juniors with a team score of 453. Trey Yarbrough's score of 162 placed him as fourth high individual for the junior contest. They are from the Era 4-H Club. Other members of the junior team included Wayne Richards from Sacred Heart, Toby Stough from the Downard-Fairplains, and Chuck Reiter from Saint Mary's.

Slan Reed of Callisburg coached the teams.

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Doris Felderhoff Is All-American For Second Year

For the second year Doris Felderhoff is named on the Kodak selection of Women's All-American basketball team. The announcement was made last Friday night in an awards banquet at the University of Minnesota sponsored by AIAW (Association of Intercollegiate Women's Athletics).

Doris and a member of the Baylor team were the two Texans chosen for the ten member dream team, all equally rated as first team members. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Felderhoff, plays with the Stephen F. Austin Ladyjacks, and formerly played with Muenster High.

As a second year winner she was awarded a Kodak movie camera; (last year an Instamatic still camera), also a plaque and All-American sweater. In addition she had an expense-paid trip to the banquet plus \$50 for spending money.

During 24 regular season games with the Ladyjacks Doris had an impressive record, leading the team in both scoring and rebounding. She made 168 field goals out of 338 attempts, an average of 49.7 per cent, also 76 of 101 free throws, an average of 75.2 per cent. Her total score was 412, the average per game was 17.7 and the high was 32. Also she had 324 rebounds, an average of 13.5 a game, and a high of 25. Along with that she made 73 fouls and fouled out of three games.

Weekend Rain Measures 4.37

Muenster's moisture condition improved wonderfully during the past weekend with rains that measured 4.37 inches on Steve Mosler's official rain gauge. Most of it came in Saturday's night's series of showers which poured out 4.02 inches while other areas of North Texas had considerably more. The Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex was flooded and Gainesville reported 8 inches.

All of the community's creeks remained calm as detention reservoirs did their flood control job perfectly. However lakes and ponds all got a good fill. Likewise land was thoroughly saturated giving grain crops a good supply of moisture as a follow-up to adequate snow and rain earlier in the year.

Along with .57 inch early in the month, the moisture total for March now stands at 4.90. Along with 4.70 in January and February the year's total now is 9.60, which is slightly more than normal.

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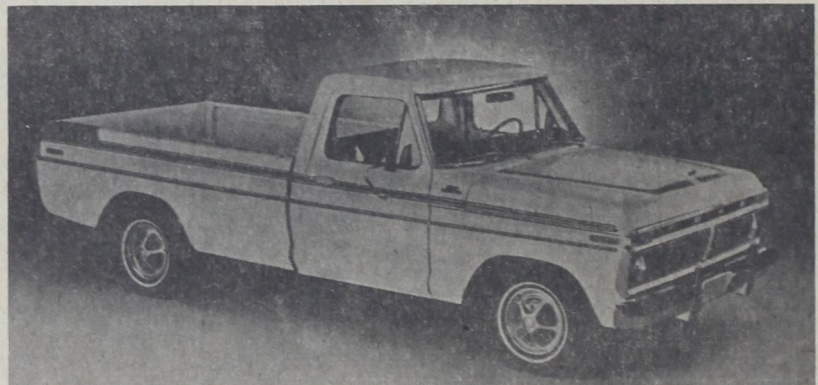

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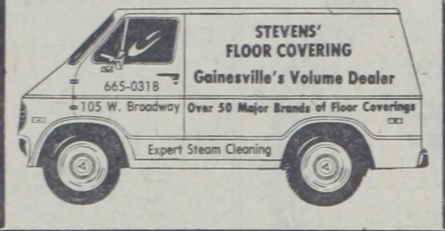

Teen Age Smoking Being Discouraged By Cancer Society

"Many young people still think smoking is sophisticated, so let's get the glamorization of this deadly habit out of advertising," declared Gilbert Bindel, President of the Cooke County Unit of the American Cancer Society.

A new American Cancer Society study revealed that a half million more teenage girls are smoking now compared with 1969, virtually catching up with boys of the same age group. Cigarette smoking among teenage boys has remained fairly constant.

According to the study there is a sharp reduction in the number of teenagers who now hear anti-smoking messages on radio or TV. "We are appealing to local stations to quadruple the number of anti-smoking spots they use," he said. "We are also supporting efforts to bar the use of models in cigarette advertising which portrays the habit as conducive to physical well-being, glamour and sex," he added.

Both girls and boys mistakenly think that most everyone else smokes especially their own peers and teachers. We should get across the point that smoking is a minority phenomenon," he said. "Part of what we are seeing here is the play of new values as witness the growth of on-campus and in-school smoking, Mr. Bindel said. "Many parents, schools, teachers and doctors seem to be taking a hands-off attitude toward youth smoking. This is part of the challenge the anti-smoking forces face today."

One has to take a stand somewhere however," Mr. Bindel declared, "and I think once you set up a smoking lounge in school you're encouraging smoking. It's like the Ten Commandments. You can't always enforce them but that doesn't mean you throw them out."

"There is a broad basis for getting young people to stop smoking. Parents, schools, and non-smoking youths themselves as well as the entire medical profession can take a part in curbing and finally eliminating this single biggest environmental cause cancer," he said.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

With reference to last week's letter to the Editor, the members of the Board of Trustees of the Muenster ISD are unanimous in this response.

Neither we, nor the news article, indicated that the only reason to vote for the bonds is because of our low tax rate. The comparison was given for information only. The fact that Muenster supports two school systems does not mean that the cost of education per student in the Public School is less, but rather our Average Daily Attendance (ADA) in the Public School is less and consequently our State aid is less, putting more cost burden on our taxpayers.

Some years ago state aid was figured differently, whereby Public Schools received aid based on scholastic count in a given school district, regardless of where the student attended school. However, now we only receive State funds based on the ADA of students in our public school.

Therefore, if more students attended Muenster ISD we would receive more State aid, based on such attendance. That is the reason we stress full attendance for each of our 180 teaching days.

The State does not figure the total education cost per student based on enrollment, but rather on ADA. As the accompanying chart will show, we are about average with our neighboring school districts for the school year 1973-74, which is the latest comparison available from the Texas Education Agency.

The following are some examples of the cost per ADA as stated in the Texas Education Agency's annual statistical report, received July 21, 1976. Petrolia, \$584.38; Lindsay, \$592.49; Valley View, \$655.32; Callisburg, \$725.94; Pilot Point, \$760.55; Holliday, \$767.39; Saint Jo, \$783.84; Whitesboro, \$818.62; MUENSTER, \$834.13; Denton, \$840.70; Era, \$949.88; DeLeon, \$959.51; Archer City, \$972.38; Decatur, \$1040.74; Forestburg, \$1085.99;

The average cost per pupil for all schools in Texas in 1973-74 was \$852.97. The average cost for schools our size (300 to 499 ADA) was \$861.66. Muenster, with a cost of \$834.13 is below both the state and the school size average.

The foremost reason our school is not lower in cost per student is that we offer more subjects and opportunities for our students than some of the other schools we may be compared with. State Aid to Public Schools is based on ADA and this ADA is the basis for that portion of the teachers' salaries which applies to the minimum required subjects for graduation. In addition to the minimum State requirements, we offer Speech and Drama, Algebra II, Trigonometry, Elementary Analysis, Chemistry, Physics, Physical Education III, Physical Education IV, Typewriting I, Typewriting II, Bookkeeping, Shorthand, Spanish I, Spanish II, Drivers' Training.

Home Economics I, Home Economics II, Home Economics III, Home Furnishing, Family Living, Vocational Ag I, Vocational Ag II, Vocational Ag III, Vocational Ag IV, Mechanical Drawing, Shop I, Shop II, Band, Chorus, and, if feasible, Carpentry in 77-78. In addition to the above selective courses, the Muenster District offers the following student services:

Counseling and Guidance, Remedial Reading, Plan "A", Special Education, Library Service, UIL Competition, Remedial Math, Health Services, Speech Therapy, and employs a woman Physical Education instructor.

Teachers' salaries for the subjects we offer in addition to the State minimum requirements are paid for entirely from local tax funds, therefore raising our cost per student above those schools that do not offer these subjects.

Costs can be reduced either by not offering the subjects or by employing teachers who do not qualify for higher pay. A Master Degree

teacher with 20 years experience is paid a larger salary than a Bachelor Degree teacher with no experience. As you are aware, salary schedules are controlled by the Texas Legislature.

As a further indication of the effort to help graduates to be better prepared to enter a senior college, the Muenster Public School requires a graduate to have 66 quarter credits, versus the State requirement of 54, this being a 22% above State requirements. Again, this adds to our overall costs, but certainly the results are well worth every cent of it.

Every member of the Board of Trustees of the Muenster ISD, except one, was born in Muenster. All are interested in its future and well being, and earn their livelihood in this community. We are also taxpayers and are interested in keeping school costs as low as possible, but we also want the boys and girls of our community to have every opportunity to further their education and well being. After all, they are the future leaders of our community, state and nation.

The Board, collectively, has spent hundreds of hours studying and discussing methods and means of financing needed improvements for the school, and we feel that the issuance of bonds is by far the best method.

The bonds would not begin to mature, and no principal would be paid on them, until our present bonds issued in 1949 are paid off in 7 more years. That is why only a 15% increase in taxes is needed to fund those bonds.

The other 15% increase in taxes is necessary to pay for the inflationary increase of operating expenses, which all schools are experiencing, and will be needed even if not a single improvement is made to our school.

If the bond election carries, the State requires that School bonds be sold at public bid, at the lowest interest cost to the school. Our local bank plans to enter a bid on these

bonds for sale to local investors, as were our hospital some years ago.

Perhaps a little more clarification is needed on several items proposed in the bond packages. The additional land will surely be needed, if not now, then at some time in the future. We think it prudent to provide such land while it is available.

The all-weather track will have a resolute surface which is practically maintenance free. We feel this track will be an asset to our community and will be available for use by both schools, for practice and track meets, as well as for all joggers and runners in our community every day of the week all year long. Public restrooms will be constructed near the track for use of participants and spectators, for both track and football. These restrooms are planned to be of the type similar to those in use on our Interstate Highways.

The administration building, if funds permit, would include a tax office and a board room with sufficient seating capacity for visitors. At the present time school taxes are collected by the county tax collector. We think that this is not the best arrangement, because tax receipts are slow in being remitted to us. The present collection cost, if kept at home, would also provide income for the employment of one of our citizens.

After your careful consideration of all aspects of this issue, we, The Board Members of the Muenster Independent School District, respectfully ask that you vote FOR the needed improvements.

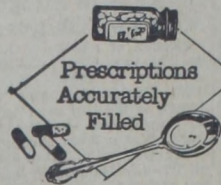

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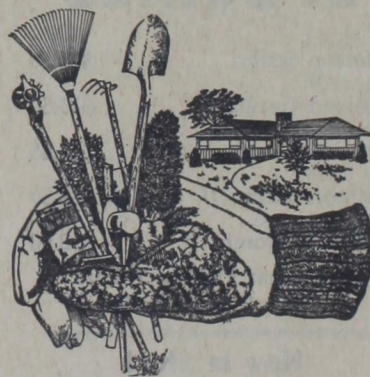

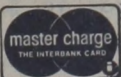
