Fischer's will host Light Crust Doughboys Saturday at noon

When the Light Crust Doughboys come to Muenster Saturday, March 14, from 12 noon to 3 p.m. to highlight the 60th anniversary celebration of Fischer's Meat Market, they will rekindle memories of radio entertainment for many area residents who enjoyed their five-day-a-week

broadcasts beginning in 1931. And that's more than 50 years ago, when the group was heard 12:30 to 12:45 p.m. with the announcer's enthusiastic introduction, "The Light Crust Doughboys are ON the air!"

Today's band reflects the living history of Western music, early Texas radio and their sponsor, Burrus Mill, makers of Light Crust Flour and other baking products.

Today's crowds at Doughboy appearances are almost a cult of faithful followers, but with a surprising mix of three age generations.

The Doughboys were organized

by W. Lee "Pappy" O'Daniel in 1931 while he was general manager of Burrus Mill and Elevator Co. in Fort Worth. O'Daniel left Burrus in 1935 to become a two-term governor of Texas. The original musical group included Bob Wills, Milton Brown and Herman Arnspiger and Truett Kimsey, announcer. Their broadcast originated from Radio Station KFJZ and their salary was \$10.00 per week, per man. But those were still Depression years!

Popularity of the program grew rapidly and the broadcast grew to include the TQN (Texas Quality Network). The Doughboys per-

TV tower battle enters legal arena

The continuing controversy over Muenster Telephone Corporation's 200-foot communications tower has escalated. After receiving a letter from the City of Muenster requiring removal of the tower within 10 days, the Telephone Corporation's legal counsel has filed a petition in civil district court challenging the decision. Attorney for the Telephone Corp., Richard Stark, said Wednesday that the suit will question Section 12, the special use provision of the zoning ordinance, contending that, in Stark's words, "it is so vague that it is not enforceable." The letter from the city requiring removal stated that the city "would exercise any remedies allowed by law" according to city attorney Chuck Bar-tush, Jr. to enforce the ordinance. He said, "The Telephone Corporation has every right to challenge the council's decision in court."

Visiting Civil District Court Judge Jack Gray has signed a temporary restraining order which precludes any further action by the city until public hearing. The hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday, March 16, before Judge Larry Sullivant in Gainesville.

Muenster Telephone Corporation Manager Alvin Fuhrman said Wednesday, "I regret having to take this action. Hopefully a solution can be worked out to everyone's satisfaction before it goes much further."

City officials had not received any of the legal paperwork by press time Wednesday. They had no comment when informed of the action.

Chamber holds busy luncheon

The Muenster Chamber of Commerce held its monthly luncheon at The Center Restaurant Tuesday, March 10. There were 21 members present as Alvin Fuhrman, Germanfest Chairman, reported that plans for Germanfest are complete and arrangements are being made to have everything ready for opening on April 24. He reported two new innovations for this year, an Arts and Crafts tent in the park and a Volksmarch.

Ben Bindel, Chairman of Volksmarch, explained a Volksmarch is non-competitive walking designed to fit the needs and abilities of every participant.

There are no times or scores maintained in Volksmarch; every participant sets his or her own pace. The Volksmarch is sanctioned by the AVA, American Volkssports Association, and the IVV, International Federations of Popular Sports. Germanfest Volksmarchers will follow a course marked through the streets of Muenster, and must pass the control points to receive the official Germanfest Volksmarch medal. Starting time is between 8 a.m. and 12 noon. The course must be completed by 2 p.m. The Volksmarch is for all ages from 1 to 100.

Thefts continue to plague Muenster area

Muenster Chief of Police Helen Tompkins has reported the following area thefts and break-ins.

On Sunday, March 8, John Yosten reported the theft of gasoline from his pickup that was parked outside his residence. The theft occurred sometime during Saturday night, March 7, or early Sunday morning, March 8.

Approximately the same time a Marlin .22 rifle and scope, and six boxes of shells, and five gallons of gas were stolen from a pickup owned by Randy Barnhill.

Sometime during Saturday night, two 1987 Honda 4-wheelers were removed from a trailer and vehicle parked at A-OK Motel on E. Hwy. 82 in Muenster. Roy Lynch of Ennis, Texas, owner of the vehicles, reported the theft Sunday morning.

Additionally reported by Police Chief Helen Tompkins was a break-in at Gregg's Chevrolet sometime between midnight and 7 a.m. on Tuesday, March 10.

Evidence indicates that two persons were involved, and gained entry by breaking glass in a door on the west side of the building in the shop area. Several hundreds of dollars of damage was done to the interior and doors.

Chamber to offer \$500 vandal reward

The Muenster Chamber of Commerce will pay up to \$500.00 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of perpetrators of acts of vandalism upon public or private property within the Muenster city limits or property of any Chamber member within the Muenster trade area. The amount or recipient of any reward shall be wholly within the discretion of the Chamber of Commerce. Rules and regulations governing the reward program are available from the Chamber of Commerce office.

An attempt was made to break into two safes that were badly damaged by hammering or pounding. Owners of Gregg's Chevrolet said, "No money was kept in the safes - only some old papers ... those guys would have been disappointed."

A much greater loss was felt, however, when a set of car keys was stolen during the same break-in, and the keys used to steal a car parked outside. The car, owned by Brian Davis of Gainesville, was a gray, 1986 Z24 Chevrolet.

A break-in at Rohmer's Restaurant on the same date, approximately between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m., was reported by Officer David Boyd. A lock on the front door, facing Hwy. 82, was pried

open with a heavy sharp instrument. A cigarette machine was damaged and a small safe belonging to Emil Rohmer was carried out. Rohmer said that only a small, undetermined amount of cash was missing. Evidence indicated that the thieves left by a side door.

Referring to recent burglaries of area homes, Chief Tompkins pleaded with residents to become more aware of unusual people, vehicles or conditions on their neighbors' property, reporting to proper authorities with descriptions. Strange sounds reported to officers may have led to apprehension of thieves or at least interruption of a local nighttime theft.

Gunshot blanks Channel 6

Alvin Fuhrman of Muenster TV reported that when Steve Jeffries of Jeffries Tower Company climbed the Telephone Company tower Monday to check why Channel 6 and the middle lights on the tower were not working, he found that both were disabled for the same reason, gun shot damage. Both red lights were destroyed and the transmission line down the tower from the Channel 6 antenna was severed. The damage occurred during the recent ice storm but was not immediately discovered because it was attributed to the ice. Repairs were delayed because the company was due to be on the new tower at any time. The cable company had hoped to avoid the additional expense of a special climb for repairs on the existing tower.

Letter to the Editor:

Council denies permit - A council member's opinion of why we have a problem with the tower. After serving on the council for a number of years I have never witnessed anything like this last council meeting.

First, I would like to apologize to persons attending this meeting. I realize I should have acted earlier to try and stop this one-half court procedure. I realize the property owners were intimidated by actions taken to keep this meeting one-sided.

I had no knowledge of what was going to take place at this meeting. I still do not know who was responsible for this one-half court set up. I was confused at the meeting by what was going on. It appeared Mr. Stark was in charge, court reporter and all. Property owners were not notified. They had no warning so they had no attorney to represent them. Mr. Stark presented evidence from the Muenster Telephone Co. as facts. He also ruled on comments made by property owners; or had someone else from his group to explain their side. Then he ruled on just about everything said to be wrong.

A little respect could have been shown to these people, at least they could have been notified so that they may have had their attorney present. Our council meeting procedure from the past was completely ignored. The zoning board was never called on to present their findings on this permit. We received no recommendation from this board. Normal procedures would have called for the Zoning Board to present their decision to the Council. Then the Council would have voted to approve or reject the permit. Then the Muenster Telephone Co. could have requested a hearing before the City Council. The Zoning Board was completely ignored at this meeting.

I brought it out with a motion for a vote. I cannot find where anyone can by pass this committee and council and argue they have a legal permit. I have no quarrels with Mr. Fuhrman as some have told. I only ask that he abide by City regulations and ordinances as everyone else is expected to. Mr. Fuhrman did not contact Council or Zoning Board as stated. He did talk to the City Secretary who told him he did not have a permit for the tower. The permit he has calls for a \$10,000.00 building and equipment. He paid for this permit several days after with the tower written on the check stub. This permit was issued in 1984. Celine told him that it was only good for one year. As I told Paul

Andres, "If this was for building a tower I wanted him to bring me a load of hay and have it on a good truck for I am going to write hay and truck on the check stub. Then I could take both."

The day the tower started up I picked up Joe Fenton at City Hall. We went to the Telephone office and asked for Alvin. We were informed he was out of town. We asked Mr. McDougle about their permit. He said all that he knew was Alvin said he had approval of the Council. We advised them they did not have a permit. We requested that Alvin contact us as soon as he returned. He did not contact anyone that I know of and he continued with the tower until finished.

Ordinance mentioned dated 1977 is an agreement with the City for use of streets, alleys and easements by supervision of City Council. It has nothing to do with private or company property, it also stated that any pole or whatever is installed will be removed on request of Council. The ordinance this tower comes under is one we all have to abide by. I have found NO place where anyone is exempt from this ordinance. The City ordinance calls for everyone owning property within two hundred feet to have a voice in making a decision on the permit. We have nine out of ten opposing this permit. Are we elected to represent the citizens of Muenster and to enforce our ordinances or should we listen to what Mr. Stark suggested? That after we listen to property owners and Zoning Board we should not let any of this have any influence on making a decision. This sounds to me like something from some other country. I feel that I was elected by the people of this City to uphold our City ordinances and laws to the best of my ability. Some of our ordinances state citizens have a voice in making decisions in their neighborhood. This I feel is a right they must have and I will defend this ordinance.

Money has been mentioned along with several other problems. When we put dollar values on justice we are creating problems we do not need. Everyone in this City must be treated equal whether rich or poor. I cannot serve this City if it has to be any other way.

I request Alvin follow the procedure set out for everyone then he will not have these problems. Threats have been made if the City forces them to remove the tower we the citizens will pay for it. I do not believe this to be true, someone will have to authorize it first.

To the Editor:

On the 4th of May, 1986 three young people from Hawkins, Texas were brutally murdered. This senseless tragedy has birthed a group of concerned citizens, "We the People." This group is currently focusing on a drive to bring about changes in the state's prison, parole and criminal justice system. "We the People" have formulated specific points which we feel need revision. These points are listed below:

1. Abolish mandatory release.
2. Reduce "good-time."
3. "Real-time" sentencing of those convicted of murder, rape, sexual assault and kidnapping.
4. County sheriffs should have final say on whether criminals can be released into their counties.
5. Protection of victims' rights.
6. Release funds to strengthen law enforcement. (Building prisons and hiring more personnel.)

Our goal is to acquire one million signatures. We will take these signatures to Austin May 4, 1987, the first anniversary of the Hawkins murders. We are also asking the public to write to their elected officials to let them know that we are not satisfied with the criminal justice system, not the sentencing, not the parole system, not the prison system, and not the way victims' rights have been set aside.

The Sunset Advisory Commission, along with the Sentencing Commission Task Force, has made several proposals to the Legislature concerning the overcrowded conditions at TDC. We feel that the public needs to be aware of these proposals.

1. Existing Law: An inmate is eligible for parole when the actual time served plus good-time credit equal 1/3 of the sentence.

Proposed Changes: An inmate will be eligible for parole when the actual time served plus good-time credit equals 1/4 of the sentence.

2. Existing Law: Currently 3G offenders serve a flat 1/2 of the sentence or 20 years, whichever is less. 3G offenders are those convicted of aggravated robbery, aggravated sexual assault, aggravated kidnapping, capital murder, or those who used or exhibited a weapon during commission of a crime.

Proposed Change: 3G offenders will be abolished. This will make inmates convicted of these crimes ineligible for parole when they have credit, both actual and "good-time" credit, for only 1/4 of their sentence or 15 years maximum.

3. Existing Law: An inmate is eligible for mandatory release when the actual time served plus "good-time" credit equal the

maximum sentence. Usually 1/3 of the actual sentence.

Proposed Change: Abolish mandatory release.

4. Existing Law: Presently offenders receive 3 days "good-time" credit for each day actually served.

Proposed Change: Reduce "good-time" credit to 2 days credit for each day actually served.

5. Existing Law: The Parole Board is mandated by law that parole should be considered only in the best interests of society.

Proposed Change: Specify, through law, that the Board of Pardons and Paroles will control the population of TDC through parole.

"We the People" find no argument with points 3 and 4 of the "five-point plan." However, points 1, 2 and 5 give us great cause for concern. Do we want convicted felons eligible for parole earlier than they are now? Do we want to do away with the only "flat-time" provisions we have? Do we want the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles to be responsible for controlling the population of TDC? Doesn't that responsibility rest with our judges and those of us who sit on the jury?

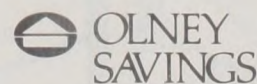

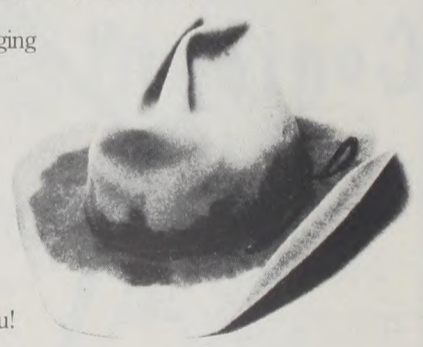

All taxable income must be reported

Although wages and salaries are the most common types of income subject to federal tax, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says that there are many other kinds of income that must also be reported on your tax return.

Examples of other taxable income include: Interest and stock dividends paid to investors; state income tax refunds and sales of stock, bonds or other property; sick pay benefits not covered by insurance paid for by the recipient; unemployment compensation that exceeds \$12,000 for a single person or \$18,000 in the case of married couples; the value of prizes and winnings from raffles, races and other forms of gambling; bonuses and tips.

To ensure that all income is correctly reported, the IRS routinely compares individual tax returns with income information provided by payors.

Texas Agriculture Facts

Farm Prices Remain Below Last Year

Texas farm prices remained below last year with the February Index of Prices Received by Texas Farmers and Ranchers at 132 percent of the 1977 base, down 1 percent. However, the index was up 1 percent from January.

Crop prices continued to drop as the All Crops Index fell to 88 percent of the base. This level was 20 percent below a year ago. Prices for all crop commodities were below 1986, except cottonseed. The index was down 3 percent from January as lower prices for most commodities offset price increases for sorghum, wheat, soybeans, alfalfa, other and all hay.

The Livestock and Livestock Products Index increased 10 percent from a year ago to 168 percent. Producers were averaging higher prices for most commodities, although prices for both eggs and wool were lower and broilers and mohair were unchanged. The index was up 5 percent from January, as higher prices for most commodities offset price decreases for lambs, sheep, broilers and all milk. Wool and mohair prices were unchanged from last month.

Nationally, the February All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers, at 121 percent of the 1977 base, was unchanged from the previous month. Higher prices for cattle, hogs, oranges and sweet corn offset price decreases for cotton, corn, milk and lettuce. The index was 1 percent below a year ago.

Cattle and hog prices were higher than in January, but prices for most other items in the Livestock and Products Index were down. Field crop prices generally declined from a month

earlier.

January Auction Sales Down for All Livestock

Total livestock sales in Texas auction markets during January were down from last year with the sale of cattle and calves dropping 12 percent to 451,000 head. According to figures released by the Texas Animal Health Commission, the monthly total was 5 percent below December sales.

January hog sales, at 28,000 head, were down 24 percent from the previous year and 3 percent from December.

Auction sales of sheep and lambs totaled 53,000 head, 2 percent below a year ago but up 36 percent from December. January goat sales decreased 7 percent from last year to 13,000 head.

Cattle and calves moving into Texas during January totaled 234,076 head, up 4 percent from last year but down 48 percent from December. Shipments of cattle and calves out of the state increased 38 percent from last year to 110,160 head.

January sheep and lamb in-shipments totaled 8,680 head, down 63 percent from a year earlier. Monthly outshipments, at 1,621 head, were also down 63 percent from last year.

Texas Red Meat Production Down 4 Percent From Last Year

Texas red meat production totaled 357 million pounds during January, down 4 percent from the previous year. Commercial cattle slaughter during January totaled 533,300 head, down 2 percent from last year. Liveweight totaled 552.87 million pounds, compared with 569.31 million a year earlier.

The monthly hog kill, at 69,400 head, had a total liveweight of 19.64 million pounds. The number of head slaughtered decreased 36

percent, while total liveweight dropped 31 percent from 1986.

U.S. commercial red meat production was down 2 percent from a year earlier to 3.41 billion pounds. Commercial cattle slaughter totaled 3.20 million head, down 4 percent from a year ago.

Texas Cattle on Feed Down from Last Year

Texas feeders reported 1.94 million head of cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market on Feb. 1, down 10 percent from last year and 5 percent from the Jan. 1 level.

Placements dropped 21 percent from a year ago to 330,000 head. Commercial feeders marketed 405,000 head during January, down 6 percent from last year.

In the seven states making monthly estimates, 7.29 million head were on feed Feb. 1, down 5 percent from last year.

January placements of 1.56 million were down 1 percent from

a year earlier. Monthly marketings increased 1 percent to 1.77 million head.

January Milk Production Up 1 Percent From Last Year

Texas milk production during January totaled 351 million pounds. Production was up 1 percent from last year and 4 percent from December. The number of milk cows averaged 325,000 head during the month, up 1 percent from a year ago. Monthly production per cow averaged 1,080 pounds, unchanged from a year ago.

Milk production in the 21 states participating in the monthly survey totaled 9.93 billion pounds during January, down 4 percent from a year ago. Production per cow averaged 1,123 pounds, 17 pounds more than the monthly average last year. Total number of milk cows averaged 8.85 million head, 5 percent below last year.
