

for comments from those attending. He asked that each person would speak only once so the meeting wouldn't last too long and a few of those present honored his request.

Cable TV manager Alvin Fuhrman described the tower, antennas to be added and the strength of the tower, stating that it was built to withstand 86-mile-per-hour winds while carrying a ¾-inch ice coating with no appreciable movement. He said the tower was necessary for his company because of the aging and inefficient tower and underground cable system now in use northeast company because of the aging and inefficient tower and underground cable system now in use northeast of town. Fuhrman added that vandalism of the tower and increasing lease costs along with the need to consolidate the system in Muenster were important considerations. "If any progress is to be made in this town, some things will have to be higher than the roof lines as many structures already are. We're doing all we can to improve our telephone and cable service," Fuhrman said.

Agnes Rohmer spoke next, citing a story in the Jan. 22 Nocona News which described the ice which fell from Tempo Cable's tower in Nocona doing serious damage to their control building and satellite dishes. She stated strongly that the tower posed a potential danger and would lower the property value of neighbors. Rohmer's Restaurant adjoins Cable TV property.

First Baptist Church pastor Steve Pearson defended the cable company, Muenster Telephone Corporation and their muchneeded service of carrying religious services to shut-ins on Channel 2. He emphasized the need to support those who serve the community.

Ray Wimmer, whose property is within 200 feet of the tower, was very concerned about insurance and liability. His research on the

very concerned about insurance and liability. His research on the subject revealed that insurance rates shouldn't go up but that even if liability for damages fell first on

the cable company, they would fall second on his business. Dwayne Rohmer, a pilot for Ozark Airlines, asked about the strength and structural integrity of present that weather and wind con-ditions above the treetops are often much different and faster. Twisting and shearing winds at speeds higher than 86 mph, he felt,

could cause metal fatigue and failure. Liability concerns of many present prompted zoning board member Earl Fisher to give his opinion that the chances of a suit resulting from an 'act of God' were remote but to remember, that anyone can be sued.

Other opponents of the tower thought it was an eyesore and that Cable TV should have just fixed the old tower and lines and been willing to pay increased lease charges. Fuhrman said he tried to negotiate the lease but finally gave up trying to work with the landowner after deteriorating relations and greatly increased cost.

McDougle, Cable TV Ken McDougle, Cable TV operations manager, gave further specifications on the tower and its strength. He said, "I cannot dispel your fears. So many structures around town are potential dangers, but just as with this tower, the chances are very remote. I can say that the tower is built to be safe."

This situation started in 1984

This situation started in 1984 when a permit was issued for an improvement project. The permit issued appeared to cover both the small building and a 200-foot tower issued appeared to cover both the small building and a 200-foot tower listed on the voucher check issued by the Cable TV Company. City records do not include the tower and no expiration date is indicated on the permit. City Hall was contacted in October 1986 before the tower contract was released. Cable TV officials say they were assured that it was alright to place the tower. They also say that City Administrator Joe Fenton gave the okay. Fenton, in fact, is not in any way connected with the issuing of permits or the zoning board. He stated that Fuhrman approached him (Fenton) and said that after checking with the city secretary, all was in order and the permit was in effect. 



AUSTIN - This is the first of a

The House and Senate convened at noon on Tuesday, Jan. 13, amid much pomp and ceremony. All 150 Representatives were sworn-in, which have all of office in unison.

much pomp and ceremony. All 150 Representatives were sworn-in, taking the oath of office in unison. By acclamation, Representative Gibson D. "Gib" Lewis (D-Fort Worth) was re-elected as Speaker of the House. This will be his third term in this position. As a surprise guest, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives in Washington, D.C., The Honograble Jim Wright (D-Fort Worth) addressed the House and congratulated his counterpart, Gib Lewis, on his third term as Speaker in Austin.

On Wednesday, Jan. 14, the House adopted what is called the "Housekeeping" resolution. This sets forth the internal functions of sets forth the internal functions of the House and describes the authority of individual Representatives' over their respective budgets and how much they can spend for particular expenses in the course of running their offices.

Next, with few changes, the House adopted its parliamentary Rules of Procedure. These will govern the mechanics by which the House will deliberate during the biennium.

On Thursday, Jan. 15, United States Senator Phil Gramm addressed the House and Senate in joint session. The Senator spoke at length for the need to diversify the state's economy and to hold the line on taxes imposed upon the hardworking people of Texas.



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



The Hornets are now 16-5 for the season and 8-0 for district. They are trying to be the first boys' district champion in Muenster history. Come out and support the Hornet effort!



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
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

County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Recently we visited with Kent Harvill, Texas Animal Health Commission Representative for our Cooke County area, about the status of Brucellosis in the county. It was encouraging to see that the infection rate in the county is extremely low with only two herds presently under quarantine. This brings to mind the Brucellosis Vaccination Program. Area veterinarians still have some funding to assist with vaccination of helfers. The vaccination program is the best single management practice available to producers to control this livestock disease. Livestock producers should continue to use the vaccination program even if it means a small additional cost would be absorbed by the cattle producer.

There are many advantages to vaccinated animals which include insome instances a freer movement

vaccinated animals which include insome instances a freer movement in marketing and sale channels, an increased demand for replacement heifers that have been vaccinated, and the added incentive of cleaning up the state's herds. The vaccination is not 100 percent effective but it is the best insurance we have to eliminate and reduce this disease problem. Tests have shown that when infection is introduced into fully vaccinated herds, protection usually exceeds 90 percent.

Special effort should be made by cattle owners to vaccinate their heifers between four and twelve months of age and to retest eligible, female within 45 to 120 days of purchase. Remember, vaccination is a major step in keeping a herd free of Brucellosis.
