

The 30th District covers a broad expanse of West Texas and the Red River area, including Carriker's home county of Fisher and seven other counties he currently serves in the

served on numerous agriculture related boards, is an ex-officio member of the Fisher County Economic Development Commission, is a former Scoutmaster, member of the National Rifle Association, and Texas Sheriff's Association. He was also active in the "Super Tuesday" primary with the Committee to Retain Elected Judges. Elected Judges.

Representative Carriker, 37, at-

tended Western Texas College in Snyder and received his B.A. from the University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife Kathy have three children, ages 12, 5 and 3. Kathy was the organizer of "Country Crafted Texas" and is a member of the board of Texas Rural Communities, an economic development foundation. Kathy also was a public school teacher for nine years.



Currently serving as the Vice-Chair of the House Democratic Caucus, Carriker stressed in his announcement statement both his lifelong residency in the district and his demonstrated leadership abilities in the legislature. "I was born, reared, and live in the 30th District," he said, "and I make my living tilling 30th District soil. My great-grandparents settled here and my children are growing up here. This is where my commitments are."

Myths of community newspapering exposed

Every metropolitan newspaper office contains one or a dozen people who dream of the quiet life of a weekly newspaper editor. They would like to swap their daily struggles and deadlines for the life of contemplation, the pleasure of thinking great thoughts and enobling the citizenry with them.

I know of no inoculation that would prevent the spread of this kind of thinking, but I have been around enough weekly newspaper people to know that

weekly newspaper people to know that a year on a weekly will cure the disease permanently. I still think editorship of a weekly ranks among the highest callings a man or woman can answer. But passage of time has changed the over-all perspective.

Oh, we have the odd community newspaper editor who spends his time at the country club in golf togs or in a smoking Jacket in his vast library. But those people bear little similarity to the sort of people who put out most of this country's weeklies.

Still, 99.999 percent of the nation's

citizens are positive they can put out a first class newspaper in four daysand spend the rest fishing. The few who think otherwise are the editors of weekles.

Most non-weekly people think the county seat town is just a miniature of the world. They believe the country editor spends his or her time wielding great power for the benefit of mankind within the county's boundaries.

They do not accept, or at least they sweep under the mental rug, the idea that most country editors do the world of two people for less pay than a good carpenter takes home.

Myths continue, though. Journalism schools are full of people who want to reform part of the world. More power to them, and to the big city chaps who want to try their luck in the small town. But they should be forewarned that some of their myths are going to evaporate as the years go by.



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

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

Rules help determine exemptions

Divorced or separated parents must use special rules to decide whether they or their former spouse can claim the exemption for their child when they file their lax return. The special rules for divorced or separated parents ap-

- The parents are divorced or legally separated under a decree of divorce or separate maintenance, are separated under a written separation agreement, or lived apart at all times during the last six months of the calendar year, and
- One or both parents provide more than half the child's total support for the calendar year, and

A noncustodial parent may claim the exemption for their child if either (1). The custodial parent signs a written declaration that he or she will not claim the exemption for the child and the noncustodial parent attaches this written declaration to his or her return, or (2). A decree or agreement executed before 1985 provides that the noncustodial parent is entitled to the exemption and he or she provides at least \$600 for the child's support during the year, unless the pre-1985 decree or agreement is modified after 1984 to specify that this provision will not apply.

Although there are some exceptions, the parent who has custody of the child for most of the year is usually treated IRS Publication 504, Tax Information IRS Publication 504, Tax Information for Divorced or Separated Individuals, half the child's support. 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

"Moonlighting" income is taxable

Taxpayers who earn income from a second job by working at night or on weekends must report their earnings on their federal income tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Some examples of "moonlighting," sidered self-employed, not employees, which produces income that must be reported, include an office worker who doubles as a babysitter in her spare time, a newspaper reporter who writes free-lance articles, a public school teacher who tutors for pay, or a construction worker who picks up extra money doing home repairs on tweekends.

Income from any source is taxable, the IRS emphasizes, whether it is received in eash, property or services, unless it is specifically excluded by law.

Even if a taxpayer does not receive a Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, from an employer, income from moonlighting jobs must be reported on the tax return as wages or salaries. The taxpayer should also be aware that he or she may have to pay estimated tax if little or no tax is withheld on the income from moonlighting jobs.

If an employer indicates that a Form W-2 will not be issued, the taxpayer should keep his or her own record, including dates, names and addresses of employers, type of employment and amount of income. Because employers

Alimony means special tax rules

Divorced or separated persons who pay or receive alimony under a court agreement should know the tax rules that affect them, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Alimony may be deductible by the parson paying it if certain requirements are met. If alimony is deductible by the payer, it is taxable to the recipient.

For payments under divorce or separation agreements made after 1984, or under pre-1985 agreements changed to specify that the new rules will apply, payments are treated as will apply, payments are treated a alimony if all the following require is are met:
The payment is in cash.

The parties do not designate that the parment is not alimony.

If the parties are legally separated under a decree of divorce or separ-

ate maintenance, the parties are not members of the same household when the payment is made. There is no liability to make any payment (in cash or property) after the death of the recipient

The parties do not file a joint return for the year in which the qualifying payments were made.

qualifying payments were made. The payer can deduct alimony payments from gross income without itemizing deductions, the IRS says. The payer must include on his or her tax return the spouse's or former spouse's last name, if different from the payer's, and social security number. Failure to report the number may result in a \$50 penalty.

If the spouse or former spouse fails to supply the payer with his or her social security number, a penalty of \$50 may be imposed on the spouse or former spouse.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 changed the extent to which large alimony payments (i.e., payments over \$15,000) made in the first three years can be deducted as alimony.

County **Agent's Report**

Summer in Texas would not be complete without the abundance of crapemyrtle flowers. It won't be long before these trees begin growth. Proper fertilization and pruning usually result in a long display of flowers of three months

pruning usually result in a long display of flowers of three months or more.

Fertilizer recommendations are best made after reviewing soil test results, but a general recommendation of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of root area is sufficient for most trees and shrubs. This can be repeated again in the late fall. The first application should be made just before new growth begins in the spring. The number of square feet in the root area is determined by the branch spread of the tree.

The most significant disease affecting crapemyrtle is probably powdery mildew. This can be controlled by spraying with Benomyl, or Funginex used according to label instructions. Mildew is usually less of a problem if plants are located in open sunny areas where air circulation is good.

Pruning is best done in late winter before new growth begins. The structure and trunks of crapemyrtle are among their chief assets; therefore, pruning should normally involve only removing.

erapemyrtle are among their chief assets; therefore, pruning should normally involve only removing dead and twiggy growth to expose the sculptural character of the tree. For dwarf varieties or in shrub borders where crapemyrtles may be grown only for their blooms, severe pruning will help insure larger and more prolific flowers. The pruning of faded and seedy blossom heads will usually promote repeat blooming late in the summer.

For something different, try some of the dwarf type crapemyrtles in tubs or pots on the terrace. They do best in sunny areas and are as satisfactory for container use as they are in the ground.

Verification of conservation practices is a must to deduct

The Tax Reform Act made some changes in how farmers and ranchers deduct expenses for installing conservation measures.

Producers who want to claim a deduction for the cost of a conservation practice on their 1987 income tax returns need to make certain that the practice is listed in the county plan or that they have a site specific plan.

They will also need to complete Internal Revenue Service form 8645 "Soil and Water Conservation Plan Certification" to file with their return.

Ray Svacina, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Gainesville, said management practices such as fencing, brush management and range seeding are listed in the county plan. For such practices, a dated site specific plan is not necessary.

"However, practices that re-

dated site specific plan is not necessary.

"However, practices that require technical design and layout need to be in a site specific plan," Svacina said. "These include terraces, waterway, and grade stabilization dams."

Svacina said he has copies of the county plan as well as a few forms 8645. Producers who use the form certify that soil and water conservation expenses paid or incurred after Dec. 31, 1986 were made according to a plan approved by SCS.

"If anyone needs a site specific plan, we will be glad to try to schedule a date to work out one," Svacina said. "However, we will not be permitted to backdate a plan just to help someone claim a deduction."

The deductible amount is limited to 25 percent of the gross income from the agricultural activity during the tax year.

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
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
