## Sacred Heart 1988 State Division II Champs!

What a perfect ending! The Sacred Heart Tigerettes basketball team marched onto the basketball court Saturday morning for the final time of the 1987-88 basketball season to face the Concordia Lutheran Crusaders, 57-30 winners over Tyler Street Christian the preceding morning.

The speedy offense of the Crusaders turned to mosh the first quarter as the Tigerettes cruised to a 21-9 early lead.

Sacred Heart led by as many as 18 points, 31-13 in the second

quarter, but Concordia closed the gap to 10 at halftime.

During the closing seconds of the third quarter, the Crusaders shortened the lead by 5 to 40-35 going into the final 8 minutes.

The Crusaders exploded when Lisa Hamric received her fifth and final foul with 5:32 remaining in the game. The excitement was at an all-time high as Concordia edged within 3 points in the closing minutes.

Sacred Heart was ahead 53-49, when Vickie Walterscheid received

her fifth foul with 2:04 left.

In the final moment of play, Juline Bartel was fouled. "Juline knocked down the two biggest free throws of the season with 19 seconds left," bragged Coach Jon. "She was as cool as a cucumber." This made the score 56-51 Tigerettes.

Vickie Schmitt's layup with 10 seconds on the clock completed the game's rally.

At last, all bad things must come to an end and end it did for Sacred Heart as the Tigerettes

stayed on track to win the state title, 58-51.

Vickie Schmitt and Vicki Walterscheid shared the scoring with 14 points each.

"Vicki was unstoppable," Coach Jon said, "until she got in foul trouble. They were scared of her inside as she was swatting flies. She got two big baskets in the last few minutes that gave us a lift. Vickie Schmitt had an

outstanding tournament, scoring 22 points and grabbing 20 rebounds."

Lisa Hamric had 13 points, 9 from 3-pointers, and "was as hot as a firecracker." Noelle Hesse added 7 points and was "all over the floor" to grab 8 steals.

Juline Bartel and Danna Hamric had 4 apiece, with Juline pulling down 8 rebounds.

"Danna controlled the game.

She got the ball to the scorers (12 assists) and took charge when Vicki and Lisa fouled out. She was outstanding under pressure," said LeBrasseur.

"Molly stepped in during crunch time and shot down Adams and also came up with a big steal." Molly also added 2 points.

"Our bunch did a great job

## Aston, Bleything discuss problems in sheriff's race

Drug enforcement and a projected crime increase in southeastern Cooke County around Ray Roberts Lake will be the most pressing problems for the next county sheriff, two candidates for the position agreed during a voter's forum preceding the March 8 Primary Election at the Chamber of Commerce, sponsored by the Gainesville League of Women Voters.

Incumbent Sheriff John Aston is being opposed by Gainesville Police Officer Jim Bleything, a chief investigator at the sheriff's

department during 1985 and 1986.

Aston pointed to an increase in felony convictions, from 28 in 1985 to 58 in 1987, as a strong point of his administration. Bleything countered, saying he played a major role in that increase. "Since I was chief investigator during 1985 and 1986, a majority of that record is my record," he said.

If elected, Bleything said he plans to restructure patrol districts so personnel can be better utilized, would seek a mutual aid agreement with Denton County on patrolling the Ray Roberts Lake

area, and would seek federal grants and greater assistance from outside drug enforcement agencies in dealing with the county's drug problem. He would also like to increase the visibility of the sheriff, and would address the problem of more than 1,700 warrants which remain unserved by the sheriff's department.

"A major objective of my administration will be to keep the same level of proficiency, production and visibility of the sheriff and the department for all four years, not just every fourth year which happens to be an election year," Bleything said.

Aston credits his administration with restructuring the sheriff's department. "When I came into office, the sheriff's department was in bad condition," Aston said. "Morale was low and professionalism was lacking."

The sheriff's department is already working on a mutual aid with Denton County for dealing with Ray Roberts, Aston said. He also feels his department is already working closely with state and federal narcotics officials in dealing with the county drug problem. "I believe in a working sheriff's department," he said.

## Candidates square off for tax assessor-collector position

Two candidates with close ties to the Muenster area seeking the job of Cooke County Tax Assessor-Collector squared off during the League of Women Voters forum at the Chamber of Commerce preceding the March 8 Democratic Primary.

Joyce Zwinggi says she's experienced and wants to keep the job she has held for the last seven years, while Pat Hennigan Jr. said he plans to seek appointment at chief appraiser if he wins.

Zwinggi, a lifelong Cooke County resident, was born in the Hood Community and graduated from Muenster High School. Married to Alrich "Red" Zwinggi, the couple have three married children. She moved to Gainesville in 1953 and worked for 12 years in a local dress factory before taking a job in the county tax assessor-collector's office in 1967. She has been deputy clerk, chief deputy clerk and was elected to the county tax assessor-collector's position in 1980, re-elected in 1984.

Hennigan, also a lifelong county resident and currently living in Gainesville, attended elementary school in Muenster and graduated from Subiaco Academy in Arkansas. He served in the U.S. Army from 1969 to 1971, working in the Chief of Staff office. He served as an administration specialist with the Korean Military Assistance Group.

After being laid off from National Supply Company, Hennigan started his own accounting firm, Pat Hennigan Accounting Services, and also keeps books for his father's auto parts store in Muenster. He has a Bachelor's degree in banking and finance from North Texas State University.

Both Hennigan and Zwinggi are both active members of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Gainesville. Hennigan is organist, choir director and serves on the Parish Council. Zwinggi is a member of the Altar Society and serves on the Parish Finance Committee.

Zwinggi said her 20 years of experience with the county tax office, seven as tax assessor-collector, qualifies her to hold the office again. Hennigan told voters he plans to actively seek the coun-

ty chief appraiser position if elected to reduce what he calls duplication of services provided by the tax office and the Cooke County Appraisal District. The person elected will have the additional duties of assessing and collecting county property taxes beginning in October.

Zwinggi said the budget for her office has not increased since she's been elected with the exception of across-the-board raises mandated

by the county commissioners. She said, however, that she will initially need additional employees when her office begins collecting property taxes. "If we didn't increase personnel, people would be standing on top of each other to be waited on," she said.

Hennigan feels he would be able to maintain expenses and would look for ways to reduce budget expenditures. One way to do this

## Rules for voting in primary explained

Debbie Hess, Cooke County Chairman of the Republican Party, has requested publication of the following information:

Voters are reminded to bring their voter registration cards with them on March 8, 1988. Failure to have the cards when arriving to cast their ballots will necessitate lengthy and time-consuming paperwork.

In another announcement of extreme importance, she stressed that those persons who signed any Democratic candidate's petition, (in lieu of filing fee), must vote in that candidate's primary. They may not vote in the Republican primary on March 8. Explaining further, she stressed that voters may vote in only one primary.

Also, she related that Republican precinct caucuses will begin at 7:15 p.m. at the voting place. The Democratic caucus will

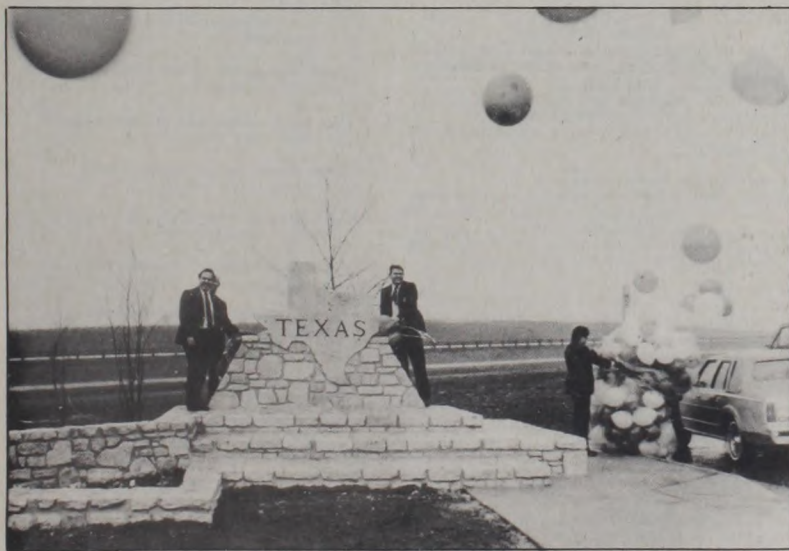
begin at 7 p.m. at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall. At the caucuses, delegates are elected to the state Democratic and Republican conventions, resolutions and platform items are discussed to bring to the convention.

Precincts 14-15 and 17 will vote at the VFW Hall, Hwy. 373 South. Entry will be through the room at the back of the building. Gloria Coker will be the election judge and Terri Hess will be the alternate judge.

Precinct 18 will vote at the Sacred Heart Community Center at 703 North Main. Mary Endres will be election judge and Rhonda Hartman will be alternate.

## Campaign workers urged: "Don't mess with Texas"

The highway department is cautioning political campaign workers not to "mess with Texas" in their zeal for victory.

As the presidential campaign's March 8 Super Tuesday approaches, more and more political signs are appearing along highways throughout the state. The department wants to be sure workers don't disobey the law when they plant a candidate's signs.

Political signs may be found wanting in two ways. If the signs do not comply with outdoor advertising sign regulations, they violate state or local laws. In addition, the placards can be considered litter under the Texas Litter Abatement Act (Article IV of Article 4477-9a, VTCS).

"We want to let political candidates know that placing signs within the highway right-of-way is prohibited," said Charles Clinger of the Right of Way Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"Signs placed within the highway right-of-way will be removed by our maintenance crews and disposed of," he cautioned.

According to Clinger, the department has two reasons for making sure the Texas Litter Abatement Act is not violated. One, of course, is a desire to keep Texas highways beautiful. The other has a more tangible motivation.

"If there's an indication that the act is not being enforced, the Federal Highway Administration can extract a 10 percent penalty from our federal highway funds. That means less money for highway construction," he said.

But littering isn't the only trouble a campaign's signs can get into. "Signs placed outside and along highway right-of-way must meet certain spacing, size, construction, license and permit requirements," added Clinger.

Two years ago, the state Legislature made the department responsible for controlling outdoor advertising in unincorporated areas. Under House Bill 1330 (Article 6674v-3, VTCS), individuals or groups wanting to erect such signs have to obtain a permit from the department for each sign.

"It is important that candidates contact the district office for specific requirements before placing any signs," Clinger said.

Along interstate and federal-aid primary highways, the highway department's responsibility for regulation extends outward 660 feet from the right-of-way in urban areas and to any sign visible from the road in rural areas.

Along all other highways and rural roads in unincorporated areas, control extends to any sign visible from the roadway.

"We feel sure the political candidates want to help maintain the beauty of our state," Clinger said. "It's important that they realize how serious we are about enforcing these laws regarding our roadside areas. It would be a shame to mar the beauty of this spring's crop of wildflowers with campaign clutter."

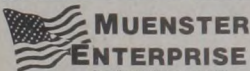
## Looking for POWs

# Williamson attends voters' forum

While not yet ready to support a statewide income tax, the wisdom of relying on an eroding property tax base for public education funding should be challenged, Ric Williamson, District 63 State Representative, said during a forum sponsored by the Gainesville League of Women Voters at the Chamber of Commerce.

Williamson is running unopposed in the March 8 Democratic Primary for re-election to his seat, serving Cooke, Wise and Parker counties.

"Public education finance is too closely linked, not only to the sales tax and property tax," Williamson said. "It's too closely linked to a certain class of people, those who own property, who are bearing the burden, and not closely enough to the entire economy."

In the future, the state may need to broaden its sales tax base, lower the rate, and have a sales tax on every commercial transaction to make taxes more equal, Williamson said.

Texas already has the third highest sales tax rate in the nation which Williamson claims has driven away businesses and resulted in a higher unemployment rate. It wouldn't be wise to simply raise the sales tax rate once again, he said. A state income tax is one alternative that should be considered, he said.

Consolidation of smaller school districts is not the answer to public education financing at this time even though it may be more cost effective in some instances, Williamson said. "As long as local property owners are footing 40 percent of the education bill, I don't see how we can have forced consolidation," he said.

Williamson sees three major priorities to be addressed by the

upcoming state legislature which will affect the counties he serves. They include a restructuring of public education financing, tax restructuring in general which he said relies too heavily on a shrinking oil and gas tax base, and how to address economic development without the state of Texas competing with the private sector.

Despite the fact that Williamson holds some views that are quite different, he said he has endorsed Democrat Richard Gephardt for president. "Although I disagree with him on several major issues, he comes across as honest," Williamson said.

The two differ over trade protectionism issues. Williamson said an oil import fee won't help Cooke County or other oil-dependent areas and will just drive up the dollar cost at which time the windfall profits tax will kick in to hurt oil producers even more.

# Jim Wilks runs for Board of Education

Jim Wilks, Sweetwater attorney, announced his candidacy for the State Board of Education, District 14 in the March Democratic Primary and has issued the following statement:

"For more than 25 years I have been involved in public education in the public schools of the State of Texas. I served for nine years as a school trustee for the Sweetwater Independent School District and served for a period of time as school board president."

"During my term as a member of the school board, I was elected to the board of trustees of the Texas Association of School Boards. During my term as a trustee of TASB, the public schools became subject to the Unemployment Compensation Act of the State of Texas. Texas Association of School Boards implemented a plan to establish a trust fund to allow each public school in the state to fulfill its obligation to the school employees to provide unemployment compensation benefits to each individual school employee while lessening the cost of the program to the individual school district. I was elected chairman of the Unemployment Compensation Trust and served in that capacity as long as I served on the TASB Board."

"In 1984, the Texas Association of School Boards established Texas School Services Foundation and charged it with the responsibility to administer all of the TASB Trust Funds. I was appointed to the TSSF Board of Trustees and was subsequently elected chairman of the TSSF Board."

"Because of my interest, background and experience, I feel

that I am uniquely qualified to represent the 14th District on the State Board of Education. I earnestly solicit your support."

A native of Taylor County, Wilks was born in Abilene, graduated from Trent High School in 1954 and Abilene Christian College in 1958. In 1967 he graduated from the University of Houston Law School and began his law practice in Sweetwater in 1968. He served on the local school board from 1972-81. He and his wife, Marjorie, have two children, Debra, a 1979 graduate of Sweetwater High School and 1983 graduate of Abilene Christian University, and Lewis, a 1981 graduate of Sweetwater High School and 1985 graduate of Abilene Christian University.

He has served as an elder at Fourth and Elm Street Church of Christ for many years and is a member and former president of the Sweetwater Downtown Lions Club and a former president of the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce.

# Taxpayers info. pamphlet available

Bill Sherman, Chief Appraiser for the Cooke County Appraisal District, offers area taxpayers a pamphlet called, "Taxpayers Rights, Remedies and Responsibilities" to help them save on their property taxes.

Published in both English and Spanish by the State Property Tax Board in Austin, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings. Sherman noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: Counties, Cities, School Districts and Special Districts, (such as municipal utility districts, water districts and hospital districts).

New legislation provides an additional tax benefit to certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over-65 homeowner is at least 55 at the time of the older spouse's death, and the death occurred after Jan. 1, 1988, then he or she can retain the tax ceiling. Before this new legislation took effect, the younger surviving spouse would have lost the tax ceiling.

The Chief Appraiser pointed out that the over-65 homeowners do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1987 and those who have

There were millions of them, many spectacularly huge and powerful, and they were the unchallenged masters of the earth for 140 million years. Then, creating what has become one of science's most baffling mysteries, they suddenly vanished.

Exploring that mystery is the focus of "Death of the Dinosaurs," a new multi-media presentation opening this month at the Cooke County College Planetarium.

What does the extinction of dinosaurs have to do with

astronomy? Possibly everything, according to Dr. Ron Bost, CCC Planetarium director.

"Among the many different theories that have been formulated as to why the dinosaurs so abruptly disappeared," Bost explains, "a majority of the most plausible ones have an astronomical basis. For example, some theorists say these incredible reptiles were victims of meteorites or comets, others say it was sun spots and some even put the blame on UFO hunting expeditions to earth."

"One of the most credible explanations, one we'll explore in the show, is that the death of the dinosaurs could have been the result of a dramatic change in the earth's climate brought about by a spectacular astronomical event known as a supernova, or exploding star."

Bost says the multi-media presentation is visually impressive as well as fascinating and educational. Viewers will learn much about the various different kinds of dinosaurs as well as about the earth looked when these creatures roamed it some 225 million years ago.

The presentation also will teach viewers much about a number of different astronomical phenomena such as supernovas, asteroids, comets, how stars are born, how the heavenly bodies affect weather and much more.

"It's a terrific show for people of all ages," Bost says, "and school age youngsters, particularly, should get a lot of educational as well as entertainment value out of it. After all, dinosaurs are really 'hot' this year, much like Halley's Comet was a couple of years back."

Planetarium shows at CCC are scheduled on Wednesday evenings beginning at 7 p.m., and the public is invited to attend free of charge. Because of limited seating, however, reservations are necessary, and it is recommended that reservations be made at least a week in advance.

Bost says that special showings at other times for groups and school classes can be arranged if requests are received well in advance.

# Men turning 26 in '88 reach milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday and who have not registered with Selective Service may forfeit their eligibility for some federal programs.

Men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26 this year. The law requires that young men register with Selective Service within 30 days of the day they turn 18. Although tardy registrations are usually accepted, Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after a man reaches age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man may permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student aid, job training and most federal employment. Likewise, some states require registration for state

student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the men who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register within 30 days if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1962 who have registered, 1988 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a

return to the draft. Nearly 20 million men, age 18 through 25, have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 98 percent of those required to register.

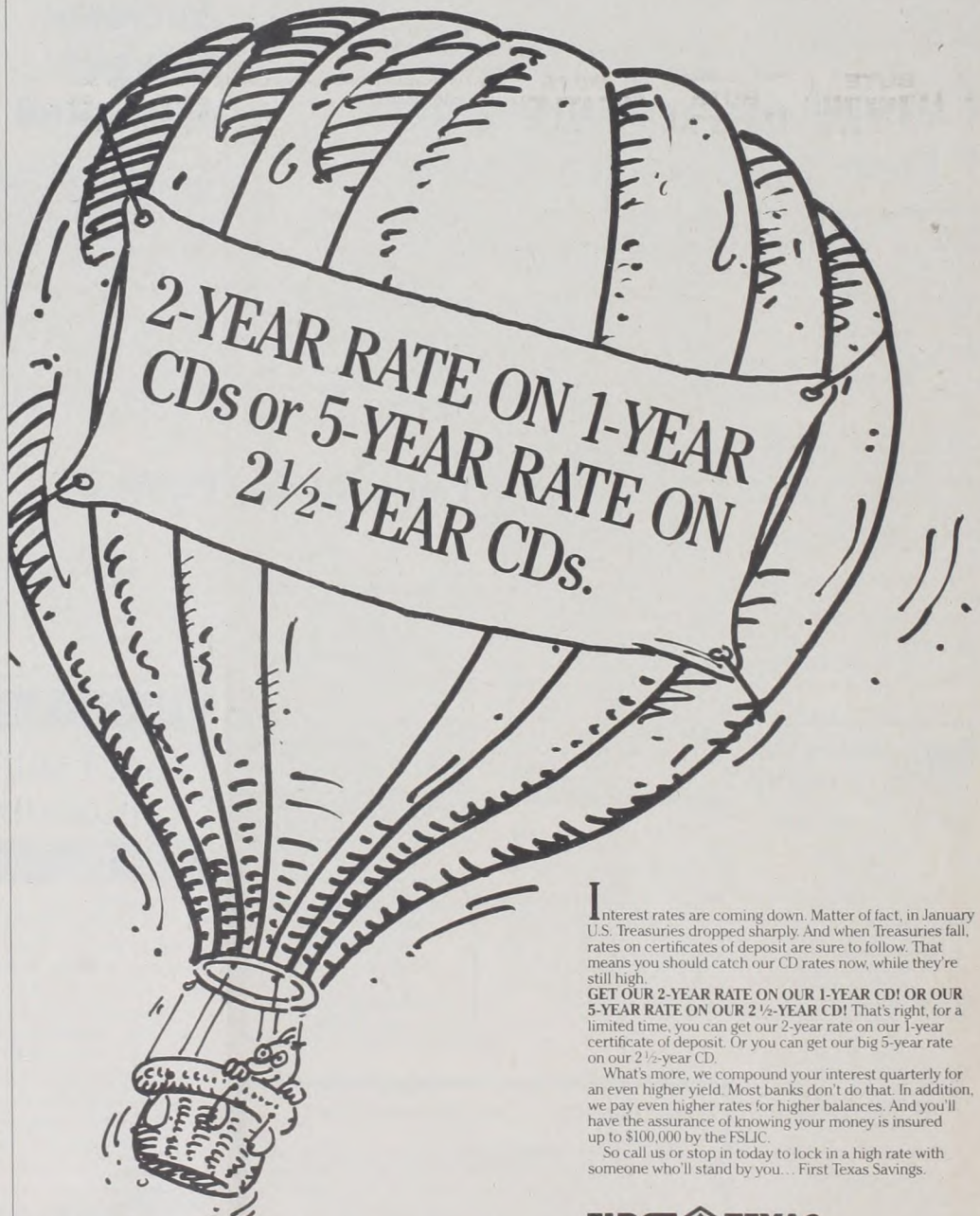
Men who have not yet registered should do so at any post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.

## Boyhood Recollections

The Muenster Enterprise has initiated a new feature highlighting childhood recollections of boys and girls, original accounts sent in by readers whose special memories of events deserve to be preserved in print. We think readers will surprise themselves in their ability to recall items of interest, and retell the stories by capturing and preserving their special significance. We hope readers will dip into almost forgotten childhood memories, and retell great stories, and we sincerely hope they will be willing to share them with others.

We'll be ever so glad to assist or edit if requested to do so. The following recollections were submitted by Joe Hoenig of Muenster.

### I cooked Christmas dinner in 1918 for my family

When I was 12 years old, my father, Alois Hoenig, sold his share in Hoenig Brothers General Merchandise Store. It was located on what is now Tuggle Motor's parking lot.

In the early spring of 1917, my father went to South Texas where many German Catholic families lived. He tried selling subscriptions to a German Catholic newspaper, the St. Joseph Blatt.

On Good Friday of that year, the United States declared war on Germany, and my father came home immediately. He owned 80 acres of land north of Muenster and bought 105 acres next to it. That land now is owned by Kate Wilson.

In the fall of 1917 we moved on to the farm, after having lived in a home located on what is now The Dairy Inn and D1 One Stop.

That year was also the last chance to buy beer legally. The country was headed into the Prohibition Era. I remember that last shipment of beer was a big one. It must have been a boxcar-load of keg beer because the dock at the Katy Depot was stacked high with full beer kegs.

My father bought one keg to save for serving to the people who helped us move onto the farm.

One incident I remember quite well was that Pete Koelzer hauled a wagonload of oats for us and in that we put our Home Brew. Guess What?!! Instead of hauling it all to the farm, he gave away a good sampling.

After Lent and Easter that year we had the party for the movers and helpers.

Then in the late fall of 1918, the terrible 'Flu Epidemic struck. Many people became desperately ill. There were several deaths in Muenster from the 'Flu.

Our whole family got very sick. For a while, there were scarcely two of us at any time able to do the chores the best they could.

My father was the sickest - he almost died. The only thing that saved him was hot applications on his chest. My mother used sacks filled either with salt or cornmeal that she heated by placing them in a warming oven which was above the woodburning cookstove.

When the congestion in my father's chest began to loosen, a handkerchief was of no use at all. He needed a bed sheet!!

Then came Christmas. At the time I was the only one able to do anything. My mother told me how to cook the dinner. That day we had burned ham, sandy potatoes and lumpy gravy. Some Cook!!

To get water for drinking or cooking, I had to dig ice out of a barrel. That water was frequently mixed with sand, especially if the windmill had pumped too fast.

In the fall of 1923, my father bought the farm of 400 acres (which now belongs to Ida, Mrs. Alphonse Hoenig). When we moved there, we had 22 wagons to haul our grain, hay and furniture. Our cows were driven over the roads like the cowboys did in the early days.

### Kids can't fly and insect screens are not for safety

Insect screens are for health and comfort, not for safety. They are intended only to keep insect and small birds out. They are not intended to keep children in. That's the way it's always been, according to Frank S. Fitzgerald, CAE, a lifetime veteran of the window industry who is currently Executive Vice President and Technical Director of the Screen Manufacturers Association. Fitzgerald is a member of the National Safety Council, and has been involved with safety programs there since the early 60's. Currently he serves on the Children's Home Falls Committee and the Consumer Product Safety Advisory Committee.

He suggests that you follow this good advice published by the National Safety Council:

1. If you must open a window in a room where a small child will be sleeping or playing, open it not more than four or five inches. If you fear a child can raise the window higher, you can secure it at the desired height with a "window burglar lock" or create your own device, such as a broomstick or piece of wood placed between the top of the raised window and the top of the window frame.
2. For windows that are opened with the turning of a handle, it may be a good idea simply to remove the handle, and screw it back only when you need to adjust the window, or for escape in case of a fire.

### Heads of household must list kids

Many taxpayers filing as heads of households have been needlessly delaying their tax refunds by forgetting to list the names of qualifying dependents or children, the Internal Revenue Service says.

To file as a head of household, a taxpayer must be unmarried or qualify to file as unmarried, and provide more than half the cost of keeping up a home that is the principal home of the taxpayer and the taxpayer's unmarried child (who may be either a dependent or not), or a married child who must be the taxpayer's dependent.

Other qualifying relatives such as an uncle, sister, niece, or son-in-law, must be the taxpayer's dependents, and actually live with the taxpayer the entire year. The taxpayer's dependent parents, however, may qualify even though they do not live with the taxpayer. The taxpayer must have paid more than half the cost of keeping up their home in order to qualify for head of household filing status.

To be considered unmarried, the IRS says, one must be single, legally separated, divorced, married but living apart for at least the last six months of the year or widowed. Without a child or qualifying dependent, the IRS stresses, unmarried taxpayers are not eligible to file as head of the household, and if they do not qualify as surviving widow or widower with a dependent child, they must file under the single status.

## Tax Law Requires Reporting of Cash Received

Any person who, in the course of a trade or business, receives more than \$10,000 in cash or foreign currency in one transaction, or in two or more related transactions, must report the payment to the Internal Revenue Service, the IRS says.

This requirement applies to every business person, whether a lawyer, farmer, broker, jeweler, car dealer or yacht broker, who receives payments made with more than \$10,000 in cash.

The transaction is reported on Form 8300, Report of Cash Payments Over \$10,000 Received in a Trade or Business, which must be filed with the IRS by the 15th day after the date of the transaction. A statement must also be provided to the person making the payment by January 31 of the next year.

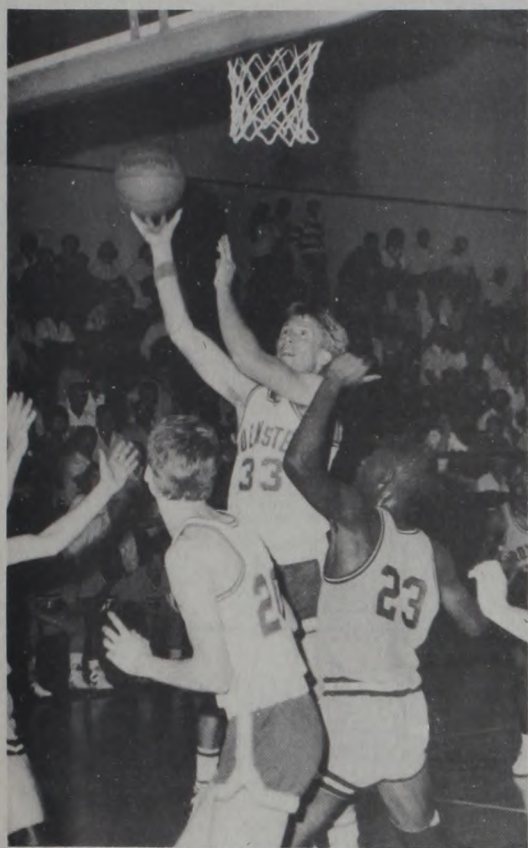

## Hornets finish 26-5... Record-setting Hornet season ends

The Muenster Hornet basketball team had their finest season come to a swift end Saturday night at Sherman as the defending regional finalists, the Roxton Lions, ran their season ledger to 26-5 with an 81-48 win over the 26-5 Hornets. The 26 wins represent a school record for the Muenster hoopsters, and despite losing the Area game, the Hornets captured the first bi-district championship in school history. This marked the second year in a row that the defending regional finalist ousted the Muenster squad in the playoffs. Last year it was the Ponder Lions in a 74-69 bi-district tilt.

"We seem to have trouble with the Lions," said second-year Hornet Coach Ted Heers. "Hornets vs. Lions has not been one of our best matchups, but we're still learning and gaining invaluable experience for the better. We lost to an excellent team that played extremely well."

The Lions connected on 29 of 53 shots from field and 20 of 27 free throw attempts to score the most points allowed by the Hornets in two years. Many of the Lion faithful felt they played their best game of the year. They also outrebounded the Muenster team 43-17.

"You don't lose many games when you shoot 55 percent and your opponent shoots 38 percent (18 of 48)," lamented Heers, "but the game was played on the glass and they controlled the boards all night. We were averaging 38 rebounds per game before tonight."

Senior co-captain Brian Hess played his final game in typical Hess fashion. He poured in 22 points and hauled in 11 rebounds as quietly as he scored his other 1374 career points for the Big Red. "We will miss Brian an awful

lot. He has been such a consistent, hard-working performer, with such a quiet demeanor that he's almost always overlooked until you pick up the stat sheets."

Seniors Kevin Anderle, Dale Reiter and Alan Hudspeth finished their Hornet careers, also. Anderle scored 6 points, Reiter 4 and Hudspeth 6.

"There's little doubt that we're losing our best defensive player in Kevin. He has been the quickest player we've had and has excited the people all year with his passing," said Heers. "We'll miss

picking on him in practice, too, he was easy prey for a good laugh. I guess Chris is next in line."

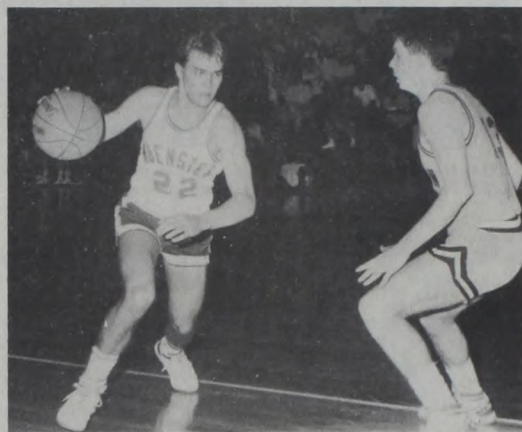

"We had an excellent season and we plan on being very competitive next season," added Heers. "Losing the four seniors, and being the defending champions, will make 1989 a great challenge. We'll be looking forward to it."

Roxton advanced to the Region III Quarterfinals against Avery. They defeated Avery 76 to 49 earlier this year and will be heavily favored to meet Fannindale for the Regional Championship at Kilgore March 5. Junior Sidney Johnson led the Lions against Muenster with 22 points and 17 rebounds.

The District 33A All-District selections will appear in next week's *Muenster Enterprise*. This Saturday marks the beginning of track season as both the Hornets and Hornettes travel to S&S.

## Rural revitalization conference set for March 15-16 in Houston

A statewide Rural Revitalization Conference for city officials, mayors of small towns, economic development groups, community leaders, businessmen, clergy, service agencies, farmers, and rural and suburban dwellers is scheduled for March 15 and 16 in Houston.

Many visitors to the show will remember the old farm tractor

that was so much a part of their early lives. The exhibit will help demonstrate that the heritage of American agriculture is an important part of the pride in that profession.

More than \$2,375 in cash prizes plus show champion plaques will be awarded in six main classes: International; Case; John Deere; Allis Chalmers and United; Oliver; Minneapolis Moline; Hart Paar; and others.

Plus special awards for champion of show, best presentation, junior champion, best restoration, oldest tractor and a judge's trophy.

All tractors on display will be manufactured prior to 1950, be in operating condition, with all parts in place. Contestants will be dressed in period costumes to match their tractors.

Judging criteria will be on restoration, repair, part replacement, painting, decals, motor control, etc., and originality (retention of as much of the original equipment, paint and decals, etc.).

## Farm Bureau asks for repeal of tax ruling

Texas Farm Bureau has asked the Texas delegation in Congress to work for the repeal of a provision in the 1986 Tax Reform Act which "adversely affects livestock producers."

In a letter to all Texas members of the U.S. House of Representatives, TFB President S.M. True pointed out that prior to the 1986 tax changes, producers could expense the cost of raising the animal in the year the expense was incurred.

"This new requirement has caused a nightmare because of the definition of pre-productive period and the allocation of costs of raising livestock," True told congressmen.

Pat Smith, TFB national affairs director, in an action-requested letter to county Farm Bureaus, said the capitalization requirements under the tax changes affects livestock producers who raise breeding, draft and sporting animals with a pre-productive period of two years or longer.

TFB policy calls for annual expensing of pre-productive expenditures. The state's largest general farm organization supports H.R. 3907 by Reps. Byron Dorgan of North Dakota and Hal Daub of Nebraska that would repeal the capitalization rules and permit the old method of expensing costs.

The problem with the new regulations, True pointed out, is that if the pre-productive period of an animal, such as a heifer, is deemed to be from the time of its own breeding until it is placed in the herd, the pre-productive period is over two years and the costs must be capitalized.

On the other hand, True noted, if the period begins at the animal's birth and runs until it is placed into the herd, the period is less than two years and the expenses can be deducted in the year they are incurred.

"H.R. 3907 will provide important relief in regard to this problem. We urge your support on this issue," True informed the lawmakers.

## County Agent's Report

Producers in Cooke County are reminded that the deadline for applying for multiple peril crop insurance (mpci) is fast approaching.

Deadlines range from Feb. 15 in far South Texas to April 15 for North and Northwest Texas.

Improvements in the prices of a number of crop and livestock commodities should not distract producers from planning for unexpected production shortfalls. That's where crop insurance comes in.

Actual Production History (APH) is the cornerstone of the mpci program. Under APH coverage, insurance protection is based on the grower's proven performance. In numerous cases, the premium cost per dollar of insurance coverage is less for high yields within a county. Policy emphasis has been toward obtaining accurate APH yields while striving to make data gathering and recording processes easier for both growers and insurance agents to use.

Numerous changes in the mpci program for 1988 are outlined below:

The provision allowing growers to divide farms into smaller units for insurance purposes has been made an option for the 1988 crop year on these crops: barley, corn, flax, grain sorghum, oats, safflower, soybeans, sunflowers and wheat. Cost to the grower of selecting this option is a

10 percent increase in premium on units created by the division of the farm. The higher premium is due to increased risk exposure to spot losses.

The 10-year base period for computing 1988 APH yield will be 1978-1987. Sugarcane is an exception due to unavailability of 1987 production information.

Olympic scoring is history! That is, the provision for dropping high and low yields and averaging the remaining eight years in calculating the APH yield has been discontinued.

Indexing based on FCIC adjusted yields has been eliminated for 1988. However, previously indexed yields remain in the 10-year base period unless replaced by actual production information.

Production reported by a grower for crop insurance claim purposes in 1986 and/or 1987 will be used in all yield determinations made for 1988 insurance coverage. The exception is soybeans in 13 states, including Texas. Because of extremely high loss ratios, soybean yields will be determined under special procedures in those states.

Growers insured in 1987 must file a production report for 1987 if they desire to be insured in 1988. If a production report is not filed, a yield will be assigned by FCIC or a private insurance company's field underwriting office. The yield assigned will typically be no more than 75 percent of the previous year's APH yield.

The production reporting date for the previous crop year has been changed from the sales closing date to the earliest of 45 days after sales closing or acreage reporting date.

The only proposed new crop program for the southwest area in 1988 is coverage for hybrid sorghum seed in the Texas High Plains area.

Other proposed new crop programs for 1988 include coverage for figs, apricots, nectarines, peaches, macadamia trees and nuts, onions and canning and processing beans.

Producers needing additional information on the mpci program should contact their crop insurance agent.

## Estimated tax: farmers have two options available

Farmers get a break from the estimated tax requirements that apply to most self-employed persons, the IRS says, if certain requirements are met.

People in business for themselves generally must make estimated tax payments four times a year, according to IRS, because unlike people who are employees, they do not have tax withheld from their income.

However, individuals who earned at least two-thirds of their 1986 or 1987 gross income from farming may either:

• Pay their estimated tax for 1987 in one

installment by January 15, 1988 and file their 1987 return and pay any balance due by April 15, 1988, or

• File their 1987 return and pay all the tax that is due on or before March 1, 1988.

The IRS has two free publications which explain these rules: Publication 225, *Farmer's Tax Guide*, and Publication 505, *Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax*. They may be obtained by using the order blank in the IRS tax return package or calling IRS toll-free at 1-800-424-3676.
