"A Thing of Shreds and Patches"

THE Parson surrenders. One who will insist that "another" means several others and himself there is no common ground for discussion.

But, following out a line of reasoning common in these times, since the reckless drivers simply will not obey the rules and the officials cannot enforce them, would it not be entirely proper—if it not in some sort a duty—to abolish all rules, bid every man look to himself, discharge the police and so, at least, save so much money, besides relieving the courts from the stigma of disregarding the law?

For forty years the Parson has been an advocate of water conservation and irrigation. About so long ago he preached a sermon at Kearney, Nebraska, at the close of a drought year when every body was at his wit's end to live on the felly. If not the wickedness of letting water run down the Platte River to denigrate the regions below, when it could be conserved and used to make desolate lands fruitful beyond one's wildest dreams.

Adventists Speed Mission as End Of World Nears

MILWAUKEE, June 17.—(AP)—Concentrating their effort toward completing their mission before the end of the world, the Seventh Day Adventists met here May 27 in quadrennial convention.

It will be in session seventeen days with church leaders and missionaries from 119 nations in attendance.

"The closing days of the earth's history are now here and it is a settled belief among Seventh Day Adventists," said C. K. Myers, general secretary. "Impelled by this conviction, they are telling the end of time is fast hastening on."

"They see in their world wide work the fulfillment of Christ's 29th prophecy that 'this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations and then shall the end come'."

Twelve union conferences are operating in North America, including sixty-two local or state conferences and five mission fields. There are 119 conferences in Europe; 24 in South America; 19 in Southern Asia; 34 in Africa, and 24 in the inter-American section.

Mussolini's Cabinet Is Composed of Group Of Youthful Citizens

ROME, June 17.—(AP)—Young men, hardly out of their teens, are climbing into high governmental positions formerly reserved only for greybeards.

The cabinet of Premier Mussolini, who will be forty-three on July 9, includes one man of twenty-nine, one of thirty and one of thirty-two. Italo Balbo, who is

Under-Secretary for Public Works, is the "baby" of the cabinet but Dino Grandi, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs and one of the most influential men in the nation yields this distinction by less than one year. Giacomo Suardo, Under-Secretary of the Prime-Ministry, now thirty-two, has held his office for more than two years.
