132 voters cast ballots in party run off elections

Editors note: all of the figures in the following story are unofficial.

In Hansford County, 132 voters turned out to cast their ballots in the run off election Tuesday, April 12.

According to District Clerk Amelia Johnson, it is hard to compare the turnouts in the runoff election. She stated, "If there is a local runoff or something of particular interest to the people in the community the runoff elections have a better turnout. Runoff elections are just different."

It was reported that there were 71 ballots cast in the Republican primary and 61 cast in the Democratic primary.

In the Democratic Party there were three run offs. Richard Fisher received 43 votes, while Jim Mattox had 18 for the United States Senator seat. For Justice Supreme Court - Place 1, Raul A. Gonzalez received 33 votes and Rene Haas received 27. Betty Marshall received 30 votes for Judge Court Criminal Appeals - Place 2, while Gene Kelly recorded 29.

The Republican Party had two offices in the runoff election. For Attorney General Don Wittig recorded 41 votes with Patricia (Pat) Lykos receiving 30. Sam Bayless had 39 votes for Judge Court Criminal Appeals - Place 2, and Sharon Keller received 32.

It was reported that 18 individuals from Hansford County took advantage of the early voting.

Gruver ISD Board of Trustees

Approves summer school program

The Gruver ISD Board of Trustees voted, during the regular meeting held Wednesday, April 13, to hold summer school for students who will be in the first through third grade in the 1994-95 school year.

This program stresses reading, writing and math, Superintendent

Barry Haensch explained. "It is for students needing a little extra help so they can be more successful in the next grade," he stated, "For these students the summer is too long and when they return they often feel like they are having to start over."

The summer program planned for this year is basically the same as the one applied in 1993; however, there are a few more field trips scheduled and more opportunities for the students to work on the computers.

Diane Brown and Linda Haight have been selected to teach the summer program again this year. According to Haensch, the program is funded by a combination of federal and local money.

The board gave the seniors permission to rent the cafeteria and elementary gym for a ceremony to be held after the high school graduation. It was stated that the facilities will be used for a reception and dance. The parents assured the board that the evening would be well chaperoned.

Amy Babbs was authorized by the board to sign the signature card at Gruver State Bank. It was explained that this would allow her to sign checks for the district with the signature of a board officer.

The policy DEC (local) was adopted. This policy brings Gruver ISD into compliance with the Federal Family/Medical Leave Act (FMLA). FMLA allows for an employee to take up to twelve weeks of unpaid leave for personal or family illness.

The board adopted the district's calendar for the 1994-95 school year.

It is reported that the calendar is similar to the 1993-94 calendar.

Possible changes in the district's attendance policy were discussed. Some of the suggested changes involve limiting the time a student may have to complete make-up work after an absence, reducing the number of consecutive days a student may be absent before a doctor's note is needed for admittance to school after the absence and a clause that defines the attendance committee's responsibility for granting credit after the state's 90 percent rule is violated by a student. The board instructed the superintendent to have the refined policy ready for a first reading in the May meeting.

A discussion was held on the air conditioning and heating project. Therman James, the project manager, and Steve Butler, the architect met to discuss the plans for the project. They answered questions and made minor changes in the plans at the board's request. The board decided to open bids for the project on April 28 at 2 p.m. and to award bids at 7:30 p.m. on May 2.

The athletic budgets for 1994-95 were reviewed by the body. The coaches explained the purchases to be made and answered questions by the board. The board also visited with coaches Frick, Garland and Myatt. Each coach reviewed the past season and discussed the prospects for the 1994-95 season.

It was reported that the football gates totaled \$8,564.61 and basketball receipts were \$15,664.19 for a total of \$24,228.80. This was \$7,228.80 more than was expected for the gates this year.

The board approved payment of bills in the amount of \$45,657.61.

Fire burns 1,200 acres

No one was injured in a grassfire that burned approximately 1,200 acres near Morse on Monday, April 18.

According to Gruver Volunteer Fire Chief Sam Gruver, the fire was started by a trash barrel. Gruver received the mutual aid call from Morse at 10:41 a.m. on a grassfire 13 miles south on Highway 136, and two and one half miles west. Gruver responded with four units. The fire was reported extinguished at 11:30 a.m.

After returning to the station a second mutual aid call to the same location was received. "The wind changed directions and the fire started up again," Gruver explained. Gruver responded to the alarm at 12:10 p.m. with six units, two were tankers. It was reported that the Gruver Volunteer Firemen were back at the station and ready to respond to the next alarm by 6:30 p.m.

Other fire departments responding to the mutual aid call were the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department and the Stinnett Volunteer Fire Department.

Individuals and companies also gave a helping hand in battling the grassfire which burned land owned by Jack Hart, Don Hudson and the McCloys.

Those lending a helping hand

were Palo Duro Feedyard, the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, Hansford County, Hutchison County and Joel Lackey. These individuals supplied equipment such as motor graders and a water truck which were used to extinguish the fire.

Palo Duro River Authority awards contract for sign

The Palo Duro River Authority awarded the contract for the dam recognition sign during the regular meeting held Tuesday, April 12.

James L. Derington, general manager, explained that the Palo Duro River Authority (PDRA) had received a plaque for recognition of the dam and the people who worked on it. "We needed to have a sign to mount this plaque on," Derington stated. Charles and Carl Buccola, Inc. submitted the only bid for the project. Their bid in the amount of \$2,765 was approved.

In other business, the tax exemptions for the 1994 year were approved. According to Derington the exemptions are basically the same as last year. These exemptions are \$50,000 for social security disabled, \$50,000 for those age 65 and over, homestead exemptions of 5 percent or \$5,000, disabled veter-

ans, non-commercial vehicles, and exemptions allowed by the state.

Carter Engineering of Borger was present at the meeting. They will mark off flood levels and make a proposal on surveying lake lots.

A rural trash collection company submitted a proposal to the PDRA. Derington stated, "We decide to continue our own collection for now."

A discussion was held on obtaining a mower and it was decided that one was needed. The storage trailer item on the agenda was tabled, Derington reported.

PDRA approved applying for a company credit card. Members discussed landscaping at the tenant house.

In regular business, the minutes from the previous meeting and the treasurer's report were approved. PDRA also approved paying bills in the amount of \$25,087.34.

Derington reported that the lake is at 197'.

Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Approves promotion, hires secretary

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees held a regular meeting Tuesday April 12 and a special meeting Tuesday, March 29. During these meetings the board approved a promotion and hired a secretary.

According to Superintendent Beryl Sears, Paige Speck was promoted to business manager during the special meeting. Paige has been administrative assistant with the district for three years. Her duties as business manager include book-keeping and financial management. Sears added that Paige is also the PEIMS Coordinator for the district.

Cindy Holton was hired as the school secretary, Sears reported. Cindy, who has been a substitute teacher for Spearman ISD, will

handle most of the student activities for the school.

In other action, the purchase of a fire alarm monitoring system was approved. The system, which was purchased and installed by Firehawk Safety Systems of Amarillo, cost \$639. According to Sears, the new system is connected to the present fire alarm system, but provides 24-hour a day monitoring. In the event of a fire alarm, area fire departments will be notified immediately.

Joe Landers of Independent Roof Inspection Service of Amarillo was hired for roofing consulting. Sears reported, Landers services include detailed roof inspections, and discussing problems and solutions.

The recommendations of the Textbook Committee were approved.

All teachers were rehired for the 1994-95 school year. The teacher/

librarian contract was also extended.

A parent presented a complaint against a Pringle-Morse teacher during the regular meeting April 12. The teacher was present and requested that the complaint be heard in open session. After hearing the complaint, the board entered into closed session and returned deciding to take no further action.

Approval was given to the eighth grade class graduation and trip budgets. The eighth grade class trip is a one-day trip, May 25, to Six-Flags Over Texas.

The board approved the 1994-95 school year calendar. According to the calendar, teachers will report for in service Wednesday, Aug. 12 and students will begin on Monday, Aug. 15.

Sears stated, "All out-of-district transfer requests were approved."

Question 4. The Police Department spends more money than any other department (do not include projects funded through bond funds). True or False.

Question 5. Of the City's total expenditures, what percent goes to wages (not including benefits)?

Question 6. Everyone who uses City services pays for them either through taxes or fees. True or False.

Question 7. The City Charter

provided the legal basis for the city government. True or False.

Question 8. In some cases, the City can exercise its authority beyond the city limits. True or False.

Question 9. Felony cases are tried in the municipal court. True or False.

Question 10. City Council members are elected at-large rather than from districts. True or False.

ANSWERS

1. **False.** Most of the City's money comes from fees for service such as water, sewer, gas and garbage removal.

2. **False.** Most of the City's money is spent on contractual services such as gas purchases, street maintenance, and electricity.

4. **False.** The Gas Department spends more money than any other department.

6. **False.** County residents who

do not live within the city limits often enjoy city services (such as the tennis courts, parks, streets, and putting garbage into dumpsters) without paying for them. Some of these activities (such as county residents putting their garbage into dumpsters) technically are theft of service and the person is subject to arrest and prosecution.

7. **False.** Spearman is a general law city which means that the city government can only do what state law allows. We have no city charter as a general law city; only home rule cities have city charters.

Library Book Notes

Since this is National Library Week, I thought it might be interesting to cover a little bit about the history of Hansford County Library as well as some current facts. In 1932, the Twentieth Century Club decided that we needed a library here in Spearman so they held a tea and book shower. With a little money and sixty-five books, the library began taking shape. In 1934, what was then called the Spearman Public Library, officially opened in City Hall. In 1960, the library moved to the Hansford County Courthouse so there would be more room. The name changed to the Hansford County Library in 1967 when the present facility was purchased, and the library has been going strong ever since. The library is presently funded by money from the Thrift Shop, monthly allotments from both the City of Spearman and Hansford County, and the quarterly distribution of the voluntary assessments collected by the city for the library, parks and recreation and economic development.

The library is governed by a board made up of people representing the

various organizations that have helped the library with funding and support. Presently the board consists of two people appointed by the city, two appointed by the county, three appointed by Twentieth Century Club, one appointed by Lions Club and there is one vacant seat on the board caused by the recent disbanding of the Spearman Book Club. The people serving on the board include Myrna Biggers, president; James Cunningham, vice-president; J.L. Brock, treasurer; Verna Gail Keim, secretary; Frances Kilgore, Marsha Murphy, JoMcLaughlin, Mac Wilmeth, Mary Alice Gibner and Dorothy Woolley, who serves as an alternate for Twentieth Century Club.

The library had a circulation of 39,646 in 1993. We answered 2,627 reference questions and had 24,831 people come into the library. We borrowed 428 books through inter-library loan for our patrons and loaned out 188 of our books to other libraries.

Out at the Lake

This column will deal with items of interest out at Palo Duro Lake. Although the water level is down now-19.7 feet on Saturday-the lake is teeming with fish and there is much of various wildlife.

Three men from Texas Park and Wildlife Inland Fisheries Division, headquartered at Canyon, were at the lake on April 12 and 13. They checked the fish they had stocked in the last few years by setting five gill nets in as many locations one evening. The next morning they counted, weighed, and measured all of the stocked varieties of fish in each net. The fish were then returned to the lake. Of these fish, walleyes and blue cats predominated, but there were many crappie, yellow perch, and bass also.

The few bullheads and carp were thrown back without treatment. The prize fish was a seven to eight pound bass. It is still out there waiting for some tempting bait. The men were pleased that the fish had done so well, and plan to return this summer to recheck with a shocking boat.

One of the members of the crew,

Jim Hoy, grew up in Gruver where he graduated with the class of 1967. His father, Turner Hoy, was grade school principal many years, and Jim's mother, Jeffie May Hoy, was a well-loved first grade teacher. Jim, now married, has been with the Texas Parks and Wildlife for 15 years.

Those who frequent the lake have been fascinated by the white pelicans that have been several months at the lake. They have been identified as American or Inland pelicans.

There are other species of bird life and animals which will be reported in a later issue.

The staff at the lake consists of Jim Derrington, general manager; Joan Hawkins, office manager; Bobby Mosier, maintenance supervisor; Willia Boyd and Raymond Cantu, Jr, employees.

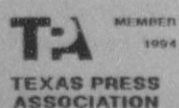

The Hansford County 4-H Livestock Judging Team recently competed in contests at Clarendon College and South Plains Community College.

On April 9 at Clarendon College, Hansford County was represented by a senior and a junior judging team.

The senior team consisted of Scott Stedje, Traci Smith, Kathy Slough and Galen Slough. As a team they placed second in reasons, third

in cattle and third in sheep, Bret Burgin stated. He continued, in the individual competition, Stedje placed third in cattle and sixth in reasons. K. Slough was fourth in cattle. Ga. Slough was seventh in the overall competition with a fourth place in reasons and a fifth place in sheep.

ject.

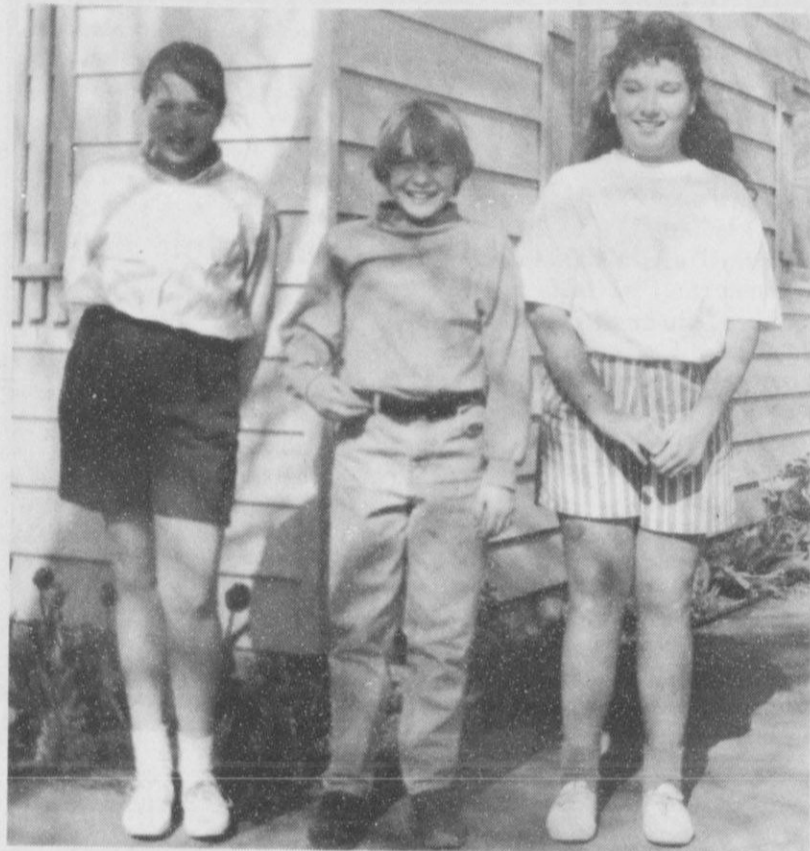
A 4-wheel ATV was reported to be driving on a public street Sunday evening. The vehicle left the area before the officer arrived.

This money was brought to the school and used to finance the business. Students then took a trip to First National Bank, where they

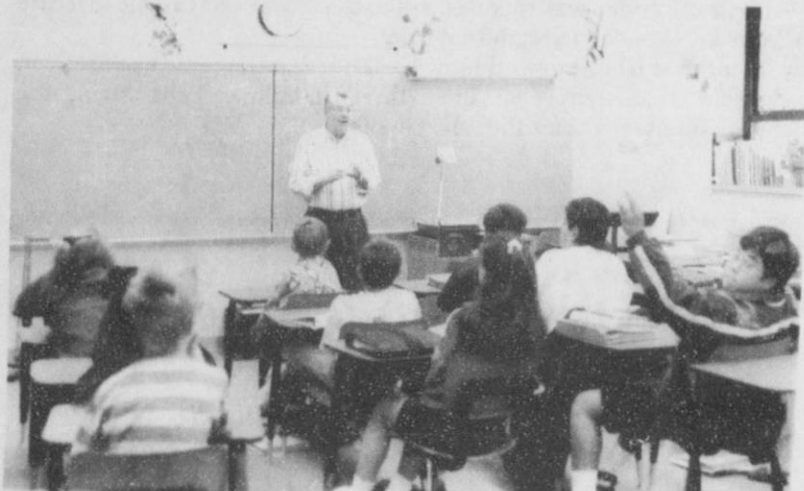
learned how to manage a checking account. At this time they opened an account with \$12. A few days later \$18 was added.

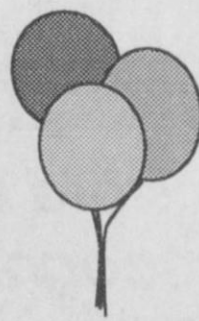

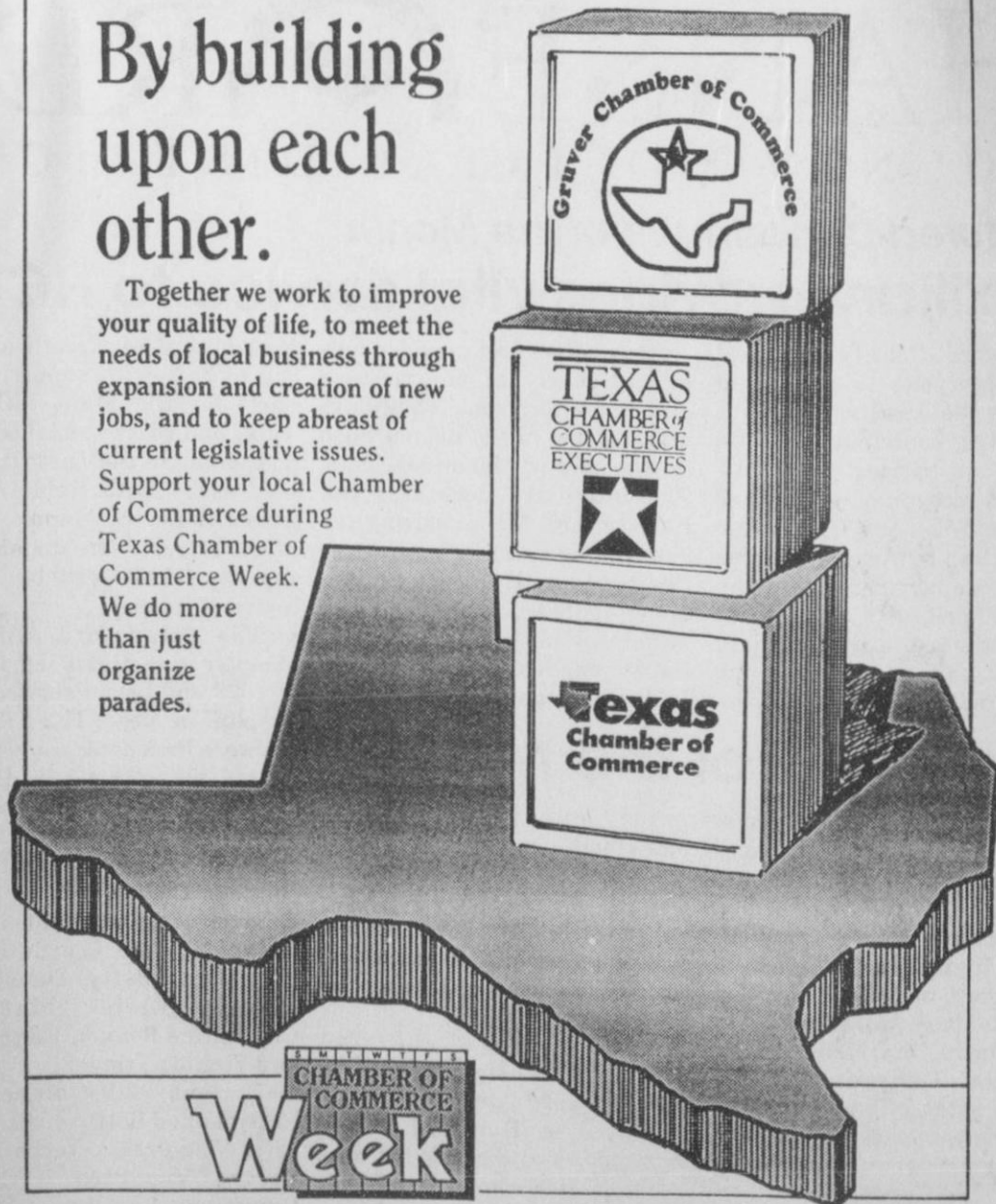

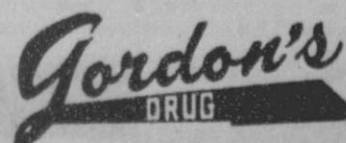

Spearman Lynx and Lynxette Place in District 1-AA meet at Boys Ranch

The 1994 Track Season culminated on Friday and Saturday at Boys Ranch as the District 1-AA Track Meet was held for 7th grade through Varsity.

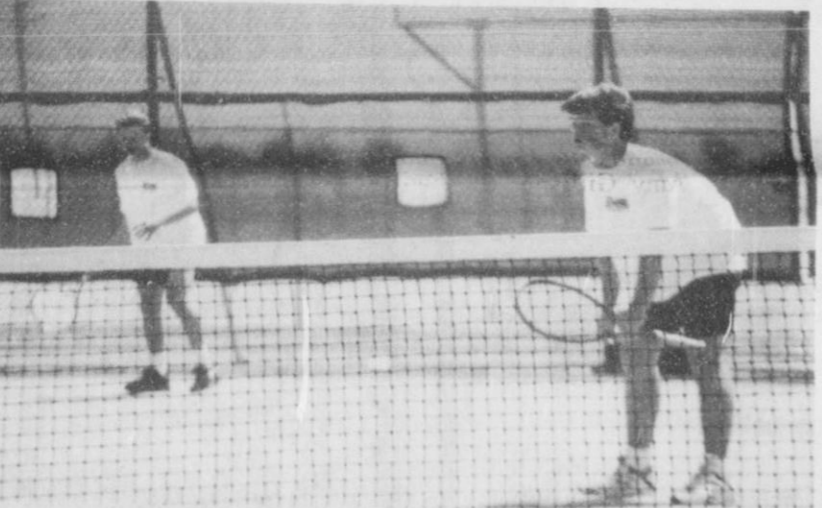

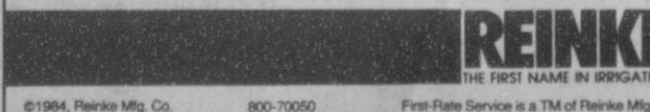

Lady Hounds win District 1-AA championship

The Gruver Lady Hounds Track and Field team has excelled this spring, and this past week, April 15-16 at Boys Ranch, they came away with the big prize - the district championship. Wynn Maupin was all silver, with second place finishes in four events, qualifying in all four events to go to regionals April 29-30 at Abilene, in nine events. A very successful district 1-AA track meet for the Lady Hounds.

The Hounds, meanwhile, were not so fortunate. Joe Bravo and Aaron Frick were the only two Hounds to qualify for regionals, as the team finished fifth at the district track meet. Bravo qualified in the 800 meter run, and Frick in the shot put, but Frick just missed a second place finish in the discus, so he will be the alternate to Abilene in that event. In addition, Ryan Atwood just missed a second place finish in the 400 meter dash, and he will be the alternate to regionals in that event.

Here is a look at how the Hounds did. Bailey Barkley, as expected, did very well in the 3200 meter run,

just missing the school record by six seconds. He ran a 10:37.14, his best time of the year, when it counted. That was good enough for only fourth place at the district meet, as the competition was fearsome. But a tremendous showing for Bailey!

In the field events, in the shot put, Aaron Frick threw it 49'2", just off his best of the year, 49'4" at Borger. It was good enough for second place and a trip to regionals at Abilene. Frick was at his best in the discus, throwing it 144'2", but it was not good enough. It gave him third place, and made him the alternate to regionals in that event.

In the pole vault, Bravo competed, and cleared 10'6". In the triple jump, it was Wylee Maupin, almost as fearsome as his sister, Wynn. He finished fifth, with a leap of 39'. Kevin McNett and Bravo also competed in the triple jump. In the long jump, Atwood, Rosalio Arreola and Eric Wright competed, with Atwood jumping 18 feet.

And in the running high jump, it was Tek Ferguson finishing fourth with a jump of 5'10"; Maupin finishing fifth also at 5'10"; and Wright

jumping 5'8".

In the 400 meter relay, it was Arreola, McNett, Bravo and Jace Dawson running a 46.1 for sixth place. In the 110 meter high hurdles, McNett ran a 16.24, good for fifth place. And in the 800 meter run, it was Bravo finishing second and winning a trip to Abilene, with a time of 2:07. Dawson competed in the 800 and ran a 2:15.

In the 100 meter dash, Frick ran a 12.32, and Wright a 12.4 seconds.

In the 400 meter dash, Atwood just missed out with a third place finish and a time of 51.4. Arreola finished fifth with a time of 52.9 seconds. And in the 200 meter dash, Atwood ran a 23.7, and Frick a 24.9 seconds.

Barkley also competed in the 1600 meter run, finishing fourth with a time of 4:53. The 1600 meter (mile) relay team of Arreola, Bravo, Maupin and Atwood finished fourth with a time of 3:34.

Now here is a look at the district champion Lady Hounds. In the 3200 meter run, Myriam Alvarez finished second, and won a trip to Abilene with a time of 13:57.

In the triple jump, Maupin finished second with a distance of 33'9 1/2". She will go to Abilene to compete in this, and three other, events. Julie Meyer finished just out of the running - third with a distance of 32'8". In the long jump, it was Maupin again for second with a jump of 16'4 1/2". She will compete at Abilene in this event also. Wendy Rodriguez finished sixth with a jump of 15'9". And in the high jump, Molly McLain finished second winning a trip to Abilene with a jump of 5'2". Molly broke the school record in the high jump twice this year -

Congratulations to the nine Gruver athletes who have qualified for regional competition in track and field at Abilene on April 29-30. Gruver will be participating in 11 events at Abilene. That is fantastic! The athletes are Lady Hounds sophomore Molly McLain (high jump), senior Wynn Maupin (long jump, triple jump, 100-meter low hurdles, 300 intermediate hurdles), sophomore Myriam Alvarez (3200-meter run), junior Julie Meyer (800 run, 800 relay), freshman Amber Murrell (400-meter dash, 800-meter relay), sophomore Tara Shapley (800 meter relay), and junior Wendy Rodriguez (800 relay); and Hounds junior Joe Bravo (800 run), and junior Aaron Frick (shot put).

Let's not forget the golf and tennis athletes who will be competing in Abilene on the 27-29th. They are freshman Kelly Boone (golf); and freshman Josh Mayhew (tennis

singles) and sophomore Kiki Carthel and McLain (tennis doubles).

All told 12 athletes in three sports will be competing at Abilene in regional competition. Maupin, who will compete in four events and will be the Gruver team "captain", is the only senior. Good show!

Well, believe it or not, it won't be long now. School will soon be out, then summer break, then two-a-days will be starting in early August. Yes, I'm already talking about football season. Gruver will be scrimmaging Canadian in Gruver on August 19, a Friday; then they will be going to Turpin, Okla. to scrimmage the Cardinals on Thursday, August 25. Then the football season will start with the new school year on Friday, Sept. 2, at Wheeler.

Here is the latest revised football schedule for 1994. 02 Sept - at Wheeler; 09 Sept - Texhoma at Gruver; 16 Sept - at Highland Park; 23 Sept - Booker at Gruver (Homecoming); 30 Sept - Panhandle at Gruver; 07 Oct - at BOYS RANCH; 14 Oct - STRATFORD at Gruver; 21 Oct - at SPEARMAN; 28 Oct - open date; 04 Nov - WEST TEXAS at Gruver. The game with Texhoma is a change to the schedule, and it

will be a masterpiece. The Red Devils return practically everyone, including their brilliant quarterback Brad Cornielson, from their state finalist team. They were 14-1 last year. That will be a good test for the Hounds. They were 14-1 in 1992 also.

The Hounds will not be favored to win district 1-AA - West Texas will; but, the Hounds may be favored for a playoff spot. 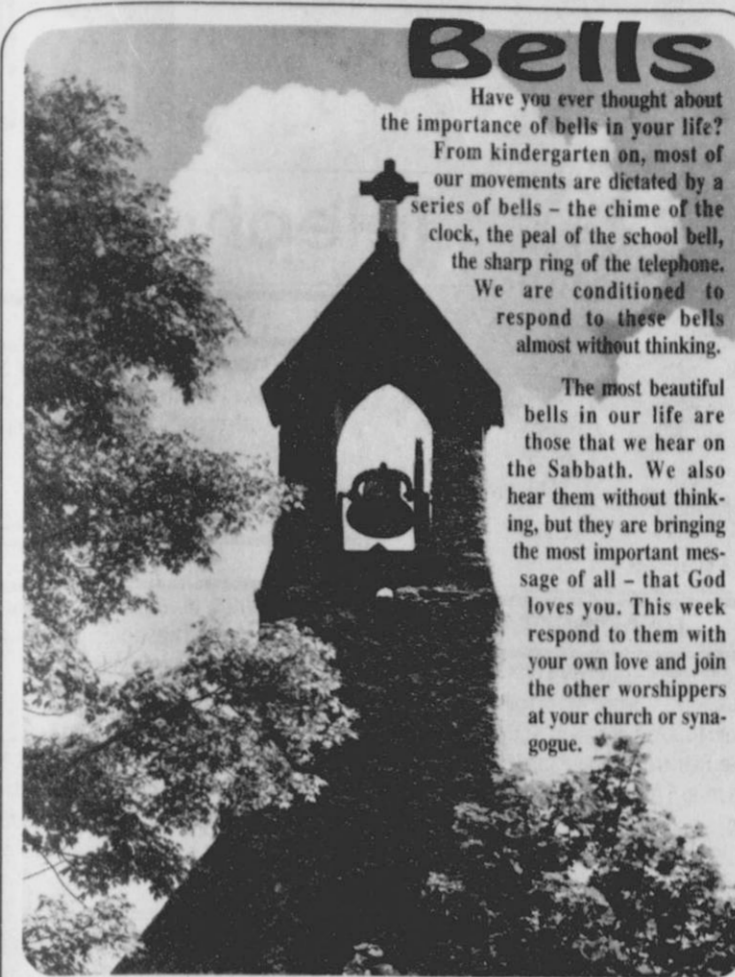
