Gruver ISD Board of Trustees

Approves summer school program

The Gruver ISD Board of Trustees voted, during the regular meeting held Wednesday, April 13, to hold summer school for students who will be in the first through third grade in the 1994-95 school

This program stresses reading, writing and math, Superintendent

students needing a little extra help so they can be more successful in the next grade," he stated, "For these students the summer is too long and when they return they often feel like they are having to start over."

The summer program planned for this year is basically the same as the one applied in 1993; however, there are a few more field trips scheduled and more opportunities for the students to work on the computers.

Diane Brown and Linda Haight have been selected to teach the summer program again this year. According to Haenisch, the program is funded by a combination of federal and local money.

The board gave the seniors permission to rent the cafeteria and elementary gym for a ceremony to be held after the high school graduation. It was stated that the facilities will be used for a reception and dance. The parents assured the board that the evening would be well chaperoned.

Amy Babbs was authorized by the board to sign the signature card at Gruver State Bank. It was explained that this would allow her to sign checks for the district with the signature of a board officer.

The policy DEC (local) was adopted. This policy brings Gruver ISD into compliance with the Federal Family/Medical Leave Act (FMLA). FMLA allows for an employee to take up to twelve weeks of unpaid leave for personal or family

The board adopted the district's calendar for the 1994-95 school year. bills in the amount of \$45,657.61.

Barry Haenisch explained. "It is for It is reported that the calendar is similar to the 1993-94 calendar.

Possible changes in the district's attendance policy were discussed. Some of the suggested changes involve limiting the time a student may have to complete make-up work after an absence, reducing the number of consecutive days a student may be absent before a doctor's note is needed for admittance to school after the absence and a clause that defines the attendance committee's responsibility for granting credit after the state's 90 percent rule is violated by a student. The board instructed the superintendent to have the refined policy ready for a first reading in the May meeting.

A discussion was held on the air conditioning and heating project. Therman James, the project manager, and Steve Butler, the architect met to discuss the plans for the project. They answered questions and made minor changes in the plans at the boards request. The board decided to open bids for the project on April 28 at 2 p.m. and to award bids at 7:30 p.m. on May 2.

The athletic budgets for 1994-95 were reviewed by the body. The coaches explained the purchases to be made and answered questions by the board. The board also visited with coaches Frick, Garland and Myatt. Each coach reviewed the past season and discussed the prospects for the 1994-95 season.

It was reported that the football gates totaled \$8,564.61 and basketball receipts were \$15,664.19 for a total of \$24,228.80. This was \$7,228.80 more than was expected for the gates this year.

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Library Book Notes

Since this is National Library Week, I thought it might be interesting to cover a little bit about the history of Hansford County Library as well as some current facts. In 1932, the Twentieth Century Club decided that we needed a library here in Spearman so they held a tea and book shower. With a little money and sixty-five books, the library began taking shape. In 1934, what was then called the Spearman Public Library, officially opened in City Hall. In 1960, the library moved to the Hansford County Courthouse so there would be more room. The name changed to the Hansford County Library in 1967 when the present facility was purchased, and the library has been going strong ever since. The library is presently funded by money from the Thrift Shop, monthly allot ments from both the City of Spearman and Hansford County, and the quarterly distribution of the voluntary assessments collected by the city for the library, parks and recreation and economic libraries. development.

This column will deal with items of interest out at Palo Duro Lake. Although the water level is down now-19.7 feet on Saturday-the lake is teeming with fish and there is much of various wildlife.

Three men from Texas Park and Wildlife Inland Fisheries Division, headquartered at Canyon, were at the lake on April 12 and 13. They checked the fish they had stocked in the last few years by setting five gill nets in as many locations one evening. The next morning they counted, weighed, and measured all of the stocked varieties of fish in each net. The fish were then returned to the lake. Of these fish, walleyes and blue cats predominated, but there were many crappie, yellow perch, and bass also.

The few bullheads and carp were thrown back without treatment. The prize fish was a seven to eight pound bass. It is still out therewaiting for some tempting bait.

Spearman Police Report

The Spearman Police Department answered 39 calls for service during the week beginning Monday, April 11 and ending Sunday, April 17. Of these calls, 11 were for animal control, and 12 were for miscellaneous activities.


Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Tidwell celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on April 17 with a reception at the Masonic Temple in Big Spring.


You see, this is not an ordinary store. This store has been opened by Mrs. Ramon and the First Grade APT class. School supplies are the items available at this store.



The Gruver Lady Hounds Track and Field team has excelled this spring, and this past week. April 15-16 at Boys Ranch, they came away with the big prize - the district championship. Wynn Maupin was all silver, with second place finishes in four events, qualifying in all four events to go to regionals April 29-30 at Abilene, in nine events. A very successful district 1-AA track meet for the Lady Hounds.

The Hounds, meanwhile, were not so fortunate. Joe Bravo and Aaron Frick were the only two Hounds to qualify for regionals, as the team finished fifth at the district track meet. Bravo qualified in the 800 meter run, and Frick in the shot put, but Frick just missed a second place finish in the discus, so he will be the alternate to Abilene in that event. In addition, Ryon Atwood just missed a second place finish in the 400 meter dash, and he will be the alternate to regionals in that event.

Here is a look at how the Hounds did. Bailey Barkley, as expected, just missing the school record by six seconds. He ran a 10:37.14, his best time of the year, when it counted. That was good enough for only fourth place at the district meet, as the competition was fearsome. But a tremendous showing place. And in the 800 meter run, it

In the field events, in the shot put, Aaron Frick threw it 49'2", just off his best of the year, 49'4" at Borger. It was good enough for second place and a trip to regionals at Abilene. 

If You Live in the Panhandle, Texas-New Mexico Power Wants to Lower Your Rates

Texas-New Mexico Power Company (TNP) has filed a request for a system-wide increase in rates of 8.9 percent, or \$34.8 million. The "Statement of Intent to Change Rates," which TNP is required to publish in all of the areas it serves, is running elsewhere in this newspaper. Even though TNP is requesting an overall increase in rates, customers in the Panhandle area of Hansford, Lipscomb and Ochiltree Counties will see a reduction in their rates. The reduction is the result of TNP's proposal to use a purchased power cost recovery factor (PCRF) that takes into consideration the fact that power purchased from Southwestern Public Service Company is delivered to TNP's Panhandle area customers only. TNP's base rates still will be the same for its entire Texas ser-

TNP's request would result in about a 3.2 percent decrease in electricity costs for an average residential Panhandle area customer. The electricity cost for an average commercial Panhandle area customer would remain about the same. TNP's proposed rates would decrease a monthly Panhandle area residential bill for 500 kWh from an average of \$41.89 to \$40.83, or \$1.06 per month. A monthly Panhandle area residential bill for 1000 kWh would decrease from an average of \$91.07 to \$88.17, or \$2.90 per month.

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
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

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
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
