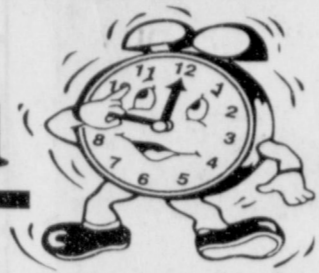

For the first time in six years, the Spearman High School Mighty Lynx Band competed in the University Interscholastic League marching band competition for the High Plains Region. They averaged together for a Division II rating).

Lynx Sack Bobcats

The Spearman Lynx traveled to Sunray this past Friday night and brought home a 35-6 victory over the Sunray Bobcats.

The Lynx were unable to score and allowed the Bobcats to slip in a touchdown in the first quarter, but after that it was all Spearman.

In the second quarter, Michael Witten picked up six points on a 5 yard run and Michael Lusby took the ball 72 yards for a touchdown. In the third quarter Witten picked up another touchdown on a 20 yard run and in the fourth quarter Jake Howard scored two touchdowns on runs of 9 yards and 7 yards. Britt Savage had a great night with 5 for 5 in extra point kicks.

Penalties could have played a big role in this game, with the Lynx team picking up 10 penalties for a total of 95 yards compared to 3 penalties and 25 yards for Sunray. Fortunately, the dynamic play of the Lynx team made up for the penalties.

Michael Lusby had a good night with 9 carries for 126 yards. Michael Witten carried the ball 16 times for 69 yards. Britt Savage moved the ball 28 yards on five carries. Jake Howard had 6 carries for 13 yards. Carlos Hernandez picked up 18 yards of 4 carries. Aaron Witten had 2 carries for 12 yards and Eric Cudd carried the ball once for 8 yards.

Stated Coach Ric Smith, "We executed well in the last three quarters of play against Sunray, but we are going to have to correct the penalty situation if we want to win consistently."

The Lynx meet West Texas at the Lynx Stadium Friday night at 7:30.

Coach Smith commented about that game, "WT is the best team we have played this year. This is probably the biggest game in district play. We will have to stop their primary running backs, Hopkins and Green, and move the ball against a real tough defense."

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HC Medical Clinic Certified As Rural Health Clinic

The Family Medical Clinic of Hansford County is pleased to announce that the clinic has been certified as a rural health clinic by the Texas Department of Human Services and the Health Care Finance Administration. An inspection of the clinic was conducted by the Texas Department of Human Resources on October 9. No deficiencies were found, resulting in a perfect inspection.

The clinic, which occupies two buildings across from Hansford Hospital, offers primary care services to all members of the community. In addition to primary care, the medical specialty of Internal Medicine is provided by Dr. Ahmed Iqbal, a Board certified internist, and the medical specialty of Pediatrics is provided by Dr. Raul Tamayo, a Board certified pediatrician.

Women's Health services are provided by Linda Dodson, an advanced nurse practitioner. Ms. Dodson has been conducting family planning and cervical cancer screenings in this area for a number of years. She sees patients on Tuesday afternoons by appointment.

The clinic recently began

providing services to women, infants, and children who were formerly clients of the now-closed Public Health Department Clinic. Immunizations, well-child physicals and family planning are among these services.

The benefits of the rural health clinic designation are the Medicare and Medicaid payments are based on cost of care, as opposed to a flat fee as in a proprietary clinic, which usually results in higher payments for rural health clinics. The designation also allows an advanced nurse practitioner or physician assistant to diagnose and treat patients and prescribe medications under a doctor's supervision. This is done to reduce the cost of providing primary medical care and increase access to high quality care in rural areas.

"We have been waiting for almost a year for our certification. The inspection was delayed due to there being insufficient federal funds for new certifications. We're delighted that we finally have a rural health clinic and congratulate the doctors and their staffs on an outstanding inspection," states Anne Snow, Hospital District Administrator.

Myrna Biggers, President of Yucca Girl Scout Council, attended the Girl Scout National Council 47th Convention in Fort Worth October 11-14. There were no changes made to the Promise and Motto. A slight change in phrasing was made to the Law in an effort to make it easier to learn. The cost of national dues will increase from \$6.00 to \$7.00 beginning in October 1997. The cost of a lifetime membership will be 25 times the cost of national dues beginning in January 1997. The size of the National Board of Directors was reduced from 44 to 35 members. Concern over the design and cost of the uniform was discussed and further study will be done. Although the business was intense, time was allowed to renew friendships, make new friends, and sing Girl Scout songs.

The keynote speaker on Friday was Marian Wright Edelman, President of the Children's Defense Fund. She spoke on the importance of our children being our first concern. Bonnie Blair, Olympic Gold Medalist, also addressed the convention on the Girl Scouts Sports Initiative. Ellie Ferdon was installed as the new president of GSUSA. The next session of the National Council will meet in Kansas City, Missouri in 1999.

The dogs were bought for 25 cents and kept in iron barrels until shipped. They kept the wolf from the door with this business for two years.

He also mentioned that at this time a lot of other people were cutting and selling soap weeds. Does anyone know who was buying and why?

City Lites

One of the most positive things about the Internet is that governments are better able to provide information to citizens. Before the Internet was developed, if a person wanted information from the state government they had to call some number in Austin and hope that the person answering the call knew where to transfer the call. The Internet makes it easier to obtain information from the State. Three of the best websites for getting information from the State are: the State of Texas Government Information page (www.texas.gov), Window on State Government (www.window.state.tx.us), and Traveltex (www.traveltex.com).

The State of Texas Government Information page is very useful for finding general information about Texas. Topics include traveling in Texas, Working in Texas (including the Texas Workforce Commission job listings, the Governor's job bank, and America's job bank), Doing Business in and with the State of Texas (this includes information on government bids), and Texas Government (lottery results, state agencies, election information, and county or city information).

The Window on State Government provides information from the State Comptroller's Office. Topics include: News from

the Comptroller, Special Programs of the Comptroller's Office (such as a directory for looking up state or federal grants and the Texas Tomorrow Fund), The Comptroller's Office, Texas Taxpayer Information (such as a description of major Texas taxes, tax publications and tax forms), Tax and Budget Information (I use this site to get information about sales tax rebates to the City). The Comptroller's website also provides information on economic indicators for the entire state, colleges and universities, and Texas cities and counties (you can even look up economic information about Spearman!).

The Traveltex website provides information from the Texas Department of Commerce and the Texas Department of Transportation. This website provide a calendar of events around the state (for those weekend getaways) and information from communities about their attractions and lodging.

These websites are very useful for those needing business information, doing homework for school projects, or just wanting to know where to have fun. I understand the Hansford Library is getting connected to the Internet. This will make it easier to use the Internet for those who are not skilled in using computers or don't have a computer.

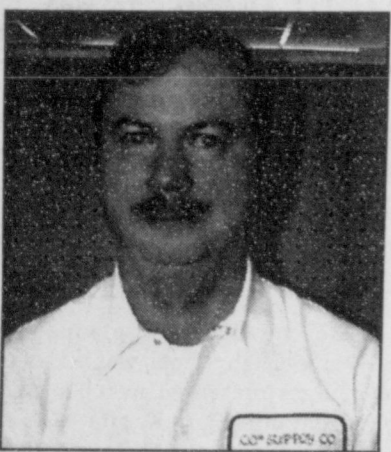

Museum Usings

Last week I wrote about Carrie Wells Cotter, a very spirited teacher of early Hansford County. This week I want to write a little about the way of life for Carrie and John D. Cotter after they married. This is a typical life for most of the early settlers of Hansford County.

Carrie met John D. Cotter while she was teaching. When they married, John built Carrie a house a mile and a half east of the town of Old Hansford. He freighted the lumber and fixtures from Texhoma.

John had several sections of land. He broke out about two and half sections for farmland. He raised cattle, horses, mules, and hogs. He shipped his cattle to Kansas City, and sometimes to Chicago. He always went along when he sold them. When he sold his hogs, he would drive them to Texhoma to market. Texhoma was the nearest railroad. It was also the place where the family freighted their wheat.

The wheat was cut with headers and thrashed in the fall. The maize was hand headed. Mr. Cotter would take a wagon of wheat to Old Ochiltree to the flour mill. He would then return with a wagon of flour.

Everything the family ate was produced on their home place. The garden was plowed with a big horse pulling the plow. The family raised their potatoes, tomatoes, and many other garden vegetables.

The Cotters also raised pinto beans. They would pull the bean plants as the beans matured and leave the plant tied to a stick in the ground. The beans would dry and were then placed in a wagon where they were beat until the beans were loose from the pods. They were sifted through several times to remove all chaff, then put up for storage.

The hogs were killed, butchered and cured for use during the summer months while beef was used in the winter. The beef would be wrapped in gunny sacks and then hung on the windmill tower. When the beef was needed, it would be pulled down on the rope it was hanging by and a piece would be cut off. Then back in the sack the meat would

be put, and pulled back to the top of the tower.

The Cotter family had their own fruit trees to supply their fruit. Mrs. Cotter canned all the vegetables and fruits that they used throughout the winter.

The family would buy coffee beans in kegs then grind their own coffee. Honey was the main dessert. Mr. Cotter would have it shipped from Kentucky.

The meat which was not in use was put in sealed boxes, packed in oats, and put in the barn. The milk was kept in a trough which ran from the well to the stock tank. The cool well-water would run over the crocks that stored the milk, keeping it cool.

Mrs. Cotter did her cooking on a range stove. A water reservoir held about 10 or 15 gallons of water at the end of the stove. This supplied the hot water for the family use.

Kerosene lamps were used throughout the year for light. Mr. Cotter bought and installed a carbide lighting system which had a generator in the yard. The carbide was so expensive to use that it was only used at Christmas time.

Christmas was a time for celebration. Mr. Cotter would cut down a pretty tree from the creek breaks and bring it to the house to decorate. A turkey was always prepared for the Christmas dinner.

I'm sure life was not easy for early settlers. We take so much for granted, such as the production of the food we eat each day. Sometimes it's an effort for me to just go to the grocery store. Wouldn't the early settlers laugh at me!

The information from this article was taken from Dotty Jones' book, A Search for Opportunity, a History of Hansford County. This book is on sale for \$15.00 at the Museum, while supplies last.

Persons interested in having the SMAC-20 blood screen should fast overnight. This test checks 20 different chemical levels in the body such as cholesterol, triglycerides, kidney and liver function, glucose and much more.

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Agriculture News

Ranchers looking for practical ways to manage during periods of drought and depressed cattle prices are invited to attend the High Plains Cattle Producers Conference Friday, November 8, at the M.K. Brown Memorial civic auditorium in Pampa, Texas, says Chaunce O. Thompson Jr., president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The free conference, which begins at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 2:00 p.m., is one in a series of regional meetings which TSCRA is conducting in Texas and Oklahoma. Rolling Plains Production Credit Association and High Plains Federal Land Bank Association are underwriting the project.

"We feel that we must roll up our sleeves and help our members on a personal basis during this period of crisis for the Texas cattle industry," says TSCRA President Thompson. "Conditions are different in each area; we have to be there to hear what our members want from their association and offer area-specific information to help them survive."

"To be sure that we provide the kind of information needed by ranchers in each area, TSCRA directors and staff members who live in each region have been asked to help plan the program," Thompson says.

Stan Bevers, extension economist from Vernon, Texas, will compare ranch performances in the region using actual SPA data.

"The Texas Rolling Plains is probably one of the most profitable ranching areas in the country," says Bevers. "However, as with any industry, there is always room for improvement."

This information helps us pinpoint where progress can be made."

J.F. Cadenhead, extension range and brush control specialist also from Vernon, will be speaking on rangeland and brush management tips.

"We'll discuss everything you wanted to know about chemical control of noxious weeds and brush that infest our rangelands in the High Plains," says Cadenhead. "Locoweed, broomsnakeweed, mesquite, cedars, skunk bush sumac, wild plum, Russian Olive, sand sagebrush, sand shinnery, plains pricklypear, and yucca (beargrass) are just some of the problems to be addressed."

James R. Clark from West Texas A&M University will explain some of the new programs initiated by the school's agricultural division. Also from West Texas A&M, Ted Montgomery will discuss how cattle producers can access the NCBA Cattleman's Carcass Data Service and explain what data and costs they can expect.

There will be information on services available from the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association, High Plains Federal Land Bank Association and TSCRA, including question-and-answer sessions with officers and staff members of these organizations.

A complimentary lunch will be provided by Hi-Pro animal Health. Door prizes will be given away to a few lucky participants.

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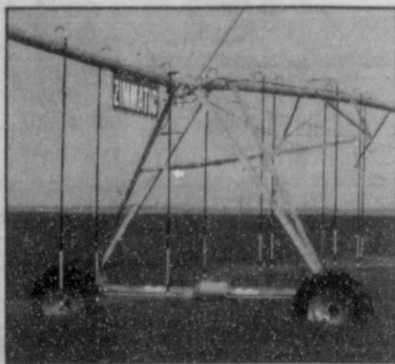
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Holt Extension Club Afghans

The Holt Schoolhouse, built 1916 is featured in the center of the weaving. It is surrounded by renditions of freight hauling, a pioneer home, Buchanan's Smithsonian windmill, the hand dug well, the Holt cemetery, a man breaking sod with a walking plow, Jeffery post office, a threshing crew and an early dugout. The Battle of Adobe Walls, taken from a painting by Gwenfred Lackey, is depicted at the bottom of the afghan.

Bordering the afghan, are the names of 30 of the earlier settlers who helped start and stayed to contribute to the growth of the community.

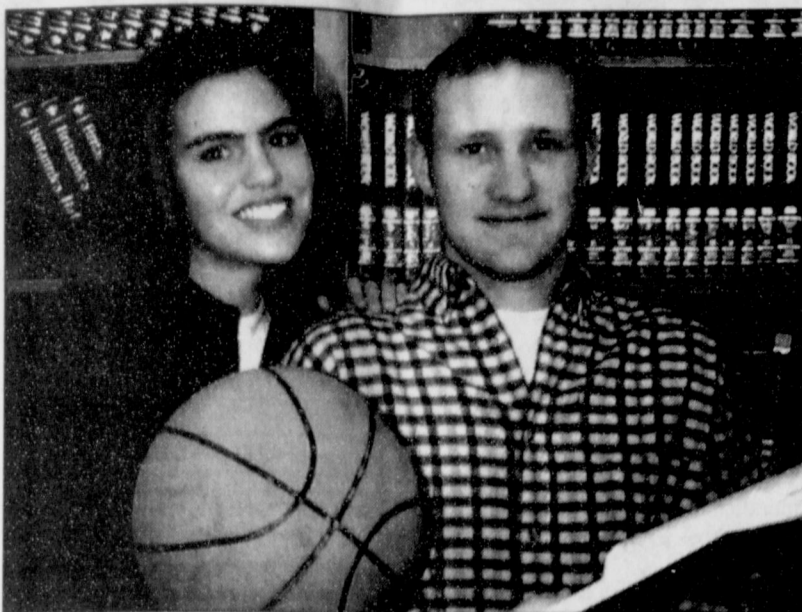
The historical monuments that are in the vicinity are featured in the corners of the afghan. The community is proud that three of these monuments, dedicated to the Drift Fence, The Cemetery and the Holt Schoolhouse, are on the grounds of the school. The fourth monument commemorates

Adobe Walls and is on Highway 207.

The Holt Community was started in 1899 when Ben Holt and Tom Coble moved into dugouts that they had constructed in the edge of the Canadian breaks about ten miles north of Turkey Track headquarters.

These men continued to work at the Turkey Track ranch while they paid for their land and prepared to farm and ranch. Soon other pioneer families moved into the vicinity, built homes and broke out the sod so that they could establish homesteads.

The initial afghan order of 150 is sold out. People are still expressing their desire to purchase an afghan, so the club members are trying to get enough orders to have 75 more woven. If these orders are placed before the last week of October, the afghans should arrive in time for Christmas. 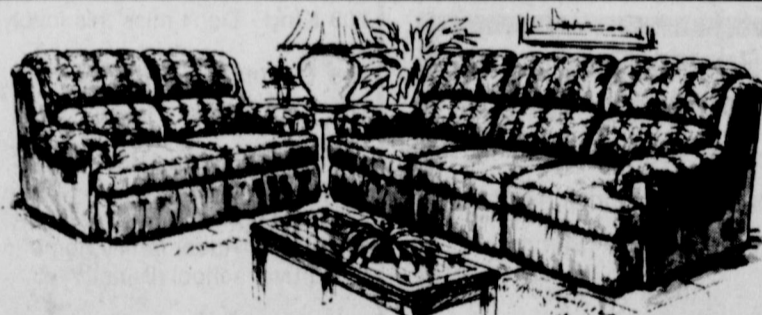

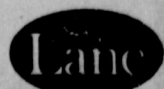

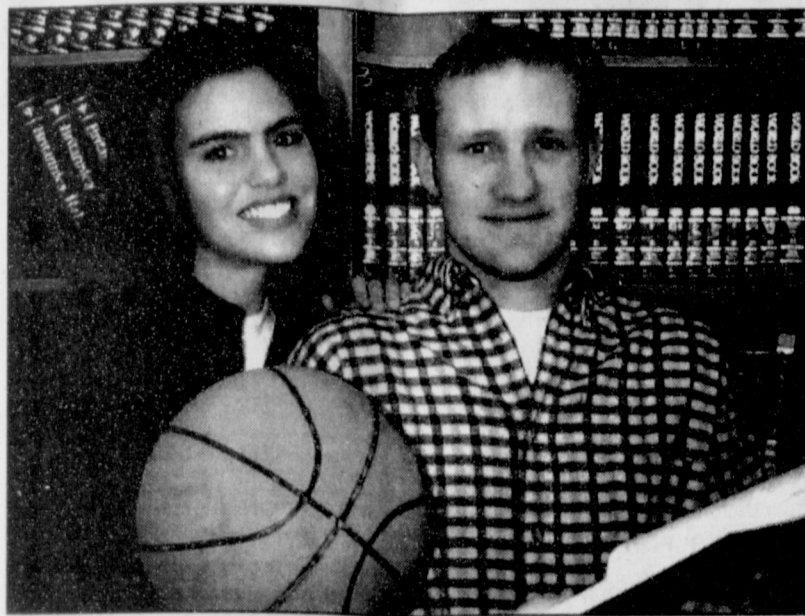
