Dedication Held for Monument

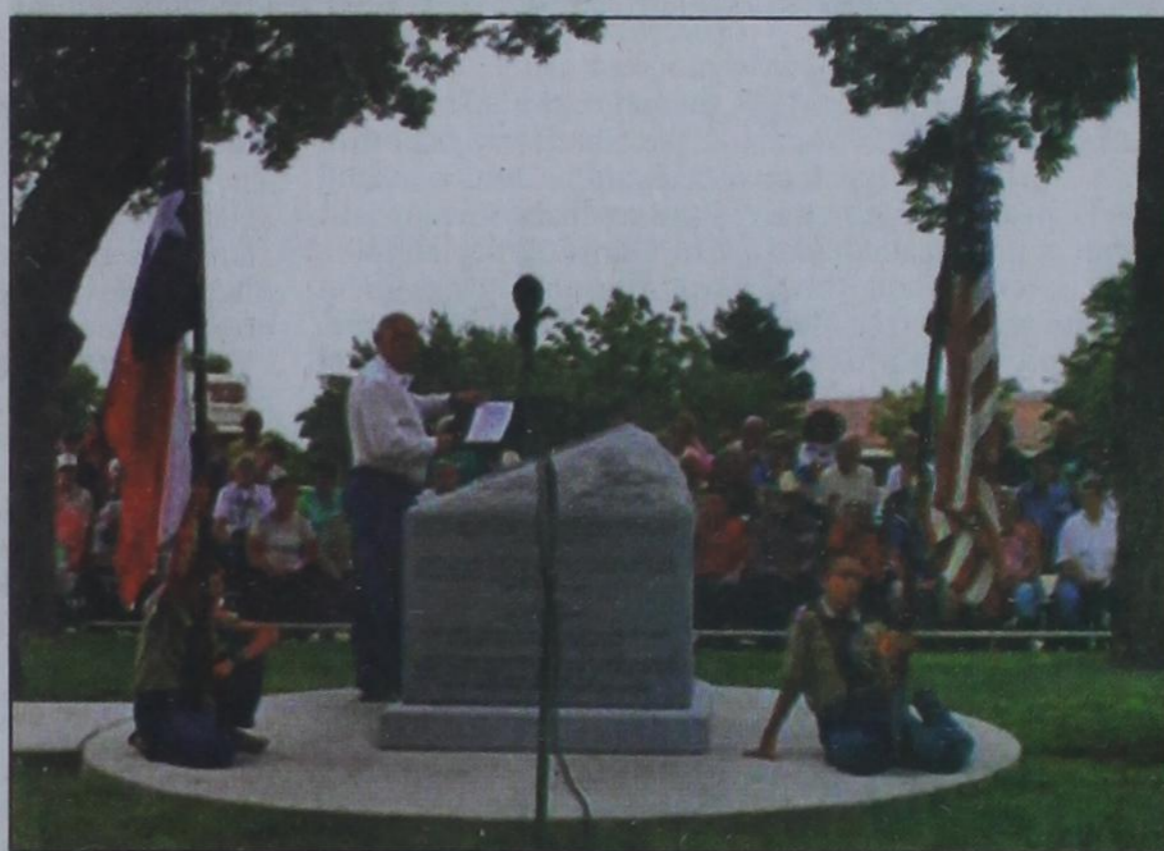

Gruver Alum Publishes Debut Novel

Gruver High School graduate, Carla (Brune) Stewart, was in Perryton on Saturday, June 19, for the launch of her debut novel, *Chasing Lilacs*. Although she now lives in Tulsa, she still has strong ties to the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandle. Three of her boys graduated from Balko, Oklahoma, and she and her husband attended church and did business in Perryton for many years. She grew up at the Sher-Han Camp between Gruver and Guymon and graduated from Gruver with the class of '68. She's glad to be "coming home" to share this exciting time in her life.

About her writing, Stewart says, "I always knew I wanted to write books like those I loved to read, but being busy with a family and working, I

kept putting it off, saying I would do it someday. In 2000, I turned fifty years old and my youngest son entered high school. I realized someday would never come if I didn't pursue it."

She wrote her first novel the following year—a book which didn't get published, but the writing bug had come to stay.

In 2002, she won the coveted honor of being invited to the Guideposts Writers Workshop and spent several years writing magazine articles and personal experience stories for anthologies. Still, writing the "great American novel" continued to be her dream. And one particular idea wouldn't leave her alone.

"I had an idyllic life growing up at the Sher-Han camp, but I don't think I fully realized that until many years later. It was a carefree time, and because it was an isolated community, there were few dangers. We ran freely throughout the neighborhood, and no one really got by with doing anything too mischievous because chances are, your parents would find out before you even got home. I wanted to set a story in a community like the one which had sheltered and nurtured me. One where old-fashioned values and camaraderie were cherished.

"Was it perfect? Of course not, and I do remember instances of adults whispering about one neighbor or another that was having "nerve" problems or had gone for shock treatments. It wasn't talked about in polite company, and I knew better than to ask questions, but I think my curious writer's mind must have been at work even then because I imagined all sorts of scenarios. What I didn't know then was that mental

illness and depression were oft misunderstood in that era and not all of the treatments gave the desired benefit.

"So combining my love of the setting where I grew up with the questions of my childhood, I began planning my novel. What would it have been like for a young girl to have a mom with these problems? How would the community have reacted? What resources would the girl have?"

Chasing Lilacs is the result—a work of fiction where all of the names, places, and events are a product of my imagination. The setting, though, does bear a number of similarities to Sher-Han camp. It's been a wonderful journey, and I look forward to sharing my book with the world, and in particular, with family and friends from the Panhandle."

The book, published by FaithWords (Hachette Book Group) has already garnered many great reviews, including a Starred Review from Publisher's Weekly, who had this to say: Stewart writes about powerful and basic emotions with a restraint that suggests depth and authenticity . . . the plot is beautifully and delicately rendered. . . Coming-of-age stories are a fiction staple, but well-done ones much rarer. This emotionally acute novel is one of the rare ones.

Other favorable reviews have appeared in Library Journal, Romantic Times Reviews, and Christian Retailing.

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Soil moisture was adequate in most areas, but parts of the region were in need of rain. The wheat harvest was nearly completed in some counties, but it was delayed in a few counties because of evening showers. Producers reported average irrigated yields and widely ranging yields for dry land. Corn and cotton were rapidly growing thanks to daytime highs in the mid to upper 90s. Rangeland and cattle were in good condition in most of region.

Wheat Harvest Draws to a Close

As harvest is concluding in Hansford County, reports indicate that Texas wheat growers will harvest 112.2 million bushels this year, up 83 percent from 2009, and 13 percent more than the 2008 crop.

While this data is still an early estimate, it is welcome news to growers across the state who battled problems throughout the growing season.

Wheat prices are sitting pretty good right now and the demand is good also. Those two things combined may help contribute to a good

harvest for local farmers.

The good news lies in the quality factors. All locations reported high test weights ranging from 60 to 64 pounds per bushel, low moisture and protein ranging from 12 to 13.5 percent. As is common with Texas wheat production, yields were highly variable, even within each growing region, and ranged from 20 to 80 bushels per acre.

Around half of all the wheat in the Texas Panhandle is dry land, with no irrigation. The farmers who produce this crop depend on mother nature to

provide the right conditions for a good crop.

From the beginning of June up until the fourth of July, Panhandle wheat farmers were busy harvesting. The process starts back in September and a lot of work and patience finally comes to fruition when they get to harvest. Of course harvest time means a bit of a boost in the Panhandle economy.

For now though, farmers are glad to see the light at the end of the tunnel.

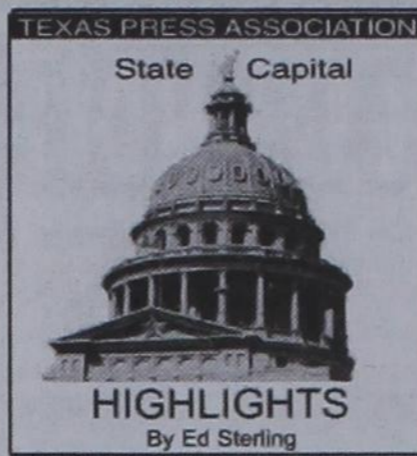
must come see his work. He also has his catalog of prints that you can browse through and purchase on the spot.

HISTORICAL MUSINGS

Harry L. Zollars related two stories of past Fourth of July firework pranks in Higgins in one of his columns.
 The first prank was planned, plotted, and carried out by two prominent citizens of Higgins. They obtained a heavy metal can from Peugh's General Mercantile Store. (The cans were used to store blasting powder in.) The two placed a quantity of the blasting powder in the can, a safe-length piece of fuse was placed in through a hole bore in the lead cover. They placed the can exactly between the Peugh and Winsett stores and ignited the device before day break.
 The front windows of both stores were blown inward & many other panes of glass shattered throughout the neighborhood. The explosion was greater than expected due to the dampness of the powder sticking to the sides of the can. After a settlement had been made with Mr. Peugh and the Winsett Brothers, the two sleep disturbers vowed never again to attempt a July 4th event.

The second event involved a gentlemen Mr. Zollars refers to as Mr. Smith, who was foreman at the long stretch of the Santa Fe railroad that included the stock pens and yard located in Higgins. Mr. Smith had been hinting to the town that a real noise would be heard on the morning of July 4th.
 "Before dawn on that memorable Fourth of July, the citizens were startled by a sharp, ripping explosion - the sort of which none had ever heard before. The men folks appeared in doorways and yards in their night clothes, believing that this might be a bank robbery or an accidental explosion in one of the stores.
 When daylight came it was discovered by a cowpuncher that most of one long wing used to guide the wild cattle into the first large pen had been completely blown away and broken. Posts and boards were scattered everywhere and considerable repair work would be needed."

Investigation by the railway officials and the local law officers discovered that Mr. Smith had used 2-inch iron pipe filled with blasting powder and a fuse. He had mounted the pipe on the fence and had ignited it. The problem was that he had not considered the great force that was generated by the explosion of the confined powder.
 It was rumored around town that Mr. Smith was fired, but it is not known. It is sure that he was required to repair the fence without help.
 I am glad that we now have firework vendors that provide little and big boys with safe explosives.

Governor protests EPA's disapproval of Texas' clean air plan

AUSTIN — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on June 30 announced its final disapproval of the flexible permit program the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality had submitted two weeks earlier for inclusion in its clean-air plan.

The EPA said Texas' program, which has been in effect for 16 years, does not meet several national Clean Air Act requirements meant to protect public health and the environment. That is because it allows companies to avoid certain federal clean air requirements by lumping emissions from multiple units at a plant under a single "cap" rather than setting specific emission limits for individual pollution sources. Individual pollution sources can be defined as each separate smokestack.

The EPA said its decision will force some 125 refineries and petrochemical plants to invest millions of dollars to get new permits, but the decision did not come as a surprise to Texas or the industries. EPA regional director Al Armendariz for months warned that he would disapprove the permits if Texas did not comply with the Clean Air Act.

Gov. Rick Perry called the EPA's action "irresponsible and heavy-handed" because it "not only undermines Texas' successful clean air programs, but threatens thousands of Texas jobs, families, businesses and communities throughout our state. It will also likely curtail energy supplies and increase gasoline prices nationwide."

Greens may certify candidates

The Texas Supreme Court on July 2 ruled the Green Party of Texas may certify candidates for the November general election ballot.

The Texas Democratic Party filed a lawsuit to stop the certification of Green Party candidates, alleging "secretly-funded petitions gathered for the Green Party by an out of state non-profit corporation constituted an illegal corporate contribution." Official filings show the Green Party received \$532,000 in corporate money. Conventional thinking is that Green Party candidates would draw votes away from Democratic candidates.

Second bomb threat in 2 weeks

A phoned-in bomb threat on the morning of July 2 necessitated the evacuation of the state Capitol. A similar threat, also made via a public pay phone to the 9-1-1 emergency number, was made on June 18.

The Texas Department of Public Safety is conducting an investigation of both threats. The DPS responded by conducting a search using troopers and trained dogs.

Operation Safe Shelter activated

With Hurricane Alex rolling in from the Gulf of Mexico, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on July 1 launched Operation Safe Shelter, a service to protect evacuees by identifying registered sex offenders who might also be

seeking refuge.

When evacuation shelters contact the Operation Safe Shelter hotline at (866) 385-0333, law enforcement officials with the office of the attorney general will access and share information from the state's registered sex offender database.

Shelter managers can use this information as necessary to coordinate specialized housing arrangements or take other action as appropriate, the attorney general's office said.

Redistricting panel is picked

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst on June 30 said redistricting is too important an issue for the Senate to wait until January when the Legislature convenes.

So, he announced appointments to the Senate Select Committee on Redistricting and Committee. Members will be able to travel the state before session begins and hear from Texans on how best to draw political lines for the next decade, Dewhurst said.

Appointees include Sens. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, chair, and Mario Gallegos, D-Galena Park, vice chair; six Republicans, John Carona of Dallas, Kevin Eltife of Tyler, Craig Estes of Wichita Falls, Joan Huffman and Dan Patrick of Houston, and Tommy Williams of The Woodlands; and three Democrats, Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa of McAllen, Royce West of Dallas and Judith Zaffirini of Laredo.

Words from Faith & Grace

In the seventh week of Pentecost we study Deuteronomy 30: 9-14, Psalm 25: 1-10, Colossians 1: 1-14, and Luke 10: 25-37. We seek to answer the questions, "Who are they that fear the Lord?", "What does it mean to lift up my soul?", "Will you hold fast to the gospel and bear fruit?" and "Who is my neighbor?"

Moses takes up the relationship of repentance to restoration. The people have sinned and fallen away from the Lord, but those who are penitent are restored by God. Because of God's restoration, the people will prosper in their children, in their livestock, and in their crops. We can learn from this passage that the ability to obey God's commandment(s) comes through internalizing the divine Word. This is done by turning to God with our entire heart and soul. Who are they that fear the Lord? Those who are taught the way they should choose.

The Psalmist's song is an expression of gratitude to God. The Psalmist "lifts up his soul" to God in prayer. He makes three requests of God. First he asks for help with his enemies. Second, he asks for God's instruction. This is because God's instruction comes in prayer not from 'study'. The Psalmist then asks God for selective 'remembering', "Do not remember the sins of my youth or my transgressions." The Psalmist is sure that the Lord will grant his requests because of God's steadfast love for those who keep his word.

Paul who has never been to Colossae is writing the church as an apostle. Notice that Paul comments on their faith in Christ and their love for all the saints. Verses 6-8 are a summation of the works/effects of the gospel. Through God's grace we bear the fruit of faith. The fruit of faith leads to our bearing the fruit of good works. Paul then prays that the Colossians will be filled with the knowledge of God's will and empowered by God to endure everything with patience. The theme is, "Will you hold fast to the gospel?"

Jesus is asked by a lawyer, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus answers by asking, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" The Lawyer answers with verses from Deuteronomy and Leviticus, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself". Jesus tells him he is correct, to go and do that and he will live. The lawyer then asks for clarification, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus then gives the parable of the "Good Samaritan". In this parable, a traveler has been robbed and left for dead. He is found by a Samaritan (despised and hated by the Jews) who cares for him and pays money for extended care. A priest and Levite had passed the wounded man without helping. Jesus asks, "which of these three was a neighbor". The lawyer answered, "The one who showed him mercy". Jesus, smiling said, "Go and do likewise."

May the Holy Spirit enable your faith so that you can "Go and do likewise"

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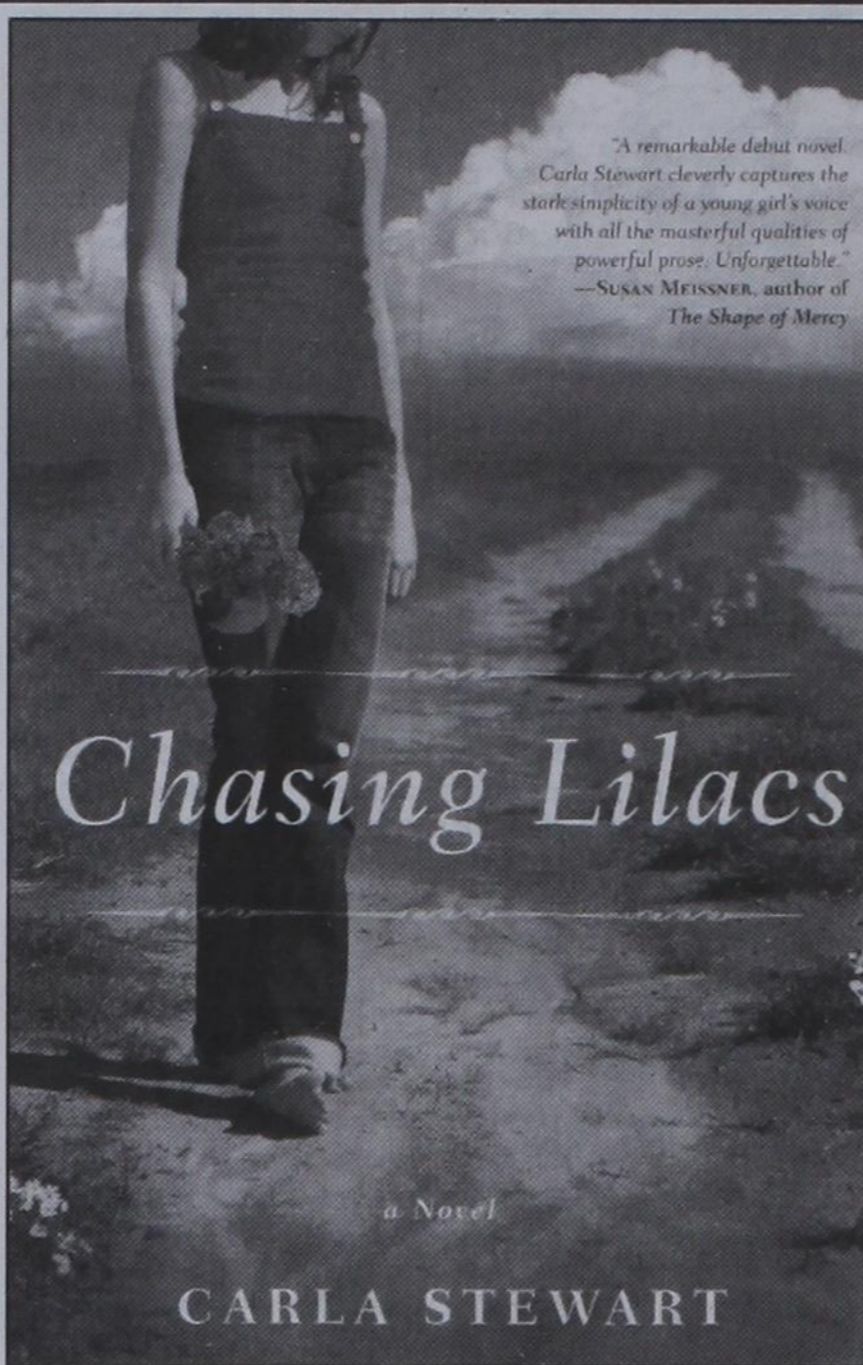
