# Commissioners' Court approves fire contracts



The Gruver City Commission adopted a \$850,760 budget for the 1992-1993 fiscal year at the regular meeting held Wednesday, Sept. 9, 1992.

According to City Manager, A.J. Ratliff, the 1992-93 budget is down from last years. The 1991-92 budget was \$852,680, which is almost \$2,000 high than the 1992-93 bud-

Ratliff stated that the city plans to fund the 1992-93 budget by earning approximately \$110,000 from taxes and approximately \$740,760 coming from utility fees and other

Other business at the meeting was setting the 1992 tax rate. This

rate was set at 55¢ per \$100 evaluation. According to Ratliff this is a 3¢ decrease from the 58¢ tax rate of

# approves payment for new sewer system

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 8, to approve final payment of the new sewer system project, consider old school pictures from Morse and Pringle schools and approve participation in the Lone Star Investment Pool.

Bo Burroughs of B&B Septic Systems presented a final request for payment for the construction of a new wastewater collection and treatment system. Work began on the system July 1 and was completed September 2. The board accepted the system as completed and approved the final payment of \$22,467.65 on the \$57,326.70

A committee of Robbie Reid, Lynn Parks, Sue McCloy and Dean Lieb was present and reported on the work they have been doing toward the restoration of the older pictures from Morse and Pringle schools. The committee recommended purchasing two 20-panel display floor units for the pictures at a cost of \$4,080. The committee will contact alumni members from both schools to seek assistance with

Participation in the Texas Association of School Boards' Lone Star Investment Pool was approved. The pool was created in 1991 and has over 250 participants. It has yielded an average annual rate of over 9%. According to Superintendent Beryl Sears, the pool is sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards and the money invested draws a higher rate of interest.

The 1992 tax rate was discussed. Since the County Education District tax rate will be set at 0.8958 per \$100 valuation, it will be necessary for the Board to set the local rate at 0.34219 per \$100 valuation, stated Sears. A meeting to formally adopt the local tax rate will be held in October. The CED will set its rate September 22, said Sears.

In other action, the Board reviewed the 1992-93 budget that was approved in a special session August 28th. According to Sears the 1992-93 budget is set at \$809,604.35. He stated that it is approximately \$11,000 less than the 1991-92 budget.







#### DOVES ARE GOOD EATING

Hunters report only limited success on recent dove hunts, but the next major cold front will cause large numbers of those speed demons in Kansas to begin a southern migration through our area.

I am delighted to share two of my favorite dove recipes. My wife, Becky, claims the world's greatest recipe for dove is from Mary Faulk Koock of Austin's legendary Green Pastures restaurant. It is found in The Texas Cookbook (Little, Brown,

#### **DOVE RECIPE #1**

Salt slightly but pepper birds generously. Take 2 parts of chopped apple and 1 part chopped onion. Stuff cavity of birds firmly. Wrap each bird with a piece of breakfast bacon. Place on wire rack over low coals; turn often until bacon is crisp. Then place birds in roaster, add just a very small amount of wine (red) or water (1/2 cup), again depending on number. Cover and place in a very low (200 degree) oven to keep warm till time to serve. If you have trouble with flames because of the bacon dripping on the coals, you may want to take the birds off before they are completely done and finish them in the oven with the wine, at a slightly higher temperature, but no higher than 325 degrees.

DOVE RECIPE # 2 (loosely borrowed from Tim Parker)

Using a sharp knife, cut a oneinch notch in each side of the breast. Insert a piece of yellow onion in one side and a piece of fresh jalapeno in the other side. (Hint-removing taste without the heat.)

# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Cal ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the tele phone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press \*67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

The PUC has jurisdiction to consider this matter pursuant to Sections 16, 18, 37 and 38 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA). This application was filed pursuant to the provisions of the PUC's Substantive Rule 23.24. Among the issues that will be addressed in this proceeding is the legality of the Caller ID device and service under
