Commissioners' Court approves fire contracts

The Hansford County Commissioners' Court discussed fire contracts with the City of Spearman and the City of Gruver at the regular meeting held Monday, Sept. 14, at 10 a.m.

According to Hansford County Judge Jim Brown both of the contracts were approved.

The contract with the City of Spearman states that Spearman will receive \$250 per fire call and \$150 for each rescue call.

Brown said, "Gruver receives a flat fee of \$3,700 a year." In addition to this they receive \$10 for

each fireman that goes out on a call, Brown added.

Sheriff's fees were also set. Brown said, they are the same as last year.

Gene Cudd was reappointed to the Hansford County Industrial Board. He will serve a five year term running from 1992 to 1997.

Other business conducted at the meeting was approving budget amendments. They were just line item changes said Brown. He added that the new budget takes affect October 1.

The court also approved a Resolution to authorize Judge Jim Brown to act on behalf of the county in the Community Development

Program Grant for the Crawford Addition.

It was also decided that they would advertise for a new 2 ton truck for the Spearman Fire Department.

Item 6, which dealt with the appointment of Hansford County Appraisal District Board Members was tabled until the next meeting scheduled to be held Monday, Sept. 28.

Regular business conducted at the meeting was the reading and approval of the minutes from the last meeting, receiving a treasures and investments reports, and payment of bills.

Palo Duro River Authority...

purchase playground equipment

During the Palo Duro River Authority meeting held Tuesday, Sept. 8, the board agreed to buy some playground equipment for the park out at the Palo Duro Dam.

According to General Manager Johnnie C. Lee, the equipment will cover an area approximately 35' by 38' and will consist of a tube slide,

a sliding pole, a suspended bridge, a poly slide and a vertical ladder. "It'll be just like school playground equipment," he said.

Lee added that it will probably be set up in about three weeks. The entire project is said to cost around \$17,000. The equipment will cost approximately \$14,000 with set up and freight costing around \$3,000, according to Lee. He added, "Things

considered (in the decision) were the safety and accessibility of the equipment."

Other business conducted was the consideration of purchasing an extension for the East boat dock. Lee stated that the board authorized the purchase of an approximate 40' extension off the boat ramp.

Hospital Board considers bids

The Hospital Board opened bids for three different types of equipment at the Board of Directors meeting for the Hansford County Hospital held Thursday, Sept. 10, at 7 p.m. in the Hansford Hospital Board Room.

The first bids to be considered were for a compact station wagon. Three bids had been received and met all of the bid specifications on this item. The Board voted to accept the bid submitted by Gruver Ford in the amount of \$11,595 for an Escort station wagon.

Then bids for four personal computers were reviewed. Four bids

had been received. It was voted that the board accept the lowest bid. This bid was from Valcom's Computers in the amount of \$10,421.94.

The last bid item was a floor scrubber. Two bids were received and reviewed. It was decided to award the bid to Jackson Supply Co. in the amount of \$3,414.40.

Next on the agenda was a request from the Medical staff for approval of medical staff privileges for Thomas Neese, M.D., for EKG over read consultations. This item was motioned and seconded and the application was approved.

Another item under new business at the meeting was a proposal

to file a suit for collection. After the board reviewed the history of the debt in question, they approved the proposal.

The board also approved an application for a RN Scholarship.

Then the Administrator, Mr. Al LaRochelle, updated the Board. He noted that the nursing home currently had only one male bed vacancy. He also said a donation in the amount of \$10,000 had been received in August from the Hansford Hospice Volunteer organization to offset the financial loss in that area. The Board expressed their appreciation to the volunteers.

The meeting was adjourned.

Gruver City Commission... sets 92-93 budget, \$850,760

The Gruver City Commission adopted a \$850,760 budget for the 1992-1993 fiscal year at the regular meeting held Wednesday, Sept. 9, 1992.

According to City Manager, A.J. Ratliff, the 1992-93 budget is down from last years. The 1991-92 budget was \$852,680, which is almost \$2,000 high than the 1992-93 budget.

Ratliff stated that the city plans to fund the 1992-93 budget by earning approximately \$110,000 from taxes and approximately \$740,760 coming from utility fees and other taxes.

Other business at the meeting was setting the 1992 tax rate. This

rate was set at 55¢ per \$100 evaluation. According to Ratliff this is a 3¢ decrease from the 58¢ tax rate of 1991.

Also discussed at the meeting was Ordinance #231 which deals with increasing solid waste rates. The amendment was approved and the rates increased from \$7.50 to \$8.50.

Another issue dealing with solid waste was a possible contract with the City of Perryton for solid waste disposal. The contract sets the cost at \$16.85 per ton. A motion was made to accept the contract. It was seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

The Gruver City Commission also held a hearing on a grant request for Community Development

Program Funds. It was motioned to pass a resolution authorizing the mayor to submit a grant application to drill a water well. According to Ratliff the project will cost \$250,718. The motion was seconded and it carried.

A new Franchise Agreement with Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was approved at the same rate as the previous Franchise Agreement in the amount of 19¢ per month for residential.

Mack Hoel of Gruver was appointed to audit the 1991-92 city financial records.

Regular business conducted at the meeting was the reading and approval of the minutes from the last meeting and the payment of August, 1992, bills.

Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D.... approves payment for new sewer system

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 8, to approve final payment of the new sewer system project, consider old school pictures from Morse and Pringle schools and approve participation in the Lone Star Investment Pool.

Bo Burroughs of B&B Septic Systems presented a final request for payment for the construction of a new wastewater collection and treatment system. Work began on the system July 1 and was completed September 2. The board accepted the system as completed and approved the final payment of \$22,467.65 on the \$57,326.70 project.

A committee of Robbie Reid, Lynn Parks, Sue McCloy and Dean Lieb was present and reported on the work they have been doing toward the restoration of the older pictures from Morse and Pringle schools. The committee recom-

mended purchasing two 20-panel display floor units for the pictures at a cost of \$4,080. The committee will contact alumni members from both schools to seek assistance with the cost.

Participation in the Texas Association of School Boards' Lone Star Investment Pool was approved. The pool was created in 1991 and has over 250 participants. It has yielded an average annual rate of over 9%. According to Superintendent Beryl Sears, the pool is sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards and the money invested draws a higher rate of interest.

The 1992 tax rate was discussed. Since the County Education District tax rate will be set at 0.8958 per \$100 valuation, it will be necessary for the Board to set the local rate at 0.34219 per \$100 valuation, stated Sears. A meeting to formally adopt the local tax rate will be held in October. The CED will set its rate September 22, said Sears.

In other action, the Board reviewed the 1992-93 budget that was approved in a special session August 28th. According to Sears the 1992-93 budget is set at \$809,604.35. He stated that it is approximately \$11,000 less than the 1991-92 budget.

The Board also approved expenditures for the month and final amendments on the 1991-92 budget.

Grandparent's of Pringle-Morse students were invited to the school's Grandparent's Day lunch Friday, Sept. 11. Also a report was given on the success of the Back-To-School Night held August 31st.

The TASB Candidate's Forum was held from 7-9 p.m. at the Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo Thursday, Sept. 10. All Regional XVI School Board members and administrators were invited to attend and meet with

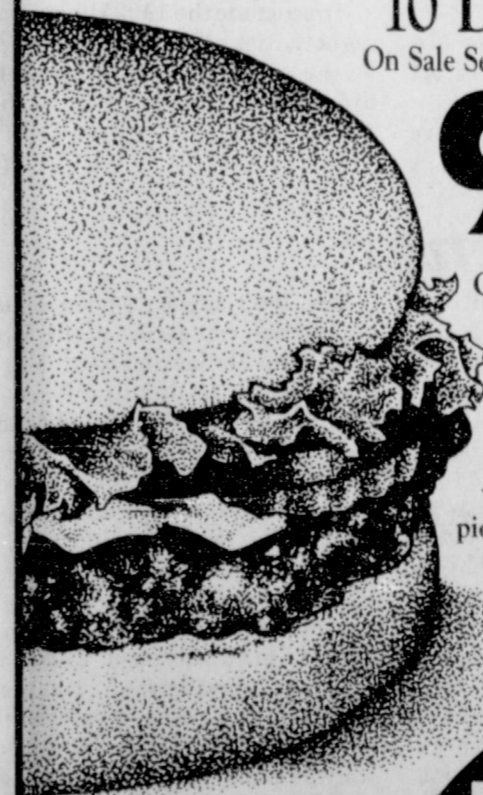

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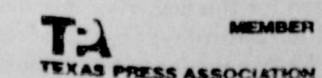

Last week, I made another unexpected trip over to Oklahoma (Purcell, not Guymon). Even though I have made dozens of trips over there this year, I continue to play my "Wandering and Wondering" game and always see some new things that get my mind to going in high gear. If any of you have any information as to what I saw, please let me know.



DOVES ARE GOOD EATING

Hunters report only limited success on recent dove hunts, but the next major cold front will cause large numbers of those speed demons in Kansas to begin a southern migration through our area.

I am delighted to share two of my favorite dove recipes. My wife, Becky, claims the world's greatest recipe for dove is from Mary Faulk Koock of Austin's legendary Green Pastures restaurant. It is found in *The Texas Cookbook* (Little, Brown, 1965).

DOVE RECIPE #1

Salt slightly but pepper birds generously. Take 2 parts of chopped apple and 1 part chopped onion. Stuff cavity of birds firmly. Wrap each bird with a piece of breakfast bacon. Place on wire rack over low coals; turn often until bacon is crisp. Then place birds in roaster, add just a very small amount of wine (red) or water (1/2 cup), again depending on number. Cover and place in a very low (200 degree) oven to keep warm till time to serve. If you have trouble with flames because of the bacon dripping on the coals, you may want to take the birds off before they are completely done and finish them in the oven with the wine, at a slightly higher temperature, but no higher than 325 degrees.

DOVE RECIPE #2 (loosely borrowed from Tim Parker)

Using a sharp knife, cut a one-inch notch in each side of the breast. Insert a piece of yellow onion in one side and a piece of fresh jalapeno in the other side. (Hint—removing veins and seeds retains the spicy taste without the heat.)

Wrap in a piece of bacon and cook over a smoky mesquite fire until bacon is crisp.

WARNING — The average

hunter can easily consume ten breasts so make sure you have plenty before the feast begins.

CONGRATULATIONS to an old friend, **AVERY COPELAND**, for winning the September 3 Fun Tournament on Lake Meredith. Avery bested the field by using (dare I put it in writing?) a PowerPak spring-powered lure to catch a 4 1/2 lb. largemouth bass. It was his personal biggest bass and was released immediately after weigh-in.

Second place went to **DAN TURNER** from Dumas with a nice 4.33 lb. smallmouth bass. Dan credited his success to a Mister Twister banana flavored curly tailed jig. Third place went to **DANNY MITCHELL** of Randall County for catching a keeper 1.68 lb. bass.

Possibly the world's smallest legal smallmouth was caught by **Borger's J.L. CHATWELL**. I'll let him tell you the details of how to catch bass weighing less than 1/5 pound.

OBSERVATIONS OF SUMMER

DOVE SEASON is here, and the annual rite of shooting "at" doves reminds each hunter that either he is one year older or somehow those doves are flying faster. If Mother Nature were logical, she would have started off hunting with pheasant, followed by goose, duck and quail. Only then would the hunter be prepared for the antics of the speedy dove.

HOW TO CATCH BIG BASS instead of losing lures is a major problem when fishing in heavy cover. Most big bass grow that size by living in the middle of an underwater jungle where the average angler cannot put a lure without hanging-up.

SOLUTION—The new A.T. jig was computer designed and bal-

anced to be weedless and always sit in an upright position. The A.T. is virtually snagfree, so the next time you want to catch a big bass, head for the submerged brambles. Tie on this jig tipped with either an A.T. RingCraw at the dependable #11 pork frog. To order some of these jigs, write All Terrain Lure Co., Dept. SWO, P.O. Box 217, Shelbyville, Texas, 75973.

THE TERRIBLE RESULTS of the recent benefit bass tournament at Lake Meredith show the urgent need to stock some bass. The head-in-the-sand bureaucrats who "observe" LAKE MEREDITH could claim that 54 anglers tied for sixth place in the bass category and 59 anglers tied for second place in the crappie and walleye categories!

TRY THIS OBSERVATION Sixty anglers fished a total of 420 hours, providing that it took 3 1/2 days of non-stop fishing to catch a keeper bass. **It doesn't take a cove kill or the expense of another survey to see the need for immediate action.**

In the long term, **catch-and-release** by more than just tournament anglers will decide the future at Lake Meredith.

ANGLER OF THE MONTH Pampa's **JASON BAGGETT**, the twelve-year-old son of **JIMMY BAGGETT** is honored as our "Angler of the Month" by virtue of out-fishing his dad during the August Fun Tournament on Lake Greenbelt. The "longest drive home" award goes to **JIMMY BAGGETT**, who tried to figure out a "good" explanation for his son out-fishing him for the SECOND time in 1992. Jason proudly finished in ninth place and won a large Plano tackle box courtesy of K-Mart.

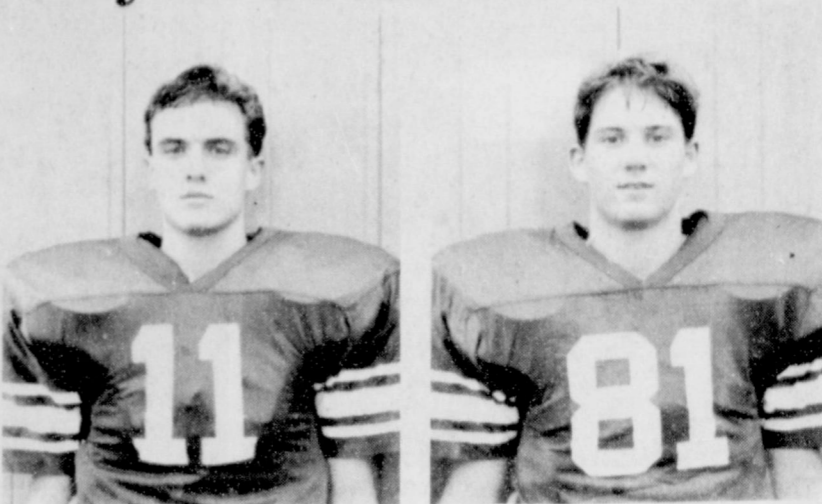
The Memphis Cyclones used all of their state playoff experience and blazing speed to beat the Lynx 27-2.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press *67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

* These rates are in addition to the initial installation charges and monthly basic service rate. For residence customers, installation charges are \$2.70 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$5.40. For business customers, the charges are \$5.40 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$10.75.

** Anonymous Call Rejection is \$3 per month if purchased without Caller ID and is \$1 per month when purchased with Caller ID Name or Number.

This proceeding has been designated Docket No. 11362, and a hearing on the merits has been scheduled for November 16, 1992. The PUC has jurisdiction to consider this matter pursuant to Sections 16, 18, 37 and 38 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA). This application was filed pursuant to the provisions of the PUC's Substantive Rule 23.24. Among the issues that will be addressed in this proceeding is the legality of the Caller ID device and service under Texas wiretap laws.

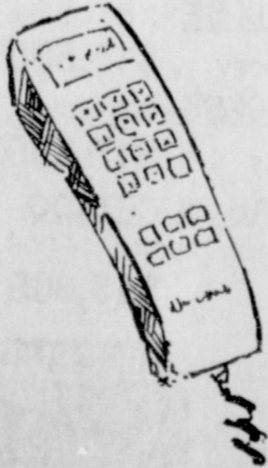
