Scout Merit Badge Counselors Needed



Shieldknight To Coach AIA



Spearman coach, Marcia Shieldknight, has accepted a summer coaching position with the Athletes in Action (AIA) basketball team. Contacted in May to coach the 1996 women's basketball tour, Shieldknight joined the international Christian sports organization. AIA's purpose is to enhance international goodwill through sports, to help athletes maximize their potential, and to introduce sports people around the world to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ while encouraging them to grow in their faith through the fellowship of a local church.

As a member of the AIA coaching staff, Shieldknight is touring Latin America with a team of women basketball players from colleges across the

United States. Clinics and tournaments are scheduled in Ecuador and Bolivia. Shieldknight, the head girls'

basketball coach at Spearman High School, lends to the AIA coaching staff her vast basketball experience as both a player and a coach. As a Spearman High School standout, Shieldknight accumulated 3,077 career points. 1,168 of these points were earned her senior year, where she averaged 28.5 points per game and was named to the all state girls' basketball team. She played college basketball for the Wayland Baptist Flying Queens and won four consecutive Amarillo National Invitational tournaments. Shieldknight was a member of the United States Olympic Women's Basketball team that toured South America in 1969 and played in the 1971 Pan American Games as a member of the American Women's Basketball team. She coached at Ralls High School in Ralls, Texas, and Caprock High School in Amarillo, Texas, and has conducted numerous clinics, including a 1979 clinic in Saudi Arabia. She enjoyed a successful career in estate planning prior to assuming the head girls' basketball position at Spearman High School in 1994.

On June 20, the City dedicated R.E and Bill Martin Park (formerly known as Water Tower Park). This park is named after R.E. Martin, former Hansford County Sheriff, who was killed in the line of duty in 1911 and Bill Martin who was a police officer with the City from 1947 to 1980. Bill Martin was on hand for the dedication ceremony. A sign naming the park was put up after the ceremony.

It is with great honor that the City of Spearman names this park after these two men. R. E. Martin gave his life while serving as Sheriff. His son, Bill, followed him into the law enforcement field and for many years was the only police officer for the city.

The City of Spearman is blessed to have the parks that we do. Many towns our size, and even some larger ones, only have one park for the entire community. Spearman has seven parks (Womble, Swimming Pool, Holton, Eska, Martin, the downtown park, and Rocket Slide) plus a rodeo arena and the City Hall playground. These parks provide a great source of leisure for Spearman adults and youth. Many other cities are envious of the park facilities in

A few years ago, the City Council adopted a parks plan for the City. In that plan, Rocket Slide and Swimming Pool parks were designated to be "active"

parks. That is, the equipment to go in those parks would encourage vigorous activities such as running, jumping, climbing and swimming. Generally, active parks can get pretty noisy at

Womble Park was designated as a children's park. Beginning next year, the City will begin building playground equipment that is targeted towards the younger members of the community.

Eska Park (just south of the hospital) is designated as a "passive" park. That is, the equipment to go in that park will encourage quieter kinds of leisure such as horseshoes, reading, and visiting. I expect that the downtown park (on the corner of Davis and Main) will also be a passive recreation park.

Holton Park (northeast of the Post Office) is an active park. We have installed playground equipment already and will probably build some playground equipment that will encourage active activity.

Rocket Slide Park is an active park and we hope to add some more equipment to build on the spaceship theme of the park.

Martin Park is an active park. However, the future plans call for this park to become more of a passive park.

I hope the citizens of Spearman notice the improvements that have been made to some of our parks. Thanks to the people who pay the PEDL fee, we will continue to make more improvements to our parks.

Thoreson Selected To TALL

Bart Thoreson of Gruver, has been selected to be a member of the next class of the Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Program. Bart is among thirty men and women from across the state to be accepted in the next class of TALL. The program is eight years old, and has provided leadership training to 103 individuals from throughout Texas.

"The Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Program is designed to build the next generation of leaders in Texas. The program exposes young Texas leaders to people, ideas and issues they may not otherwise encounter, and helps them broaden their understanding of local, state and national systems," stated Dr. Dick Cummins, TALL director.

Two years of extensive training are required as part of the leadership program. Participants attend 9 seminars on various issues within the state, a national seminar in Washington, D.C., and an out-of-state seminar. Class members also will be able to study the global implications of agriculture and other business interests by participating in an international study tour.

In each location, participants will study the economy and industry of that area and subjects that might encounter area business. Issues include water control, environment, food safety, animal welfare, education and other social issues. Additionally, TALL provides training in communication skills and other areas of personal development.

"True leadership is the pivotal force in business today. There are many challenges facing businesses and agriculture in the '90's and beyond," Cummins said. "Challenges such as regulations, globalization, new technologies, new financial climates, and more. For creative solutions to become a reality, they must be developed, accepted, put into practice and given a proper chance to work. That's the role of leadership," he

"The applicants for TALL were all talented agricultural people," Cummins said. "The competition was strong and it was difficult determining the class participants. We are thrilled with the caliber of young men and women chosen to make up this



Focus On The Family

QUESTIONS: My child is often ridiculed and hurt by other children on our block, and I don't know how to handle the situation. He gets very depressed and comes home crying frequently. How should I respond?

DR. DOBSON: When your child has been rejected in this manner, he is badly in need of a friend, and you are elected. Let him talk. Don't try to tell him that it doesn't hurt or that it's silly to be so sensitive. Ask him if he knows what it is that his "friends" don't like. (He may be causing their reaction by dominance, selfishness or dishonesty.) Be understanding and sympathetic. As soon as appropriate, involve yourself with him in a game or some other activity that he will enjoy. Finally, set about resolving the underlying

I suggest you ask your child to invite one of his school friends to the zoo on a Saturday (or some other attractive "bait") and then spend the night at your

Genuine friendship often grows from such beginnings. Even the hostile children on the block may be more kind when only one of them is invited at a time. Not only can you help your child make friends this way, but you can also observe the social mistakes he is making to drive them away.



Burl and J.B. Buchanan returned on Monday from the 8th Windmillers International Trade Fair held in Batavia, Illinois.

Batavia, 38 miles west of Chicago, is an appropriate location for the windmillers as it is the birthplace of windmills in the U.S. and was for many years the location of four of the largest

windmill factories

The local newspaper is named the Windmill Herald.

The windmillers registered in the Batavia City Hall which is housed in the renovated but preserved building that was a windmill factory.

The great, great grandson of the inventor (1850) and co-founder of the first factory came to this fair. The town went all out to entertain the guests with local tours, etc.

There were 400 registered windmillers from all over the U.S., Canada, Cuba and possibly other countries. The Fox river runs through Batavia and their windmill park and museum is on an island in the river. On one of the local tours near

Batavia, J.B. and Burl were amazed that a Dutch windmill, predating the American windmills, was still intact. It is now a historical monument. The six story edifice has a 60 foot wheel. J.B. and Burl climbed the steep stairway for several stories in order to closely examine the wheel and mechanism. They were incredulous to find that it was made completely of wood-all the gears- no metal in any part of it and it was in use for nearly a century. J.B. with his 90th birthday next month felt that examining it was well worth the steep climb.

He was pleased that so many of the windmillers were friends of his. One pleasant surprise was when a young man came up to him and explained that about ten years ago, when he was just a boy, he was fascinated by windmills and was trying to build one. He wrote J.B. seeking technical information. Their correspondence lasted several years. J.B. remembered his name and their letters. The young man was very grateful and now has his own

There was a surprising number of young people there, even teenagers, there including a large number of girls, keenly interested in windmills.

The Master of Ceremonies introduced J.B. as being responsible for the current intense interest in windmills. In the 30 or more years that J.B. has had his collection, observers from the highway would stop for talk and pictures, then pass on their own interest to others. Others would see the newspaper items, books, etc. and get in touch with him. So directly or indirectly, the interest is traced back to J.B.

The speaker made reference to and expressed appreciation to Homer Beck, of Wichita, Kansas for his assistance in their fair, arrangements, program, etc. Homer was one who had stopped at J.B.'s years ago then pursued his own interest and influenced others. Homer was raised in Spearman and attended school

Available at the fair were a number of the last issue of Texas Highways, books, and other publications that had pictures and items about J.B. So the purchasers would ask him to autograph them and to have their pictures made with him.

With an impish grin, J.B. said a number of them were pretty ladies who asked that he put his arm around them for the picture. (Wonder if Burl didn't edge a little closer--to get in on the action.) There was news media there who interviewed and photographed him also.
