

2009 Property Tax Announcement

Hansford County property owners have until January 31, 2009 to pay their property taxes before incurring penalty and interest fees. Second statements are sent to remind property owners to pay their taxes. Starting February 1, property owners face a 7% fee added to the taxes owed, plus an additional 2% each month they do not pay their taxes.

After July 1, delinquent accounts will be turned over to a tax attorney and an additional 20% will be added on top of the penalty and interest to pay for attorney fees. Delinquent taxpayers could also face a lawsuit in state district court. In order to avoid a law suit a pay agreement contract to make monthly payments may be signed at either Hansford County Tax Assessors Collector's office located in the county courthouse or the Hansford County Appraisal District Office at 709 W. 7th Avenue in Spearman.

Partial payments are accepted if you would like to divide your taxes in four payments October through January. Taxpayers are still required to pay taxes even though for some reason they did not receive a tax statement.

AgriLife Extension Schedules Food Manager Certification Course

The typical American household spends an average of \$2,634 on food away from home each year. To assist area food establishments in providing food that is safe for their customers, Texas AgriLife Extension Service officials from Sherman and Potter counties are offering a one-day food manager certification training course.

"Food Safety: It's Our Business" will be offered Jan. 27 at the Sherman County Exhibit Building located at 501 S. Maple in Stratford. The deadline for signing up to attend is Jan. 23. Food establishments are required by law to have one certified food manager employed, said Susie Spurlock, AgriLife Extension family and consumer science agent in Sherman County. If successfully completed, this course meets the state requirement. Included with the training will be materials and the state food manager certification examination. Cost of the course is \$110. Food-bome illnesses affecting an establishment are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills, Spurlock said. Hansford County Has Ties **To Two New Year's Babies**

Dominic Brown and Adler Vasquez Receive Title of First Baby of the Year

Hansford County has ties to two New Year's babies. as midnight rolled around to have Dominic James Brown was born shortly after midnight on New Year's Day at Baptist St. Anthony's

Hospital in Amarillo, receiving the title of Amarillo's first baby of the year. Adler Grant Vasquez was born at 8:28 a.m. on Friday, January 2, 2009 at Ochiltree General Hospital in Perryton, receiving the title of Perryton's first baby of the year. Both baby boys have grandparents in Spearman.

Dominic, named after a character from the film "Kindergarten Cop," arrived nine days early and put his mother, Christen Brown, a 22-year-old from the town of Panhandle, through more than 18 hours of labor. The infant came into the world at 12:18 a.m.

After Brown's labor pains began at 5:45 a.m. Wednesday, she and Bradley drove to Amarillo. When the baby didn't immediately arrive, hospital staff sent Brown, accompanied by her family, to Westgate Mall to walk for three hours to help her dilate, said Dominic's grandmother, Brenda Ferguson of Spearman. By 3:30 p.m., medical personnel had induced labor, but still Dominic didn't arrive. At midnight, they sent Brown in for an emergency C-section.

Minutes later, a healthy 7-pound, 7-ounce, 19.5-inch boy was delivered.

Dominic's grandparents, aunt and doting father were there for it all, Ferguson said.

Bradley Brown, 23, said his son arrived at an oppor-

BSA nurse Sis James said traditionally nurses at Northwest Texas Hospital and BSA call back and forth to see who has had the first baby of the year.

"It's just a little added fun," she said.

For the past 15 years, Northwest had the first baby, BSA spokeswoman Mary Barlow said. Dominic broke the trend.

By 1:15 p.m. Thursday, BSA had seven babies born on New Year's Day, Barlow said.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, one birth is expected every eight seconds this month in the United States.

The show began at 1:30 p.m. Eastern Standard Time/10:30 a.m. Pacific Standard Time on January 4 on local NBC stations.

City of Spearman Accepts Bid to Replace Downtown Sidewalk

On Tuesday, December 23, 2008, during a special called city council meeting, a bid was accepted for the replacement of one of the sidewalks in downtown Spearman. It is the section of sidewalk from Cates Men & Boys Wear to Celebrate, in the 200 block of Main Street.

The job was awarded to Concrete Connection of Plainview. They have recently completed sidewalk projects in Quitaque, Lockney and Matador. The bid price was \$147,313.80. This price was over \$116,000 less than the last bids received in August of 2007

The project has a schedule to take no longer than 90 days, and this price is good for 30 days.

The project is to be financed in the following fashion: It is proposed that the City of Spearman will pay a third of the cost, the EDC will pay a third, and the building owner will pay the remaining third. The cost to everyone is considerably less than the initial plans and assessment as recorded in Ordinance #773, dated September 2003, which the City proposed paying fifty percent and the property owner fifty percent. The terms are for 7 years at 8% interest. The City will allow the building owners to make semi-annual, annual installments, or pay all of the installments at any time with no interest.

Copies of the plans are available at Spearman City Hall for viewing anytime during regular business hours, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

innovative, environmentally sensitive ways to move freight across the state.

On Dec. 19, TxDOT published a "Request for Information," a document asking for suggestions on how to develop freight transport systems that minimize environmental impacts and technologies with low carbon emissions in particular.

"Potential systems could include technology involving electromagnetic propulsion where the electricity is supplied by green technology such as wind or solar generation. Such systems could potentially operate on a rail or other fixed channel," an agency release stated.

TxDOT also asked for help with developing a business model to finance, develop and operate these systems.





James Arthur Stedje

Editor's note---Most of the information in the following article is taken from James Arthur Stedje's memoir, Takker De, Gud (Thank you, God). The memoir was written by James Stedje, recorded by Ada Joyce Stedje, and edited by Diane Stedje Battles.

James Arthur Stedje was born in Leland, Iowa on September 2, 1909, to Jens Michael and Clara Johnson Stedje. He was the second of their 5 children.

In February, 1922, the family moved from Iowa to Hansford County to land they had bought in 1916 in the Oslo Community. When Jens Stedje died July 12, 1922, James became the man of the family at age 12.

In the fall of 1942, James was drafted. On October 3 he reported to Camp Gruber near Tulsa. Oklahoma where he joined the 88th Infantry Division, 88th Signal Corps. He was sent to Alexandria,

maneuvers.

"I spent three months in Louisiana. I nearly lost my engraved gold watch that my family had given to me. I had showered (a stall under the trees) and I had hung my watch in a tree limb by my helmet to put back on. Suddenly our trucks were ready to move and I was the driver! We moved out and when I stopped for the night I missed my watch. Next day, as luck would have it, I was driving one of the trucks sent back to get more supplies to bring back. knew my directions and was always very conscious of where I had driven. I was able to go right back to the very tree I had hung my watch on, and it was there!!! "I also remember when I spent

my first night with all these New Yorkers who were going to be my noisy room mate soldiers for the next three years. How my quiet life was changing! I can't remember what time we got to sleep or settled down. I do remember when we got up the next morning. I had acquired a growing habit of always getting my directions straight. I said, 'Well, that is east so...' 'How do you know that is east?' asked a city Yankee. 'Because there is the sun...' I replied. 'Oh, does it always come up in the east?' I was glad I had grown up on a farm and not lived in a city! At least, I knew my directions.

"Boyee, was it ever hot in Louisiana - like 117 degrees with humidity! I spent three months there on maneuvers and then went to Fort Sam Houston in San [James' brother] was there, so I went twenty miles to see him.

"Then came the time to ship out to Oran, North Africa. I left from Hampton Roads, Virginia. Of course, we all wondered if we would week's edition see the U.S. again! I looked long and hard at the shoreline, taking it

Louisiana as a truck driver for all in. Strangely enough three years later when I returned, my ship docked in nearly the same place from where we left, only one dock over.


> "We were on a Liberty ship for twenty-eight days. I bought a carton of nut Hershey bars and ate one a day. When I got to Africa, I had three bars left. We stayed in Oran about six weeks, and during that time we traveled one hundred miles south for maneuvers.

> "Then we took a train back to Oran and shipped out crossing the Mediterranean on a flat bottom boat. It was so rough, and most everybody got seasick! We were glad after three or four days to get to Naples, Italy. The docks were full of sunken ships so planks were laid.

> "The truck drivers were given all new Dodge trucks, and we drove two trips up to the front lines, hauling all the freight. I always looked back on those days and felt lucky that I never had to kill anyone. From then on, our 88th Signal Corps stayed in Italy from Naples to the Brenner Pass.

"I was in communications, so my job was T & T (telephone and telegraph). One time I was called in when a line was down, and this officer said that there was no one to fix it. I told him that I would go do it before dark. He said, 'Thank you! You are a soldier and a gentleman.' I remember another time that I went out early in the morning to fix a line, and I ran into this Italian soldier. He was carrying a machine gun, holding it up over his head. I ran and grabbed it so he wouldn't Antonio. I found out that Clifford shoot me. He wanted to trade me this gun for some cigarettes. I had some cigarettes in a pocket, getting pretty badly worn, so I gave them to him.

JACK HOKE HART Jack Hoke Hart, 85, of Amarillo

died Sunday, January 4, 2009. Graveside services were at 11:00 am Wednesday, January 7, 2009, at the Gruver Cemetery, Gruver, Texas by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home, Spearman, Texas. Reverend Dale Moreland officiated.

Jack was born on October 30, 1923 on his grandfather's ranch near Morse, Texas. Jack graduated from Gruver High School in 1940 and enrolled in Iowa State University where he was a member of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. In 1943, as an advanced ROTC cadet, he was called into active duty with the Army. He requested a transfer to the U.S.

Army Air Corps and received training as a reconnaissance pilot in the twin-fuselage, twin-engine, single seat P-38 that was fitted with cameras rather than guns. Jack finished first in his class and was immediately sent overseas to Okinawa. During a rest stop at New Guinea on his way to Okinawa, Jack received word that his older brother Walter, who was a major with the Fifth Cavalry, was killed on the island of Luzon in the Philippines. Jack flew three combat missions from Okinawa. The first two reconnaissance missions were over Tokyo and Yokohama. His third combat mission at the age of 21 years was the first reconnaissance flight over Nagasaki on August 10, 1945, the day after the atomic bomb was dropped over the city.

After serving a year in Japan with the Occupational Army, Jack returned to Hansford County where he began his lifetime occupation of farming and ranching. Later he and several partners built and operated the Hansford Feedyard located northeast of Spearman that is now Spearman Cattle Feeders. He also owned and operated the Palo Duro Grain Elevators in Gruver for many years. He served as vice president of the Gruver ISD Board of Trustees in the late 50's and early 60's. Jack always regretted not completing his college education so he enrolled in West Texas State University in Canyon and received his college degree in 1979 at the age of 56. He later attended Western State

University Law School in San Diego, California. In 1985 he joined with others to become an organizing director of First National Bank, Spearman, and served as a director for many years. Jack was a member of the Southwest Cattle Raisers Association and the Texas Grain and Feed Association.

Jack was a member of The Church at Quail Creek.

Jack married Bobbie A. Sanders on August 20, 1979. Jack was preceded in death by his parents; a sister, Mary Ann Johnson; a brother, Walter; and a granddaughter Jennifer Hart Tidwell.







In this first week of Epiphany we study Genesis 1: 1-5, Psalm 29, Acts 19: 1-7, and Mark 1: 4-11. Moses writes of the creation of the world. He writes that in the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. The word we translate as God is "Elohim"; this is a plural noun! Recall last weeks lesson from the Gospel of John, the "Logos" was with God, the 'Logos" was God, and nothing was created without the "Logos" (Word). We may discover from this that God the Father Almighty is present at creation, Jesus (the "Logos") is present at creation, and the Spirit of God (Holy Spirit) is present at creation. We may discover here that God is One but perceived as three persons-Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Epiphany indeed!

The Psalmist sings of the power of the "voice" of God while thinking of a Palestinian thunder storm. The "voice" of God is powerful flashing forth flames of fire, breaking trees, causing the ground to shake. The salmist discovers God in nature revealed!

Luke tells us of Paul in Ephesus. Paul finds a group of believers who know only the baptism of John the Baptist. Now these people followed the baptism of repentance. They confess their sin to themselves; confessed their sin to those they had harmed; and, then confessed their sin to God. Thus, seeking to amend their lives. Paul asks them if they know of the Holy Spirit and they say no. These Ephesians are baptized in the name of Jesus Christ, and when Paul places his hands upon them, they receive the Holy Spirit. These Ephesians have discovered the nature of God!


Mark tells us of the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist. We are told by Jesus that it was necessary for Him to be baptized by John the Baptist in the baptism of repentance; even though He is the Son of God. What do we discover here? Jesus' baptism by John is a moment of decision. It is the moment that Christ embarks on His ministry. It is a moment of identification. The "voice" of God identifies Jesus as his "beloved son". It is a moment of preparation; the Spirit of God descends upon Jesus. We discover God in Man! God has intervened in human history! God's plan of redemption is afoot!

May the Holy Spirit open your eyes and allow you to discover Him!

The current pheasant season framework calls for opening the first Saturday in December for 30 consecutive days.

No immediate changes to the pheasant season framework are being considered in order to ensure the public has ample opportunity to weigh in on the discussion.


