14 Candidates **Meet Deadline for March Primary**

Two candidates filed for the Hansford County Judge position for the March 9, 2004 republican primary.

Benny Wilson, who was appointed by the Hansford County Commissioners Court to fill the unexpired term of Judge Jim Brown filed, as did Cody Cazares.

Four candidates filed for the Hansford County Sheriff position, including Deputy Pete Ochoa, Deputy Gary Evans, Deputy Lance Swan and Spearman Police Officer Edward Mayfield.

Two candidates filed for the Tax Assessor/Collector position. They are Linda Cummings, currently serving as assistant tax assessor/collector, and Jackie Reed Nelson, an employee at First State

Three candidates filed for the Precinct 3 County Commissioner seat. They include Tim Stedje, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Kent Guthrie, as well as Charlie Bell and Ty Williams.

County Attorney John L. Hutchison, 84th Judicial District Judge William D "Bill" Smith and 84th Judicial District Attorney Clay Ballman are all running unopposed in the primary election.

No democrats filed for Hansford County.

Winter Safety Tips from the City of Spearman

The City of Spearman wants to remind people that with the return of cold weather it is time to make sure your furnace and other gas appliances are in good operating condition to ensure a safe heating season. Also, people who have had recent roof work may want to have a service technician inspect their vents to ensure that all vents were re-installed in a proper manner and that their appliances are venting efficiently.

Ideally, natural gas burns in a appliance completely and efficiently, mixing with the oxygen in the air to produce harmless carbon dioxide (CO2) and water vapor. But if conditions are not right, the natural gas won't combust completely, giving off deadly fumes of carbon monoxide (CO).

When humans are exposed to high levels over a short period of time, or lower levels over a longer period - overnight, for example, sickness or death can occur. Carbon monoxide can be especially dangerous during the winter, when our homes are sealed up tight. Symptoms mimic the flu, so watch for these warning signs: headache, nausea or vomiting, dizziness or disorientation, muscle weakness or fatigue.

If these flu-like symptoms are NOT accompanied by a fever, if everyone in the family is ill, or the symptoms disappear when you leave thee house, you may have a CO problem. You should have your gas appliances checked by a service technician right away.

Prevention is the only way to deal with carbon monoxide, and the best prevention is regular inspection by a service technician. Natural gas furnaces should be inspected EVERY YEAR. Other appliances, such as water heaters, clothes dryers and stoves should be inspected every two years.

It is also important to have a good carbon monoxide detector. These devices work like smoke detectors, sounding an audible alarm if a certain level of CO is detected. Make sure your CO detector is installed near the living and sleeping areas of your home.

If you have an older gas appliance, take a moment to check the connector linking the appliance to the gas line. Flexible metal connectors, especially those made of uncoated brass, can weaken or crack over time, causing a leak. If it's been more than 15 years since your gas appliance was installed or inspected, have the connector replaced with a new one made of either stainless steel or plastic coated metal. Make sure the connector conforms to the American National Standards Institute and are certified by the American Gas

Remember, the City of Spearman is available 24-hours a day, 7 days a week to assist you. If you have a suspected natural gas leak, or carbon monoxide is present, call 659-2524, anytime.

Washington-Based Plane Crashes In Oregon

The pilot of a twin-engine plane reported power problems before crashing, killing one and injuring three, the National Transportation Safety Board said Friday, January 1, 2004.

The Piper Seminole flying from Oakland, CA, to North Bend, OR, crashed Thursday night, December 31st, while trying to make

an emergency landing because of a snow storm, authorities said. The pilot diverted from the original route after reporting some kind of power problem, said Steven McCreary, investigator in

charge of the National Transportation Safety Board in Seattle. "We don't know whether that was because of a problem with the engine or a problem with environmental conditions affecting the engine or what," McCreary said.

Josephine County sheriff's deputies said snow was falling heavily when the plane crashed at about 6:40 p.m. Thursday next to U.S. Highway 199 just south of the Illinois Valley airport, located about two miles south of Cave Junction.

They found the plane upside-down in a brushy area near Rough and Ready Creek.

The co-pilot, Jeff Mclain, 27, of Seattle, was killed. Pilot Mark Ritchie of Olympia was seriously hurt. The two women passengers on board, Ruri Murikani and Jacqueline Westfall were also injured.

The women were taken to Three Rivers Community Hospital in Grants Pass and Ritchie was taken to Rogue Valley Medical Center in Medford.

Two Federal Aviation Administration investigators were en route to examine the wreckage, McCreary said.

Three of the four people were flight instructors, said Sara Nicholson of Josephine County Emergency Services. The plane was registered to Piper Project II of Sumner, Wash., but leased by Auburn Flight Services of Auburn, Wash., she said.

McLain is the son of Valerie Clark of Dallas and the grandson of R.L. and Betty Uptergrove of Spearman.

Special Election for State Senate, District 31

A special election is being held on January 20, 2004 for the purpose of the Office of State Senate, District 31.

Early voting began Monday, January 5th. Texas counties had less

than 30 days to prepare from the time the governor called the special election on December 8, 2003, with the holidays landing right in the middle of that period.

Early voting will last through January 16, with the election being held on Tuesday, January 20th.

Office seekers, listed with party affiliation, place of residence and profession, are:

Bob Barnes, R-Odessa, restaurateur;

* Kirk Edwards, R-Odessa, businessman;

* Lee Gibson, R-Dumas, farmer;

* Elaine King Miller, D-Amarillo, education consultant; * Jesse Quackenbush, R-Amarillo, lawyer/restaurateur;

* Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, businessman; and

* Don Sparks, R-Midland, oilman.

Gov. Rick Perry called the special election when state Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, announced his resignation. Bivins is leaving the seat he has held since 1989 to accept the nomination by President Bush to serve as ambassador to Sweden.

Bivins' departure means for the first time since Amarillo, Midland and Odessa have been in the same Texas senate district together, the race for the seat is wide open. Political scientists have said the race could be a battle for the district between Amarillo and the Panhandle in the north and Midland, Odessa and the Permian Basin in the south.

A candidate must win a majority of the votes to win the seat. If no candidate comes away from the special election with more than 50 percent of votes, the top two vote getters will face each other in a run-off in February on a date yet to be determined.

Early voting by personal appearance will be conducted each weekday at the Hansford County Clerks Office in Spearman and the branch office at the City Hall in Gruver. Voting will be conducted between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. beginning January 5th and ending on January 16, 2004.



This special election will be held on January 20, 2004 at the City Hall in Spearman and the High School Library in Gruver, beginning

at 7 a.m. and ending at 7 p.m. Due to a federal court order entered on November 12, 2003, the mass mailing of new voter registration certificates may not begin

until January 11, 2004. In order to process voters in the special elections on January 20, 2004 in Senate District 31, voters may present their old (orange) certificate when voting. Voters may also vote without any certificate by showing another form of identification such as a driver's

Texas Residential Construction Commission To Hold Open Meeting in Amarillo

The Texas Residential Construction Commission will take public comments on proposed rules pertaining to the registration of new homes, registration of builders in the State of Texas, definitions to be used in construing agency rules, and fees - all of which will be published in the January 9th issue of the Texas Register. In addition, the commission is interested in receiving public comment on rules related to registration of third-party inspectors, registration of certified arbitrators and the state-sponsored inspection and dispute resolution process, which have not yet been published for comment in the Texas Register, but which were adopted as emergency rules at the commission's January 6, 2004, Open Meeting.

Any person wanting to provide comments regarding the proposed rules is encouraged to appear and offer verbal or written comments or statements on the issue. A public meeting will be held in Amarillo at the Ambassador Inn, 3101 I-40 West, on Thursday, January 15, 2004 at 6:30 p.m.

Interested persons not able to attend the above public meeting may submit written comments (16 copies) on the proposed rules to Susan K. Durso, General Counsel, Texas Residential Construction Commission, PO Box 13144, Austin, Texas 78711. comments may also be submitted electronically to <u>rulescomments@trcc.state.tx.us</u>. The deadline for submission of comments with the commission is thirty (30) days from the date of the publication of the proposed rules in the Texas Register. Comments should be organized in a manner consistent with the organization of the proposed rules.

The commission is responsible for registering new homes and home builders in the State of Texas, overseeing a state-sponsored inspection and dispute resolution process, preparing and adopting building and performance standards and limited statutory warranties, providing voluntary certification of arbitrators, providing for the filing of arbitration wards and managing three task force







Fawn Memories

During the early part of this past summer, I spent many hours on horseback checking cattle in our pastures. Because the rides often took me along or across our creek, they were a wonderful opportunity to observe nature. The most memorable experiences turned out to be the many encounters I had with small fawns.

The first incident took place when my brother, Micah, and I were returning home from moving some cattle. We were riding side by side, trotting briskly across a grassy low land, when Micah spied the spotted fawn as we passed on either side of it. The baby, only the size of a large house cat, never twitched as we thundered by. Circling our horses, we gazed at the little creature curled in the grass. Though scared, it lay motionless. Was there anything that would scare it into fleeing? We cherished the moment and con-

tinued homeward. A couple of days later, Micah and I had the opportunity to learn more about fawn behavior. We were crossing the creek near the site of the previous meeting, when our nervous horses helped us detect the fawn, tucked in beside a clump of green grass. Wow, another once in a life time experience! Burn the picture deep in your mind. It may have to last you a long time. The little thing certainly has been well taught to lie still. We enjoyed the seconds. The fawn did not. After about a half a minute of having the big ugly beasts stare at it, the fawn had had enough. Without warning, it jumped to its feet. We, calming our terrified horses, watched as the baby sprang backwards into a pool of water. It stood up, covered with mud and water. "Where's my mommy? Maybe on the other side of those horses, farther up the creek. I'll have to risk it!" As it dashed between our horses, the fawn let out a pitiful maa/yelp. It soon disappeared around a bend of the creek. While Micah and I couldn't 't help but chuckle at the humor

on the ordeal, we both hoped that Mommy got to lick baby deer clean really soon.

While that was the last time I saw a fawn in its hiding place, we continued to have interesting encounters. One, was a little more interesting than the fawn would have preferred. I had just crossed the creek with four sick cattle and was driving them across a low land toward our house. They insisted on spreading out, so I let them and followed behind. It was hardly surprising when a couple of them flushed up a little fawn. What did surprise me though, was the baby's course of action. In spite of other options, it ran straight up the hill toward our house! While I wished for a cell phone to call home, I hurried the cattle to the side and around the house. I then topped the hill in time to see the fawn (practically in our front yard) thrashing against the chicken fence. Mama and the girls were watching with perplexed looks on their faces. I rode around the house and tied my horse. The fawn, mean while, found its way back out to pasture, so I joined the girls and mama, who still had funny looks on their faces. Funny enough, that when Mama asked me if I had done that on purpose, I hurriedly shook my head and pointed at the cattle!

Cattle also led me into another more friendly meeting, this time with two young fawns. The two sick cattle that I was driving home were in the creek bottom, and I was on the bank above. They were playing the "see if you can make me cross the creek" game, which turned into the "up and down the creek" game. While they were trying their up the creek tactic, I noticed a fawn standing in the grass a short distance farther ahead. Declaring the cattle "short term winners", I dismounted to watch the curious baby. As the horse and I stood still, it wandered closer and closer, looking us over intently. Another fawn soon appeared, watching from a safe distance, beneath a tree. The two began conversing in soft little maas. I longed for a camera, as the first

one walked within fifteen feet of me. It then went over and joined its companion under the tree. After a few minutes they both lay down, and I rode off to find the cattle, which had wandered off in opposite directions. It took me an extra thirty minutes to locate and head them home, but that didn't matter. It was worth it, to have an experience like that.

I don't know how many fawns were raised in the area this summer, but on one trip down the creek I saw four, including a set of twins which ran off with their mother. I do know, however, that several fawns saw more of me during the summer than they would have liked. No long term harm came to them from our meetings though, and I thank the Lord for making my path cross those of one of his cutest creatures, "the spotted fawn".
