## Spearman City Council... schedules hours and fees for municipal swimming pool

Spearman City Council members set dates and fees for the municipal swimming pool 1993 season during the regular meeting Tuesday, May 18.

The pool will be open Saturday, May 29, through Sunday, August 15. Daily hours are Monday - Saturday, 1 to 5 p.m.; Sunday, 2 to 5 p.m. The nightly hours are: teen night, Tuesday, 8 to 10 p.m.; and family night, Thursday, 8 to 10 p.m.

Admission tickets can be purchased in three different ways: regular admission, season pass or family pass. Regular admission is \$1.50 for individuals 12 years and under; \$2 for 13 to 18 year olds; and \$2.50 for 19 and over. A season pass for an individual 12 and under is \$40; 13 to 18 years is \$50 and 19 and over costs \$60.

Family passes are also available this season. The cost for a family pass is as follows: \$150 for three family members or less; \$160 for four to five family members; and \$175 for six family members and over. It is specified that family members must be living in the same household and will be listed on the pass.

The rate for parties is \$35 per hour for pool and concession. This covers up to 25 people. It is \$10 extra per hour for each additional 25 people.

Lessons will be given privately. According to City Manager Kelvin Knauf, this year the swimming pool manager is Francis Pipkin. The assistant pool manager is Mendy Lasater. Lifeguards for the season are: Jill Lusby, Tracy Tigrett, Trixie Pearson, Kara Faries, Chad Wilkerson and Mikki Raper.

In other business, the council considered a request for additional monthly support for the Hansford County Library. Sheri Benton, Librarian and Mary Alice Gibner, board member, presented a revenue and expense report to the council and requested an increase of \$500 in monthly support, which would bring the total per month to \$1,250. It was noted that the city currently pays the library \$750 a month which was raised \$250 a month in April 1989. Benton and Gibner stated that they also requested the same amount from the county. It was motioned that the item be tabled and that the request be considered in the next fiscal year budget. The motion was seconded and carried.

Other business brought before the council was considering an agreement with the Spearhead Corporation for a land exchange. Knauf explained the land exchange. He said that the city's land is valued at \$33,750 and the Spearhead

Corporation's land is valued at \$40,800. He added that the Community Center would be more centrally located if it was built on the city's land. A motion was made to agree to exchange land. It was seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

The council also approved an agreement with the Spearman I.S.D. to help maintain the tennis courts. The agreement is for the amount of \$2,000.

Stephanie Crossland, president and Cindy Blackman, executive director of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce agreed to the terms of the contract for the use and operation of the rodeo arena. The city approved the contract with the chamber for the use and operation of the rodeo arena for public events.

In other business, Police Chief Joe Raper brought up providing "angle parking" on the south side of east Third Avenue and providing "no parking" on the north side of east Third Avenue. He added that this would allow more vehicles to park, but it also creates less area for two-way traffic which is why the "no parking" is needed on the north side. It was brought up that the parking would only be enforced during scheduled ball games. It was suggested that two or three parking spots be designated as handicapped. The request was approved.

Resolution of the economic development committee was approved. This economic committee is to be responsible for the planning and implementation of a strategic economic development plan for the City of Spearman.

Other business at the meeting was the reappointment of citizens to the various boards. The reappointments were approved as follows:

Planning and Zoning Commission - 3 year terms - Chairman J.L. Brock, Helen Etter and James Cunningham; Electrical Board - 2 year terms - Verlin Behne, R.L. Uptergrove and Lee Shaver; Housing

### School's out, motorists urged to be cautious

School is out! This signals a lot of outdoor fun for kids, and for drivers it should necessitate a change in our driving habits. "With warmer weather and longer days, children play outside from early morning to late at night. Since there will be many more children outside during the summer, drivers must remain alert and ready for almost anything," advised Trooper Wayne Beighle Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Most people understand that children are not just small adults. Kids do not think like adults, and usually they do not reason as adults. They lack experience with traffic and also have limited perceptual skills; consequently, they are unable to accurately judge the speed and distance of vehicles. Drivers, therefore, have the responsibility to watch out for children at play.

"The key to avoid hitting a pedestrian is leaving yourself plenty of time and space for proper reaction. Scanning from curb to curb, well ahead of your vehicle, will afford a driver the necessary time and space," Beighle added.

Everyone who enters a roadway is vulnerable to injury, but children are at greater risk. As the number of kids outdoors increases this summer, we, as drivers are obligated to keep them safe.

Illegal dumping is becoming more and more common as the environmental regulations become more restrictive. State laws and city ordinances prohibit the disposal of waste (household garbage, industrial waste or hazardous waste) in any manner which is not consistent with state and local regulations. This prohibition also extends to disposing of waste, including grass clippings and weeds, on another person's property. Dumpsters are provided for the disposal of grass and weeds and are available for this purpose until State law prohibits the mixing of grass and weeds with regular household garbage.

Many times those people who are illegally disposing of waste, even if they are just throwing old tires into the bar ditch, think that they are avoiding any costs of properly disposing of the waste. Where waste is disposed of illegally means that the city or county government has to clean up the illegal disposal. The fact is that illegal disposal of waste costs all of us through higher city or county taxes. Overall, it really costs less if individuals would dispose of waste properly. If you don't know how to properly dispose of certain kinds wastes, please call City Hall or the Texas Water Commission in Amarillo. We will do our best to advise you on the proper disposal methods.

The Hansford County Library in Spearman has received several copies of a new young people's book about saving energy. The books, "25 Simple Things Kids Can Do To Save Energy," were donated to the library by Phillips Petroleum Company's Borger operations.

There were 13 animal control calls during the week.

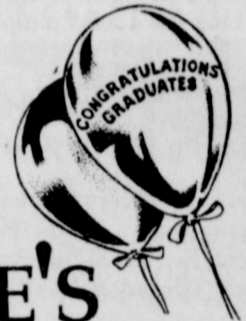

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

Illegal dumping is becoming more and more common as the environmental regulations become more restrictive. State laws and city ordinances prohibit the disposal of waste (household garbage, industrial waste or hazardous waste) in any manner which is not consistent with state and local regulations. This prohibition also extends to disposing of waste, including grass clippings and weeds, on another person's property. Dumpsters are provided for the disposal of grass and weeds and are available for this purpose until State law prohibits the mixing of grass and weeds with regular household garbage.

Many times those people who are illegally disposing of waste, even if they are just throwing old tires into the bar ditch, think that they are avoiding any costs of properly disposing of the waste. Where waste is disposed of illegally means that the city or county government has to clean up the illegal disposal. The fact is that illegal disposal of waste costs all of us through higher city or county taxes. Overall, it really costs less if individuals would dispose of waste properly. 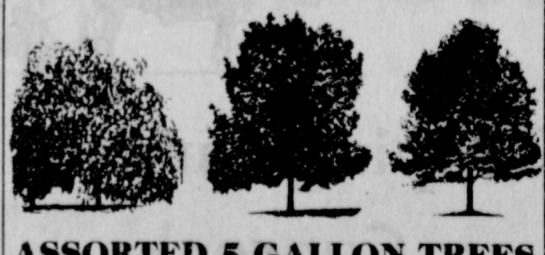

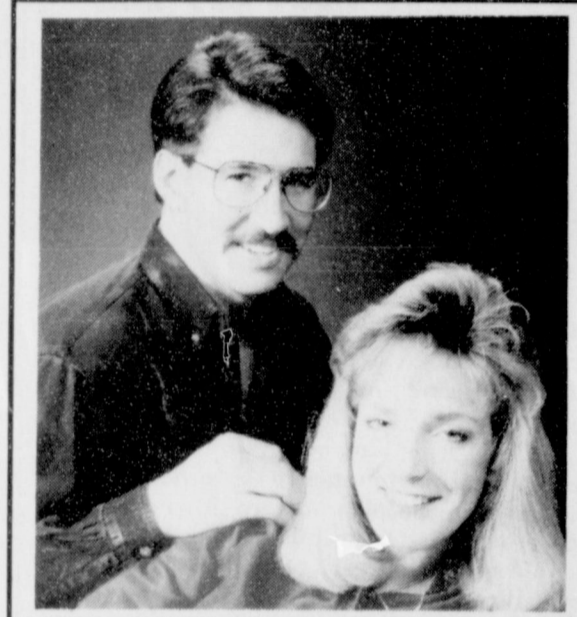

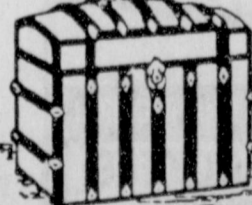

The Hansford County Old-Timers' Reunion is scheduled to be held from 2 to 4 p.m. in the Home Demonstration building, 309 N. Bernice. This reunion is sponsored by the Historical Commission. It is open to the public with individuals from Hansford County and the surrounding area urged to attend. RubyJo Wilbanks stated that many of the pioneers don't live here now, but they come back for the reunion. "It is an open house to renew old acquaintances and make new ones," she added.

During the reunion Mr. J.B. and Ila Mae Buchanan will be honored as the 1993 Pioneer Day King and Queen. RubyJo added that the entire Buchanan family will also be recognized. Family members include J.B.'s brothers and sisters are J.W. (Buck) Buchanan of Dumas, Paul Buchanan of Pampa, twins Lucile Allen of Guyman and

Louise Vaught of Amarillo, Helen Fisher of Spearman, Edna Bassel and Virginia Cates, both of Amarillo. Monroe Buchanan and Ruth Tipton are both deceased.

J.B., "the grandfather of the windmill collectors," is the oldest of Mr. J.H. and Mary Buchanan's 10 children. The Buchanans moved to Old Hansford in 1911 from Oklahoma. They then moved to Spearman at approximately the same time the town moved, according to Ila Mae.

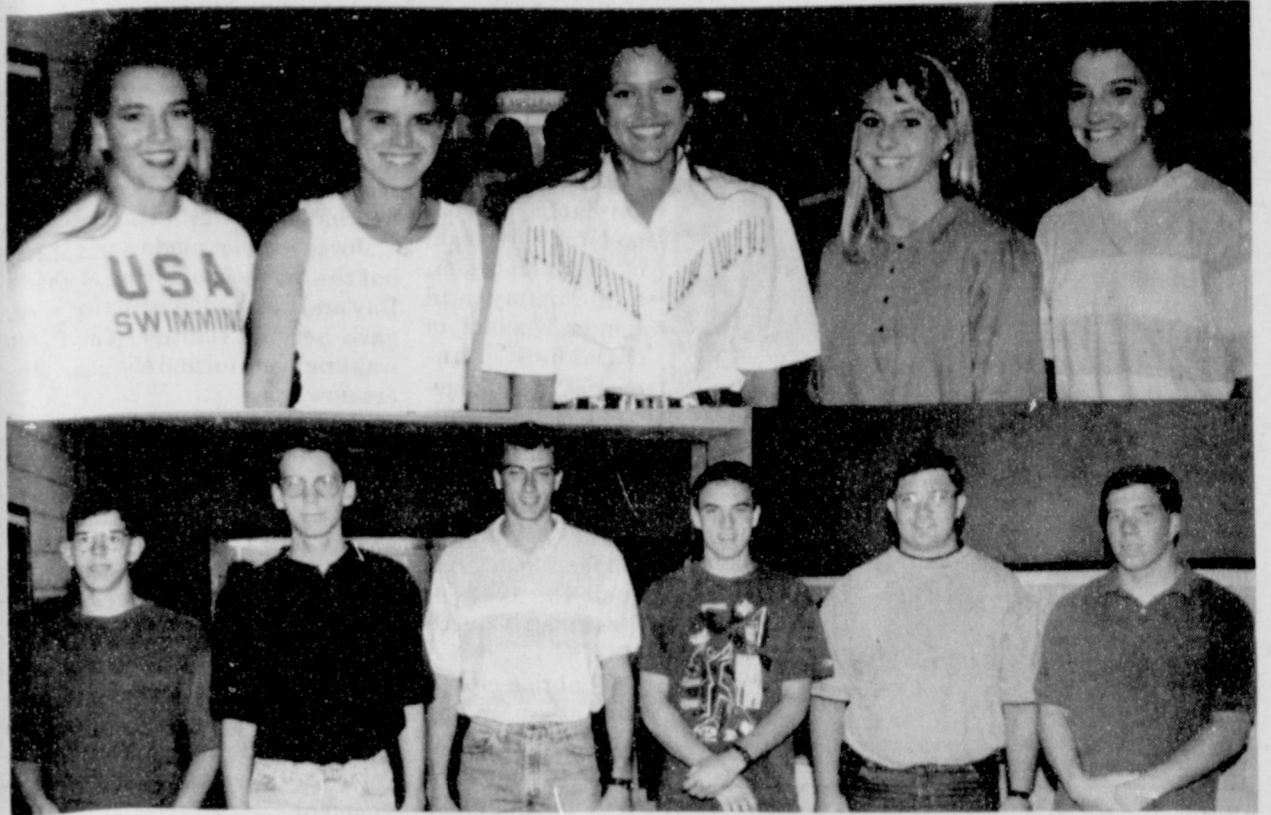
One of the Buchanan's neighbors in Spearman was Marion Ging, Ila Mae's sister. When Ila Mae came to spend a summer with her sister she met J.B. They married in Marion's home in June of 1934. At that time J.B. was working for the Phillips Petroleum Company. During their first year of marriage the couple lived in Borger. After a year they moved to Phillips, Texas. Then in 1949 they moved to 'the farm' which is located approximately 15 miles south of Spearman. Ila Mae explained that the farm is just across the Hutchinson County line.

J.B. continued to work for the Phillips company until 1955. He and Ila Mae had one son, Spearman Mayor Burl Buchanan. Burl married Nellie and they have two chil-

dren, Jana and Roger. Nellie works at the Spearman High School Business office. Their daughter, Jana, lives in Amarillo and teaches school at Tulia. Since J.B.'s retirement three years ago, grandson Roger farms the land.

One of J.B.'s passions throughout his life has been windmills. "He loved windmills from the time he was a little boy," Ila Mae said. She added, "Then as soon as he had time he started looking for them. At first they just give the windmills to him, but then some people started charging for them." 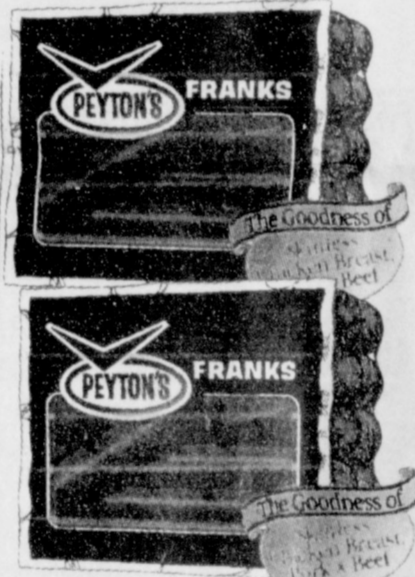

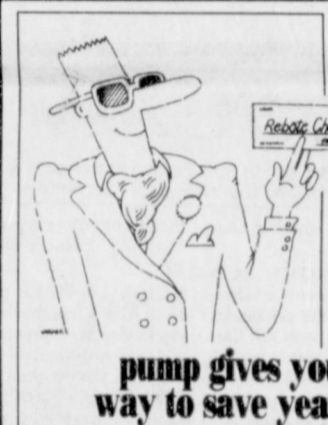

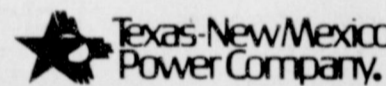
