SISD Board holds monthly meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Spearman Independent School District met in Regular Session on March 9, 1995 in Room #114 of the High School at 7:00 pm.

Officer LaRue, with the Spearman Police Department, requested to use the High School Cafeteria on the evening of March 24th and all day March 25th for a volleyball tournament as a fund raising activity for D.A.R.E.

The Board next moved on to discussing whether to approve or vote down Action Items that have come before the board.

They approved a resolution supporting the production of the Texas Teacher Retirement System.

They approved a resolution to participate in the West Texas Food Service Cooperative.

The Board then approved an exception to Policy FMG for the Senior Trip.

They approved a purchase and installation of a chair lift for the Junior High School, and the Lease-Purchase of three buses.

They discussed and approved the Textbook Committee's recommendation for the adoption of new text-

books for the SISD.

The Board also accepted the gas/diesel quote from Spearman Equity.

The minutes of the meetings from February 13, 1995 and March 6, 1995 were also accepted as written.

The Board also approved the payment of bills totaling \$95,659.73.

The Budget Amendment, produced to reflect a reduction in the amount of funds received from the Pringle-Morse ISD, was also approved.

In addition, each Board member

voted for new directors of the Education Service Center.

After the discussion and approval of the Action Items during the meeting, the Board went on to talk about the Discussion Items on the agenda for this meeting.

Mr. Murrey, SISD Superintendent, reported that bids were being secured on renovation of the High School Auditorium. He also reported that Charles Elliott was getting quotes for possible painting projects at the Elementary School and gym. This information will be presented at the April meeting.

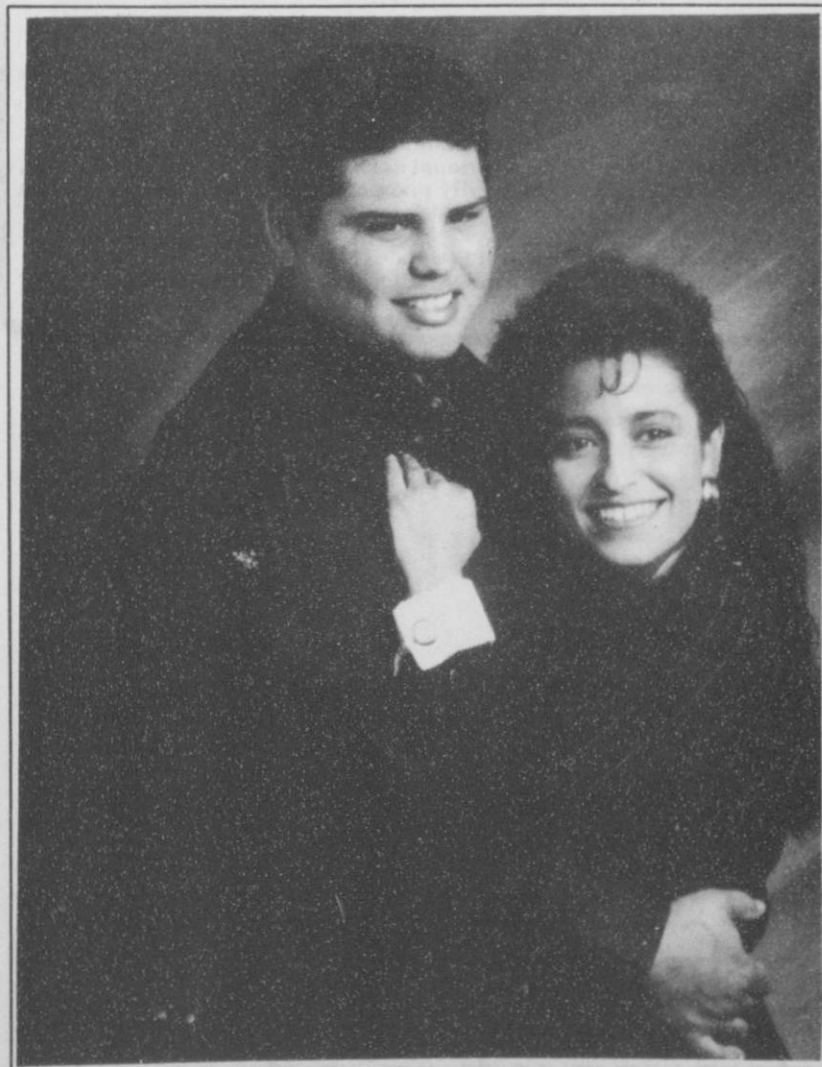
The wedding party and special guests were entertained at a rehearsal dinner at the fellowship hall on the eve of the wedding.

The wedding will be on June 3, 1995 at 3:00 p.m. at Sacred Heart Catholic Church of Spearman.

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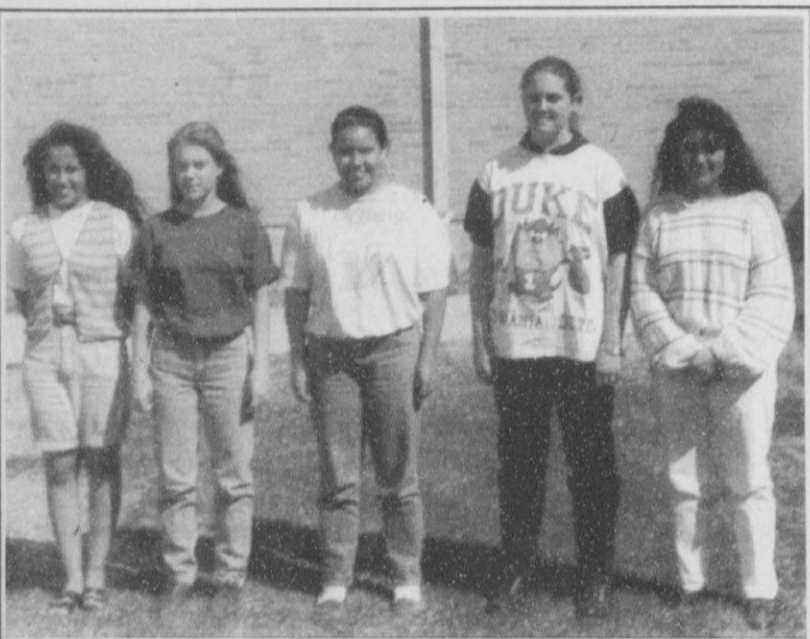

Saturday found a lot of visitors at the lake. Fishermen did well.

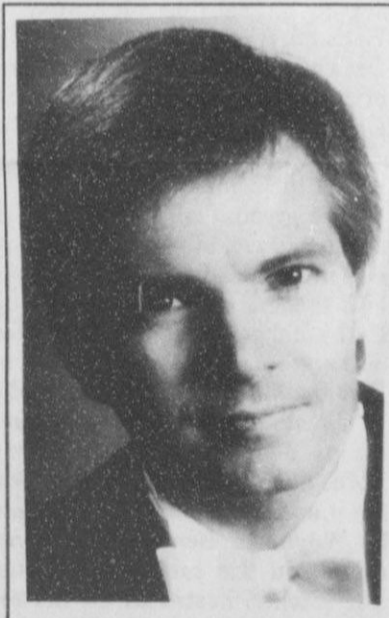

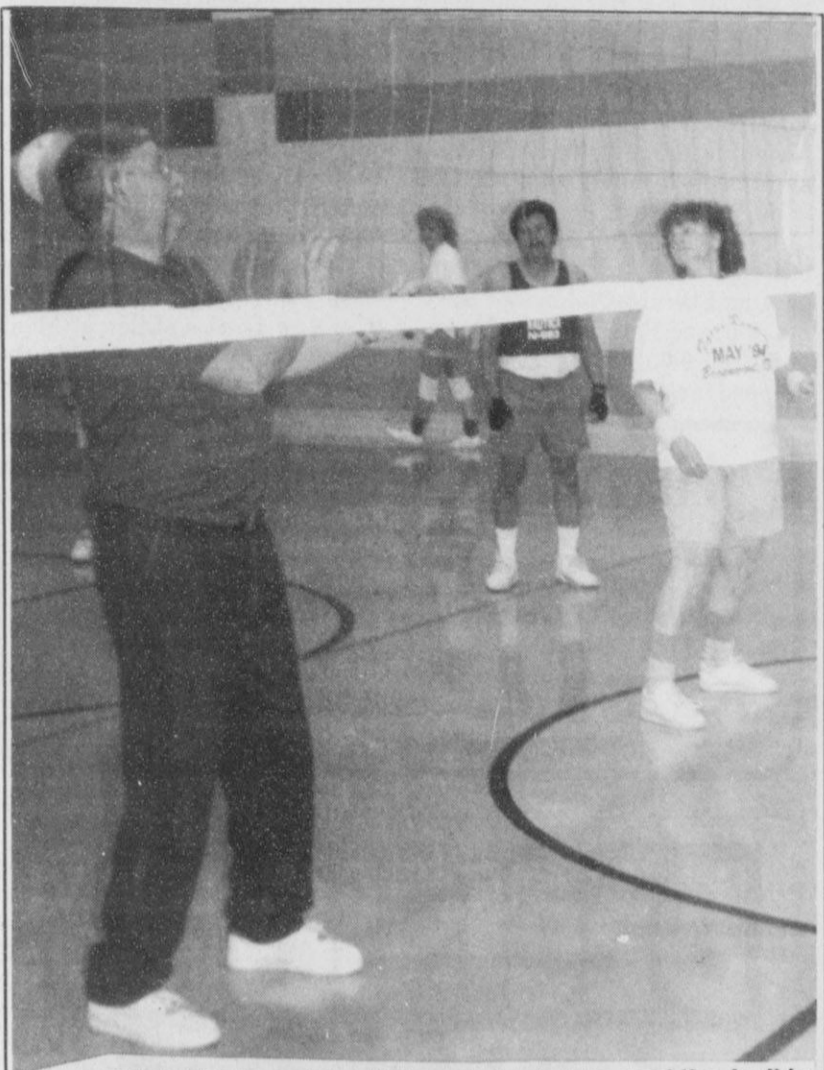
