prices in Texas have risen 3.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.82/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 3.2 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.89/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 27.1 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 23.5 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 18.6 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 26.8 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"The national average has finally showed some signs of slowing down, and gasoline prices in dozens of areas have virtually stabilized after rising for two to three consecutive weeks," said Gas-Buddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "The rally in gasoline prices started in March, we could have dubbed it March Madness, to coincide with the flurry of college basketball games, but as the tournament winds down, gasoline prices too have slowed their increase, and maybe- just maybegasoline prices are closer to a peak than we initially expected," DeHaan said, noting that GasBuddy last week revised it's gasoline price forecast slightly higher.

Texas Crop & Weather

Rain continued to push back the Texas drought, with most of the northeastern, central, southeastern and eastern parts of the state either out of the drought or merely abnormally dry, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor status report of March 27

With soil moisture boosted by frequent rains, and above-average temperatures bringing warm-season grasses out of dormancy many producers were already fertilizing pastures. (Texas AgriLife Extension Service photo by Robert Burns)

But as much as 67 percent of the state remained under one stage of drought or another,

http://agrilife.tamu.edu/drought/ The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors for April 3, 2012: The region had unseasonably warm weather. Soilmoisture levels were from adequate to very short, with most counties reporting short. Wheat was rapidly growing thanks to warmer weather, irrigation and recent rains. Ratings of wheat varied from excellent to very poor, with most areas reporting fair to poor. Farmers continued preparing for spring planting. Rangeland and pastures were very poor to fair condition, with most reporting very poor to poor. Cattle grazing on wheat made excellent gains. However, most cattle on rangeland still required supplemental feeding.







Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

We have experienced the journey of Christ to the cross during our Community Holy Week Services. We now see the com-

pletion of God's extraordinary grace in the resurrection of Jesus The Christ. Truly our hope is built on nothing less than Jesus blood and righteousness as we study Acts 10:34-43, Psalm 118: 102,14-24, 1 Corinthians 15: 1 11, and John 20: 1-18.

Luke shows us the conclusion reached by Peter after his two visions which he announced at his visit to the house of the Roman Centurion, Cornelius. "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him". We may not all agree, as believers, on the proper order of service, on certain matters of doctrine, or the design of our houses of worship; but, we all declare Jesus as Lord. The Good News of the Gospel is that redemption, forgiveness of sins, and eternal life are granted by God to all who believe in Jesus The Christ.

The Psalmist sings a song of individual praise which expands to include others in the chorus of praise. Verse 22 is often quoted as referring to Jesus, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone" God's plan of salvation, begun at creation, comes to fruition in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Truly we can sing with the Psalmist, "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Paul gives the Corinthians a reminder of the Good News! Verses 1-2 tell us why Paul's message should be accepted. Verses 3-4 tell us that Christ died for our sins Verses 5-8 recited the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus, reinforcing the truth that he is alive. Verses 9-10 Itell us what type of apostle Paul is. This message reinforces the Good News.

The gospel of John opens with a scene of creation; then shows Jesus asking some disciples of John, "Whom are you looking for". After the crucifixion, Mary remains alone at the tomb of Jesus. She is weeping. Jesus comes to her and asks, "Who are you looking for?" Mary, mistaking Jesus for a gardener says, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away," Jesus says, "Mary!" Mary then recognizes Jesus and at his instruction goes to tell the disciples, "I have seen the Lord!" Thus, the first bearer of the Good News; the first 'evangelist" was a woman!

So, dear reader, whom are you looking for? May the Holy Spirit enable you to truly see and hear the Good News!

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



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NOTICE OF ELECTION

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Panhandle Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Panhandle Boll Weevil Eradication Zone consists of all of Carson, Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Roberts and Sherman counties.

Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2011 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Panhandle Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton. Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Panhandle Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by April 23, 2012, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by May 8, 2012. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than May 23, 2012, in order to be valid.






