

Retirements mark end of Dry, McFarlin era

Sixty-seven years of service and three decades in the history of Hansford County was honored December 10, with a retirement party honoring Hansford County Tax Assessor/Collector Helen Dry and Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

Over thirty-four years of the county's history was recorded during the tenures of Dry, who took office as the deputy tax assessor collector June 1, 1970, and McFarlin, who took office as sheriff September 24, 1973.

The history of Dry and Mc-Farlin have many parallels. Both began their service in the same office when the Hansford County Tax Assessor/Collector and

Hansford Sheriff's office were one. Although Dry began work when J.B. Cook headed the office, she and McFarlin's paths crossed when McFarlin was appointed sheriff three days after the death of Cook.

After taking office, McFarlin soon realized the months of January-May were so time-consuming in the pursuit of tax assessment and collection that law enforcement suffered. Using a state

were purchased in the mid 90's.

law that gave sheriffs the right to call for an election to split the two offices, McFarlin was able to bring

the issue before the voters. "Many thought the measure would not pass," McFarlin stated. "When the November election came around, the issue passed by a 5-1 margin."

With the two offices separated, Dry became the first tax assessor/collector and McFarlin the first sheriff, serving exclusively in those positions.

Through their years of public service, both Dry and McFarlin have noted changes in their offices. Dry especially remembers the the busy time of license plate

"All license plates used to expire March 31, of every year," Dry said. "The last two weeks of March and the first week of April were nightmares with everyone in the county needing new plates at the same

Since the metal license plates came in 25-pound boxes, Dry essentially became a weight lifter each year during the spring ritual.

Voter registration handled by the office has also changed.

R.L. McFarlin was served as Hansford County Sheriff for 31 years.

his tenure as Hansford County Sheriff upon his retirement. It was one

"Everyone had to register every year to vote," Dry said. "Now registration is renewed every two years, unless the voter has moved or had a change of address."

In 2004, the Hansford County heriff was honored with the Texas Peacemaker Award, which ecognizes a law enforcement professional that has exemplified an extraordinary devotion to the public good and community throughout a lifetime of public service.

"The junk yard case is certainly one I remember.' McFarlin said. "We received word of two brothers who had supposedly murdered a man and were going to dispose of the body by putting it in a car and crushing the car."

"We went to the junk yard expecting to encounter armed murderers seeking to destroy evidence.

The sheriff's office and law Instead we found the suspects, who were unable to get the crusher to work, passed out from drinking in a car,' McFarlin said.

Other cases held more humor than danger and give insight to the range of duties of a local law enforcement officer.

"I received a call from a man telling me he was dying,' McFarlin Officers now undergo extensive said. "Upon arrival at his home, he showed me 'pure blood' that he had passed."

While assisting the man to the patrol car, McFarlin noticed a large bottle of vanilla extract sitting next to a large bottle of red food color-

"The man was about to pass out in my car before I suggested to him that he had probably partaken of the red food coloring instead of the vanilla extract," McFarlin said, noting that vanilla extract was sometimes drunk for the alcoholic content. "Upon on hearing the suggestion, the man showed immediate improvement."

With their retirement effective December 31, 2004, both Dry and McFarlin end an era of Hansford County history, which is now one for the books.







Johnson. Features of the business include: pharmacy with 24-hour service, old-fashioned soda fountain serving breakfast and lunch, a large gift department and bridal registry, and a Fuji photo processing lab with inhouse film processing providing complete photo finishing services.





"Jeff's numbers might not jump out at you, because we're pretty much a ground team," Spearman Lynx Coach Ric Smith said. "But it's not that he doesn't have the ability to catch the ball. It's just that we run the ball for about 380 yards a game. He really has good hands and good speed. When you look at our offense, you know we ask him to block a lot, and he's an excellent blocker. Considering the number of catching opportunities he had, he was very successful. He has great endurance and stamina, and he's a very tough player. At a small, 2A school like ours, he's one of those guys who plays offense, defense and special teams. I'd send him out there for the opening kickoff and never see him again (on the sideline) for the rest of the game.

"I've learned not to underestimate what Jeff can do," continued Coach Smith. "He's an outstanding player and an outstanding young man -- he's also No. 1 (academically) in his class. He's been great for us. And I think he'll fit in great at SMU. The coaches really stress high moral character, being good on and off the field, high academics He'll be a guy the school can be proud of and a guy the fans can be proud of."

"We signed two tight ends in this class," said Phil Bennett, SMU head coach. "Mario Walker is a guy from Marshall, Texas, who was first-team all-state. He's a great receiving tight end -- he's got great hands. He's not as big as some 'bruising' tight ends, but he's a better-than-average blocker. He's not that big, but he gets in your way real well.

"Jeff Brock is from Spearman, in west Texas. He's a big guy who's going to keep growing. He's got a chance to grow a lot, maybe grow into a guy like (current SMU tight end) Ryan Kennedy (who's 6'5" and 265). Jeff is a good athlete who also played defensive end for his school -- a lot of guys at small schools play both ways -- but we like him at tight end. He has very soft hands. His team only completed 30 passes, but he caught 19 of them, and took five of them in for touchdowns."

"I don't know exactly what will happen next year," Brock said. "But if they redshirt me, sometimes it's a good thing to get a year to get stronger and faster, and to get used to the changing speed of the game. But I'm going to work hard, and I'll be ready if they decide to use me."

The Mustangs finished 3-8 last season, 3-5 in the Western Athletic Conference. They will move to Conference USA beginning with the 2005-06 school year.

Jeff is the son of Kim and Stephanie Brock of Spearman and the grandson of Mary and J.L. Brock of Spearman and Mr. and Mrs. Dave Warren of Dallas.

He was named 7-AA All-District first team offensive tight end and first team defensive end. He was also named to the 2A Region I first team Academic All-State team. (The criteria to be nominated are: (1) 92 GPA for grades 9-11 and 1st six weeks of Grade 12. (2) Member of team in good standing. (3) Must be a senior (4) Must be of good moral character. Once they meet criteria, THSCA uses GPA, class rank and SAT/ACT scores for team placement.)

Jeff is the youngest of four, and the fourth to receive a college scholarship in athletics. His sister, Janna, earned a swimming scholarship to Nebraska and Jeff's older brothers Jordan and John each played college football - Jordan at Abilene Christian and John at Rice before transferring to Abilene Christian prior to the 2004 season.




