## Vote count finalized

The April 10 primary runoff election's votes were canvassed Friday, April 13 by Democratic and Republican party officials in Hansford County.

All unofficial tabulations previously reported are now official, with the exception of the number of votes cast in the county's Democratic Party's Justice of the Peace runoff.

The final canvass shows Democratic candidate for Justice of the Peace Johnny P. Vernon received a total of 457 votes. His opponent, Michele Davis, received 498 votes to win the party's nomination for the November 6 ballot.

As computerized voting totals demonstrate, 30.5 percent of Hansford County's voters, or a total of 1,038 people, turned out to

cast their ballots in last week's primary runoff. In the most hotly contested of the state nominations, this county's Democratic voters overwhelmingly favored gubernatorial candidate Jim Mattox over Ann Richards, with 592 votes (or 69 percent) for Mattox to Richards' 264 votes (or 31 percent.)

This did not prevent Richards' gaining the party's nomination for governor by a definite margin, however.

Absentee voting was strong, both statewide in general and in Hansford County's Democratic runoff in particular, due to recent changes in the law. A total of 124 (or 15 percent) voted by absentee ballot in the Democratic primary runoff here. In the Vernon-Davis contest, 68 voted for Vernon by

absentee ballot and 55 voted for Davis by absentee ballot, for a combined total of 13 percent voting absentee.

The Republican primary runoff turnout was light, probably because there was no local race, according to local officials.

The precinct with the greatest voter turnout in the combined (Republican and Democratic) primary runoffs was Precinct 6, with 41 percent, followed closely by Precinct 1, with 38 percent. Voters in Precinct 1 vote at the Hansford County Courthouse and those in Precinct 6 vote at Spearman High School.

A precise breakdown of all primary runoff results is available at the County Clerk's office at the county courthouse.

## Purchases local insurance

At their April 10 regular meeting, Spearman City Council members voted to purchase property and liability insurance, voted to purchase a pickup for the city's utilities department, and awarded a contract for the 1990 sealcoat and fog sealing at the airport.

Kim Brock of Brock Insurance Agency, Ronnie Hudson and Kevin Maybis of Texas Employers and Daisy Palmer of TML Inter-governmental Risk Pool attended the council meeting to answer questions concerning property and liability insurance coverage from May 1, 1990 through April

30, 1991.

After discussion the council voted to award a contract to Brock Insurance to provide the city's gas utility, general liability, police liability, errors and omissions liability, auto liability and physical damage coverage. TML will provide the real personal property coverage, including the data processing equipment, valuable papers, EDP media, extra expense and mobile equipment coverage.

Council members approved the contracts after a recommendation by Bill Stephens of Stephens

Management Consultants Inc., the city's consultant on evaluating the insurance bids.

Bids were received on a small size long wheelbase pickup for the utilities department, and the council discussed the type of service the low bidder would provide since the service department is in Perryton. After discussion, the council voted to award the purchase contract to the second low bidder, Crawford Motors of Spearman, because their bid seemed to be the most

## Discipleship event continues

One hundred fifty area teens will meet in 12 small groups for 30 hours in Spearman beginning Friday, April 27. They and their small-group leaders are part of "thirtysomething II: The Discipleship Event Continues."

This 30-hour Christian program had its inception just over one year ago in Spearman when three local church youth directors and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes' sponsor perceived a need for basic Christian education for their organizations' teenagers.

Gary Ellsworth, youth minister at First Christian Church, and Scott Taylor, youth minister at

First United Baptist Church, have combined energies, resources and forces to plan and implement "thirtysomething II," this year's similar event. This time around, the program is being expanded to accommodate more teens from a wider area, including Gruver, Perryton and Dumas.

"Spearman is becoming a focal point for youth discipleship," commented Taylor, "and we hope that it will really blossom after this year." He said the curriculum will be the same as last year for seventh graders, since they come to the event as new participants, but the learning sessions for eighth graders through 12th grad-

ers are not a repeat of last year.

Called "Back to Basics: Basic Christian Discipleship" and "Growing in Godliness," the interdenominational lessons were written by Billy Beacham of Fort Worth. For eighth graders and up,

the purpose of the seminar, as described in the curriculum itself, is to help students: 1) Understand the seriousness of moral impurity; 2) Accept God's love and forgiveness; 3) Maintain personal holiness; and 4) Develop a deeper walk with God.

Taylor said the purpose of the seventh grade curriculum is to establish a beginning point for youths' understanding of basic Christian discipleship. The main focus of the sessions is establishing quiet times and eventually working toward lifestyle evangelism.

Participants of "thirtysomething II" will meet in local sponsor homes for six sessions to study and answer such questions as "What is Godliness?" and discuss such topics as dating and personal integrity. They will be led in their studies by a small-group leader.

Ellsworth said this year's 12 small-group leaders include Steve Donnell, former youth director of Spearman's First United Methodist Church and current youth minister in Pampa. The three members of the Christian band "Gabriel" will also teach small groups. (Gabriel will also perform at the "thirtysomething II Main Event" on Saturday night in the Lyric Theatre.)

Other small-group leaders include the youth directors from First Christian Church in Perryton, First United Methodist Church in Andrews, Texas, and Borger, and First Baptist Church in Lampasas, Texas and Canadian. "thirtysomething II" will also feature a Baptist college

donations. Students' registration fee of \$15 is just enough to cover the expenses of each individual's curriculum kit and a special "thirtysomething II" t-shirt. Meals are being provided to the small groups through local church members, who can sign up to provide one item of a meal as part of a Food Team. "Last year, 129 ladies helped with this!" said Taylor.

Taylor reports that this year's expenses for the event include teaching supplies, honorariums to be paid to small-group leaders, fees for the band "Gabriel" and filming and photography expenses. Ellsworth added, "But we have cut our costs dramatically this year - from \$8,000 last year to \$6,700 - and this while we are expanding the program!"

Ellsworth and Taylor reported that the Fellowship of Christian Athletes is sponsoring a car wash on Saturday, April 21 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to benefit "thirtysomething II." Taylor explained, "The kids get sponsors for so much money per car, then anyone who wants the exterior of his car washed can bring it to the old Co-op (across from Crazy Corners) to get it washed for free." He said the group hopes to wash enough cars to raise the \$3,000 "thirtysomething II" is now short.

Taylor and Ellsworth are still taking the names of teens who want to participate in "thirtysomething II" through Monday, April 23. Registration forms are available at local churches and at the schools.

## Causes teens to change

When asked to reflect on the effects last year's first "thirtysomething" program had on local teenagers and others, Scott Taylor and Gary Ellsworth responded enthusiastically.

"We've been hearing from parents consistently that their teens showed a change of heart and attitude at home after the first 'thirtysomething,'" Taylor said. "In some cases, the changes were just dumbfounding!" He added that parents still report their teenagers are keeping up with their "quiet time." Teaching how to do "quiet time" was an integral part of the program.

Ellsworth said that high school teachers reported themselves amazed at the change in the youth who attended last year's "thirty-

spring grew through sharing and forged many new strong friendships, Ellsworth said, particularly friendships with teens from other churches. "Kids who saw each other on Monday through Friday every week at school but went to different churches on Sunday shared their common faith at 'thirtysomething' and that broke down a lot of walls," he explained.

Taylor credits the nondenominational, inspirational curriculum for this sharing. "This curriculum elicits a lot of positive participation and well-thought-out responses in a relaxed, home setting," he said. "The kids didn't have to hide their Christianity any more, and expressed it fully and freely!"

something." He explained that the teachers saw new leadership among those who completed the discipleship event. This in turn seemed to have a positive effect on other high school students. One example, according to Ellsworth, was that one teacher realized she was no longer hearing "cussing" in the school corridors.

Even area ministers reported positive changes back to Taylor and Ellsworth after last year's event, the two leaders said. "There are ministers who have seen kids' characters literally transformed by the principles they learned through 'thirtysomething,'" Taylor commented.

The young people who participated in "thirtysomething" last

group leaders benefitted from the program as well, as they are quick to point out. Taylor discovered a sensitivity toward spiritual things on the part of the youth that he had never before seen. "In casual conversation, the youth seem almost callous about spiritual things," he said, "but 'thirtysomething' broke through that veneer and the kids showed that they have very strong convictions." He was very encouraged in his own youth ministry work by this revelation.

Ellsworth said this same discovery facilitated his job as a youth minister. "After 'thirtysomething' it was a lot easier to go

## Place at roundup

Hansford County 4-H members Leslie Latta and Randi Renner took second place honors in the Senior Division of Farm and Ranch Economics at the recent District 4-H Roundup.

The event was held March 31 in Borger, when high plains 4-Hers from 15 of the 20 counties in Extension Panhandle District 1 qualified to compete in the State 4-H Roundup at College Station June 4-7.

In the Share the Fun category, the Hansford County 4-H team of Shane Harnish, Karla Kunselman, Traci Scribner and Stacy Gardiner took fourth place in the Senior division.

About 243 boys and girls competed in the one-day event which included 41 contests. Winners received their awards in ceremonies at the Borger Community Activity Center at Frank Phillips Jr. College in Borger.

Deaf Smith and Randall county 4-Hers captured the most qualifying wins of any county with 9 teams and/or individual senior wins. Gray County had five wins, and Hemphill and Dallam counties had four wins. Moore County had three qualifying wins; and Carson, Lipscomb, and Potter counties had two wins each. Other counties taking a portion of senior division

honors include: Hansford, Hartley and Sherman counties with one win.

To qualify for the state contests, a team or individual must have a first or second place win in the senior division, which is for the 14 year old and older. Juniors do not compete beyond the district level.

Dallam, Deaf Smith, and Oldham counties each had eight wins, which captured the most wins of any county in the junior division. Other counties with first and second place junior wins were Moore and Randall with four wins each; Gray, Hemphill, and Hutchinson with three wins each; Lipscomb with two wins; and Hartley and Potter with one win each.

Meat judging, Dairy Cattle and Soil Judging were held on March 30. The Consumer Decision Making Contest was held on April 7, Range and Pasture Grass on April 21; and livestock judging, Horse Judging and Rifle contests are set for April 28.

Ribbons were presented at an awards assembly which followed the contests, except for the contests held on March 30, which were presented at the contest sites. Awards for contests to be held on April 7, 21, and 28 will also be presented at the contest sites.

New figures from the U.S. Bureau of the Census reveal that what people earn is a direct reflection of how much education they have obtained. The median annual income for all individuals 18 years of age and older working year round in 1987 includes: less than 8th grade, \$6,214; 8th grade, \$7,183; high school dropout, \$7,914; high school graduate, \$12,040; some college, \$14,554; college graduate, \$22,381; and college plus, \$30,606.

Median income means that half of the workers earn less than that amount and half earn more. The figures make it clear that the more education a person has, the greater his or her earning capacity. Although there are likely to be exceptions, most high school dropouts cannot expect to earn what college graduates do.

Young people who are disenchanted with school and wait impatiently for the day when they can leave may think that the money they will earn will buy a

fantastic lifestyle. That is because compared to zero earnings, anything sounds good. The fact is, meeting basic needs costs money. Financing an imagined lifestyle is even more costly.

If a person earns the median income for high school dropouts, he/she will earn \$7,914 per year, or \$659.50 a month before taxes, with apartment rentals and utilities to pay, car payments and insurance costs to cover, very little money will be left over for the essentials of living.

### Water Ways

Water is not mentioned in the USDA Dietary guidelines, the American Heart Association Guidelines nor the American Cancer Society Guidelines. However, water is as important to your health and well-being as the food you eat. Here are some water facts:

The human body contains 40-50 quarts of water.

2-3 quarts of water are lost daily through perspiration, urine and breathing and must be replaced.

As little as a 3-percent reduction of your body weight due to water loss can affect your strength and endurance.

A 15-20 percent water loss can be fatal.

Additionally, water performs many important functions in the body. Water quenches your thirst and helps the digestive process. Water, in the form of perspiration, sets up a self-cooling system for you during exercise. It carries nutrients to the cells and removes waste products. A healthy complexion depends on a water-enhanced skin tone. Joints are lubricated by water.

On the curative side, water can often help relieve headaches and decrease premenstrual bloating. And, for those who wish to maintain or lose weight, drinking large glasses of water during the day and right before meals can help you curb your appetite and avoid impluse snacking. Alcoholic beverage consumption, which should always be in moderation, should include other liquids to dilute the effect of alcohol.

Nutritionists continue to advise everyone to drink six to eight glasses of liquid a day, and they mean water. Caffeine- or alcohol-containing beverages are not recommended because they are diuretics that will act to remove water from your body. Other drinks such as regular soft drinks and milk shakes are not recommended in excess because of their high caloric count.

It is important to increase your fluid consumption in situations that stress the body like exercise, fever, infections or even travel to high altitudes. Don't rely on thirst to tell you when your water level is low. Drink fluids before, during and after exercise. If you are ill or have traveled to a higher altitude than your body is accustomed to, drink at least 2 glasses of water a day more than usual.

Drinking sufficient water will help you look and feel your best. Remember not to neglect water as an integral component of your dietary plans and practices.

Last week, the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, Tom Foley of Washington, announced the appointment of a special task force of House members to determine the type of assistance the new democracies in Eastern Europe will need to successfully establish their parliaments. I was very gratified to be named to be the Chairman of the Task Force.

Specifically named the Special Task Force on the Development of Parliamentary Institutions in Eastern Europe, the group will consist of three Democratic Members of Congress and two Republican Members of Congress. The other members of the Task Force are: Congressmen Dough Bosco (D-Calif.), Bart Gordon (D-Tenn.) Jim Leach (R-Iowa), and Gerald Solomon (R-NY).

The citizens of Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Bulgaria, and other nations have struggled under Communist domination for more than forty years, during which time we have constantly reminded them of what life was like outside of the "Iron Curtain", and in essence, we urged them to continue their struggle for freedom -- to continue their struggle for democracy.

Too many times, as in the case of the Russian supression of Hungary and Czechoslovakia, the United States has done far too little to support the democratic spirit of these nations, even after hearing the direct calls from these nations asking for our help.

We cannot allow these nations to go much longer with helping them to establish their parliaments -- and that is precisely the reason Speaker Foley appointed

the Special Task Force on the Development of Parliamentary Institutions in Eastern Europe.

It will be our goal to meet with the leaders of these nations -- to ask them how we can assist them in adopting a democratic legislative operation. We will not attempt to impose any form of government on them, nor will we--in any way-- attempt to establish U.S. policy toward these countries.

For more than two hundred years, the United States has maintained the most stable form of elected government on Earth. Our House of Representatives has developed rules of debate, amendment on Earth. Our House of Representatives has developed rules of debate, amendment procedures, and voting procedures that could go a long way toward helping Eastern European nations to cut their "learning time" to a large extent.

We can advise them on what types of equipment might facilitate their legislative process -- and perhaps advise them of sources for obtaining such equipment.

But it is important to keep in mind that we want to help them in ways of interest to them. We will not start with any preconceived notions as to what these nations need; but, it is important to confer with them soon, and the sooner the better, as I am sure the Communists are eyeing these countries in the hope that they fail.

As Chairman of the new Task Force, we are dedicated to their success--in the way the people of the nations choose to succeed. I look forward to the challenge of taking America's message of support to them.

Others on the program included Roxanne Holt and Mary Dawn Henson; Janet Irwin introduced the Hymn of the Month, which




to write down some poignant thoughts about Christianity in their lives, as they have ministered to many people over the years, and their individual thoughts would be extremely interesting. I hope it happens.

And if her sister had never found her poetry after Emily's death, we might never have known her. . .

As some of you no doubt know, I have been fascinated by things

Japanese for many years now. One of my favorite weekly television programs is *This Week in Japan* on CNN every Saturday night at 8:30. The Japanese baseball season is now starting, of course, and I was fortunate enough to see three games in Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo and one in Jingu Stadium, and I saw the great Sadaharu Oh of the Yomiuri Giants hit a homer for the Giants in 1972. Oh surpassed Hank Aaron as the greatest home run hitter of all time, in the mid-late 1970's. The thing about Japanese baseball of greatest interest to me is the large number of female fans present at many of the games. And many times, they come unaccompanied. Even the public address announcers are female.

Can you imagine ladies coming unaccompanied to games in Chicago or in New York???

The truth about Katyn Forest in the U.S.S.R. is now out, though it has been suspected for all of the 30 years since the 1940 massacre of 15000 Polish soldiers there. ## GJHS girls sweep district

The Gruver 7th and 8th grade girls track teams each garnered a first place finish at the District 1-A track meet held April 6-7 at White Deer.

For the 8th grade girls it was an especially sweet accomplishment, as they had only nine girls competing in the event and still took first place with 119 points.

Looking at the 8th grade district champs first, in the 400 meter relay Gruver took third place with a time of 55.4 seconds. That was Anissa Ryan, Gina Hoel, Sara Jones and Wynn Maupin. In the 100 meter low hurdles, Mika McLain took second place with a time of 18.7 seconds. And in the 800 meter run, Gruver had two competitors: Tammie Stevens placed fifth and Melissa Stewart placed seventh.

The 400 meter dash saw Traci Smith finish fourth at 76.0, and Andee Salmans place fifth at 77.1. In the 300 meter low hurdles, Mika McLain competed. In the 200 meter dash, Stevens finished third at 30.4, and in the 1200 meter run, Stewart finished sixth at 5:22.

The 800 meter relay finished second at 1:59.5. That was Ryan, Hoel, Jones and Maupin. The 1600 meter relay took first place honors at 4:37.2. That was McLain, Hoel, Ryan and Maupin.

In the field events, Ryan placed fourth in the shot put with a heave

of 27-5, and Sara Jones sixth with a toss of 26-8. In the triple jump, Wynn Maupin really excels. Last week at Miami she jumped 33-6 1/2, her best on the season. This week she took first with a distance of 32-11. Salmans took fourth with a distance of 28-5 1/4. In the long jump, again it was McLain, this time finishing fourth with a distance of 13-2, and in the high jump, Gruver had three competitors: Maupin first at 4-10, McLain second at 4-8, and Hoel third at 4-6.

For the 7th grade, it was first place with 242 points. In the 400 meter relay, Gruver finished first with a time of 56.1 seconds. That was Wendy Rodriguez, Monica Garcia, Kimbo Wagner and Julie Meyer. In the 100 meter low hurdles, Angela Overbey finished second at 19.8 seconds, Garcia third at 19.9, and Monica Magallanes fourth at 20.2. And in the 800 meter run it was Janyth Hart second at 2:57, Gloria Moreno fourth at 3:04, and Tracy Robinson fifth at 3:08.

In the 100 meter dash Overbey finished second at 14.2, Wagner fifth at 14.5, and Jona Boney ran a 16.5. In the 400 meter dash, Meyer finished first at 68.1, Rodriguez second at 68.12, and Lacy Barkley third at 71.8. And in

the 200 meter low hurdles, Garcia finished first at 36.0, Overbey second at 37.5, and Magallanes third at 38.6.

The 200 meter dash saw Tisha Ralston finish second, with a time of 32.3, Kayce Haenisch third at 32.4, and Wagner fourth at 32.8. In the 1200 meter run, Hart finished second at 4:50, Hilda Moreno fourth at 5:06, and Carmen Ortega seventh at 5:18.

In the 800 meter relay, Gruver took first place with a time of 2:02. That was Ralston, Barkley, Haenisch and Kim Venneman. The 1600 meter relay team of Venneman, Rodriguez, Barkley, and Meyer also finished first with a time of 4:43.

In the field events, Barkley placed third in the shot put with a heave of 26-3, and Gruver had three competitors in the discus throw: Ralston took first place with a distance of 56', Ortega second at 55-6, and Shawnae Robinson fourth at 53'. In the triple jump, Meyer finished first at 29-9, and Rodriguez second at 29-8 3/4.

In the long jump, it was Rodriguez for second place at 14', and Meyer in fourth place at 13-8. And in the high jump, it was Overbey third at 4-2, and Venneman fifth at 4'.

# House passes education bill

 Monday night, April 9th the House passed an education bill, such as it is called. They say the funding part will cost \$450 million the first year. However, others quote a much higher price tag of \$600 million while still others do not know the exact figure. This was slightly scary to vote on something and not know the exact amount of money we were talking about. Therefore, among other reasons, I voted against the bill. I do know we must get something to conference committee, but I would have preferred to start with a different bill.

Senate and they refused to concur with our changes. A conference committee was appointed with five members from the House and five from the Senate. Unless the conference committee receives permission from both bodies, the conference committee may not venture from the boundaries of the two bills they are trying to reach a compromise upon.

The governance of the House bill mainly consists of an appointed Commissioner of Education by the Governor from the recommendation of the Legislative Education Board (L.E.B.) which is a new bureaucracy the bill creates. The L.E.B. would have the authority to circumvent the elected State Board of Education. The L.E.B. consists of the Speaker of the House, the Lt. Governor, and designated members of the House and Senate. This is just what the state needs - another bureaucracy to handle education! I do not understand why we can not turn education back to our local boards and let our teachers go back to teaching instead of testing. Again, Austin is painting all of us with the same brush. Our schools in the

Panhandle are considerably better than those down state but we all have to be under the same governance of this bill.

The Governor has promised to veto a tax bill. Therefore, one of the ways this may be funded out of the present system is by lowering the state's contribution to the teacher retirement fund. I really do not think we should be doing that, so another reason I voted no. I have said that if they will do meaningful reform I will look at a finance bill - I do not call what we have done so far meaningful reform.

I tried again to do away with the Career Ladder and designate that money to teacher salaries to be distributed by the local school districts. I lost the effort by six votes with the Speaker against me. We were able to place an amendment on the bill calling for no state mandates without funding.

River authority meets

Tax exemptions, a gas gathering system and archaeology were among agenda items at the April 10 regular meeting of the Palo Duro River Authority.

Other business included reading of minutes of the PDRA's previous meeting; hearing the treasurer's report; and consideration and payment of claims, along with general discussion of the project.

The PDRA, as a taxing entity, set tax exemptions at \$50,000 for disabled persons receiving Social Security benefits; \$50,000 for persons age 65 and over; and for disabled veterans. Homestead exemptions at five percent are

\$5,000. Exemptions were approved for non-commercial vehicles, as were exemptions allowed by the State of Texas.

The PDRA is asking Maxus Exploration to move pipeline, part of the company's gas gathering system, from the bottom of the reservoir location. At the April 10 meeting, the PDRA approved a proposal from Maxus which involves moving the pipeline at an estimated cost of \$152,600.

PDRA members approved an archaeology mitigation contract with Mariah Associates Inc. Mariah will begin a two-month project in May which involves digging at selected sites in the area for investigation.

to youth group and do Bible lessons instead of just trying to entertain my kids," he said, "because I found out they really were serious about their walk with the Lord." advantageous to the city. The pickup bid was in the amount of \$8,876.75.

Dwight L. Brandt, consulting engineer on the 1990 sealcoat and fog sealing projects recommended that the council award a contract to Appian Corporation of Hereford for both the sealcoating of the city streets and the fog sealing of the municipal airport. Appian Corporation, the low bidder, will perform the sealcoat at a cost of \$0.453 per square yard and up to a total of \$49,500. The company will fog seal areas of the airport in the amount of \$0.10 per square yard.

Other business for the council concerned the Hansford County Activity Center. Council members voted to enter into a contract with the activity center for the operation of the municipal swimming pool for the 1990 season, and approved an amended lease agreement with the activity center. The amended lease agreement will delete the requirement for property insurance on the building.

Kim Brock, coach of the Spearman Swim Club, requested financial aid for the club from the city, but after discussion withdrew his request. No action was taken by the council.

The council adopted a resolution designating a depository for

city funds and designating First National Bank officials to conduct business for the City of Spearman.


Joe Raper, director of public safety, gave the council a short report on a proposed membership drive for the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department, saying that response has not been good in gaining new members from the few businesses that he had contacted.

Regular council business included approval of minutes from the March 13 meeting; approval of monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports; approval of the revenue and expense report for February; and approval of monthly bills payable in the amount of \$109,285.93.


