Jean Wood, owner of Floral Expressions in Amarillo, will demonstrate "Patio Pizzaz" followed by Lou Anne Causey of Irwin Greenhouses, who will recommend modern patio and backyard decorating with European Gardens and Mixed

Judy Spurlock, an experienced Extension certified Master Gardener, will do the final

presentation of the afternoon on the popular concept of xeroscaping featuring quality landscaping that conserves water and protects the environment.

Spearman's rate order for the \$15 million reduction was suspended until a review is made of the company's rate filing package scheduled to be filed with the city on April 16, 1997;

however, the rates are in effect as of March 6 and refunds or adjustments would be made.

"The costs of electric generation are declining quickly today, and costs to consumers should be coming down," said Iim Boyle, an Austin utility attorney who represents the City of Spearman. "It's time for SPS to have reasonable rates on Main Street instead of sending excessive profits to Wall Street.'

# 15th CRP Sign-Up Slated

The 15th Conservation Reserve Program sign-up will be March 3rd through March 28th. FSA (formerly ASCS) will be sending out a newsletter with details about eligibility requirements. FSA and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) are working together to provide assistance to interested individuals.

The eligibility requirements are site specific for every farm. Rental rates are based on soil productivity, land value, and cropping history. Bid caps will be made for each county, but are not known at this time.

According to both FSA and NRCS, priority areas have been designated at the national level and within each state to better address conservation and environmental issues in a planned and coordinated manner. Priority areas in Texas include all of Bexar, Callahan, Deaf Smith, Fisher, Floyd, Garza, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Medina, Nolan, Randall, Scurry, Stonewall, Swisher, Taylor, Uvalde, and portions of Armstrong, Borden, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Crosby, Dickens, Gray, Hale, Hutchinson, Lubbock, Motley, Oldham, Parmer, Potter and Roberts counties.

Land enrolled into a CRP high priority area does not have to meet any other land eligibility criteria. Enrollment in a CRP high priority area, however, does not mean a producer will automatically be accepted into the program. Other requirements must still be met before an application is accepted.

The 15th CRP-sign up also considers environmental benefits such as the protection of wildlife habitat, wetlands, and streams. Locations are site specific and must meet specific criteria to be approved.

FSA and NRCS are working closely together to make the 15th CRP sign-up as easy as possible for producers in Hansford County. Interested persons should call the FSA office in Spearman for an appointment at telephone number (806)659-3036. The telephone number for the NRCS office in Spearman is (806)659-2330.





# Focus On The Family

OUESTION: My little girl is sometimes sugarsweet, and other times she is unbearably irritating. How can I get her out of a bad mood when she has not really done anything to deserve punishment?

DR. DOBSON: I would suggest that you take her in your arms and talk to her in this manner: "I don't know whether you've noticed it or not, but you have two personalities.' A personality is a way of acting and talking and behaving. One of your personalities is sweet and loving. No one could possibly be more lovable and happy when this personality is in control. It likes to work and look for ways to make the rest of the family happy.

'And all you have to do is press a little red button, 'ding,' and out comes the other personality. It is cranky and noisy and silly. It wants to fight with your brother and disobey your mom. It gets up grouchy in the morning and complains throughout the day.

"Now, I know that you can press the button for the neat personality or you can call up the mean one. Sometimes it takes some punishment to make you press the right button. If you keep on pressing the wrong one, like you have been today, then I'm going to make you uncomfortable, one way or the other. I'm tired of that cranky character, and I want to see the grinny one. Can we make a deal?'

.When discipline becomes a game, as in a conversation such as this, then you've achieved your purpose without conflict and animosity.

The city was under curfew and the National Guard had been called in to stop the widespread looting. The store owners were carrying weapons for the protection of themselves and their businesses.

Both of Juanita's adult granddaughters work in Lexington and they had been unable to return home up to that time. The other granddaughters, twins in high school, were at home as the schools were closed.

Juanita spoke with Robbie again on Monday and learned that part of the water system had been restored; the water had receded from the city pavements. The pavements covered in deep

nud resembled muddy, rutted rural roads. The schools had not reopened. All the population were required to wear face masks outside of their homes because of the contamination, and they were also required to get tetanus shots.

Robbie had managed to reach her church to assist in feeding the homeless people; they had fed 200 that day, at just the one



This use of phase with the birds has been hard for me, as I tend to think of phase meaning something you go through for a period of time, but to birders, color-phase means an inherited or year around color having nothing to do with age, sex, or season. We found this condition with snow geese where some of them are blue and were originally thought to be a different species. In the hawk family we find the dark and light colors in the short tailed, roughlegged, red-tailed, Swainson's, Harlan's, and Ferruginous hawks. This means if you see a black hawk it may be any of the above.



William Alan (Mac) McGregor

Our March Resident of the Month is William Alan (Mac) McGregor, Jr. What follows is a historical cameo told by Mac McGregor.

At a farm on March 18, 1922, in Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, the world took on a new challenge when I was born. My parents were Katherine Southland Cameron and William Alan McGregor. My father bred Angus cattle, and my mother assisted with everything to make life smooth for us. During my early childhood my father's innovative breeding techniques became widely known and demand for his services resulted in our move to the United States. First, we moved from the icy plains of Canada to Briarcliff Farms in upstate New York, and then to the wealthy temperate seashore area of Chesapeake Bay, Maryland.

As my father managed large Angus herds for investors, my brother and I learned his work and completed high school. I also found time for Lacrosse as a player, and later as a coach. Upon graduation from high school, I attended the University of Maryland and completed a degree in animal husbandry. I also completed a degree in matrimony, marrying a lady named Margaret after graduation. We had one daughter named Sandy, who now lives in Darrouzett. I established my own reputation working with the Dupont family Angus farms.

Major change entered my life with World War II. I was activated with the 36th Division of the Texas National Guard and spent a total of three years overseas. My first European landing was at Salerno, Italy. This quickly became not only Allied territory but actually an Allied stronghold from which missions were sent.

During that time, my knees began to give me trouble so I switched from infantry to OSS. On an OSS mission I took a stand and actively disagreed with my commanding officer about the safest route to take to Alliedheld territory. He allowed me to go the way I wanted -- the Czechoslovakian resistance fighter and the downed American pilots we had rescued went with me. Sadly, the larger group was captured and taken to the most infamous interrogation center which was run by the Gestapo. The interrogation technique used there was to tie soldiers' hands behind their backs and then use that rope to lift them off the floor until their shoulders ripped out of their sockets. This horrible

torture caused most men to talk. When the desired information was given they were individually shot in the back of the head. Their bodies were burned in ovens. Not one of our mission survived. Those of us who went the other way were lucky that time.

Later, I was captured but was taken to a different interrogation center. I was kept there for two months before being transferred to a camp in central Germany. Soon, we were force-marched about 200 miles to Bavaria in southern Germany. Nearly two years of my tour were spent interred in prisoner of war camps. The situation was not good; the shortage of food was endured by soldiers and prisoners alike. I dropped to 116 pounds due to the food shortage, but I did learn about the delicacy of cat meat! The guards had a cat that was not stupid. It would walk along the fence but would always stay out of reach. Finally I decided to catch him. I took small amounts of tuna from the Red Cross rations and placed them near a hole in the fence. Each day the tuna got closer to our barracks until I finally grabbed the cat and strangled it. - Tastes like fried chicken!!

Our group of POWs managed to retain a BBC radio without being discovered by passing it from one person to the next daily for safekeeping. Each evening after being sure the guards were gone from the building, we all crowded around and listened to American radio programs. That small link to freedom and familiarity helped us keep our sanity during those frightful times.

When word reached camp that General Patton's men would be liberating us, I was one of the two men chosen to stand at the gate and welcome them. To my amazement, the first jeep through the gate contained a University of Maryland classmate of mine by the name of Perry Waters. Perry was this rather "hick farmer nobody" that I would never have expected to see anywhere, especially liberating our prisoner

The love of my life arrived after the war. Her name is Beverly, and she became my second wife. She is the daughter of an artist and is a creative, lovely person. She brought three children to our marriage, whom I adopted, and we had two more. Now my children numbered six: Sandy, Robin, Duane, Stacy, Jamie, and Katie. We lived in various places including Del Rey Beach, Florida, and Santa Fe, New Mexico, before we moved to New Zealand to take on a farm of 20,000 sheep and 700 Angus. It was a beautiful country with wonderful people and worldrespected schools. We were very happy there and would have stayed, but after three years we were forced to move back to the States to manage business interests here.

That move took us back to Santa Fe, New Mexico, to keep the land development project of three subdivisions being built solvent. Following that project's completion, I decided to abandon the risks of land development. Beverly and I began a lucrative business called CAC (Commercial Agency Consultants) to help smaller agencies recruit and appropriately serve corporate insurance accounts. There was no charge for our services; we would enter a partnership with the

Eventually, our brood moved to Alpine, California, a few miles from San Diego. Sometime during my time in San Diego, Beverly and I realized that we had developed different goals in our lives. We divorced but have remained very good friends over the years. We exchange regular notes to keep in touch.

Not that my life hasn't been wonderful. I have succeeded in several different businesses and have traveled throughout the world. I have the distinction of having flown the first Angus cattle - two planes full, to be exact - into Cuba, to serve as breeding stock, just before Castro seized power. Of course, that was over 30 years ago, and I often wonder how many Angus cattle are now living

Various business interests have kept me on the move throughout my life. On one train trip to Miami I met a stewardess from North Carolina, named Gary Reynolds. She was a beautiful lady who happened to be named by a father who wanted a boy! She became my third wife, and we had a son named Greg. Later we

Half of my children now live in Montana right near my birthplace just across the border in Canada. Stacy, who has moved there, has just recently had a baby. Duane and Robin live in San Diego and entertainment, visiting and together have developed a dyeing process that is being used worldwide in the textile market. They zip back and forth between Paris and San Diego, but have squeezed in time to come visit me. Sandy, as I mentioned earlier, is a teacher in Darrouzett and lives with her husband Verle Woods and their son Bryan. I actually came to Texas to live near her and spend time with my oldest grandson. Since I have only five grand kids, I hope to spend a lot of time with each one. There are many fascinating family stories to share with them as a part of their family heritage.

Ms. Bergins's duties for planning discharges include making sure that a patient's home life promotes good health and recuperation. For some patients, support services such as Hansford Home Care, Meals on Wheels, or Hansford Hospice may be necessary.

In addition, she provides psychosocial evaluations and crisis counseling and works with patients concerned with financial arrangements. She assists patients adjusting to illnesses such as cancer and helps them find ways to extend and increase the quality of their lives.
