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

Gruver ISD officials hold meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Gruver Independent School District met Wednesday, April 5, for their regular monthly meeting.

The first item they attended to was the approval of the minutes of the March 8, 1995 Board meeting.

They then went on to recognize the GHS Student of the Month. Roxane Holt, the junior daughter of Nick and Trixie Holt, was recognized as the Gruver High School Student of the Month. Roxane is a regular member of the All A Honor Roll announced at the end of each six weeks. In addition to her academic accomplishments; Mrs.

Sherry Johnson, a district math teacher who presented Roxane to the board; told the group that Miss Holt was active in the school's One Act Play and that she had qualified for regional competition in Number Sense and Headline Writing. Roxane is also a member of the school's National Honor Society.

The Board then went on to name Mrs. Betty Mathews as an election clerk for the May 6th election. Replacing Mrs. Beverly Mireles. Mrs. Mireles became ineligible to serve because of her husband Ralph's filing for a position on the Gruver School Board.

On the Action Items portion of the agenda, after a public hearing to receive information from citizens, the board opened a bid from Northridge (Western) Energy Company for the leasing of school owned land for possible mineral exploration. The May 6th elections for city and school elections are drawing closer, and several names were not released and thus left off of previous election coverage.


For the City of Spearman there are four people running for the three positions available. The candidates are Steve Benton, Ed Garner, Brian Gillispie, and Steve Krug.

 My husband Larry, who is 38, has found that he is in need of a liver transplant and he is not covered by medical insurance. Larry was diagnosed with Hepatitis C in May of 1993. Because of a change in employment, his medical insurance, under COBRA, expired in December 1994 and we have been unable to find coverage through our current employers or elsewhere.
 To date, all of our attempts to find assistance through government agencies, and insurance companies, have failed. It appears that our only possible source of funding for the transplant is fund-raising.
 A trust fund has been set up with the American Organ Transplant Association for any donations or money we are able to raise. We have been told that we will need approximately \$250,000.00 for the transplant. A large percentage of this amount must be available in order for Larry to be LISTED as a transplant candidate. We are in the process of setting up various fund-raising activities. Donations can be made out to AOTA Fund #21 and sent to us or directly to AOTA, P.O. Box 277, Missouri City, TX 77459.
 Larry has been seeing Dr. Williams Millikan at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and it appears that the surgery

could possibly be performed at University Medical Center in Lubbock.

Out at the Lake

The shelter is beginning to be in use again, and more fishermen are showing us on the pretty days. An archery group from Spearman is using an area on the Gibner place (west side of the highway coming from Spearman). There are a lot of places to ride horseback, and the PDRA Board would welcome advice on where eventually the permanent trails should be set. Now the only place off limits for horses and mules is the park area north of the dam. The Board did vote at the last meeting to try giving special permission to any one with a team and wagon for some occasions. Ask at the office.

Notice that prairie dog town that

is south of the entrance to office side of the Park. It seems to be growing. This is one for of wildlife that I hope we don't have to contend with in the Park area.

I checked in Charles Goodnight by J. Evetts Haley to see what Colonel Goodnight had to say on prairie dogs. When he was scouting and out of buffalo range, there was often nothing to eat but the prairie dogs. He said the problem was that they were small and that half of them, even with their heads shot off, would fall back in their holes and kick themselves below the first bend, where they couldn't be reached. They kept a little flour on hand to thicken soup made from the fat little animals. They made a good soup, but not too satisfying.

Charles Goodnight said that a

dog will not enter his hold if a rattler is in it. He had put dead rattlesnakes in holes and later found them covered up by the dogs. They evidently attempt to cover the holes when there is a live snake in them, and it seems that the rattler is aware of this too. If you slowly pour dirt in on a rattler, he will make his appearance quickly. He said that when a rattler entered the hole, he intended to eat a prairie dog.

I don't see how a snake could swallow a grown prairie dog. I still think they must eat the young. Another book says that they breed February-March and about a month later have their one annual litter, usually off 4-5 young, born deaf, blind, and hairless. The young emerge from the burrow at about six weeks.

patients receive, and decrease extrication time. When dealing with trauma patients we use the GOLDEN HOUR RULE. This is the first hour after an accident and the most critical time for the patient. If a patient can be delivered to a hospital where they can receive a greater level of care than can be

offered in the field in this first hour, then the chances of permanent disability or death can be greatly reduced. Approximately 20 to 35 minutes of this time is spent enroute to a scene and from the scene to the receiving hospital which considerably cuts down the time we have to spend on the scene.

Deadline for Ag program nears

Sign-up for the 1995 Farm Program will continue through April 28, 1995 at the Hansford County ASCS Office. The program is basically the same as last year with the exception that a 7.5% ACR requirement will be applied to 1995 corn bases. The final date to sign up into the 1995 program is April 28, 1995, and the last day to return signatures for the 1995 program is May 12, 1995. Federal Crop Insurance is a requirement for 1995 Farm Program Participation. Proof of 1995 insurance for all crops planted is required before any payments can be issued. Please bring proof of 1995 insurance with you when you come in to sign up.

Due to the 1995 crop insurance reform, April 28 1995 will be the final date to certify and/or request measurement service for 1995 wheat, barley, and oats. Acreages of these crops that are not intended for grain must also be reported by April 28, 1995, unless a request to hay or graze is filed with the ASCS office. If you make a request to hay or graze, the acreages must be substantially destroyed by before the crop reaches the hard dough stage.

Under FCIC program guidelines, small grain acreages intended for grain should not be grazed past April 1. If you intend to graze the acres past this date, you should contact your insurance representative. The non-haying and non-grazing period for acreage used as ACR, or CU for PAY under the 0-85 options is June 1 through November 1 in Hansford County.

Producers who have hybrid seed sorghum should be aware that the

final certification date is June 15, 1995.

Please call to make an appointment to sign up into the 1995 Farm Program and certify your small grain acres as soon as possible. We are losing two weeks with the new April 8, 1995 deadline for certification and time is running out.

1995 Federal Crop

Insurance

For those who have purchased Catastrophic Insurance from Hansford County CFSA, the final day to provide us with past production records is April 18, 1995, however, we would like to receive it as soon as possible. Production records are required so we can calculate your APH yield. We need a least four

years of production and can use as many as 10 years.

1995 ACP Funds

Funds are still available and applications are being accepted for the Agricultural Conservation Program. This is a continuous sign-up and we ask that you make an appointment to sign up for your convenience.




Spearman 6th graders end hoop season 8-2

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
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
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
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
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8th graders wrap up season at district

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




Lynx and Greyhounds race away with meet victories

Shieldknight and Rodriguez then joined forces with Samantha Beasley and Shayla Barber, to again take a gold, but this time in the 800 m relay, as they finished with a time of 1:56. These six girls were the only Lynxettes to take home a gold medal at the meet.




