Weekly Update
Texas, October 22 - Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 7.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.42/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 9.0 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.67/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 12.9 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 16.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 14.2 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 20.1 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Only one other time in the last few years have we seen the national average drop so significantly in the course of just a week, and that other time was in May 2011," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "Looking back at our data, we only see that prices dropped considerably more in autumn 2008 when the economy slipped into a recession. Given the circumstances with this latest weekly decrease- that it has nothing to do with recession- is significant," DeHaan said.

GasBuddy operates, TexasGasPrices.com, and over 225 other local gasoline pricetracking websites that follow prices at over 125,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. GasBuddy also uses Facebook (facebook.com/gasbuddy) Twitter (twitter.com/gasbuddy), and phone apps to keep motorists ahead of changing gasoline prices.

4-H Livestock Judges Place 1st at Tri-State

Continuing their preparations for the national contest at the American Royal in Kansas City, the Hansford County 4-H livestock judging team competed at the Tri-State Fair contest held in Amarillo.

Before I get to those results, I'd like to say a big thank you to the parents, coaches, teachers, families, and friends of the senior team for being so understanding while we train them for nationals. The kids have all pretty much given up their normal lives until November 2nd so they can do well at this very important contest. They've already traveled many miles, been gone many days, and seen a whole lot of livestock, with much more to go. Please continue to be patient during our preparations. We want to do our very best and make Hansford County proud. Also thank you to my fellow coaches, their families and employers. They are working hard.

Now, to the Tri-State contest. The senior team had an impressive day, winning first in cattle, sheep, and swine while finishing second in reasons. Hansford had the high team overall, with Hermitage County (the reigning Arkansas state champion) placing second.

In the individual awards, Travis Stedje placed 2nd overall. He also received honors for 2nd in cattle, 3rd in swine, and 9th in both sheep and reasons. Callie Stedje finished 3rd overall, placing 2nd in sheep and 3rd in reasons. Audrey Lieb won 7th overall with a 3rd place finish in cattle and a 9th in swine. Jennifer Crowl placed 4th in swine. Jaci Burgin was recognized for 1st in sheep, 8th in swine and 10th in reasons. Rayel Anderson placed 4th in cattle and 6th in sheep.

In the junior division, Hansford County had seven students make the trip. The junior team placed 1st in sheep, 2nd in swine, 4th in cattle, and 2nd place overall team.

Individually, Jonathon Crowl kept his medalist streak alive, winning 1st in sheep, 3rd in cattle, 10th in swine, and was named the high individual overall for the third contest in a row. Tyler Stedje placed 3rd in swine, 9th in cattle, 10th in sheep, and 3rd overall. Kaycee Anderson was recognized for 9th in sheep. Reed Anderson won 12th in swine. Maggie Davis placed 7th in swine in her first contest. Carter Burgin and Kaitlyn Stedje also competed for Hansford County.

The team is coached by Bret Burgin, Nick Slough, and County Extension Agent Burt Williams.

Unidentified Man Attacked By Dogs

Over the weekend an unidentified man was attacked by two dogs in the south east part of Spearman.

The victim sustained injuries to his legs and arm, requiring treatment and stitches.

Shots were fired at the dogs wounding one of them.

As of Saturday evening both of the dogs involved in the attack of the man near the soccer field were captured. One of the dogs is in the Spearman Animal Shelter, the other is at the Vet clinic. Both dogs are under a 10 day quarantine. The results of the investigation will be turned over to the Municipal Judge to determine the final disposition of the dogs.

The attack on Saturday is the second dog attack on a person here in Spearman within the last thirty days. Each reported dog attack has been from a dog that has a known owner, not a stray.

It is imperative that dog owners do everything possible to restrain their dogs. Do not take it for granted that your dog will not harm someone. Please get your animals vaccinated for rabies and other preventable diseases.

Animal Control Officer Mahaffe handles 25 to 30 dogs a month, and handles an average of 250 calls from citizens a month. Many of these calls for service are repeatedly dealing with dogs of whom the owner is known. This can be costly to dog owner, and prevents ACO Mahaffe from working to rid our town of strays.

Pringle-Morse CISD Cafeteria Certified by TDA to Implement New Meal Patterns

Superintendent Kent Hargis is pleased to announce that the Pringle-Morse CISD cafeteria is one of the first 13 schools approved and certified by the Texas State Department of Agriculture, "TDA," to receive an additional 6 cents for lunches served under the National School Lunch Program. Hargis congratulated Cafeteria Manager Janice McCloy on her accomplishments for the District.

According to McCloy, applicant schools have to demonstrate compliance with the new meal patterns implemented by the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010, and the TDA then reviews the performance-based reimbursement documentation submitted by the district.

Most of our students seem happy with the menu changes, said McCloy.

"I like the new Beefy Macaroni," said Daniel Eckert.

Kalem Lopez said he likes the steak-fingers and the Tex-Mex Stack best.

Martha Hamm, Mattee Johnson, and Scarlett Shields chimed in that they love all the new fruit.

"Every teacher and staff member dines in the school cafeteria several times a week, so I have adults to please as well," said McCloy. "The 6 cents helps pay for the additional fruit and vegetable choices required by the new menus."

Third-grade teacher Leslie Ford said, "I like the colorful assortment of food on the tray, and I am enjoying all the fresh vegetables."

The TDA commended the District's efforts to ensure meals served in the National School Lunch Program and the School Breakfast Program align with the 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans and recommendations from the Institute of Medicine. The additional 6 cents per lunch TDA reimbursement will begin with the District's October lunch claim.



Bushland Girls Capture First District Title

The Bushland Lady Falcons put five scoring runners among the top eight to win their first district title and easily vanquished four-time defending state champion Spearman on its home course at Palo Duro Park in Spearman in the process.

Bushland won the district 1-2A title with 24 points. Spearman finished a distant second with 54 points and Highland Park earned the third regional berth with 80 points.

Lady Falcons Kenzie Schaffer and Aundrea Schroder swept first and second place and teammates Cortnie Graul, Stormi Fuentes and Morgan Lackey finished in sixth, seventh and eighth, respectively, to dominate the competition.

Highland Park freshman Kristen Elizalde finished second and teammate Elizabeth Gill third to lead the Lady Hornets to a regional berth.

In the boys race, Highland Park's Quinlin McGregor and Boys Ranch stayed perfect in district cross country competition at Palo Duro Park near Spearman on Monday.

Boys Ranch, which has never lost a district title since beginning the program in 1981, put six runners in the top 10 to easily win the District 1-2A title.

McGregor won his fourth consecutive title on the 3.1 course in 16 minutes 50 seconds, shy of his 16:34 course record he had lowered earlier this year, but the four-peat wasn't without a challenge.

Canadian's Elliot Webb pushed McGregor throughout the race and took the lead during the second mile, but came up short, finishing second in 17:02 when McGregor moved ahead in the third mile and would not be denied.

After the McGregor and Webb duel, the race was all Boys Ranch, with Trey Sendigas, Jacob Myers, Andrew Pacino and Devon Razo taking the third, fourth and fifth and sixth places, respectively. Roughrider Justice Barnes finished eighth to complete the team scoring.

Bushland, led by John Singler's seventh place fin-

ish, earned a regional berth with a second place team finish of 59 points, and Highland Park earned the third place berth with 71 points.

District 1-1A

In Class 1A competition, the defending state champion Gruver Lady Greyhounds narrowly escaped with their third consecutive District 1-1A cross country title Monday at Thompson Park in Amarillo.

Lady Hounds freshman Lariat Lerner won the individual title in a time of 12 minutes, 47 seconds over the 2-mile course to lead her No. 2-ranked team to victory with 63 points, just ahead of No. 10 Stratford with 67 points and No. 5 and defending state-runner-up Sunray with 69 points.

"It's a tough district," Sunray coach Sid Whiteley said. "Just six points separated first and third."

With only three teams and the top 10 individuals qualifying for the Nov. 3 UIL Region I Meet in Lubbock, the loaded district ended Clarendon's season except for senior Audrey Shelton, who finished third behind another strong freshman, Samantha Gonzalez of Stratford, who took second in 12:58.

While the Sunray girls finished second, Whiteley's Sunray team put all five scoring runners among the top eight runners to win the District 1-1A boys title in dominating fashion with 24 points to easily out-distance Gruver in second with 51 points.

Booker qualified for the third and final boys team regional berth with 71 points, just one point ahead of Panhandle in fourth with 72 points.

Stratford's Grayson Gonzalez, the No. 1 returning class 1A runner from last year's UIL Region I Meet, had little difficulty in winning the district title in a time of 18:48 over the 3.1 mile course, well ahead of Mason McLain of Gruver in second (19:37) and Sunray's Julio Loya in third in 19:47.

The past weekend at the Park was lovely weather wise and color wise. There were 7 RVs behind the dam and 2 on the office side. Blue cats and channel catfish were being caught. The Clint Davis Cookoff was held Saturday. A number of visitors drove out to look at the fall color and just to enjoy the beauty of the Lake and Park.

Jim mentioned seeing the pair of bald eagles, but he did not see the juveniles. White pelicans visited

briefly, and 20 Canada geese were seen. Sand hill cranes have been heard leaving early in the morning and coming in after dark.

Spearman hosted the high school district 1-2A track meets for boys and girls at the Park on Monday afternoon, October 22. The Spearman girls were defending champions, as they had won the district title the last 4 years. They came in second this year to the Bushland girls. However, a bright spot for Spearman was that Joyce and Joel Lee Lackey's granddaughter Morgan Lackey was on the winning Bushland team. The Lackeys were among the spectators. Joel Lee commented it was a beautiful afternoon at a beautiful spot.

Marian Tomlinson called to say she had seen a White-breasted Nuthatch in her yard last week. The Red-breasted are seen frequently here, but the White-breasted had not been reported as seen in Hansford County. Jim said the restrooms

would be closed this weekend if the temperatures drop as low as is being forecast.

Clark's Grebe

The Clark's Grebe picture was taken by Russell Shaver. This is another bird that has not been reported as seen in Hansford County, so it is great to have an actual picture taken on the Lake.

Grebes are not another form of ducks as I had supposed. Neither are they in the loon family as others have thought. They are considered one of the most perfectly adapted to water of all birds. They dive and swim rapidly under water. Rather than fly if scared, a grebe usually dives and comes up at a different location. At times then he will only show the top of his head, eyes, and beak. When on land, if they try to run, they sometimes tip over as their legs are set far back on the body.

Of the different Grebe species, we would be more apt to see the Eared Grebe and the Pied-bill Grebe at the Lake.
