Spearman High School received third place in the State One-Act Play Contest held May 6-8 in Austin. They were named one of two advancing plays on Friday, April 23, 2004 at the Region I One-Act Play competition in Abilene, along with Nocona. Spearman performed The Terezin Promise and Nocona performed Ark of Safety. New Diana (Diana) received first place with the play, Quilters and Rogers came in second place with the play Marisol. The cast and crew of the first through third received individual medals as well as a state plaque.

Other schools competing, and the play they performed, were: Hamilton - The Man Who Came to Dinner, Sadler S&S - Mother Courage and Her Children, Central Heights (Nacogdoches) -Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, and Vanderbilt (Industrian)- The Voice of the Prairie.



USDA Sets Date for Soybean **Request for** Referendum

WASHINGTON, March 24 2004 -- The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced that it will offer soybean producers the opportunity to request a referendum on the Soybean Promotion and Research Order as authorized under the Soybean Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Act.

The request for referendum will be conducted at USDA's county Farm Service Agency offices. To be eligible to participate, producers must certify and provide documentation that shows that they produced soy-beans and paid an assessment on the soybeans during the peri-od of Jan. 1, 2002, through Dec. 31, 2003. Only those producers who desire a referendum on the

order will participate. Beginning May 3, 2004, and continuing through May 28, 2004, producers may obtain a form to request a referendum from county FSA offices either in person or by sending a request by mail or facsimile. Forms may also be obtained via Internet

http://www.ams.usda.gov/lsg/m pb/rp-soy.htm. Individual producers and other producer entities may request a referendum at the county FSA office where their administrative farm records are maintained. For the producer not participating in FSA programs, the opportunity to request a referendum will be provided at the county FSA office where the producer owns or rents land. Mail in requests must be postmarked by May 28, 2004, and received in the county FSA office by June 7, 2004. All other requests made by facsimile or in person, must be received in the county FSA

office by May 28, 2004. USDA will conduct a referendum on the order if a least 10 percent of the 663,880 soybean producers request a referen-dum, provided that no more than one-fifth be producers from one state. The request for referendum is mandated by the act. The act requires that the secretary of agriculture conduct a request for referendum every five years after the initial referendum, which was conducted in 1994. USDA monitors activities of the United Soybean Board. The mandatory program is financed by an assessment of one-half of i percent of the net market value of the soybeans. Notice of the soybean request for referendum was published in the March 25, 2004, Federal Register.

Wheat Field Day **Showcases New Variety**

heads tightly to determine grain fill and maturity. Others judge crop health by color, looking for a lush, uniform green.

On May 26, participants at the 2004 Wheat Field Day will be able to inspect new irrigated and dryland varieties. The event will be at the North Plains Research Field, a facility of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, located north of Dumas on state Highway 287.

Registration will begin at 10 a.m. The program will begin with a welcome by Thomas Marek, North Plains Field superintendent, followed by the walking tours at 10:20 a.m.

"Our field tours will allow participants easy access to see varieties up close," said Dr. Jackie Rudd, Experiment Station wheat breeder at Amarillo. "At least 163 trials are currently under way by our state breeding team with many located here in the High Plains."

Varieties are being tested statewide at locations near Abilene, Brady, Bushland, Canadian, Castroville, Chillicothe, Claude, Dalhart, Etter, Lockett, Lubbock, McGregor, Nazareth, Prosper, and in Ellis County. Two irrigated trials are under way near Clovis, N.M. Evaluations

Some farmers squeeze wheat involve types for irrigated and dryland production in addition to several early and later maturing beardless and grazing varieties, Rudd said.


John Sweeten, Experiment Station resident director, will welcome participants at noon.

Other presenters include Dr. Mark Hussey, head of the soil and crop science department at Texas A&M University, and Texas Wheat Producers Board and area legislative officials or their staffs.

Dr. Bean will lead the dryland wheat tour beginning at 1 p.m.

The Etter research unit is a 326-acre facility dedicated to research and demonstrations of irrigation systems and water use efficiency in addition to cropping and environmental systems. The Experiment Station has leased the current location - "Insect update," Dr. Carl from the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District, headquartered in Dumas, since 1988. The original partnership began in 1963 at a site 2 miles north of the present location. The North Plains research unit accommodated 21 studies in 2003 involving 16 scientists and engineers from six agencies.

Gruver FFA members competed at the State Livestock Judging contest held May 1st in College Station Texas on the Campus of Texas A&M University. Members on the team include Bailey Reid, Charles Slough, Nicholas Slough, and Tucker Williams.

The contest includes six classes of cattle, sheep, and swine, a class of feeder cattle grading, a class of slaughter cattle grading, and a written exam consisting of twenty five questions. There are 625 points per individual and 2025 points for a team total. The lowest score is dropped and not counted for the team total.


The team had recently place third in area competition, second in district, and fifth overall in Texas Tech contests to qualify for the state trip. At Texas A&M the team scored a total of 1789 points letting them hold the sixteenth spot in state out of 80 teams that qualified across the state of Texas.

During the trip to A&M the students were able to see many different parts of the state and judge at several reputable farms along the way.

The team will be able to compete next year with three students returning as Nicholas graduates this year.

Storm Shelter Funding Announced By USDA Rural Development

USDA Rural Development State Director Bryan Daniel announced today that the Agency is offering low interest Section 504 loans to help finance storm shelters for very-low income homeowners living in rural Texas.

"Severe weather can strike Texas unexpectedly, and with serious personal consequences. As Texans know, violent storms and the unfortunate loss of life underscore the need for improved home safety measures. The installation of an approved storm shelter can provide rural Texans added safety and security." said Daniel.

Eligibility requirements for this program includes a family income of less than 50% of the median income for their respective county, an applicant must live in their own home, and the family must reside in an eligible rural community. The USDA Rural Development financed shelters must also meet Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) standards in design, construction and installation.





EARL ED NOVAK



SPEARMAN - Dr. Earl Ed Novak, 69, passed away early Thursday morning, May 6, 2004 at Hansford Hospital in Spearman.

The third child of Beatrice Frances (Nespor) and Frank F. Novak, he was born November 7, 1934 on the Novak farm south of Spearman. Soon after his father passed away in February of 1944, the Novaks moved to Yukon, OK to be closer to family. He attended Yukon schools and graduated from Yukon High School with the Class of 1953. The family returned to Spearman each summer to farm, where Earl came to love the

farm, the Panhandle and its people.

After graduating from Oklahoma State University, he entered Baylor University College of Dentistry in Dallas, TX, in the fall of 1957. 

Dale's passing made us realize that we should cherish in the small and everyday moments we share with one another for they are the gifts of life.


Spearman Post Office Celebrates Mother's Day





"Coach Auld knew he was going to be stepping down, and I think he started giving me more responsibility, unbeknownst to me, Jenschke said. " Some of that good-guy relationship had already kind of dwindled away because of the responsibilities he had given me last year, especially because he knew he was slowly but surely turning things over."

The transition from assistant to head coach has been a change for both Jenschke and her team.

"I had to become more of an authority figure and embrace the role of disciplinarian, rather than the cry coach - the good guy assistant who was always privy to the girls' favor." Jenschke said.

McKayla Padilla, a senior on the Cedar Park team has noticed a increase in intensity during practice under Coach Jenschke, "Players are now more focused and serious, "she said.

"Really, I'd say the only transition has been adjusting to her authority and coaching style, "Padilla said.

One aspect coach Jenschke has emphasized is the the need for running, both in distance and in periods of time.

Both Jenschke and the Cedar Park team feel that this is their year with 10 seniors on the team, four of whom have been regulars on the team since their freshman year.


Thursday morning was filled with music and exercise.




