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New year means change, but bad weather continues

Although most people set new year's resolutions to change in 1993, the weather apparently has not. As we moved into the third week of 1993 snow, rain and sleet continue in Hansford County and the surrounding area.

After having a high of 45° on Saturday, Jan. 16, the temperatures began dropping again as another winter storm rolled into the Texas Panhandle. On Sunday sleet made driving on the roads hazardous and the entire panhandle area was under a winter storm warning. The winter storm conditions remained the same through Monday.

Then on Tuesday everything began as normal. The Gruver and Pringle-Morse students were off to school at 8 a.m. and Spearman students were in class by 9 a.m., but the weather had other plans for the panhandle. A little after 9 a.m. a snow storm had blown into Hansford County and the streets

were quickly covered.

Because of this and the already hazardous road conditions the schools began to let out. Spearman and Gruver schools let their students out at 10:15 a.m. and Pringle-Morse students were let out at 1 p.m.

Because of the snow neither the Spearman or Gruver basketball games were played.

Spearman's Varsity basketball games have been rescheduled for Saturday, Jan. 23. Lynxettes to begin at 6:30 p.m.

Spearman has rescheduled their games with Sunray for Saturday, Jan. 23. The JV Girls will begin playing at Sunray at 4 p.m. and the Varsity Girls are scheduled to begin playing at 6:30 p.m.

Gruver's games with Texhoma have been canceled. "It was an agreement between the two schools," Coach Tim Garland said. The ball games were canceled because of the snow and because of scheduling conflicts it will not be played, he added. He also stated

that it was a non-district game.

Approximately 5 inches of snow fell during the Tuesday storms. That evening road crews were still out clearing the roads and several were seen Wednesday morning working to make driving conditions better.

Classes resumed in Hansford County on Wednesday. All three

schools reported that their buses ran late. Gruver students started classes at 9:30 a.m., while both Pringle-Morse and Spearman students started classes at 9 a.m.

The Hansford County schools were not the only ones affected by the storm. Many other schools in the area started classes late on Wednesday. West Texas State University in Canyon was closed on Tuesday and remained closed until Wednesday night classes.

The board considered building a

Smith takes 84th district bench

On January 1 of 1993 the new 84th District Court Judge, William D. (Bill) Smith, took the bench.

Before being elected as the District Judge, Smith had been the Hutchinson County Attorney. He held the position from 1981 until he resigned in November 1991 to run for the District office. "I thought it would be a good opportunity," Smith said. He added, "I was ready to do something a little different, ready for a change."

During that ten year period he also had a private practise in Borger. His cases dealt with many areas such as oil & gas, family, real estate, commercial litigation and representing banks. Also during

Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. approves programs and renews contract

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday, Jan. 12, to approve a cooperative purchasing program, revise the district's Chapter I and Compensatory Education programs and to renew the superintendent's contract.

An agreement to participate in the Region XVI Education Service Center's Cooperative Purchasing Program was passed. Participation in this program will allow the service center to receive bids for office products, teaching supplies, paper products and custodial supplies for the district, Superintendent Beryl Sears explained.

Revisions in the Chapter I and Compensatory Education programs were approved. The revisions include a policy to promote parental involvement in the programs. Also, a letter from the School Picture Restoration Committee was approved. This letter will be sent to Pringle-Morse alumni.

The board presented the annual evaluation to Superintendent Beryl

this ten year period he served five years on the Fritch State Bank Board of Directors.

Since being elected he has resigned from the board and discontinued his private practise. He explained that District Judges are prohibited from private practise.

Smith said, "I think is important that people get a fair hearing and feel that they got a fair hearing." He continued, "This is often the court of last resort because many can't afford an appeal. As a judge I want to listen to the evidence and make a decision from that, not what I think or feel but based on the evidence and the law."

Smith believes that people need to have a little higher standards for their elected officials. He added

that people also need to have confidence in the judicial system. "People come over here and ask you to solve their problems when they can't," he stated.

"Judges need to be impartial," Smith added. He continued saying, "A judge should know less about the case than anyone. The judge needs to know next to nothing about the case before the evidence is presented."

This is really important in custody and divorce cases. Smith explained, "A judge has a lot of discretion, especially in custody and divorce cases." He added that a judge needs to pay close attention to the evidence in these cases for

According to City Manager A.J. Ratliff, this ordinance (Ordinance Number 234) would give the city

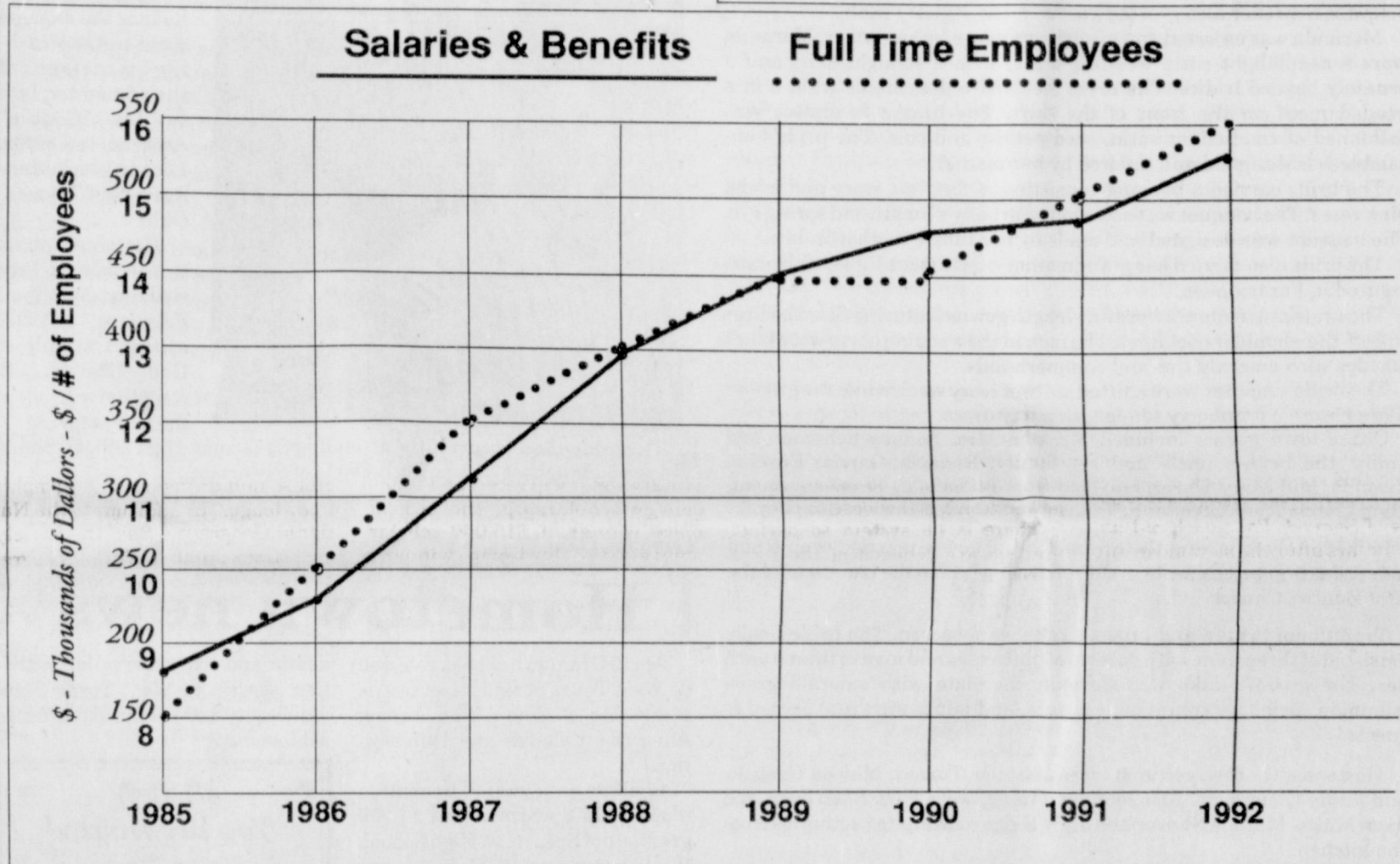
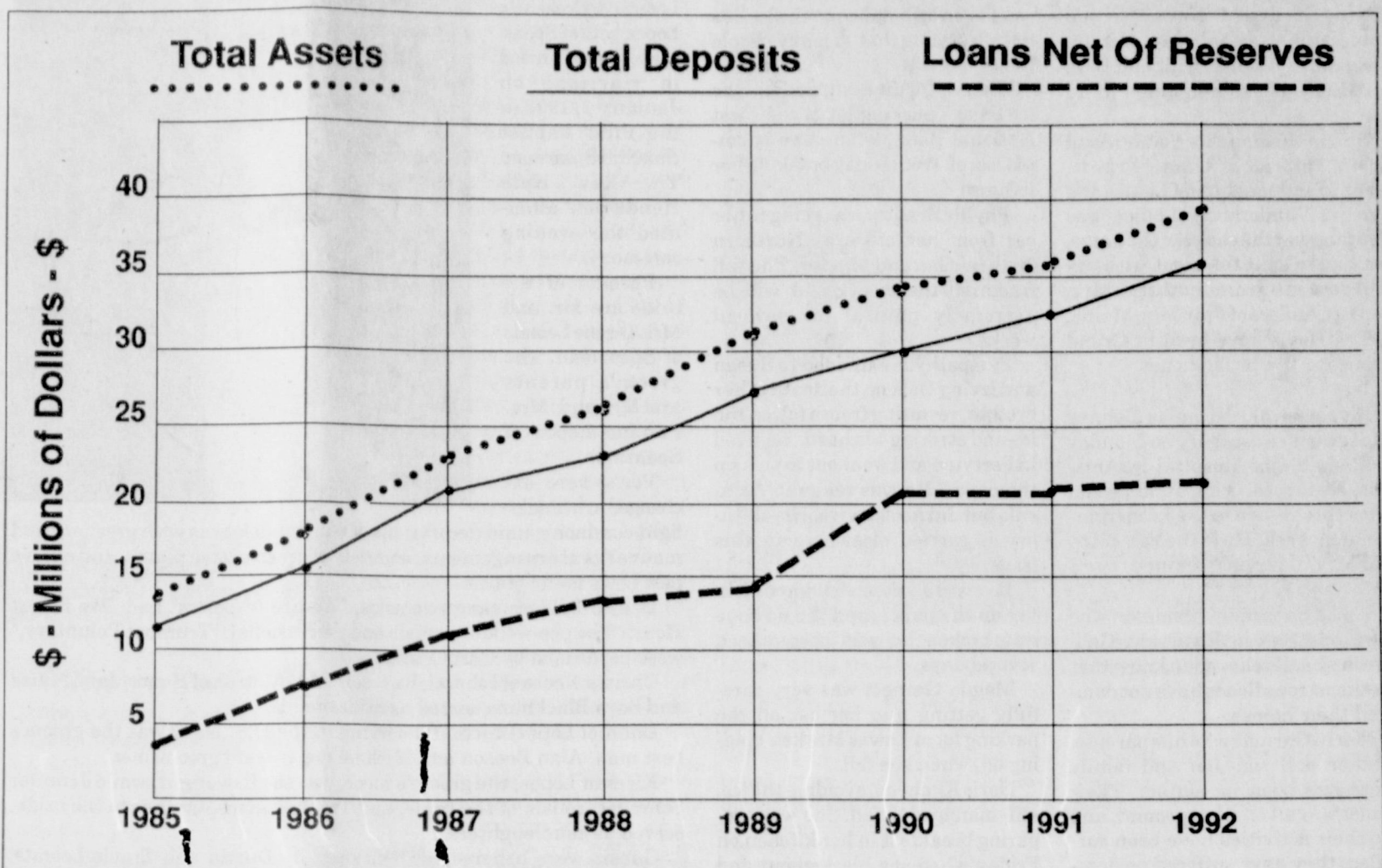
the authority to tear down old abandoned houses. Ordinance Number 234 will be considered at a later meeting, Ratliff said.

Beedy wins Spearman Geography Bee

Blake Beedy of Spearman moves one step closer to winning a \$25,000 college scholarship.

Beedy an 8th grade student at Spearman Junior High School, won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee on January 15, and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship. The school-level Bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the fifth annual National Geography Bee, which is sponsored by National Geographic WORLD, the Society's magazine for children, and Amtrak.

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of January 4, with thousands of schools around the United States, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories participating.

Spearman's preliminary round of the 1993 Geography Bee ended Jan. 12 at 3 p.m. Winners from this round were:

4th Grade—Travis Burgess, son of Keith and Freida Burgess.

5th Grade—Jeremy Ledgewood, son of Don and Pam Ledgewood; and Casey Villenes, son of Tony Villines and Teresa Pope.

6th Grade—Loyd Sprague, son of Donald and Carol Sprague; and

Jennifer Laxson, daughter of Paulette Laxson.

7th Grade—Mario Puentes, son of Benito and Esperanza Puentes;

and Keith Winegarner, son of Norlan and Linda Winegarner.

8th Grade—Bruce Howell, winner of our school from last year, son of Danny and Cindy Howell. Run-off position for high score, Blake Beedy defeated Dillon Miller. Blake is the son of Jeff and Michelle Beedy and Dillon is the son of Jim and Marlene Miller.

The school winners, including Blake, will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 2.

The National Geographic Society with its co-sponsors will provide an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee national championship on May 25 and 26. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; the second-place winner, a \$15,000 scholarship; and the third-place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals, which will air as a prime-time special on the Public Broadcasting Service at 8 p.m. May 26.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18 to 24—the youngest group surveyed—knew less about geography than

young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Geographic Society, with nearly 10 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including the Summer Geography Institute for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which is currently working in almost every state and Puerto Rico.

Spiritually Speaking

Is There a Perfect System?

It has and always will be easier to describe what is wrong with a nation than to prescribe a solution. I think there are two classic descriptions of national ill. Can you guess what periods in world history are involved, which nations are being described? "Things fall apart," one writer says. "The centre cannot hold. Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world." The second writer is less poetic, more matter of fact. "In those days...every man did what was right in his own eyes."

Most people in most generations hear these words, look at themselves, and say, "That's our day the writer is describing. That's us." The first quotation, describing the pulling apart of order, is by W.B. Yeats, who was picturing the western nations as World War I approached. "Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world." The second is an unknown author's description of the people of Israel about 1060 BC when the book of Samuel opens. "In those days...every man did what was right in his own eyes." (Judges 21:25)

We see here that both quotations accurately describe the basic human predicament which persists from century to century, including our own. In the midst of a culture which advises us to "do our own thing," we hear echoes across three thousand years from a people who did just that, and found it wanting. Those echoes come from the book of Samuel, one of the most readable, fast-paced books of the Bible.

The book is so long that it could not be included on one Hebrew scroll, so it was divided into two parts. It begins with the story of the boy Samuel and his nocturnal conversations with God. Samuel grows up to be a judge over Israel and takes part in the selection of Saul as Israel's first king. We read of Saul's wars with the Philistines, of his son Jonathan's friendship with David, of David's slaying Goliath. Saul dies in battle, and David becomes king, meets and marries Bathsheba and establishes Jerusalem as the capital, and makes Israel a strong and vigorous nation. It is a book which describes the stumbling efforts of the nation Is-

rael to find a perfect system by which to live.

Any person who thinks seriously about his or her nation and its integrity will find insight by a close reading of this ancient book. In it, we see the disturbing condition of the people of Israel were in, the solution they devised, the problems this caused and the conclusion of the matter.

We might ask, "What was the Condition?" In that day, there was no king in Israel, and every man did what was right in his own eyes." With this verse the book of Judges closes, setting the scene for the stories of Samuel. For nearly a hundred years after the slow move into the Promised Land, the people had been led by a series of judges who sought to give them order. Charismatic-type leaders, the judges had their brief day and were gone.

Is there any level of life on which such anarchy would work? In our overcrowded society and the strictures that go with it, we have a wistful yearning for complete personal freedom. But if we get desperately ill and need quick skilled treatment, we do not want to go to a doctor who does his own thing in medicine, or did his own thing in medical school. We want someone who has chosen to serve a discipline, who has given his or her life to systematic knowledge and truth.

Marriage does not work when we simply do whatever seems right

in our own eyes. This relationship involves a deliberate, solemn renouncing of the "do your own thing" approach. Will you keep unto him so long as you both shall live? "Will you keep only unto her?" "Will you forsake all others?"

It is no wonder people feel weak and defenseless in the midst of everyone like Israel when you see the disciplined nations like Philistia. People need a better system, something to govern and direct and discipline them. It is very obvious that the people need something like control. Paul said, "You belong to the power which you choose to obey."

There is no system so perfect that we are relieved of the hard duties of INTEGRITY and RIGHTEOUSNESS. Who needs to hear this? We all do. We have offered things to long. We need to offer personal examples.

There is but one way! Centuries after David died, the Israelites were to discover that it wasn't a system they needed, but a Savior. That is what God sent, and to those who accept him, then and now, he gives the power to become children of God.

We, "AMERICA" have a new president. He cannot do everything himself. We must be concerned and help him.

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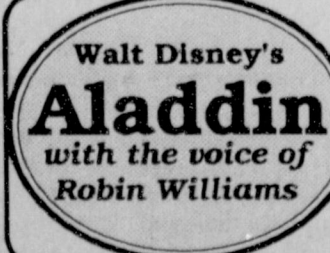

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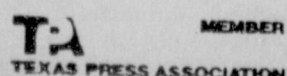

holds 'big-time shuttle blast-off'

During the third six weeks a very significant discovery was being made. Lift off and shuttle exploration were the subjects for the "Strive" class at Gruver I.S.D.

The Jr. High Strive class built a scale-size control deck/flight simulator for the elementary to take the journey of their lives. The "Endeavor" model was made of common easy-to-find material such as a black plastic tarp, some cardboard boxes, lights, life-like instrument panels, and glow-in-the-dark paint. The tarp was blown up with a fan to comfortably hold 10 people. Inside, the control panel had gauges and scales and a monitor where video-taped instructions were given to the space cadets. On the mission, they experimented with refraction and reflection of light, the freezing of ice-cream in space (yum!) and they repaired a weather satellite. A sound system was installed in the room to give "lift-off" sounds that vibrated the whole building. A strobe light was used to give a "cosmic" atmosphere. Everyone involved had a BLAST.

WHOLE GRAINS FOR WHOLE NUTRITION

Including more whole grains in your diet is one way to add taste and variety to your meals and increase your intake of complex carbohydrate and fiber as well.

Whole grains should be purchased in small quantities. Whole grains turn rancid faster because they contain the oil-rich germ. They can be refrigerated, frozen or stored tightly covered in a cool, dry place for up to five months.

Here are some examples of whole grains that can help you get the 6 to 11 cereal, grain and pasta servings recommended for consumption in the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans:

- Barley—The polished kernels or seeds of the barley plant. Available in pearl or quick-cooking form. Barley is most often used in soups

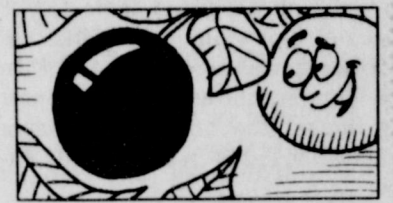

January sales tax rebates sent

Spearman received \$9,767.52 in the January 1993 distribution of the city sales taxes from the state comptroller's office. Gruver received \$3,698.39.

As compared to the January 1992 receipts, Spearman's share of the rebates show a decrease of 5.87 percent from the \$10,376.12, while Gruver's share shows a decrease of 3.49 percent from the \$3,832.03.

When looking at the county as a whole, Hansford County received \$13,465.91 in the January 1993 distribution. This is a 5.22 percent decrease from the \$14,208.15 received in 1992.

Statewide, State Comptroller John Sharp said that his office sent checks totaling \$98.7 million to cities and counties.

"As a whole, Texas continues to outpace the nation in terms of economic growth," Sharp said.

Sales tax rebates to Texas cities in January were \$88.2 million, a 3.2 percent increase over the \$85.5 million they received last January.

The January checks reflect taxes collected on November sales and reported to the Comptroller in December by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Spearman Police Report

Icy road conditions plagued motorists in Spearman with three accident reports filed during the week running from Monday, Jan. 11, to Sunday, Jan. 17. During the period a total of 27 activity reports were filed at the Spearman Police Department.

The first accident occurred on Tuesday, Jan. 12, at 1:53 in the afternoon in the intersection of First Street and Townsend. No injuries were reported and no citation was issued, Raper said.

Another accident was also reported on Tuesday. It occurred in the 700 block of W. 7th. According to Raper, a 1986 GMC pickup driven by Leo Cummings of Spearman was traveling west on 7th. The GMC collided with a 1982 Chevrolet pickup driven by Roberta Law of Spearman. "She was stopped at the mall exit on 7th Street," Raper said. He added that road conditions were a factor in the accident. Light damage was reported, but there were no accidents and no citations issued.

The third accident occurred at 1:38 in the afternoon on Friday, Jan. 15. This accident involved a 1991 Dodge Van driven by Ronna Lynn Hopson of Borger. According to Raper, Ronna was traveling west

on 11th at Barkley when she swerved to miss a vehicle that did not appear to be going to stop and she struck a utility pole. Moderate damage was reported to her vehicle, Raper stated. He added, A possible injury was also reported, but no citation was given.

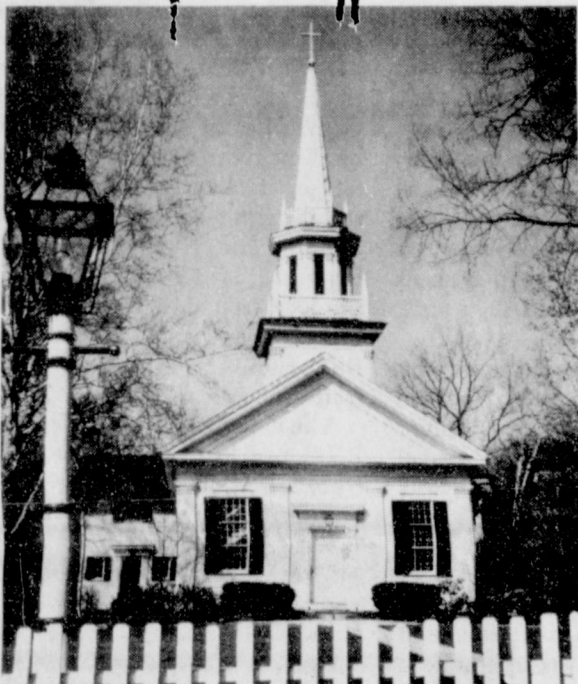

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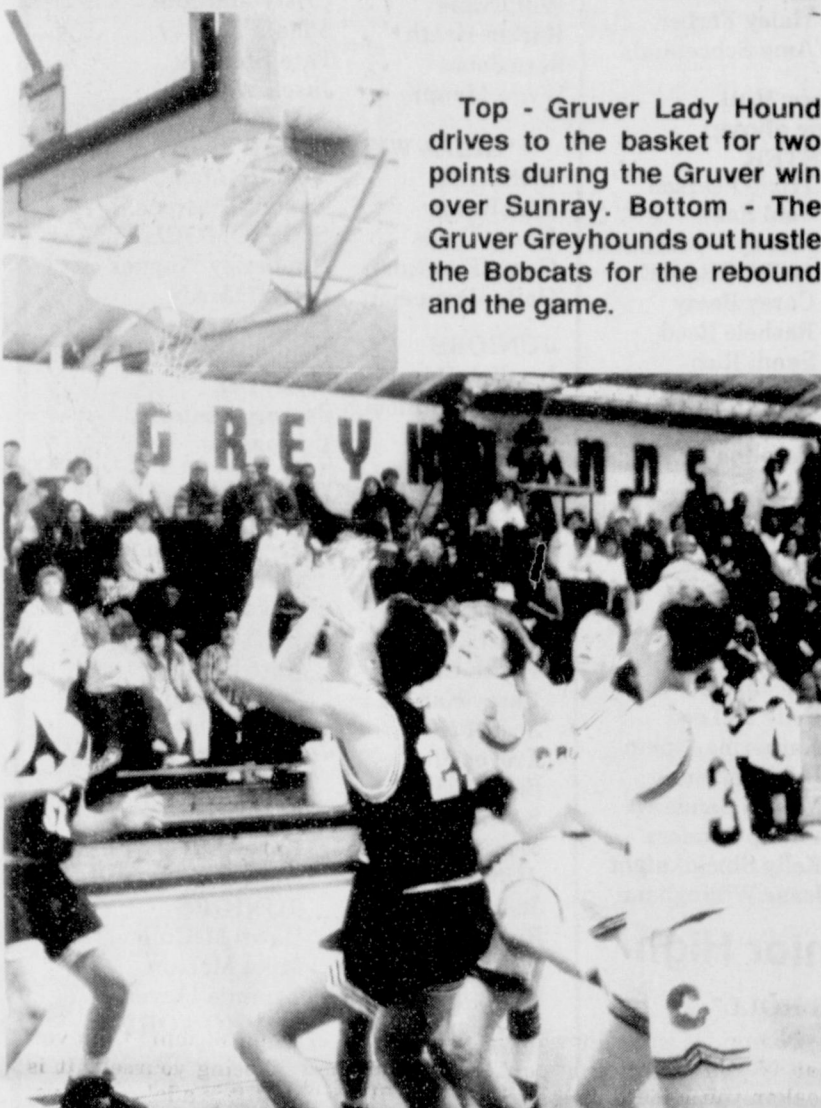
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Lady Hounds stun Sunray Lady Cats

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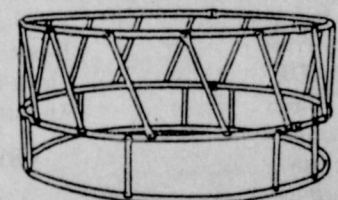

Soon, the eagle was hopping mad. Nut gathering production decreased and the rabbit refused the blame, because he hadn't put the nuts up in the trees in the first place. The duck would only fly north and south, so all east and west customers were neglected. The squirrel was sick of being wet all day and stayed home ill most of the time. Soon the business failed and all the animals went back to the forest.

The moral is

The moral of this little story is a simple one: Each of us has special gifts and abilities. We will become successful and experience real satisfaction when we make use of those

talents. We have the potential to achieve greatness just by being ourselves.

Like the animals, when we use what comes natural to us, we will grow and prosper. When we try to be something we are not, we will most likely fail.
