# Lynxettes – Bi-District Champs

The Spearman Lynxettes defeated Henrietta Lady Cats 51-48 to become the 2005 Bi-District Champs.

The Lynxettes (22-7) and the Lady Cats (22-7) both entered the bi-district game with their eyes on the championship title. The score at the end of the first quarter, 17-16, Spearman, accurately represented their determination.

Henrietta outscored the Lynxettes 9-14 in the second quarter, sending the Lynxettes into half-time behind, 30-26.

The Lynxettes came out fighting in the third quarter, though, and never backed down. They outscored the Lady Cats 13-8 in the third quarter, and 12-10 in the fourth.

The Lynxettes were led by soph-omore Kelcee Rex, who scored 15 points, including 3-for-3 from the 3-point range. She was also 4-4 at the free throw line. Lindsay Short scored 13 points (one three-point goal), was 6 of 7 from the free throw line, and posted 10 rebounds and five steals.

Short's two free throws gave Spearman a 49-48 lead with 33 seconds left. Rex added the clinching free throws after a defensive stop.

Other scorers for the Lynxettes included: Saylee Flowers 9, Kendall Schneider 6, Tonya Hart 4, Kylee Howard 2 and Jordanna Lozano 2. "We are the bi-district champs with a hard-fought win over Henrietta," commented Coach Kyle Short. "We made the plays down the stretch that we had not made earlier in the game. "We want to thank the fans who made the trip to Childress for their support," continued Short. "You saw the Lynxettes fighting to win with all they had." The Lynxettes advance to play defending state champions Shallowater on Thursday, February 17 at 7:30 p.m at Canyon High School. The Lynxettes will be the visiting team. A send-off will be held at 4:30 p.m. in the varsity gym parking lot (Spearman Junior High).





The ACT Assessment now contains an optional Writing Test. Some colleges will require writing scores from students entering college in the fall of 2006. The cost is \$28 without the Writing Test, and \$42 with the Writing Test. Students can receive registration information from their high school guid-ance counselor or they can register on ACT's website at www.actstu-dent.org. ACT encourages eleventh graders to examine their ACT scores for academic weaknesses and take more challenging courses or receive extra help to grow stronger in important academic areas. 
### West Texas A&M University

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

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
