Weekly Update

Texas, October 1 - Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 5.0 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.52/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 2.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.79/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 30.5 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 12.6 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 0.8 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 33.2 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"In the last few years, we've typically seen a seasonal downward trend at the gas pump as the cooler temperatures invade," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "We just haven't seen any sort of real decline at the pump yet this autumn. This year has seen one of the warmest ever-temperatures and gasoline prices alike. High temperatures have been blamed on global warming, perhaps we're seeing a long term "pump warning" equivalent at retail pumps. Either way, the small drop in gasoline prices isn't to the satisfaction of many, and I don't see enough relief to satisfy the majority of American motorists any time soon," DeHaan said.

GasBuddy operates, TexasGasPrices.com, and over 225 other local gasoline pricetracking websites that follow prices at over 125,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. GasBuddy also uses Facebook (facebook.com/gasbuddy) Twitter (twitter.com/gasbuddy), and phone apps to keep motorists ahead of changing gasoline prices.

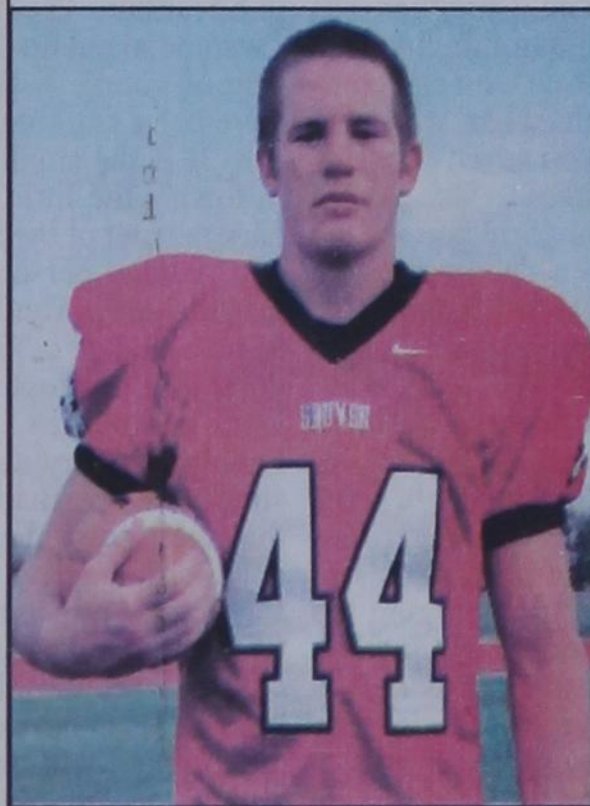
Wills Injured in School Accident

Wolf Recovering in Lubbock Burn Unit

Spearman High School Sophomore varsity football player, Cameron Wolf, who was injured on Sept. 20 while lighting a bonfire and it exploded, causing 2nd and 3rd degree burns on his face, hands, and arms, has the continued support of his friends, family, teammates, and the whole Spearman community behind him.

Thoughts and prayers are flowing in for the young man and his family as he resides in the Burn Unit in Lubbock at the University Medical Center. On a Prayer Group for Cameron Wolf Group page on Facebook, people have been extending their well-wishes as well as receiving updates from some of Cameron's family.

His mother, Kandi, has been updating the community and group members of his progress. She said he had a skin graft on his right arm on Monday, and on Thursday he had a skin graft on his left arm.

"Cameron came through his surgery today like a trooper," said Kandi on the Facebook prayer group page on Thursday. "They told us his right arm was looking good. Backed off his pain meds so he was

awake this afternoon. We even got to take him outside for a while this evening! Nice change of scenery. Hoping tomorrow will be even better."

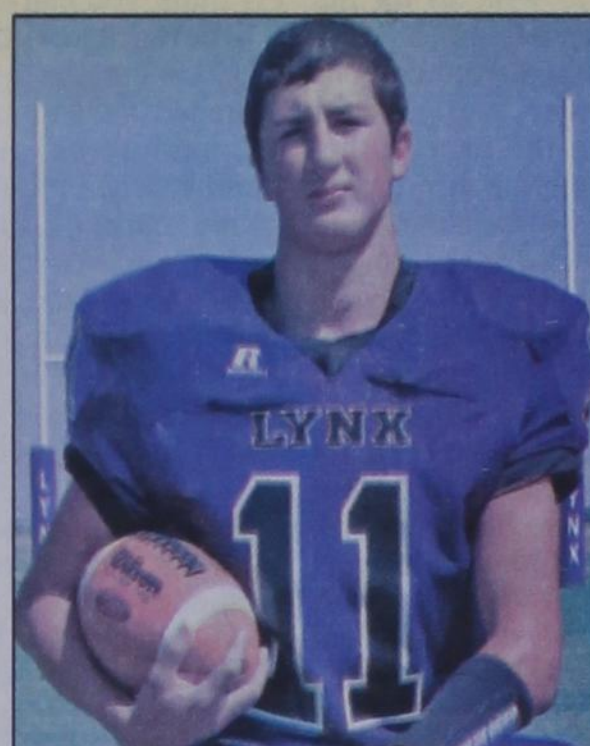
All of Cameron's teammates have made sure they are honoring him in any way possible while he is away and recovering, but one of his close friends and teammates is going above and beyond to show his support.

Christian Ortiz has taken it upon himself to design and start selling t-shirts as a fundraiser and a showing of support for Cameron and his family.

"We have always sat down at the lunch table and joked around and always had plans on making shirts together," said Christian. "I've never seen that kid not smile, so I decided to put a smily face on the front of it."

Christian's ideas behind the shirt have a combination of Cameron's personality, as well as a significant amount of support to be shown to Cameron's family.

"I just want Cameron's parents to know that they have the whole town and many more people out of state too that are be-

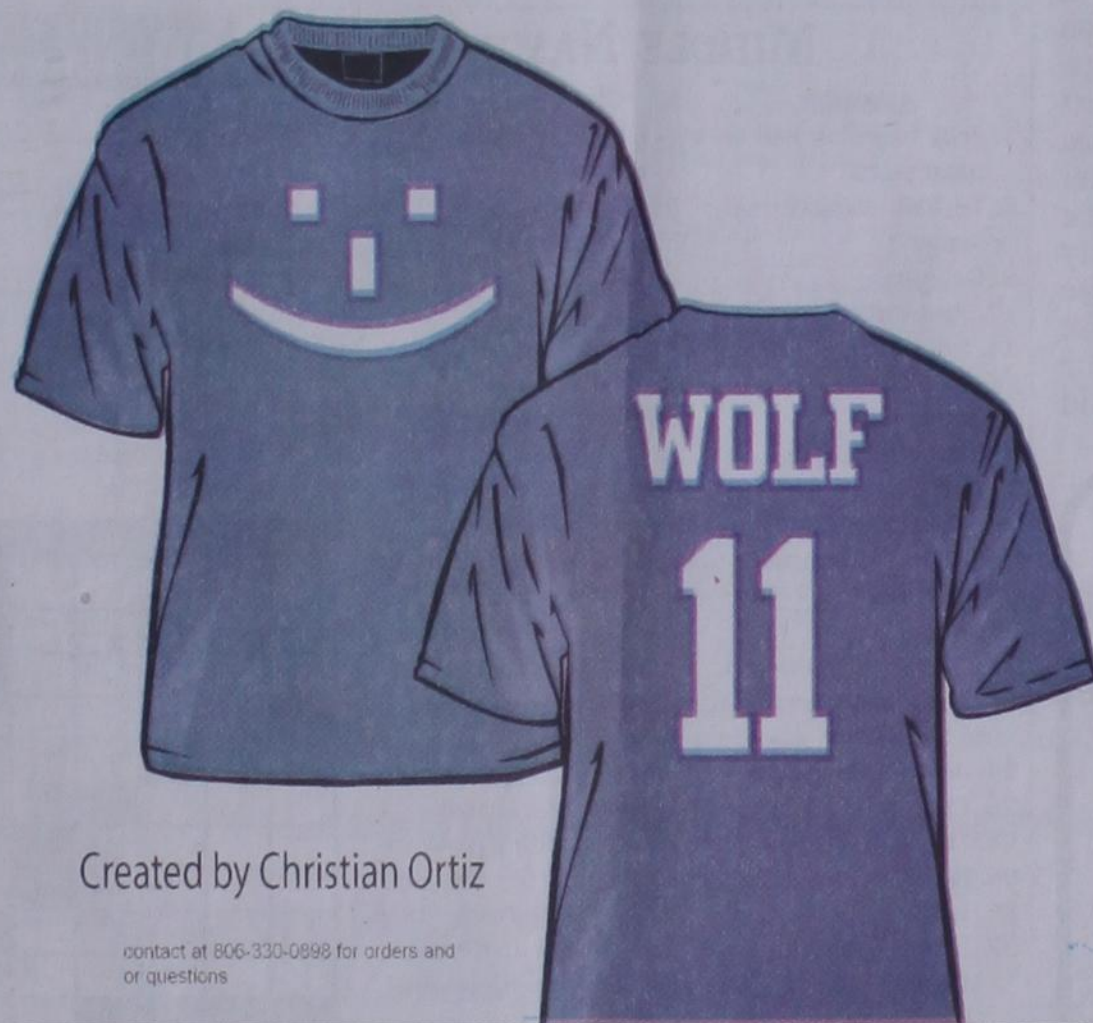

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors for September 25, 2012: Most of the area received some rain, from a trace to more than 5 inches in isolated areas. Soil-moisture levels varied from very short to surplus, with most counties reporting short. The rain caused a temporary halt to the corn harvest in some areas. Cotton was mostly in fair condition. Winter-wheat planting was ongoing, with earlier plantings up and in good shape. Cattle were in fair to good condition.

We are also planning our annual fundraising dinner so stay tuned for details.

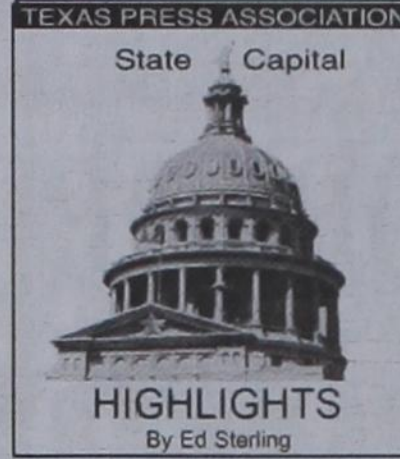
HISTORICAL MUSINGS

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Appeals court upholds Texas open meetings law

AUSTIN — A case brought by a group of 15 city officials naming the State of Texas and Attorney General Greg Abbott as defendants failed before the New Orleans-based U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals on Sept. 25.

In *Asgeirsson et al. v. Abbott*, plaintiffs sought to have the court declare the Texas open meetings law "unconstitutionally vague" and "overbroad" primarily because of criminal provisions local governmental officials face if accused of knowingly circumventing the law. A violation is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$100 to \$500, confinement in jail for one to six months, or both.

Plaintiffs' central argument was that the criminal portion of the law abridges their right to free speech under the First Amendment. However, in a unanimous decision by a three-judge panel, the 5th Circuit affirmed a lower court ruling that the law is constitutionally sound.

After the court released its decision on Sept. 25, Abbott said the outcome "... is a great victory for democracy and the First Amendment. The decision further guarantees the public will continue to have access to information about how their government works. Making meetings accessible and allowing the public to see how decisions are made are the foundation of open government. A healthy democracy requires that the public have access to how government operates."

In 2006, again in 2009-2010 and currently in 2011-2012, sets of more than a dozen city officials from many regions of Texas unsuccessfully brought the same general case and arguments before a federal district court and the 5th Circuit.

Originally adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1967, the open meetings law is intended to discourage public officials from meeting in non-public settings to deliberate on public business. According to the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press, invalidating the law potentially would allow government corruption to escape public scrutiny.

Push is on for spending limits

Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and other Republicans last week called a stricter constitutional spending limit for the state budget ahead of the upcoming legislative session.

In calling for a spending limiting amendment to the state constitution, Perry said, "Government growth, if any, should be kept to the bare minimum and should be limited ... to the rate of our population growth combined with the rate of inflation."

Dewhurst said Texas is "the national model when it comes to keeping state spending to a minimum," adding, "We take pride in the fact that Texas ranks 47th out of 50th per capita in state spending."

Perry called on lawmakers to commit to the five principals of his Texas Budget Compact:

- Practice "Truth in Budgeting";
- Support a constitutional limit of spending to the growth of population and inflation;
- Oppose any new taxes or tax increases and make the small business tax exemption permanent;
- Preserve a strong Rainy Day Fund; and
- Cut unnecessary and duplicative government programs and agencies.

In explaining Truth in Budgeting, Perry said, "We owe it to Texans to create a budget process that's more honest and transparent by making the tough decisions a Texans make every day and presenting a truly balanced

budget free of IOUs and accounting maneuvers."

Red Tape site seeks input

Computer users who have an Internet connection now have an easy way to make their thoughts known on an expanding variety of statewide topics including occupational licensing, state agency rulemaking, public school mandates and manufacturing in Texas.

Texas Red Tape Challenge (www.texasredtapechallenge.com) allows citizens to log in and "share ideas, discuss others' ideas and vote the best ones to the top."

According to the site's sponsor, Texas House Government Reform and Efficiency Committee, "workable ideas that gain consensus will be considered by the Committee for inclusion in its formal report to the 83rd Legislature which begins in January 2013."

More kids taking SAT

Data released by the College Board on Sept. 24 show that in Texas between the 2007-2008 school year and last school year, the number of Hispanic public school students taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test increased by 65 percent.

Gains in SAT-taking also were posted by African-American students, up 42 percent; Asian students, up 29 percent; and white students, up 9 percent.

State Education Commissioner Michael Williams reacted, saying, "We are clearly building a college-going culture in Texas."

Words from Faith & Grace

In the nineteenth week of the Season of Pentecost, we learn of living relationships, our responsibilities in creation, and how we receive the Kingdom of God. We study Genesis 2: 18-24, Psalm 8, Hebrews 1:1-4, 2: 5-12.

In the second creation story, we see that humans need to live in friendship and community. God saw that man was alone and not complete; therefore, God created woman. Woman was created from the side of man (rib); symbolic of a partnership, an equality. Adam declares, "This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh..." The man and the woman become "one flesh". Marriage is a strong bond, ordained by God.

The Psalmist sings a song of relationship, man's relationship with God's creation. The Psalmist asks the question, "What is a man, a mortal, that you care for him". (Note many modern translations put this statement in the plural, in Hebrew it is singular.) Man is crowned with glory by God. Man is intended to be a faithful steward of God's creation.

The writer of Hebrews in soaring Greek distinguishes Christ from the prophets and the angels. Jesus The Christ is the exact 'image' of God; Jesus Christ's throne shall endure forever. God commands all angels to worship Jesus The Christ. The Christ has for a time by becoming man been "lower" than the angels, by becoming man The Christ has experienced humanity. By his resurrection The Christ has been exalted and as he is we shall be. Jesus The Christ alone brings the true revelation of God to man.

The Pharisees ask Jesus about the marriage relationship; "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" They sought perhaps to trap Jesus into heresy, but the question was relevant for Jesus' time because marriage had become easy for men who found any "indecency" in their wife. (Burning the toast could be an 'indecency' under their logic). Jesus answered that Moses' allowed for divorce because of the hardness of men's hearts. But God joins the man and the woman together as one flesh; therefore, it is not for man to separate them. Please note that in the first century women were treated as property and had few rights. A woman could divorce her husband only if he ravished a virgin, if he took up an 'unclean' trade, or if he falsely accuses her of pre-marital sin. Jesus says that whoever divorces and remarries another commits adultery. To this day, because of the hardness of our hearts, our failure to love as Christ loves, divorce can be necessary.

Jesus then blessed the children in the crown and told his disciples, "Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." Little children trust implicitly; a most innocent faith.

May the Holy Spirit strengthen you in all your relationships as a follower of Jesus The Christ.
