Filing Closes In City Council, School Board Elections

The deadline for filing as a candidate in the upcoming school board and city council elections was Monday, March 15th at 5 p.m. The election will be held on Saturday, May 15th.

Mayor Steve Benton and aldermen Charles Elliott and Don Reed are up for reelection this year. Mayor Benton has filed, as well did Charles Elliott. Other candidates filing for Spearman City Council are Roger Buchanan, Jon Garnett and Kathy Boyd. Incumbent Don Reed did not file.

Chad Logsdon refiled for his position on the Gruver City Council. No one else filed.

Gruver ISD listed seven candidates for the school board election while Spearman ISD listed six. Pringle-Morse CISD had three candidates file.

Those who will be vying for three seats on the Gruver Board of Trustees are Curt Fitzgearld. Jeff Graves, Pat Harris, Larry Hicks, Paul Stavlo (I), Davin Winger (I), and Todd Williams . Incumbent Buddy Lowe did not file for the election.

Three seats are also being decided in the Spearman ISD Board of Trustees election. Those filing are Bob Boxwell (I), Stephanie Crossland (I), Will Jarvis (I), Trace Worley, Tony Ferguson and Glen Ray Mackie.


Two seats will be decided on the Pringle-Morse School Board. Filing were Bob Zimmer, James Lieb and Carolyn Shields (I). Incumbent Betty Womble did not file.

Write-in candidates may sign-up until Monday, March 22.

School board seats are for three-year's duration, while city council terms are for two-years.

The first day to accept applications for early voting by mail is March 16, with the early clerk able to mail the ballots to qualified applicants beginning March 31. The last day to receive ballots by mail is 5 p.m. on May 7th.

Early voting in person will be held Wednesday, April 28 through Tuesday, May 11. School board voting will be conducted at the business office of each school, and city council voting will be conducted at City Hall.

Charge Filed In **E-Mail Incident**

Texas Ranger Todd Snyder of Dumas filed a report with County Attorney John Hutchison on Wednesday afternoon concerning a "threatening" e-mail sent to Hansford County judge candidate Cody J. Cazares.

Atty. Hutchison filed a charge for harassment by making a threat using electronic communications [Penal code section 42.07 (2)].

The charge is a Class B Misdemeanor, which carries a fine not to exceed \$2000 and/or imprisonment not to exceed 180 days.

Cazares received the e-mail on Monday, March 1st. The e-mail was traced to a computer within the Region 16 Education System, linking it to a school computer.

The name portion of the e-mail said "kill Cody" and the body of the message included "I will contact you soon, I hope you don't become a victim of political assassination in the meantime."

Cazares released the following statement: "I am very disappointed that my opponent's negative whisper campaign tactics has affected one of our young people enough to do something that he would not normally do. I am saddened that those who oppose my candidacy could allow their own negative opinions to be aired in front of Hansford County's youth in such a harmful way," Cazares said.

Cazares was defeated by County Judge Benny Wilson in the March 9th Republican primary.



Stinnett Volunteers To Provide Labor For \$350,000 Grant Project Grant from ORCA to fund water service development undertaking

Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) today announced it has awarded a \$350,000 grant funds from its Community Development Program (TCDP) Small Towns Environment Program (Texas STEP) to the city of Stinnett for a local water project. The fund

will provide for equipment, expertise, and technical assistance, while volunteers provide the "sweat equity" to complete the project. Stinnett is the seat of Hutchison County.

Texas STEP is an innovative approach to solving the water and wastewater needs in rural Texas. Through this program, residents provide a certain percentage of the labor themselves. This self-help technique encourages small towns and counties to look within their own communities for resources to bring to the table.

The grant will help Stinnett volunteers provide first-time sewer service to some local residents, and alleviate failing septic systems that are overflowing and causing a health nuisance by installing approximately 26,170 linear feet or five miles of four and eight-inch line, 45 manholes, a sewer lift station and 51 service connections.

"Texas STEP is a win/win program for Stinnett and the State of Texas," said Senator Kel Seliger. "Combining money from federal and state sources with hard work from the local citizens will stretch taxpayer dollars and better our standard of living in the Texas Panhandle.

The US Department of Urban Housing and Development (HUD) is the funding source for this program.


This same fight is going on inside you, and inside every other person, too."



-26.52 feet (-0.12) Jim spent a few days last week in Houston at the Woodlands attending the annual Texas Water Conservation Meeting. Jack Lane of Stinnett had planned to fly down with Jim, but back trouble that is to require surgery made him change his plans. Margarette Evans, who drove down, was the only board member to attend.

Some big fish were caught while Jim was gone. Max Taylor caught a 24-pound blue catfish on shad while fishing from the bank, and then Vic White caught a 27-pound one. Since a 28-pound one was caught last year, most of the fishermen think there is at least a 30-pound one waiting to be caught.

Vic White saw a bobcat last week at the intake tower. There seem to be fewer coyotes in the park this year for some reason, and the cottontails are more plentiful.

An armadillo as roadkill was

seen south of Gruver a few days ago. It has not been very long since the first ones were seen in the county. The Eurasian Collared Doves are an addition in the last few years, too. Another bird to watch for is the Inca Dove. They have been seen in the Panhandle in the last fifteen years but had not been recorded in Hansford County. Last summer Amy Harris saw one in the Gruver City Park, so I am wondering if others will be reported this year.

This small dove has a tail almost as long as its body. Its dark tipped feathers give it a scalloped effect all over its body. When it flies chestnut wing patches can be seen, while its long squared tail has white edges when spread.

Like the other doves, the Inca builds a flimsy twig platform for a nest.

Both parents incubate the usual two white eggs. In cold weather the birds nestle on top of each other with sometimes as many as four layers of birds in the form of a pyramid.
