Wheat harvest gets under way

Many of the farmers in the area were relieved to get into the wheat fields and finally start this year's harvest, Saturday, June 13.

With the rain pouring down the last two weeks and all of the hail reported in the surrounding areas, the Hansford County farmers were hoping that they would get into the fields to harvest the crops before the bad weather hit again.

The fields in the area dried enough for a few combines to get into the fields and start cutting dryland wheat Saturday and every since then the numbers have just been increasing.

Pam Barber of Equity Elevators in Spearman said this about the harvest, "It's going pretty good, but it's not really busy yet. It should get in full swing the middle to later part of the week."

Kermit McKee of the Gruver Co-op said, "If the weather stays clear it is really going to get busy. (They are) cutting mostly dryland now." He added that it is the best dryland they've had for a couple of years.

Tommy Pepper of Atteburry Grain in Gruver said that they had gotten in a lot of wheat starting Monday. He added, "It looks like it is going to yield pretty good."

Rhonda Christian of Morse Equity stated that the wheat had not been coming in steady there yet. "We've got two or three cutters," she added.

Randy Coombs of AGCO said, "We got just a dab in on Saturday, but we're getting to swing pretty good."

The following paragraphs are reports from the different elevators on the wheat they have received.

On Saturday, June 13, the

Gruver Co-op received 3,000 bushels with the moisture ranging from 14.5% to 15.5%. 20,000 bushels were delivered on Sunday and 44,000 bushels came in on Monday. By then the moisture content of the wheat was averaging 12.5%. The test weight averaged 59.5.

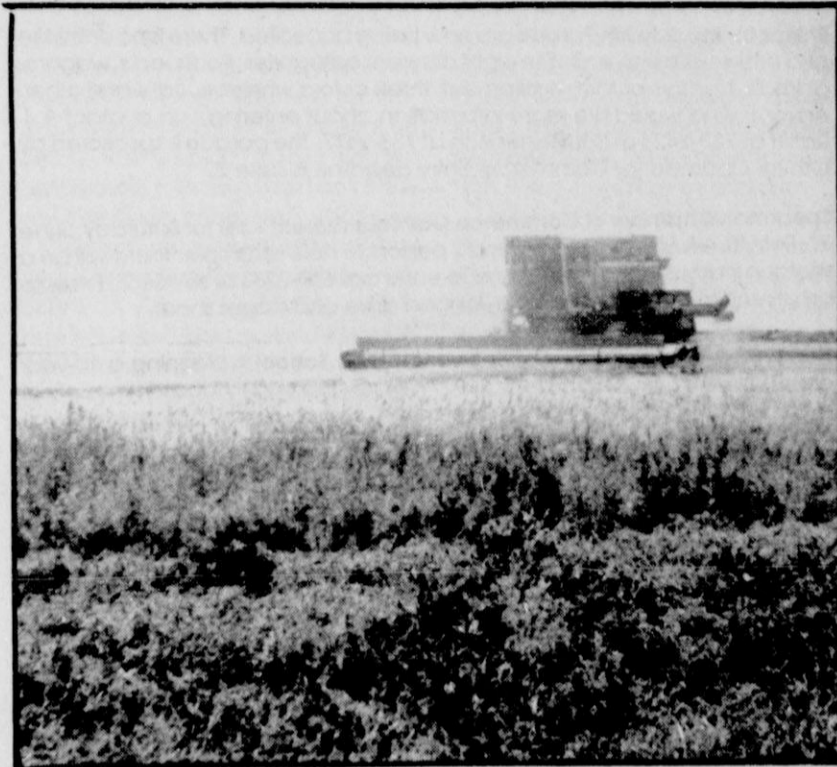
Morse Equity reported that the farmers had "cut a little bit" there on Saturday, but they hadn't received much until Sunday when they got 15,000 bushels. Then on Monday 14,000 bushels were delivered to the elevator.

Coombs of AGCO said that they had gotten in 2133 bu. on Saturday. And for Saturday and Sunday a total of 100,000 bu. of wheat had been delivered to their elevators. The moisture averaged 12.3% and the test weight was 59.5. He guessed that dryland was yielding from 25 to 30 bushels per acre and

added that it was "good quality" wheat.

On Saturday, Equity Elevators of Spearman received 9,483 bu. of wheat with a moisture average of 14% and a test weight of 58. By Sunday the moisture had dropped to 12.5% (which is about where they want it, the best is between 11 and 12) the test weight was still 58 and they had received 13,166 more bushels of wheat. On Monday, a little over a 16,606 bu. of wheat were delivered to the elevator. The average moisture content was 11.8% and the test weight was up to 59.

Bernstein Elevators in Gruver said that they had received 15,000 bushels of wheat on Sunday and 51,000 bushels on Monday. The moisture content on the wheat ranged from 10.5% to 14%. Pepper said that the test weights on the wheat were good.



It was a cloud of dust and get the wheat in on Sunday afternoon for Frank Wilmeth and many other Hansford County farmers. The harvest got under way Saturday, June 13.

Latta wins HLS&R scholarship

Leslie A. Latta was awarded a \$10,000, four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H scholarship recently in special ceremonies at the Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station.

Leslie, daughter of Tom and Linda Latta of Spearman, is a recent graduate of Spearman High School where she was a member of the Future Homemakers of America and the National Honor Society. Leslie was a member of 4-H for nine years, actively involved in raising and exhibiting sheep and beef cattle. She was also a member of the county livestock judging team.

Leslie, who plans to major in veterinary science at Tarleton State University, was one of 50 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H scholarship winners honored.

Members of the Texas Agricul-

tural Extension Service choose the 4-H scholarship recipients. The selected students all demonstrated academic excellence and strong leadership skills throughout their high school careers.

All 4-H recipients must pursue a degree in agriculture of life sciences at a Texas college or university.

In remarks to the Texas 4-H Roundup participants, James R. "Dick" Graves, president of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, said, "As many of you know, we had the most successful show of our 60-year history just a few months ago. Nearly one million people attended our rodeo and more than 1.5 million people attended our livestock show, horse show and rodeo combined."

He also commented on the results of caps placed on the amount

of money junior show exhibitors could receive for their animals at auction. Money paid in excess of these caps (first implemented in 1992), \$808,900, was added to the Show's scholarship fund.

As Graves prepared to hand out the 50 scholarships, he noted, "It is quite obvious that the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is committed to youth, to education and to the improvement of agricultural production and processing. Our partnership with the Texas 4-H and our association with these fantastic young people you see here tonight exemplify this commitment."

Scholarship funding is provided by revenues earned and the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. The Show has committed more than \$2 million in educational funds for the upcoming school year.

Eakin and McCloy... qualify for national finals rodeo

Hansford County's Mark Eakin and Marty McCloy will be traveling to Shawnee, Okla. in July for the National High School Rodeo Finals. Contestants sign in on July 19. The competition begins July 20 and runs through July 26.

These cowboys qualified for nationals by placing in the top four in an event at the Texas High School Rodeo Finals last week-end in Abilene.

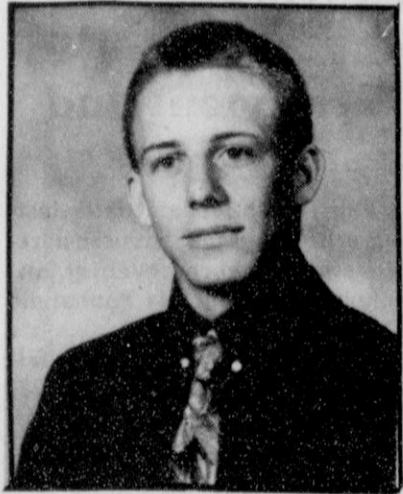
Wanda Eakin, Mark's mother, explained the state competition. Everyone goes into the state competition even. No points are carried in from the regional competition. Each contestant starts at zero.

Gruver rodeo team member, McCloy and his partner, Marty Nicholson of Canadian, qualified for nationals in the team roping.

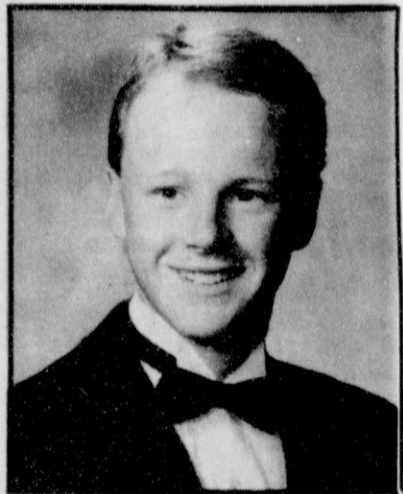
In the first round their time was a long 18. "We were a 13 plus 5," McCloy said. The five seconds was added to their time because they only caught one heel. Apparently the time did not discourage them, because in the second-go they roped their steer in 6.8 seconds. These two times combined equalled 25.866 seconds which was fast enough to bring them back to the short-go (The top 10 teams after the two goes compete in the short-go.) setting fourth.

In the short-go the team completed their run in 8.676 seconds. The time placed them third in the round and moved them from fourth in the average to second. Their total time on three head was 34.542 seconds.

McCloy's good friend, Eakin will

also be competing at Nationals. He qualified in the calf roping.

In the first-go he had a time of 11.947 which was fast enough to win him ninth. He placed fifth in the second-go. His time was 11.023 seconds. These two times combined (22.97 seconds) placed him in the top ten. In the short-go he roped and tied his calf in 11.675 seconds placing him fourth in the go-around. His average time on three head was 34.6450 seconds. A time that would win him third in the average and a trip to Shawnee.

"He had three good calves," Wanda said.

Eakin also competed in the steer wrestling and the saddle bronc riding at the state competition.

In the steer wrestling Eakin threw his first-go steer in 7.5 seconds. He placed ninth in the go.

He scored 69 points on his saddle bronc in the first-go to place seventh in the round. This score also

placed him eighth in the average.

Although Eakin and McCloy compete against each other in the rodeo arena, they are still good friends, said W. Eakin. They go out there and compete and then the yell for each other, added W. Eakin.

Matt Eakin competed in the state competition, but did not qualify for national finals this year. He is a sophomore at Spearman High School, so he still has time, said W. Eakin.

The Tri-State Finals (regional) competition was held June 4 through June 7 at the Will Rogers Range Riders Arena in Amarillo.

In other business, the commissioners' court approved advertising for bids for the sale of property

re-evaluates speed limits in city

Gruver City Commission approved a resolution setting speed limits on State Highways within the city.

A.J. Ratliff, city manager, said that only one highway speed limit was changed by the resolution, Highway 15. The section of road in front of Gophers and continuing to the Community Bible Church was changed from 50 miles per hour to 40 miles per hour, he said. The change occurs as vehicles enter the city limits.

In other business, it was approved that the city participate with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) (which is the Panhandle Council of Government) in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) training. This act states that all government buildings be made assessable to the handicapped, Ratliff said. "It (the buildings) will be analysed by the PRPC and they will make a recommendation on the changes that need to

take place," he stated. Southwestern Bell Telephone Company representatives, Gary Stevens and Sandra Lewis opened discussion on a new Franchise Agreement with the City of Gruver.

Discussion was also held on soliciting for bids to build a replica of the Zulu Stockade at the Stationmaster's House Museum.

The motion was approved.

A road easement was granted to Maxus Exploration. The easement is in Commissioner's Precinct No. 1, Dick Gillaspie's precinct, said Brown.

This means that Maxus Exploration will be running a line under a county road southeast of Spearman.

Regular business for County Commissioners included approval of minutes from the previous meeting, approval of the treasurer's report and approval of claims for payment.

H.C. rebate checks down

In a recent report released by State Comptroller, John Sharp figures showed that Hansford County's sales tax rebate for the month of June are down by 3.79% from this same time last year.

In June, Hansford County received rebate checks of \$13,911.09 in 1991 and received \$13,383.24 in 1992.

Spearman's rebate payment for June 1992 are \$9,796.89 compared to June 1991's \$10,445.77. This is a 6.21% decrease from 1991 to 1992.

Gruver's rebate checks for June 1992 are \$3,586.35 which is a 3.49% increase from the 1991 rebate pay-

ments of \$3,465.32.

Although the rebate checks for Hansford County are down for the month of June, the payments to date are up by 8.63% from 1991.

In 1991, the payments to date in Gruver amounted to \$21,671.91. The 1992 payments have totaled \$24,259.01. This is an increase of 11.94%.

The rebate checks for Spearman in 1991 totaled \$80,130.90 to-date. In 1992, it has increased by 7.73%. The rebate payments for 1992 have totaled \$86,328.42 so far this year.

State Comptroller, John Sharp, reported having sent \$105.6 million in June sales tax rebates to

 JESUS: THE FOOD FRIEND**

One of the most amazing things about Jesus was that even though his teachings were often hard to accept, people loved him. Jesus encouraged people. Critics unwittingly praised Jesus when they labeled him a friend of tax collectors and sinners.

A sinful woman came to a well thirsty, and left bubbling over with the water of life. An unpopular tax collector climbed a tree with hopes of catching a glimpse of Jesus, and ended up having a life-changing lunch with him. A prostitute, hopelessly tangled up in her sin, was thrown at Jesus' feet, expecting words of scorn and judgement, and heard instead the merciful, "Neither do I condemn thee."

Barnabas must have had this quality of Jesus in his life. His name means "son of encourage-

ment." He apparently had the gift to be able to believe in people, to see their potential in spite of mistakes in their past. Remember how Barnabas stood by Paul while others were unsure of his conversion (see Acts 8:26-27). And it was Barnabas who gave John Mark a second chance to be a missionary after his first attempt ended in failure. (See Acts 15:37). Paul could not see such potential in John Mark, but Barnabas could, and Mark became the writer of the Gospel which bears his name.

We have a need for the gift of encouraging today. The world is a lonely place for many; good friends are hard to find. Saints with this gift are needed when people have experienced great failure in their lives. Leaders need encouragement from those who follow. Certainly all of us can be good friends, but some are especially gifted to be like Christ in this way.

- * a resource for consumer information to aid consumer decision making.

Better Business Bureaus handle inquiries and complaints. The BBB offers general consumer information through reports and pamphlets containing summaries of business practices. A report may focus on a particular company's experience record or may give an overview of an industry.

The BBB will also inform consumers of complaints which have been brought to their attention regarding a particular company. The bureau can usually respond to inquiries for information regarding charities or philanthropic organizations which have requested contributions.

The BBB assists in resolving complaints against businesses. Bureaus do not handle complaints concerning legal matters, credit matters, collection of accounts, or wages owed. When written complaints they can handle are received, the Bureau sends them to the company concerned for review and reply. When the company responds, the BBB will help to resolve differences between the business and customer.

Whether or not complaints are answered or resolved, each complaint becomes a part of the history on that company. Because of this, complaints which cannot be resolved are still helpful to other consumers who fall to request information on a company before doing business.

Better Business Bureaus do not offer judgments regarding businesses. They offer factual information designed to allow the consumer to make informed decisions. This means the consumer may have to interpret warning signals in Bureau responses. For example, a response of "There is a pattern of no response from that company," means the company has ignored previous attempts by the BBB to intervene on behalf of dissatisfied customers and may ignore complaints.

While the consumer must be alert to warning signals, it is unfair to assume that any company with a complaint filed against it is unscrupulous or that all complaints filed

By providing consumer information and handling complaints, local Better Business Bureaus serve as useful community consumer resources.

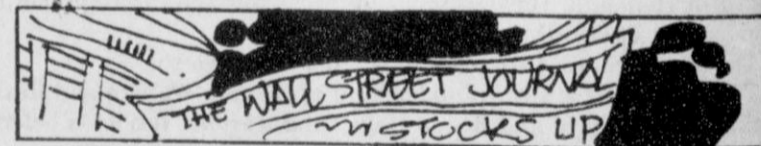
Tee off time for the shotgun start is 10 a.m. The deadline for entries is Saturday, June 20 at 9 a.m.

Another \$142.5 million in quarterly payments went to six transit authorities in the state's largest cities.

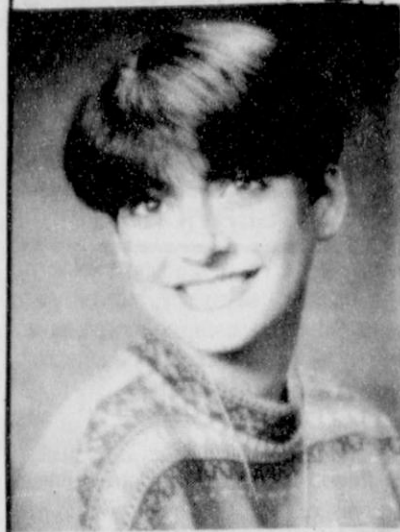
