**IT MAKES US BLUSH.**

THE BRAND has always been inclined to look upon Hereford as being far in advance of her sister Panhandle towns in most, if not every respect, but a visit to Canyon City last week reveals the inevitable fact that that progressive city has at least passed us in one particular, and that in the construction of substantial concrete sidewalks. A walk of standard size has been placed around the entire square and the city council, of which Geo. Abbott formerly of this county is a member, has done some work worthy of emulation in the construction of cement crossings with culverts made of the same material. Not only has this useful work been well executed in the business portion of the town, but almost every residence owner has taken up a progressive spirit and made similar improvements.

#### HEREFORD A CLEAN CITY.
