SATISFIED WITH THE PLAINS.

Uncle Fred Williamson Tells of the Southwest Country. Coming Back West.

Falfurias, Texas, March 9, 1907. To the Editor of the Brand:

Dear Sir:—After spending two weeks in this country looking around for room to settle down I thought that some of your many readers would like to read a few lines from their humble servant. I will drop the Brand this short letter.

This is 175 miles south of San Antonio at the terminus of a branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. Falfurias is in the upper end of Starr County, 90 miles from the county seat, Rio Grande City. Mexicans are largely in the majority here and any one not versed in the Spanish vocabulary is apt to be left out at any public affair unless you are built on the fashion of Balam's mule. In other words, Mexicans and their burros hold full sway down here, with prickly pears in the lead for the general supply of food. This country is level for miles without a break except now and then a sand ruff with a fine growth of grass burs.

We visited the noted Laster Mott

farm. The ranch foreman told me Mr Laster had 23,000 head of cattle and 1,000 head of horses and mules, besides sheep and plenty of Mexican laborers at work. The ranch house is a nice residence located in a live oak grove of about ten acres, situated on a slight promontory, with numerous out houses and water conveniences.

They have artesian wells here but they seem to be weak and have to be aided by Gasoline pumps to throw a sufficient stream. The land is an ashy color and very fine. They have the double wind mill here, two wheels, one turning one way and one the other; they claim it gives double power, and it does throw a good stream of water. There is no grass or place for grass to grow visible to a man up a tree here, but prickly pear is everywhere and in everybody's way. In short, this country may suit a few white people, but I want it understood that I am not included in that few, for this is the home of Mexicans, burros and prickly pears.

I will start northwest in a few days better satisfied to settle than I ever would have been had I not seen this country at all.

Farewell to Southern Texas
God help the people there
To ride Burros astraddle
And feed them on prickly pear.
Many kind wishes for the Brand and its many readers.

Mr. B. Barnard Dead.

On last Sunday afternoon at about 6 o'clock all of Hereford was shocked to learn of the almost sudden death of one of her prominent business men, Mr. B. Barnard. He was sick only about twenty-four hours, having been at his place of business until Saturday at noon. Conjestion of the lungs or acute pneumonia was the cause of his death. So sudden was his death that all of his family did not get in in time to spend the last

few moments with him at his bedside.

Mr. B. Barnard was born March 19th, 1842, in Missouri. He came to Texas in 1860 as a young man just before the breaking out of the Civil War, and settled at Springtown in Parker county. From there he went to join the army and served as a Confederate soldier for four years. After the war he returned to Parker county, where he resided a greater part of the time until he moved to

the plains. At one time he was run away from his home by the Indians who were making ravages in that part of the country; he went to Rockwall county, spending about a year. After the Indians became peaceable he returned to his old home in Parker county. He was married in 1866 to Miss M. A. Montgomery of Missouri, who survived him only a few days. To this happy union were born nine children, six of whom are living: Mrs. H. B. Webb of Hereford, Mrs. George Ashwander of Weatherford Mrs. Dr. Hicks of Amarillo, J. L. Banard of Parker county, and Misses Minnie and May Barnard of this city.

Mr. Barnard moved to Hereford about three years ago and since that time has been prominently associated with the business interests of our city, both as a merchant and as a property holder. He was a consistent member of the Methodist church and in his loyalty to his church and pastor his equal was rarely found anywhere. He was always willing and ready to do anything for the church, the good of the community, the uplift of the race, the glory of God—in fact "Whatever his hands found to do he did it with his might." Mr. Barnard was a very religious man and lived his religion every day and enjoyed the confidence and respect of all who knew him. In the death of Mr. Barnard Hereford loses one of its most useful and progressive citizens.

We join the many friends of the family in extending our deepest feelings of sympathy to the stricken home.

Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon by Rev. A. C. Smith and the remains were buried with Masonic honors in the city cemetery.

AN ORDINANCE.

Chapter 3.—Shall Not Sweep, Etc., any Paper, Trash, Etc., into Gutters, Streets or Alleys.

Article 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford.

It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, sweep, place or throw or cause or permit to be deposited, swept or thrown or placed in any sewer, gutter, ditch, street, alley or on the sidewalk, or in front of any premises owned, occupied or controlled by him, her or them, any sweeping of dirt, trash, waste paper, or other rubbish or filth

of any kind, but all such trash, rubbish or filth accumulating in any house or on any sidewalk in front thereof, shall be swept and collected together by the occupant or owner of such house or premises, and placed in a box or barrel, which such occupant shall, as often as necessity may require, burn or empty or have emptied beyond the limits of the City, at his own expense, and any person violating any of the provisions of this article, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$50.00.

The public school board met in call session at the office of Bowers & Dunlap Saturday morning to fill the vacancy in the seventh grade, created by the resignation of Mrs. Vannoy. The meeting failed in its purpose, however, as there were no applicants who were eligible to the place, the better teachers being engaged at present in closing out the latter portion of their session's work. At the earnest solicitation of the Board, Mrs. D. W. Hawkins consented to teach for a week or so, in order that a suitable teacher may be found.

Superintendent Hawkins was present at the meeting and addressed the Board on some needed improvements and additions which the rapid growth of our schools have made necessary. Chief among these were the addition of the eleventh grade and extending the scholastic age from 17 years to either 18 or 19 years. After some discussion of these questions it was thought best to defer final action until some subsequent meeting when they will be disposed of.

In the meantime, the Board is waiting to receive applications to fill the vacancy now existing in the school. Those having friends without employment should report to some member of that body.

AN ORDINANCE.

Chapter 4. Regulating the Running of Automobiles Within the City Limits.

Article 1a. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford:

That it shall be unlawful for any person who owns, controls or drives or otherwise uses an automobile, to run same at a rate of speed higher than eight miles per hour within the city limits of the City of Hereford. Any person violating the provisions of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Article 2a. Any person owning, controlling or otherwise using an automobile within the city limits of Hereford, when meeting a buggy or any other vehicle being drawn by one or more horses or mules, driven by a woman, or by anyone, when the horses or mules are inclined to shy or become frightened at the said automobile, the driver shall stop said automobile until the vehicle passes, and anyone violating the provisions of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Article 3a. Any person offending against either of the preceding articles of this chapter shall be fined in any sum not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00.

NEW ROAD TO EXTEND

Col. Ransom Submits Propositions to Towns North on Proposed Line.

In response to a letter written by Col. J. H. Ransom to the Railroad Committee at Dalhart just after his return from Boulder, Colorado, in regard to extending the Panhandle Short Line north through that place, he received a telegram from them requesting him to come at once, that they were ready to consider his proposition.

The road will extend north-west through the Panhandle into the coal fields of Colorado, thus giving us direct connection with the largest and best coal mines in the West. The direct route north has not yet been decided upon but Col. Ransom is submitting propositions to the different points along the proposed line and will in the near future determine upon the territory through which it is to be extended, and fortunate indeed is the country through which it is to pass.

The property holders and busi-

ness men all along the line are very anxious for the road. It will be a great factor in developing this wonderful Panhandle country. It will not only extend north to the rich coal fields of Colorado but will give us direct connection with the most important cities of Central and Southern Texas, and the Gulf of Mexico. When completed this line will be one of the most important railroads in the West.

KEEP OFF PLAY GROUND.

At the last meeting of the public school Board, complaints were made with reference to boys, not in school, loafing on the play ground at recess and hanging around the buildings during the study period. As a rule, it is said, these boys were in school earlier in the session, but from one cause and another have dropped out. The Board does not feel like taking drastic methods of preventing this cause of annoyance, so they ask the Brand to say that all who are not engaged in actual school work will not make a practice of spending their time about the school campus. This is a matter which comes directly under the jurisdiction of the School Board and they are right in removing every obstacle which would hinder the progress of the school. A careful observance of this request will be duly appreciated by them.

AFTER TAX DODGERS.

State Revenue Agent Declares His Intention of Looking Well After State Finances.

Austin, Tex., March 7.—Capt. W. J. McDonald, State Revenue Agent, has been investigating tax matters in this State, and says he has discovered some of the causes for the present deficiency. He says that a full rendition of all taxable property at fair values, followed by close collection of taxes, would very materially change the present conditions.

Art. 5098, Revised Statutes of 1895, requires property owners to render and swear to correct lists of property subject to taxation. A false affidavit to such lists is punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary.

Art. 5100 provides that if the Assessor fails to require property owners to subscribe and swear to such lists, he, the Tax Assessor, shall forfeit to the county \$50, to be deducted out of his commissions for each such failure.

Capt. McDonald says that he intends to follow up these two articles and to see that property owners who wilfully swear falsely in rendering their property shall be investigated by the Grand Juries of this State. He intends also to see that Tax Assessors do their duty in regard to the above articles so that those who may be indicted under this law for false swearing can not escape on the ground that the Assessor did not administer the oath.

Severe penalties are also imposed upon those charged with the duties

of collecting occupation taxes, and the State Revenue Agent intends to enforce this law.

Those who know Capt. McDonald are ready to testify that there will be trouble unless the tax laws are strictly obeyed.

Work On Elevator.

Work was begun the first of the week on the new flouring mill and elevator, mention of which has hitherto been made in these columns. The work is being done at the instigation of the Star Mill and Elevator Co. of Amarillo, who intend putting a plant here which will easily take care of the grain business of this section. The contract for the excavation and buildings is in charge of M. J. Travis of Wichita, Kans., and will be pushed to completion in time to handle this year's crop.

Besides their two story elevator, a warehouse 108 feet long will be erected. All told, their plant will have a storage capacity of more than 10,000 bushels.

The Brand is glad to witness the inauguration of this valuable enterprise as it means much for the farmers of this and adjoining counties.

Another Old Resident Gone.

One of Hereford's old and respected citizens was taken from us in the death of Mr. John A. Tomamichel which occurred on early morning of the 13th. He had lived in Hereford for several years, and was widely and favorably known.

He leaves a wife who has been his companion in the joys and sorrows of life for nearly fifty-three years. They were the parents of nine children. The youngest living son, J. J. Tomamichel, who is County Judge of Billings county, N. D., has been with his father in the last days of his illness.

The funeral service was held on Thursday at 2 p. m., at the Presbyterian church, his minister, W. G. Keiry officiating. Burial was conducted by the Odd Fellows Lodge, in the city demetery.

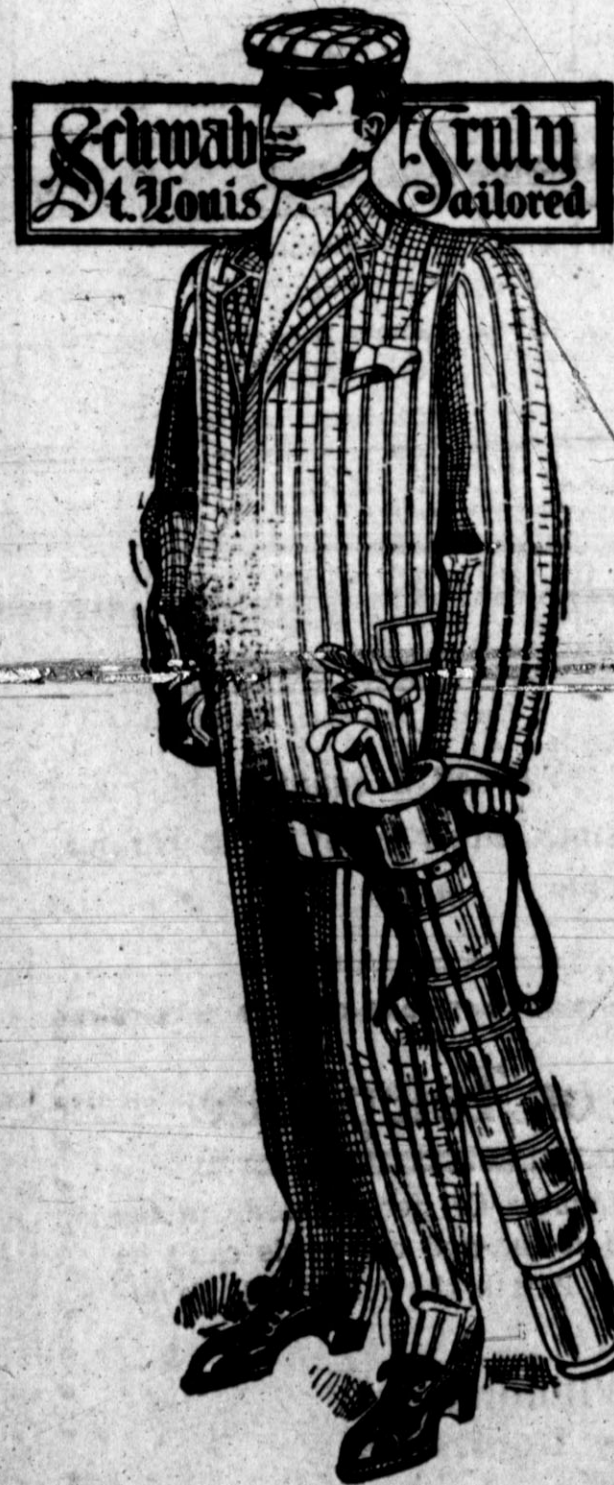
