ONE AND ONE-THIRD INCHES RAIN FALL

Two Good Rains at Hereford With Two to Four Duplicates in Other Parts of County Make Fine Season.

Beginning Friday afternoon with a heavy rain 3 miles south of Hereford and extending east to west for 30 miles, several good showers and heavy pour downs all around gives the Hereford country a good season.

The rains have been general all over the Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico to the Rocky mountains. The Canadian river is on a rampant and has torn out 24 bents of the bridge. The Rock Island road has also been crippled.

North and west of Hereford a fine rain fell Monday night, reports naming as high as 4 inch fall. In many places the basin lakes are well filled.

At Hereford there were three distinct showers: Sunday morning a fall of .80 inches was registered; Sunday night another fall of .50 inches fell, and the following morning a light shower brought the total

up to 1 1/2 inches.

These rains will start off feed crops in fine shape, and will help many of the other crops.

Since the rains, it has been very warm and May closes with a good average month, showing a total rainfall of 1.80 inches.

The Courthouse Yard.

Deaf Smith county will have the most attractive court yard in all the Panhandle in a few days.

The commissioners are having all the debris removed and the grounds leveled and graded. The fine lot of trees when trimmed will be joy forever.

A suggestion. The large pieces of concrete and old rock left on the grounds could be easily built into a beautiful rockery and fountain. All that would be needed is to pile the rock and concrete blocks in a careless but artistic manner, place a pipe connection with a water jet from the top of the pile and the work would be done. The expense of making this beauty spot on the courtyard would not be as much as to remove the rocks from the ground.

"We all hated to leave Hereford so bad we couldn't hardly stand it, but as I had made arrangements two or three months ago, we couldn't do anything else but move. But we all think lots of Hereford, the country and also the people, so don't be surprised if you see us all driving back."

"As a whole the trip was pleasant and roads good, mighty pretty scenery between Amarillo and Dumas through the Canadian breaks, also through the Cimarron breaks in Kansas. From Amarillo to Dumas it is 56 miles and we only saw five people. Stayed at Dumas Saturday night and Sunday night at Liberal, Kansas. After leaving Liberal we found about twenty miles of paved road, but it was paved with sand, four to six inches deep, but we pulled

through it alright.
"After crossing the Cimarron river, or driving through it, (wasn't any bridge), had good roads to Plains, and there we struck the mud. Had been a four inch rain a couple of days before, sixty or seventy miles of muddy roads, sorry driving, several boggy places, but fortunately we pulled through alright.

"We might have got here Monday night but it was getting late and the folks tired, so we stayed at Pratt, twenty miles southwest of here, and we drove in here Tuesday morning. Our speedometer registered the total number of miles 520.

FIFTH WEEK DISTRICT COURT

The New Courthouse Draws So
 Much Admiration From the Court
 That There is Nothing Doing
 In Particular.

District Court reconvened Monday
 morning in the new courthouse and
 resumed the trial of the case of the
 Bank of Bovina vs. Tom Riley. After
 hearing all the testimony the court
 gave judgment in favor of the plain-
 tiff for \$2063.35, but quashed the
 plaintiff's writ of attachment and
 ordered the money now in the hands
 of the Clerk to be turned over to the
 defendant.

The case of The Western Nation-
 al Bank vs. H. B. McKinley, suit on
 a note and for foreclosure of an at-
 tachment lien, is now on trial.

Court will probably dispose of all
 the business before it this week and
 adjourn for the term.
