Special Telephone Feature With Dallas Train.

The special train bearing the business men of Dallas which will pass through Hereford April 22nd, will have installed a complete telephone equipment by which those on board may communicate with one another while the train is in motion and at the principal points en route may place long distance calls as they desire. As soon as the train reaches the city, linemen will be ready to connect telephones on this special train with the long distance switchboard and calls will be handled exactly as from any residence or business house. For the information of those who may desire to call the train, the number of the special telephone will be 313. A complete miniature switchboard will be installed in the baggage car of the special train and an operator will connect lines from each car as directed. The train telephone system extends from the Locomotive cab to the rear platform. This will be in service all the time. It will not be necessary to walk back and fourth through the train to find friends and business associates who may be in some other car. The Southwestern Telegraph & Telephone Co., will be represented on this trip by General Com'l Supt. P. K. Baker.

The linemen will be ready to make the necessary connections as soon as the train arrives, and Mr. Lovelace proposes to break the record by having phone conversation established in less than one minute.

While attending the session of the Panhandle Press Association held at Canyon City last week, the members had the pleasure of visiting the different departments of the Northwest Texas Normal. President Cousins had personal charge and explained the object and work of each department. The different classes were busy with their work, even though it was Saturday, having made Monday the week holiday. We found an earnest body of students, numbering more than 400, the pick of the Plains counties, but there were a goodly number from other sections of the state. The school spirit was of a high order and the decorum was such as indicated a true conception of the object in view. A mention of all of the departments separately would lengthen this beyond the limits of a country paper, but we must make mention of some of the work being done. The manual training or rather we should say the carpenter and cabinet shops excited the visiting newspaper men and women to expressions of surprise and admiration. The splendid work being done by the boys in their overalls was indicative of the general training of the entire school—the heart, the mind and the hand. The wood turning, the tables, desks, being made by the boys would do credit to the long established manufacturing plants of other states. The machinery in this department was of the best and latest patterns. Another department that

must have appealed as strongly to the lean and lank editors was that known better to them as the kitchen school, but called the "Culinary Department." Here we found a number of the fairer students in spotless white aprons preparing a dinner for the visiting debating team from the Denton Normal. One young lady was caught in the act of putting her beautiful white hands into a mass of golden dough and was deftly forming the much relished "biscuits" of the Sunny South. The long cooking tables with handy gas jets and ranges made the task of doing something useful both a pleasure and a means of training. In another room, other young ladies were spreading the linen and placing the table silver and china preparatory to the sumptuous meal being cooked in the kitchen.

But perhaps the greatest power of the school, the one that will cast its radium influence into the every recesses of the state was found in the teacher-training department. In this we found the young ladies, who had chosen teaching as their life work, not bent over books on "How to teach," but handling a small class of actual boys and girls, under the supervision of a professional trainer. The subjects and the subject matter were thus brought together. Teachers turned out under such conditions will not go out to take a school without working knowledge of what they are expected to do. Trustees who employ trained teachers will not employ inexperienced teachers if they seek those who have pursued such a course in training as is being given at the Northwest Texas Normal. President Cousins and his at-le corps of assistants are to be congratulated for the good work they are doing. Canyon City is to be praised for her energy in securing such an institution; and the state of Texas must of necessity be proud of the work by the school on the High Plains.

TIERRA BLANCO VALLEY ABROAD

Publication of Record Yields of Crops Raised by Pump Irrigation by National Paper.

Information about the success of farming by irrigation is being sought by the largest circulation farm journals in the United States. Only recently Southern Farming of Atlanta, Ga., one of the farm journal publications of the Judd Company, published a splendid column telling about the record crops raised on the irrigated farms in the Tierra Blanco Valley. These journals have a combined circulation of 500,000 and permeate every farming section of the country. The article published is of such a nature as will be read with interest, and for fear that this wide-spread publicity will not be noticed by our local people, the entire article is reprinted by permission.

Hereford is located in the southeastern part of Deaf Smith county, Texas, and it has been no trouble to develop wells here that furnish from 1000 to 1600 gallons of water a minute, which is enough to irrigate from 160 to 320 acres of land, depending upon the crops planted. The type of well used is 24 inches in diameter, in which the centrifugal or turbine pump is installed. The pumps are driven by crude oil engines, making very cheap power, and water cost compares favorably with the very best gravity systems, without the attendant complications, and the assurance of no short water at any season of the year.

The principal crops grown under irrigation here are alfalfa, wheat, oats, corn, milo, kafir and millet. The yield of oats last year ranged from 40 to 104 bushels an acre, with an average of 60 bushels. One experimental field of Alberta white oats made 104 bushels on an acre. This was grown by Henry Scheutte with three 4-inch irrigations, and shows the possibilities of oats under proper handling with good seed. Wheat made an average of 24 bushels an acre, which was satisfactory considering the late start in the spring and the amount of water applied, one 3-inch irrigation. With good seed, more water and early seeding there is no good reason why the yield will not reach 50 bushels to the acre, since soil and climate are well adapted to wheat growing.

The forage crops are simply immense. Kafir and milo are estimated by old-timers at from 90 to 110 bushels an acre. Men who have grown these crops for years say they never saw anything like the yield. Millet has been a very profitable crop and quick money. It is good for 25 bushels of seed and about 1 1/2 tons of good feed to the acre, and when cut for hay makes from two to three tons. Millet has been grown quite extensively on stubble ground after wheat and oats, making two crops a year, and is always in demand at good prices.

Alfalfa, however, will be the main crop under irrigation. Every irrigated farm will finally be found with 75 per cent of the acreage seeded to alfalfa. Every field seeded the past fall is a good stand and in vigorous condition. With the moisture condi-

tions right, it is very easy to get a stand, and this is controlled to a nicety from the pumps. Land seeded to alfalfa late in August, 1911, produced four cuttings of hay the past year, with a total yield of about four tons.

While the crops mentioned are all money-makers, they do not by any means represent all the crops adapted to this country. Apples, plums, peaches, cherries, all the berries and all the common vegetables are produced in a small way very successfully. Sugar beets containing 16.1 per cent sugar have been grown. Bermuda onions do well and are good keepers. Choice celery, cantaloups and sweet potatoes are grown in Hereford's gardens every year.

Irrigation has opened a new field for the stock man. Cattle and sheep, which are usually shipped as stockers, are now being full fed on the irrigated farm. E. W. Morgan has fed 1500 lambs on irrigated kafir and obtained fine results. Several bunches of calves have been fattened on alfalfa and ground kafir and milo, with the addition of a little cottonseed meal.

The silo will play an important part in this feeding proposition. While there are no silos here at present, a large number of farmers have seen the folly of the waste in handling dry feed and will install silos next season. Every acre of irrigated kafir in the Hereford country this year would have made at least 15 tons of good silage, and when the cost of producing this feed is figured it will be seen that the profits in feeding will be largely increased.

The discovery of irrigating water on the staked plains of Texas is of recent date. It is not yet two years since it was found that irrigation was feasible and water plentiful.
