## LUBBOCK SEES HEREFORD WELLS

Committee of Citizens From Live Town Visit the District and Inspect Wells, Water and Wealth Winners.

Last Friday and Saturday twelve live wires from Lubbock were in Hereford as the guests of D. L. McDonald of the McDonald Company, and came for the purpose of seeing for themselves, the irrigation wells. They had been told of the extent of the project at Hereford and of the type of wells, but would not be satisfied until they could come on the grounds and make a personal inspection. They visited a number of the wells and after seeing the large volume of water flowing out with such ease, they exclaimed with one accord, "the half has not been told;" "we could never have believed it;" "that beats anything we ever saw;" "that's coming some;" "that's going some;" "that's an ocean of water;" "what kaffir and maize;" "who would'a thought it;" "we are going to have us a dozen like them;" and so on for several more exclamations. Their real purpose was to examine the McDonald type of well. They have organized a stock company and will put in a big well on a tract near Lubbock and operate a demonstration farm. While not using the water on the crops, it will flow down both gutters of the main boulevard and around the square. Trees will be planted and the streets made one of the attractive features of the town. On the farm every variety of fruit, vegetable and field crop will be grown. No doubt, this well at Lubbock will cause many others to be put down. That Hereford has set the standard for irrigation is now well established. All of the points within the radius of 200 miles, where irrigation by pumping is possible, look to Hereford. They have all recognized that the McDonald type of well is a water getter. They have seen the crops, they have drunk of the pure water to their intoxication, and they all return with praises for the "Oceans of Water" on their lips. ### County Exhibits at State Fair.

Dallas, Texas, October 24.—Twenty-seven counties are exhibiting products raised within their borders at the Dallas Fair, this season involving an expense of over \$18,000. Among the most prominent displays and ones eliciting much admiration and approval are Montague, Hunt, Denton, Comanche, Wichita, Brown, Hall, Hale, Donley, Van Zandt, Andrews, Wilbarger and McCollough. Although Hunt County has been conceded first prize for general exhibit by many visitors, this point is being closely contested by Montague, Wichita and Denton Counties, all of which are offering excellent specimens of farm products for inspection.

Forage crops, consisting of Milo Maize, Kaffir Corn, Egyptian Wheat, Oats, etc., are prominently to the fore, but fruits and vegetables also occupy considerable space in the different booths.

Canned fruits are especially attracting attention and several fine specimens are displayed. Pears, peaches, apples and berries, looking as fresh and luscious as the day they were picked attract the eye and sharpen the appetite of the sight-seeing visitor.

King Cotton is still the ruler and dictator at all exhibits but a casual glance at the volume of Kaffir and Maize displayed in attractive designs cannot fail to convince the most skeptical that Texas farmers are practicing diversification more each year and that in a short time these two crops will forge to the front as formidable rivals to the old standby.

Thousands of head of cattle, hogs and all kinds of livestock are housed in the pens and yards and many fine breeds are shown. The hogs this year show a great improvement over last and the number on exhibition has also increased.

The machinery and farm implement displays are unusually large this year and every article of practical use to the farmer is listed in the entrees. Disc plows are very numerous and this soil breaker is very popular with the interested land developer.

Individual booths in the main exhibition hall are attractively arranged and artistically draped with flowers and flowing streamers, possessing the true fair environments and calling for several hours inspection in order to receive the full benefits of their beauty and instructiveness.

### Kansas City Market Letter.

Kansas City Stock Yards, Oct. 21, 1912.—The general cattle market advanced 10 to 25 cents last week, everything participating except veal calves, which lost 25 to 75 cents, and prime finished steers. None of the latter class were received, but they are quotable around \$10.75 for best, about a quarter under the highest time. Country buyers are the backbone of the market, their purchases last week aggregating 35,000 cattle here. Another heavy run came in today, 28,000 head, about one fourth more than anybody expected today. Country buyers have again saved the day for the market, sales ranging steady to ten lower than the best time last week. Killer buyers are rendered harmless by the extraordinary demand from the country else they might be counted on to do effective work in lowering prices. Kansas is still shipping freely, pasture cattle selling today at \$5.00 to \$8.50, including Old Mexicos grazed in Kansas. Ohio feeder buyers took eight loads of Greenwood county steers at \$6.15 to \$6.50, on which the best bids from packers was \$6.00 to \$6.30. Common cows made the biggest gain in the quarantine division last week. Run there today is 116 car loads, selling a shade lower, steers at \$4.25 to \$6.00, cows \$3.25 to \$5.00. Thirty cars from Arkansas and five cars from Louisiana are included in quarantine receipts today. The Panhandle and Colorado are shipping freely, largely stock steers at \$5.50 to \$7.00, feeders \$6.00 to \$7.00, and some mountain beef steers at \$6.00 to \$7.50, cows and heifers \$4.25 to 6.00. Hogs have struck a rough place, market 10 lower today, following heavy dealings last week. Receipts are heavier, but are still far below runs a year ago. Top heavy hogs today \$8.75, middle weights \$8.40 to \$8.70, lights \$8.25 to \$8.60. Sheep made a big gain last week, shippers receiving \$100 to \$200 per car more for consignments than they expected when loading. The market is a quarter lower than high time today, supply 30,000 here today. Lambs bring \$6.75 to \$7.25, feeding lambs around \$6.00, wethers \$3.75 to \$4.50, ewes \$3.50 to \$4.00.

### Many Important Subjects Discussed

Houston, Texas, Oct. 17.—Unusual interest was manifested by the members of the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, who were in session in this city recently, in the reports of Texas Welfare Commission, Education; Marketing of Cotton; Marketing of Perishable Farm Products; Irrigation; Good Roads; Insurance; Organization of Private Corporations and Railroad Stocks and Bonds, were passed upon by the Commission and this recommendation will be printed in pamphlet form for free distribution by the Association.

Joseph Lee of Colorado, manager for a large irrigation company that furnishes water by the gravity system to a big scope of country, was here this week and made a careful inspection of the irrigation wells. He upon his own responsibility measured the flow of a few of the wells. At the Baskin-Hester well he measured 150 Colorado inches; at the Gough well, 168. Mr. Lee stated that his company never contracted with a farmer for more than 120 inches for each 160 acres, and that the Hereford wells were more than sufficient. He further stated that his company charged the Colorado farmers \$11.50 for each 24-hour run giving them 100 inches. Compared with the cost at the Gough well, the figures are favorable to Hereford, when a run of 24 hours, with a flow of 168 inches, cost but \$12.00. A flow of only 100 inches at the Gough well costs but \$7.14. This is one third less than the Colorado cost. Mr. Lee was pleased with both the quality and quantity of the water and as for the soil, he felt sure of its properties. No doubt, he will make a most favorable report to his company and friends.

### Thrifty Immigrants Entering Galveston.

Galveston, Texas, Oct. 17.—During the month of September 517 aliens entered the United States through this port, bringing with them \$16,726 in cash. Of this amount, the Germans seemed to have the bulk of it, as sixty of them brought \$5,570, forty-nine Bohemians, \$4,502, and the balance of the money was brought in by the various other nationalities. There seems to be a much thriftier class of aliens enter this port than any other in the United States. Most of them bring a sufficient amount of money to support themselves until they obtain employment or find a suitable investment.

The tower is up and as soon as the outfit can be moved, the McDonald Company will put down the well and the equipment.

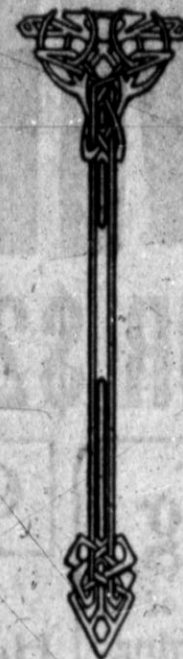

#### Favors Compulsory Education.

Prof. W. O. Allen, the Sage of Plumdale, a teacher of three or more decades, answers Supt. Abbott of McLennan county concerning the apportionment of the state public free school funds and offers a substitute in compulsory education. The Sage thinks that a different method of distributing the funds will not reach the people and encourage school attendance, but rather punish those ambitious children in the counties where school attendance is below the average. But Prof. Allen forgets one thing or two. He knows from his long experience in the school room that all boys were not cut out to make Websters nor Westinghouses; that, to use an old but trite saying, "you cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear;" that the unequal mental and moral ability of the pupils make compulsory education an impossibility. There could be compulsory attendance, but never compulsory education; you cannot educate a boy or girl against their will. The old couplet is germane: "You can lead a horse to water, but you cannot make him drink; you

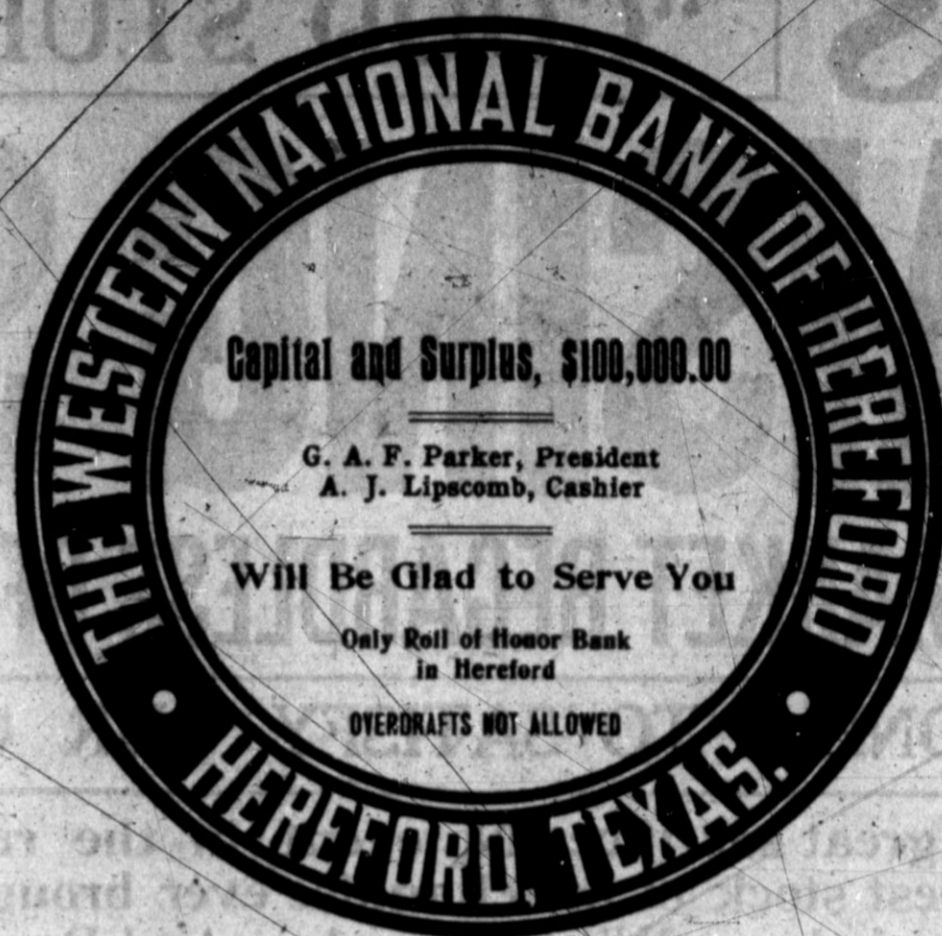

can send a boy to college, but you cannot make him think;" and to be able to think is to become educated. It is doubtful whether "compulsory attendance" would bring about the desired end—to give all the people a common school education. True, all of the boys and girls, with rare exceptions, would learn to read and write; to use the four fundamental principals of arithmetic and to compose simple letters of correspondence; but the great throng of people would still depend upon others to do their planning and their thinking; we are not far enough removed from the "dark ages." The old doctrine of the "survival of the fittest" would work wonders in the proposed method of apportioning the state funds; those who valued an education would strive for the state benefit; the counties would vie with each other in the matter of attendance; the teachers, if they were true to their charges, would encourage the boys and girls to remain in school instead of driving them out by antiquated methods and vagaries of the school room. Instead of trying to bend the mind to suit the methods, the methods would be changed to suit the trend of mental growth. "Compulsory education" belongs to the idea of stuffing geese to fatten them for the market and the surprise is that the Sage of Plumdale would advocate such an impossibility. Geese can be fattened against their will, but a boy, never.

In the attempted assassination of Col. Roosevelt, the world is again reminded of the undercurrent of anarchism that flows in the stream of American civilization as well as in the kingdom of Europe. While these fiendish deeds of murder are usually attempted by some "crank" or demented person, they get their motive and incentive from the flaming speeches of anarchists, and from papers and books that stir up hatred and strife between the fortunately rich and the unfortunately poor. While the freedom of the press and stump should never be curtailed, it appears that there should be some limit placed upon the circulation of literature that tends to array men against men or classes against classes. Labor should not be taught to hate Capital; the poor should not be taught to hate the rich; the uneducated should not be taught to hate the tutored; the brotherhood of man should be encouraged. Why should a man be shot down in cold blood, just because he has an ambition to be president of the United States for the third time? Why should men like Carnegie, Rockefeller, Frick be hated just because they have amassed millions. They have done nothing more than their dispoilers would have done had they had the same opportunity. Some of them might have done worse. The millionaires of this country are the direct result of our complicated commercial system and the combined result of organization and invention. Without the large corporations and the use of the modern machinery, it would have been impossible to carry on the vast business of the oil or steel companies. The world demanded these big concerns and it took men of world-wide thinking to effect such organizations that would bring the desired results. Shooting



down men who either defend the present systems or advocate their abolition and confiscation will have no more effect than burning Christian martyrs at the stake.
